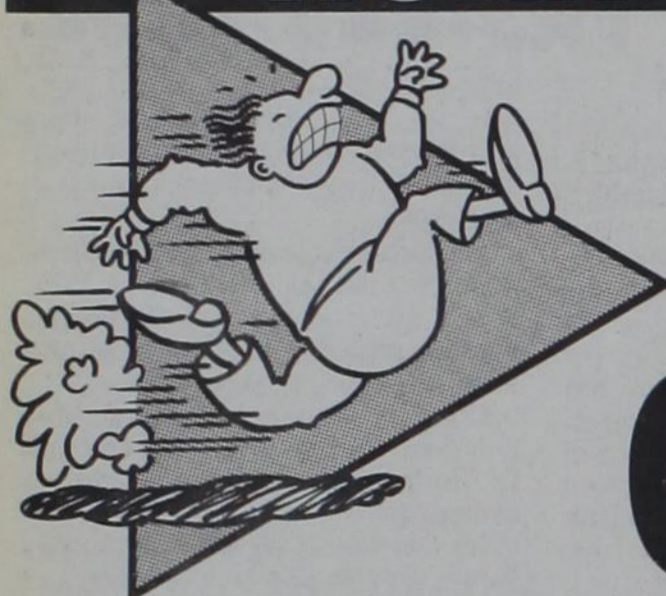

New Light Shed on Diet Behavior Connections

At a recent forum on diet and behavior sponsored by the American Dietetic Association National Center for Nutrition and Dietetics, speakers addressed a range of issues relating to childhood behavior.

Reviewing recent research on the effects of food on learning and behavior in children, Dr. Johanna Dwyer, professor of medicine at Tufts, stressed the importance of school breakfast and other food programs. "School breakfasts and other school meals supply a meal that children would not otherwise eat." According to Dwyer studies show a definite relationship between nutritional status and school achievement, with such factors as hunger, lack of school meals and iron deficiency correlating with poor performance.

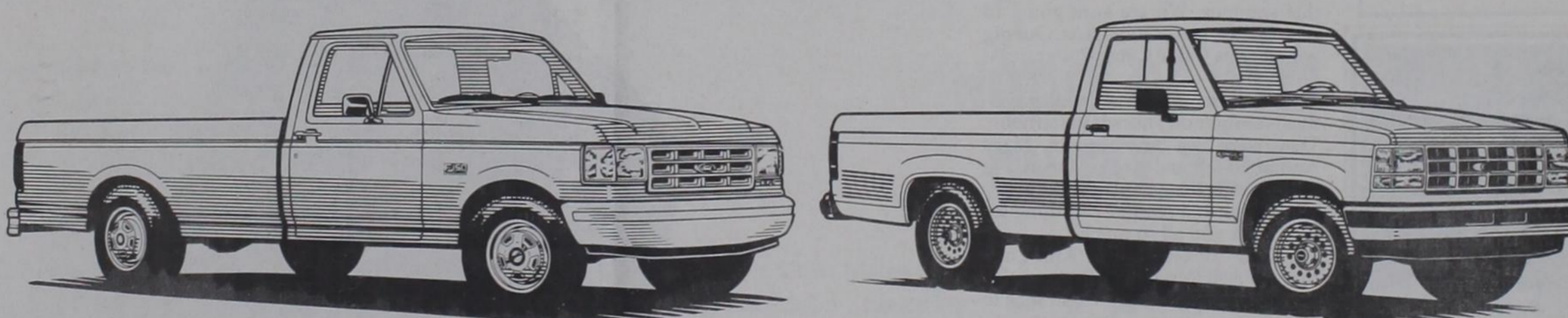

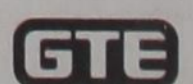

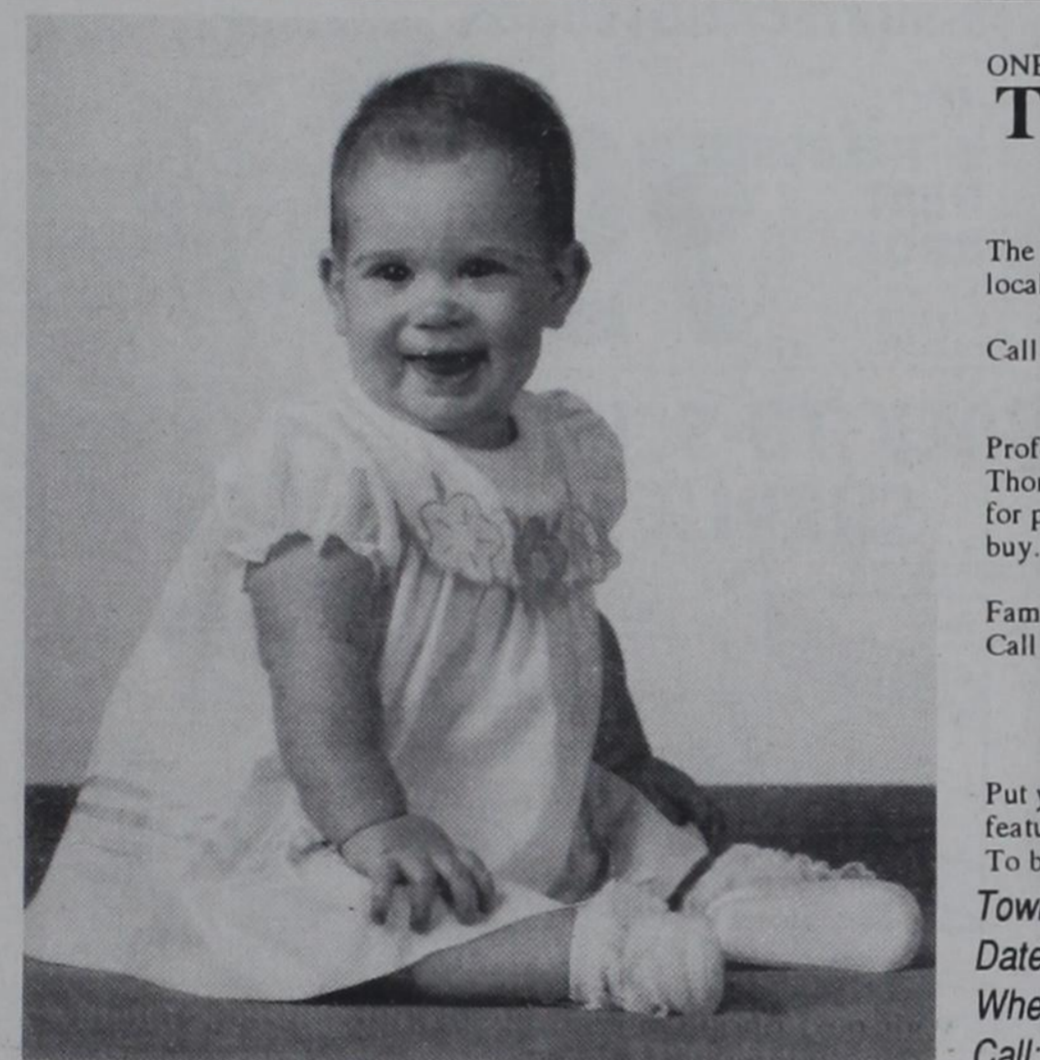
