Soil & Water District Offers Windbreak Trees

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District has started taking orders on windbreak trees. The district sells windbreak trees each year to help raise money for our local Soil and Water Conservation District to promote conservation in the county.

The following trees and shrubs are available this year: American Plum, Amur Honeysuckle, Aromatic Sumac, Flameleaf Sumac, Fourwing Saltbrush, Green Ash, Hackberry, Honeylocust, Lacebark Elm, Nanking Cherry, Osage Orange, Russian Olive, Sand Plum, Shumard Oak, Caragana, Coto-neaster, Native Plum, Skunkbush Sumac, Sand Cherry, European Sage, Siberian Elm, Hybrid Cottonwood, Golden Willow, Lombardy Poplar.

The evergreens that are available are: Austrian Pine, Pinyon Pine, Redcedar, Spruce, Rocky Mt. Juniper, Colorado Blue Spruce, Ponderosa Pine, Scotch Pine.

We also have lilac bushes and wildlife packages available.

Orders will be taken until Feb. 28, 2003. Trees will come in the last part of March. Please come by our office to pick up an order form or give us a call and we can mail an order form to you. Should you have any questions please give us a call at 806/826-3565 ext. 3.

Wheeler County Crime Stoppers Program Will Become A Reality

Following months of preparation, training and paperwork, Wheeler County Crime Stoppers, Inc., will become a reality thanks to a generous donation of seized drug money from 31st District Attorney Rick Roach.

Within seven days, Wheeler County Crime Stoppers will be operational, taking anonymous tips and paying cash for any arrest made using that information.

Approximately 18 months earlier, Sheriff Jimmy Adams expressed the idea that a Crime Stoppers program needed to be started to provide a way for anonymous callers to relay valuable information to law enforcement officials.

Sheriff Adams asked Toby Brooks, editor of the *County Star-News*, to act as chairman of the organization, appointing Wheeler County Chief Deputy Rick Walden as the coordinating officer representing the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department as well as, through cooperation with Shamrock Chief of Police Joe Daniels, the Shamrock Police Department.

Both Brooks and Walden were certified by Southwest Texas State University's Institute of Criminal Justice Studies, after successful completion of TCLEOSE Course 3902, receiving 16 hours of basic crime stoppers training at Austin, January 24-25, 2002.

Since that time, a five member executive committee was established consisting of: Chairman -

Toby Brooks of Shamrock, Vice-Chairman Gary Ware of Wheeler, Treasurer - David "Dusty" Oldham of Shamrock, Secretary - Maggie Marshall of Wheeler, Fundraising Chairman - Jim Wakefield of Shamrock, and Coordinating Officer - Rick Walden.

The organization was incorporated in the State of Texas, is pending 501(c)(3) tax exempt status from the federal government, and has passed its bylaws all with help from generous donations by Shamrock City Secretary, Becky Brown, and Shamrock attorney, John Mann. Representatives from Samnorwood, Shamrock, Kelton, Wheeler, Ft. Elliott and Allison's school districts have been asked to join the Board and will be accepted at a November 7, 2002, meeting. All Board members must undergo thorough criminal background checks and believe in the philosophy of Crime Stoppers by holding the confidentiality of the caller as the most important aspect of the organization. Terms of Board members are for three years.

"Crime Stoppers simply does not work if total confidentiality is not maintained. Let me assure any individual who calls in an anonymous tip, that unless they reveal their identity, their anonymity will be protected," said Mr. Brooks. "Unless the caller wants their identity revealed, there is absolutely

no way their identity will be made known to anyone due to safeguards and laws in place to protect Crime Stoppers callers and the organization itself."

A weekly "Crime of the Week" will begin appearing in the *County Star-News* and *The Wheeler Times* with a short synopsis of a crime that has been committed in the immediate area. Anyone with information concerning that particular crime, or any criminal activity being committed, is encouraged to call Wheeler County Crime Stoppers at 826-0227. After an arrest is made from the information received, callers will be instructed, through the weekly newspaper column, to contact a telephone number receiving instructions on how to obtain their cash reward from \$50 up to \$1,000.

Although the number to Wheeler County Crime Stoppers is a Wheeler phone number, the phone is NOT answered by anyone in Wheeler county. The Wheeler phone number is forwarded to a firm outside of Wheeler county that will handle all Wheeler County Crime Stopper calls. The phone number is NOT equipped with "caller I.D." or "call return." The conversation is NOT recorded and as soon as the phone call is completed, the information is immediately relayed to the Wheeler County Sheriff's office and appropriate action will be immediately taken.

"I could think of no better way to use seized drug money other than using it to fight crime. It is my pleasure to help this organization with this initial seed money of \$5,000 and I challenge Wheeler County's citizens that my office will match each dollar donated to Wheeler County Crime Stoppers in the next six months, up to an additional \$5,000," said District Attorney Roach.

OBSERVATIONS

... from the Wheeler Superintendent

What do you remember from your time in public school? For some of us, those days are getting to be so long ago that the facts may have been "hazed" over in our memory. Some of us will always be convinced that there could never be another school, team, band, or whatever as good as the one we were part of.

I will always remember those teachers, coaches, sponsors, and choir directors that pushed me to do more than I thought I could do. They were able to see potential in me that I did not see in myself, and through their teaching, coaching, and directing, I was encouraged to attempt things I would never have attempted on my own. The successes or failures were mine. I was the one who studied, worked, sweated, rehearsed, and performed. But it was those adult leaders who challenged me to try things I considered too difficult for me.

As parents, we are not helping our children mature if we seek to rob them of experiences that make them uncomfortable or push them beyond what they think themselves capable of facing. How far is too far? How much is too much to expect? We don't want to pressure them too much nor overly protect them.

As we consider our roles today as parents and as educators, I hope we are successfully challenging our young people to attempt things beyond what they are comfortable with. May we be blessed with the ability to see their real potential and push them towards it.

USDA Seeks Comments On Farm Program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service is seeking public comments on the Farm and Ranch Lands Protection Program (FRPP) formerly known as the Farmland Protection Program. The 2002 Farm Bill amended the program and a proposed rule was published in today's Federal Register, Oct. 29, 2002.

"While the name of the program has changed to more accurately reflect that both farms and ranches are eligible for assistance, the program's purpose, which is to protect prime, unique and important soil from conversion to nonagricultural uses through the purchase of conservation easements, remains the same," said

NRCS Chief Bruce I. Knight.

The proposed rule establishes eligibility criteria, state ranking considerations and guidelines for program administration. USDA encourages written comments on the proposed rule from individuals as well as governmental agencies and nongovernmental organizations during the 60 day comment period. 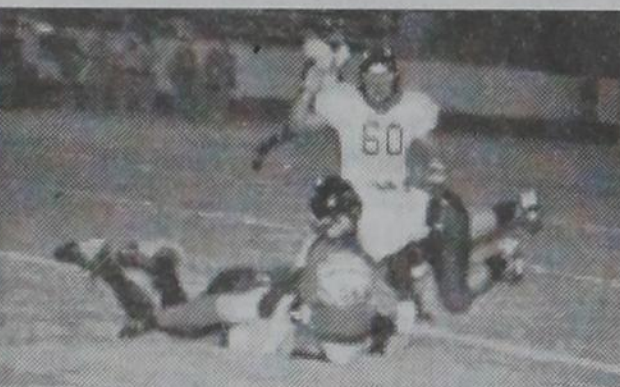

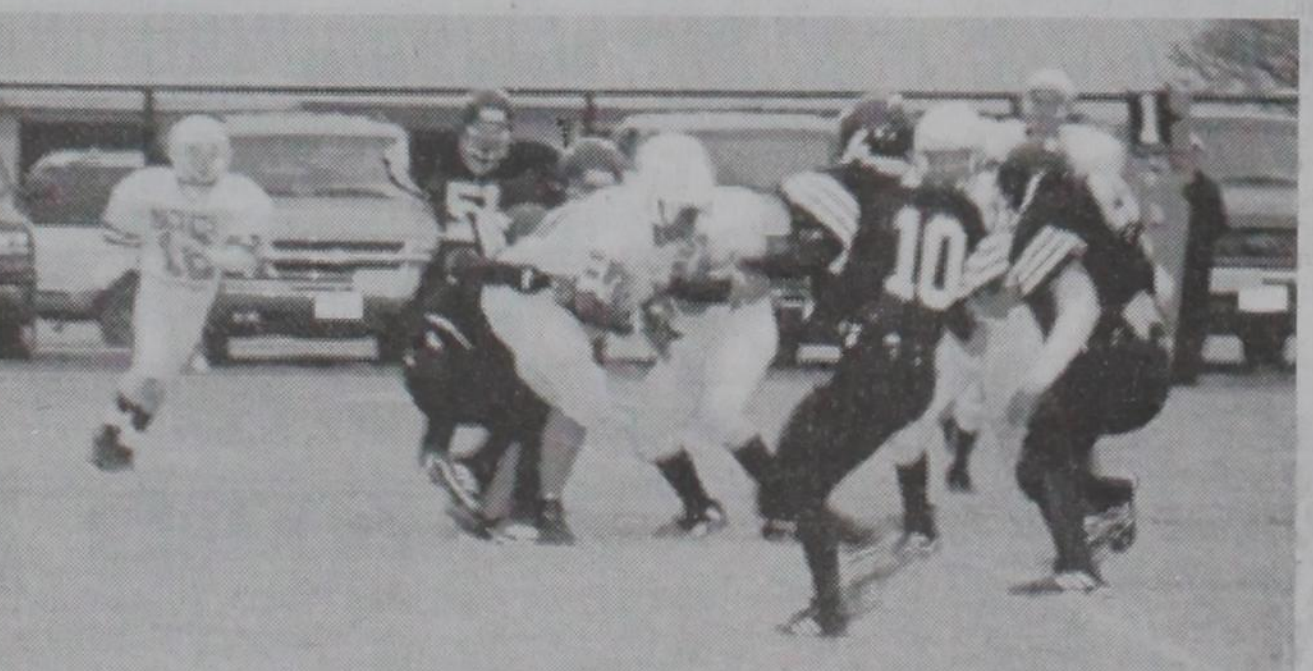

eating contest. Logan Chupp, Monty Hand and Grant Archer were the three fastest eaters.

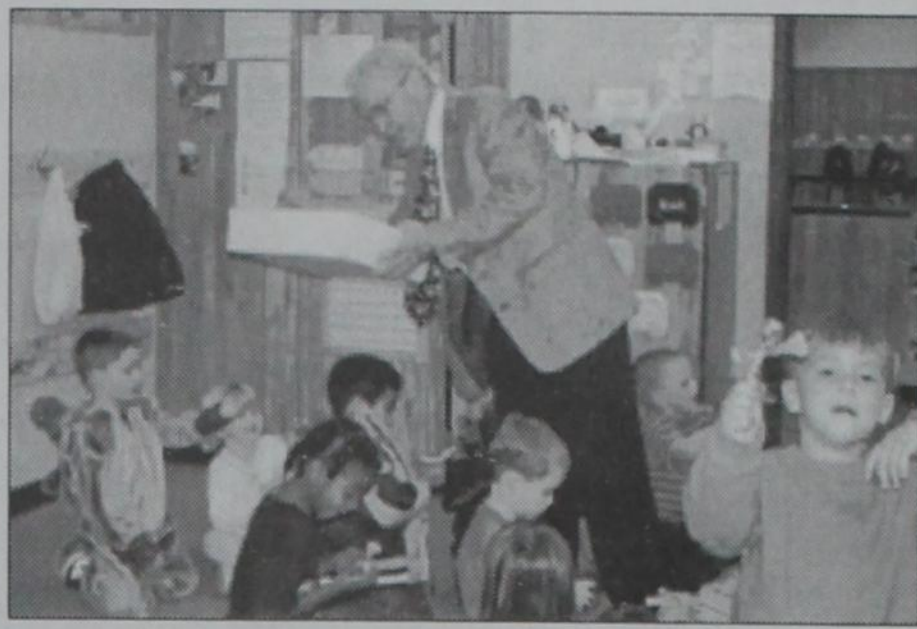
Bingo dominated the night's fun, though. Every game was full.

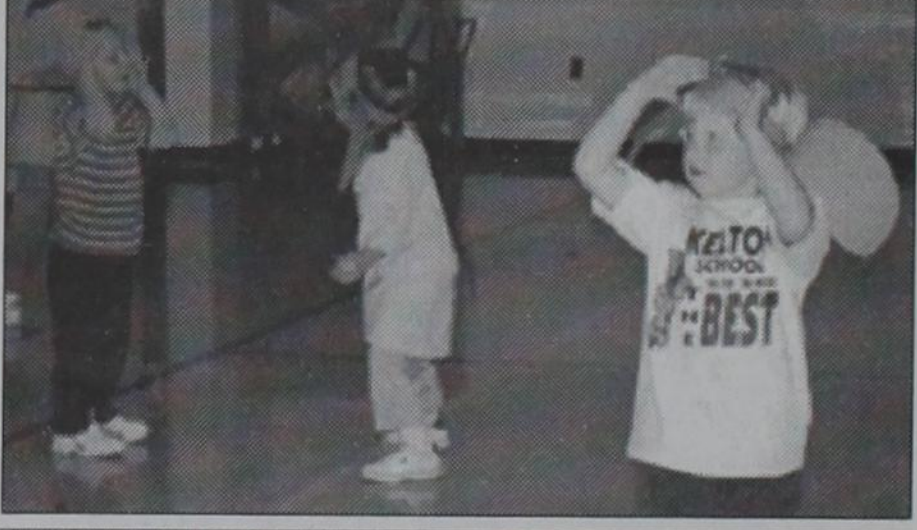

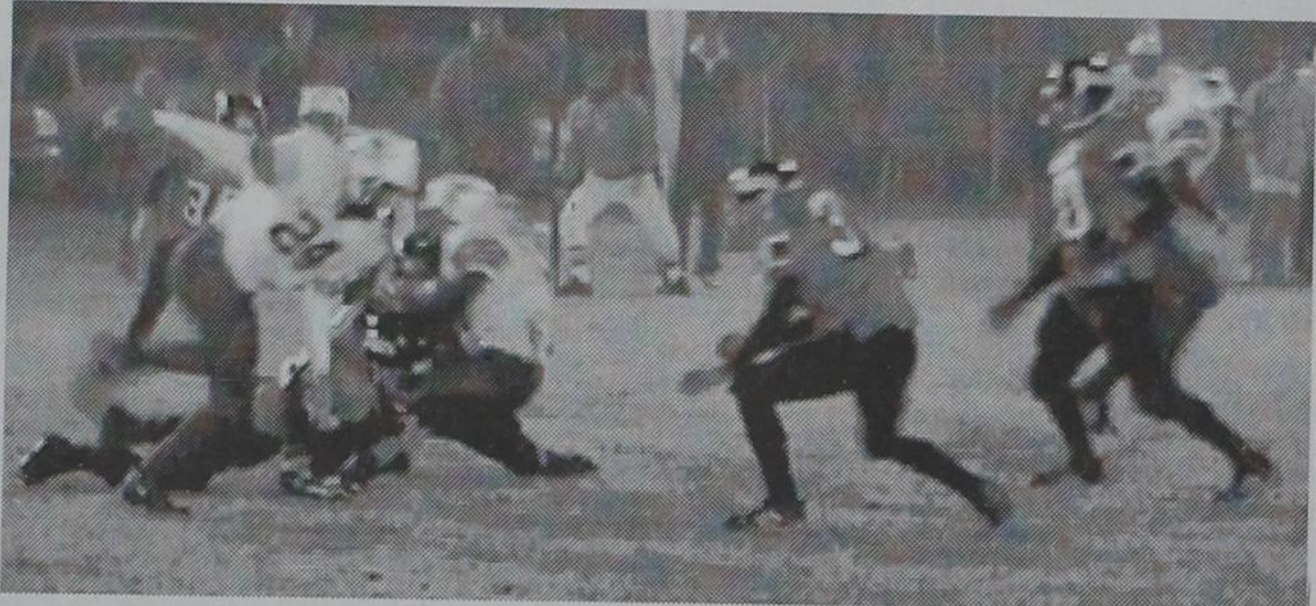

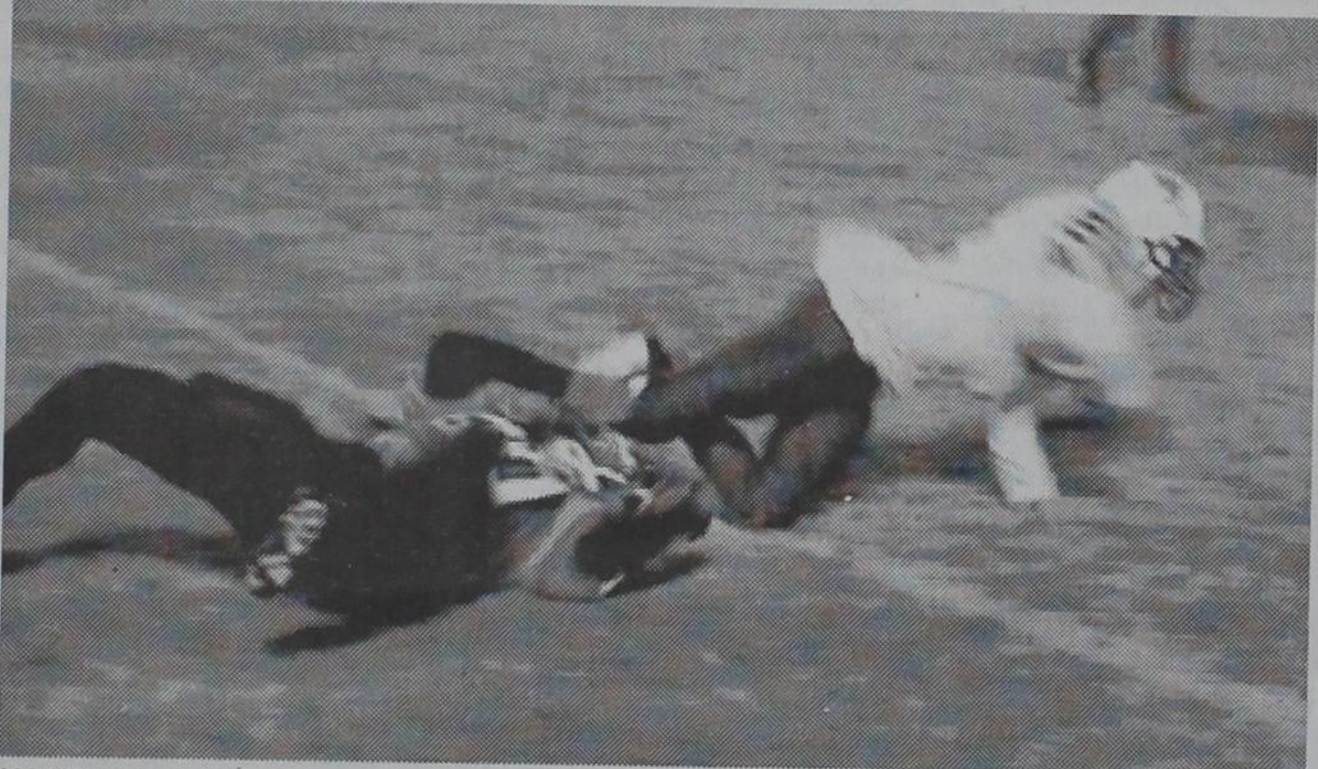

END GAIN: The Ft. Elliott Cougars bring down a Samnorwood player Friday evening to end the gain.



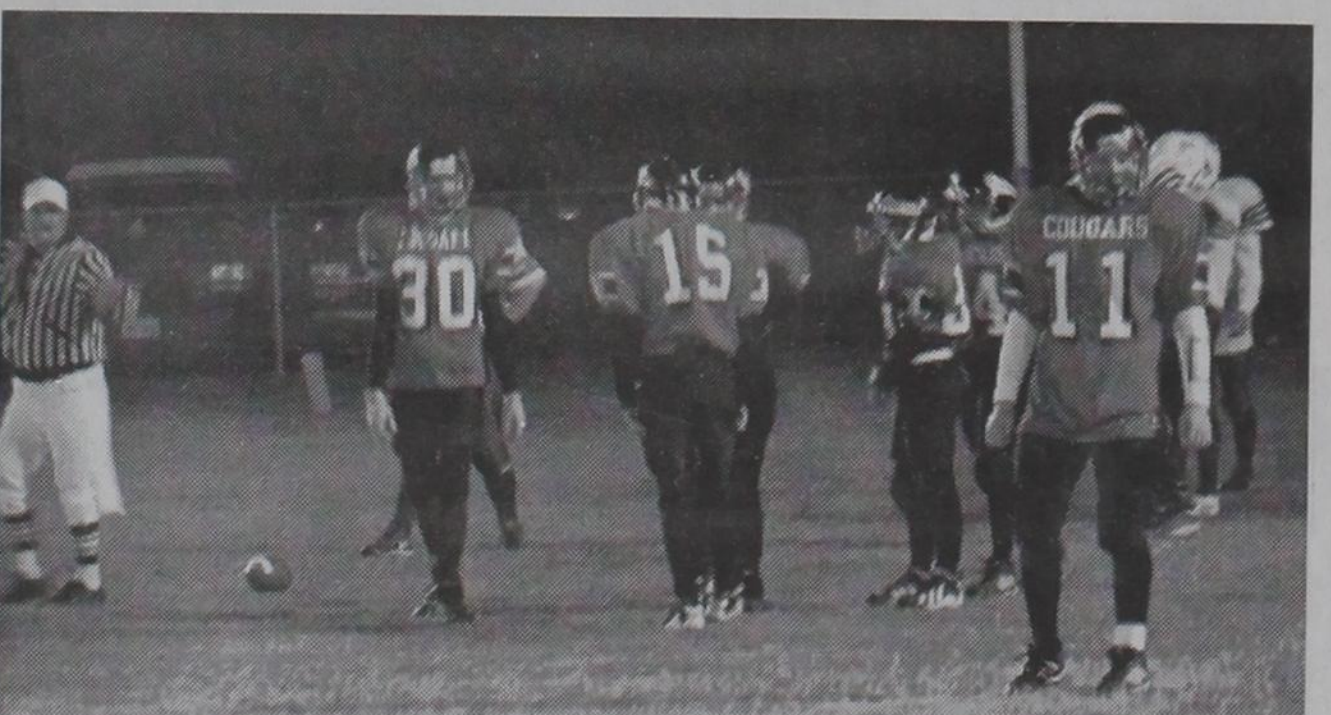
