LENINISM IS STIRRING IN TEXAS SCHOOLS

(Editor's Note: The following story was taken from the Phoenix Republic.) Leninism may be stone-dead in

Eastern Europe, but it's stirring, blinking and scratching itself in Texas. Yes, good old freedom-loving, getoutta-my-way, blankety-blank-thebureaucrats Texas!

What we're doing hereabouts is trying to uplift mediocre school districts by pillaging successful ones. These we've lined up against the wall, while the Legislature strip-searches them for property tax revenues. We're going to take the extra money they spend on their own pupils and pass it around to those who, sniff, sob, need it more. Who defines "need'? The state

It's the educational equivalent of the Bolshevik revolution in Russia. It should prove just about as fruitful.

A certain degree of human sympathy is due the legislators, into whose chambers the state Supreme Court wheelbarrowed this noisome mess.

The Texas Constitution, 115 years old, says Texas must provide an "efficient" system of public education. No court for 113 of those years ever said this meant mandatory redistribution of local property-tax revenues.

Nevertheless, in Edgewood vs Kirby, decided in late 1989, the court pounced on the mathematically indisputable fact that districts with higher property valves are able to raise more revenues than districts without.

Inefficiently! the justices hollered. In the next breath they told the Legislature to Do Something. The lawmakers voted \$2 billion over the next five years for poorer districts. These, unappeased, returned to court. The Supreme Court snarled again at the Legislature: Absolutely not; you have to redistribute.

This reminds us, I hope, that the nub of the school problem isn't lack of funds. Districts with less taxing capacity already receive compensatory monies from the state. (The spending gap between the "wealthiest" and the 'poorest" districts averages less than \$1,000 per pupil.)

No, the nub of the problem is Envy-second of the Seven Deadly Sins. The litigants don't just want more for themselves; they want others to have less. Their spokesmen in the state capital are toiling to make sure this

One reason they toil is that many of the "poorer" districts—including Edgewood, lead district in the lawsuit—are Mexican-American. Democrats, who presently control the state government, can't afford the appearanceofracial "insensitivity". Anyway, Texas whites increasingly vote Republican. To hell with them!

The state Senate's creative plan calls for rolling the state's 1,052 local districts into 20 taxing regions for more efficient rapine and pillage. A more "moderate" plan passed by the House would do the same job, only at the county wide level.

The underlying principle is the same: Everybody taxes at the same rate; everybody spends the same. The more you raise; the more you lose. We might as well live on a collective farm in the Ukraine, so little respect the Legislature pays hard work and private initiative. Give us a few years, we'll settle down to sloth and comfortable mediocrity. Einstein? Yeah, some heavy-metal rock band, right?

The state's better districts, under the new dispensation, will have to reduce programs and staff. The Highland Park Independent School, one of the country's best, would have to double local school taxes just to stay even.

The profound irony here is that some of the "richer" districts serve large numbers of poor people. (Property rich Dallas has few white students, thanks to busing). Likewise some of the "poorer" districts serve large numbers of the affluent.
