The recent wildfire tragedy at Stinnett should increase everyone's awareness for Wildfire hazards.

Local conditions are extremely critical due to the extended "Dry-Spell", low humidity and high wind speeds common this time of the year.

All residents should "clear" areas adjacent to structures and homes of tall grass, weeds and trash. If a Wildfire approaches your property, immediately notify the Sheriff's office and evacuate to a place of safety. **DO NOT ATTEMPT TO EXTINGUISH A FIRE OF ANY MAGNITUDE WITH A GARDEN HOSE.**

Please **DO NOT** attempt to "Go Look at the Fire" as this is:

1. Extremely dangerous.
2. Illegal.
3. Handicaps firefighting efforts, resulting in a greater loss of property.

Please "Yield" to emergency vehicles in route to a fire or other emergency.

Volunteer firefighters in Wheeler County provide thousands of dollars worth of service each year, at a fraction of the cost of paid departments.

All Fire Departments in this area are "Critically Undermanned" from 7:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m., Mondays through Friday, and although many firefighters reside in this area, their jobs are elsewhere during these hours.

We are requesting that you call before setting any outside fires, because all fires that are responded to by the fire departments will be extinguished per state law requirements and civil liabilities. We are requesting your cooperation in this matter for the safety of the responding fire personnel and emergency equipment. Each fire call costs the county \$125.00 minimum and could cost a human life unnecessarily.

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If you qualify, your agricultural land will be taxed on its capacity to produce crops, livestock, or timber, instead of its value on the real estate market. Productivity appraisal can lower the taxable value of your land, and lower your property taxes as a result.

If your land has never received productivity appraisal, you must apply to the appraisal district no later than Tuesday, April 30, to get

tax benefits for 1991. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

If your land already receives agricultural or timber appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to. If an annual application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

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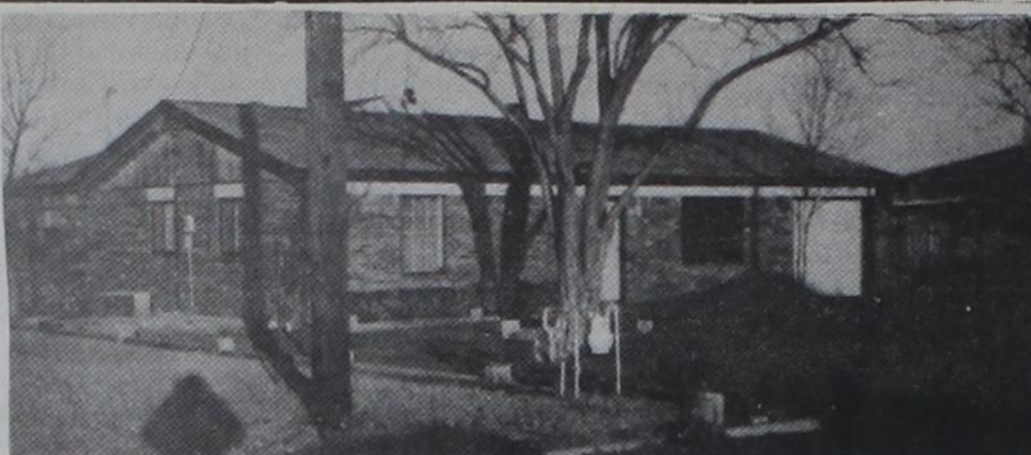
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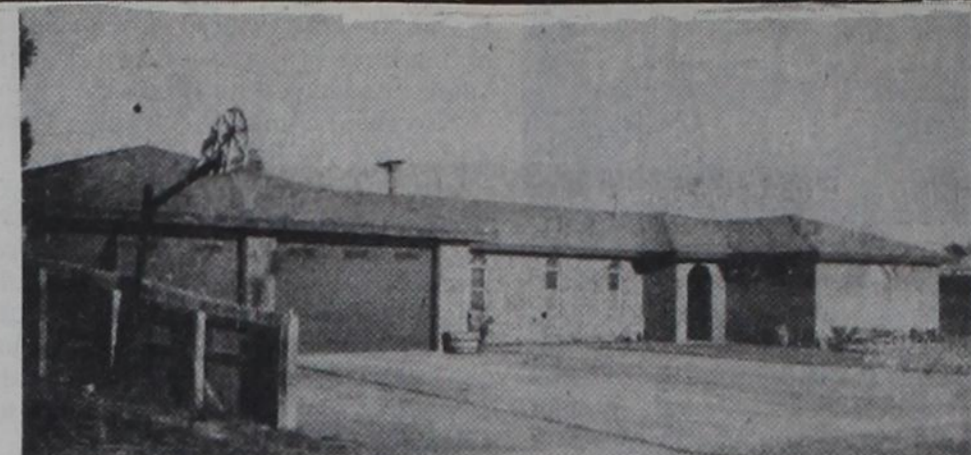

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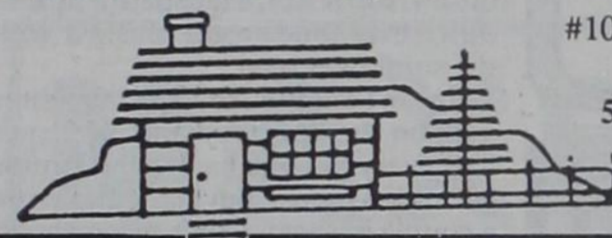

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS



MAY LOWER YOUR HOME'S PROPERTY TAXES

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. For example, if your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth only \$45,000.

You qualify for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1 and used it as your primary residence on that date. It doesn't matter whether your home is a house, a condominium, or a mobile home.

Exemptions are available to all homeowners to lower their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 and over. And, if you receive the over-65 exemption, you also qualify for a ceiling on school taxes. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts.

Who should apply? If you received a homestead exemption on your home in 1990, you won't need to

re-apply for 1991 unless your chief appraiser requires it.

If you became 65 or disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1991.

File your homestead exemption with your local appraisal office at the address shown below.

The last day to file for applications is April 30, 1991. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time to file.

SCS Food Security Act Implementation

"From 1985 to 1990, we scrambled to assemble conservation plans in Wheeler county" said Fred Allison, District Conservationist for the USDA-Soil Conservation Service at Wheeler. "We sorely complained of the shortness of planning time. After all time was short."

Mr. Allison said, "Given that time frame, many producers hurriedly made decisions on conservation practices and techniques unfamiliar to them. Some producers didn't have the proper equipment to carry out their plan."

"1990 was a learning experience for all. But now these plans need to be applied," Allison said.

"Be advised, the 1985 Farm Bill is NOT fading away, Mr. Allison added. "If you don't fully agree, or just can't live with your plan, immediately contact the Wheeler County Soil Conservation Service Office."

Mr. Allison also said, "It is not too late. But it's imperative to make these adjustments now."

Plans for modified plans, must be implemented as scheduled and fully applied by December 31, 1994. Time is running out along with options.
