Wheeler ISD Is Now Offering Student's Registration Packets

For parents of all kindergarten students and of students new to the district, Wheeler ISD is offering registration packets. These became available Friday, August 2, and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on business days between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. parents of returning students will only need to fill out the "Registration/Emergency Card"; these will be available in the same location for parents who wish to fill one out prior to Friday, August 16, registration day.

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration/ Emergency Card; 2. Student Health Information (A two page questionnaire); 3. Home Language Survey. The parent/guardian must provide all the requested information, including full legal names, before his/her child can be enrolled in school. Students who attended Wheeler ISD's Early Education class already have the home language survey and the ting in some early hours getting ready student health information in their for the new year and football season. permanent records, but parents of these students need to get the kindergarten registration packets because it contains other vital information, as well as, the "Registration/Emergency Card."

> The estimated length of time needed to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "Traffic Jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day (9:00 a.m. through 10:00 a.m., Friday, August 16,) are welcome to do so.

BREAST SCREENING

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and high Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month.

2. Have a physical examination every year. 3. Have a mammogram according

Area Producers who are interested in improving their wildlife management skills are invited to two meetings on Thursday, August 22.

The annual Wheeler County Range and Pasture Tour will leave from the parking lot at Maxey's Steakhouse south of Wheeler at 9:30 a.m. on August 22. This year the tour, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District, will feature information on managing rangeland and pastures to improve wildlife habitat.

Primary speakers for the tour will be Dr. Dale Rollins, Extension Wildlife Specialist at San Angelo and J.F. Cadenhead, Extension Range and Brush Control Specialist at Vernon. Stops on the tour will include upland, creek bottom and meadow sites. Dr. Rollins will discuss planning brush and weed control to provide a habitat that encourages wildlife development. Cadenhead will explain methods of brush and weed control that can be

A sponsored meal will be provided

following the tour.

After dinner, there will be short presentations by Rollins, Cadenhead, the county Extension agent, and SCS

The second meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the District Courtroom at Wheeler. Dick DeArment, retired wildlife biologist for the Parks and Wildlife Department, will discuss the wildlife situation in the area and the potential for wildlife development. Dr. Rollins will present management techniques for the turkey, deer and quail that can increase their value to

the landowner. "Dr. Rollins is highly respected for his knowledge of wildlife and his speaking ability and those that know Mr. DeArment realize his understanding of and dedication to wildlife management in the Wheeler County area. This should be an enjoyable and informative meeting for anyone interested in wildlife," said Don King, County Extension Agent.

Educational programs conducted by the Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.





Reviewing recent research on teheffects of food on learning and behavior in children, Dr. Johanna Dwyer, professor of medicine at Tufts, stressed the Importance of school breakfast and other food programs. "School breakfasts and other school meals supply a meal that children would not otherwise eat. "According to Dwyer studies show a definite relationship between nutritional status and school achievement, with such factors as hunger, lack of school meals and iron deficiency correlating with poor performance.
