RANGE & PASTURE TOUR

JOE DON KING — CEA

Area Producers who are interested in improving their wildlife management skills are invited to two meetings on Thursday, August 22.

The annual Wheeler County Range and Pasture Tour will leave from the parking lot at Maxey's Steakhouse south of Wheeler at 9:30 a.m. on August 22. This year the tour, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District, will feature information on managing rangeland and pastures to improve wildlife habitat.

Primary speakers for the tour will be Dr. Dale Rollins, Extension Wildlife Specialist at San Angelo and J.F. Cadenhead, Extension Range and Brush Control Specialist at Vernon. Stops on the tour will include upland, creek bottom and meadow sites. Dr. Rollins will discuss planning brush and weed control to provide a habitat that encourages wildlife development. Cadenhead will explain methods of brush and weed control that can be used.

A sponsored meal will be provided

following the tour.

After dinner, there will be short presentations by Rollins, Cadenhead, the county Extension agent, and SCS personnel.

The second meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the District Courtroom at Wheeler. Dick DeArment, retired wildlife biologist for the Parks and Wildlife Department, will discuss the wildlife situation in the area and the potential for wildlife development. Dr. Rollins will present management techniques for the turkey, deer and quail that can increase their value to the landowner.

"Dr. Rollins is highly respected for his knowledge of wildlife and his speaking ability and those that know Mr. DeArment realize his understanding of and dedication to wildlife management in the Wheeler County area. This should be an enjoyable and informative meeting for anyone interested in wildlife," said Don King, County Extension Agent.

Educational programs conducted by the Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

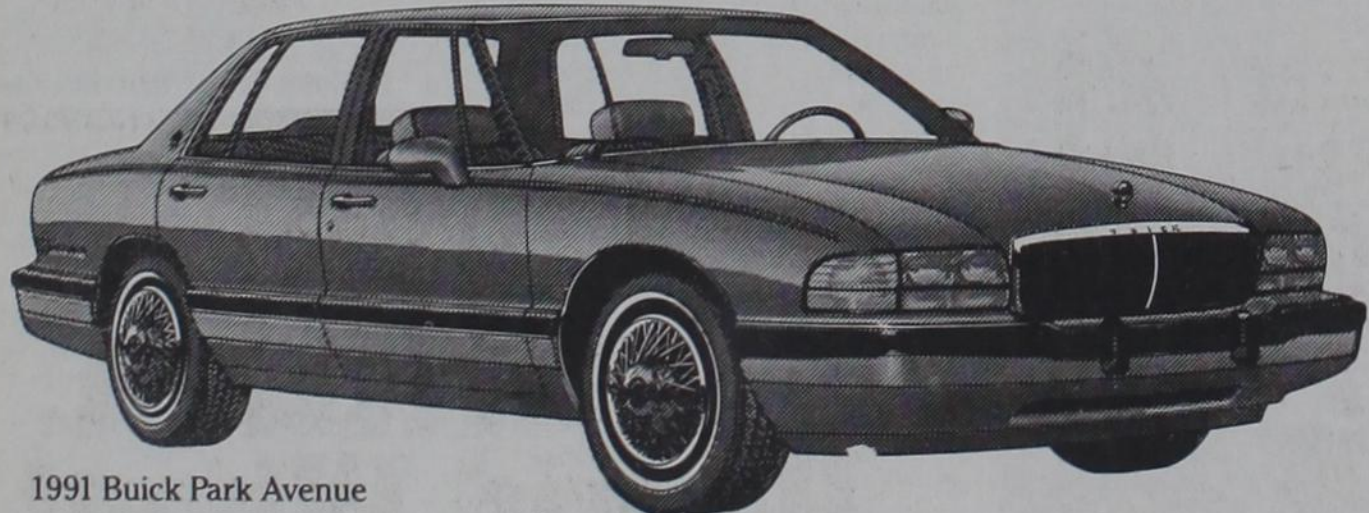

Preparing Compost For Garden Use

Cool mornings, holiday preparations, high school football, falling leaves, are all part of the changing of the seasons in Texas. Falling leaves are somewhat of a nuisance, but they can be a valuable asset to next year's garden. Leaves can be converted to valuable compost, one of the best mulches around.

Mulches reduce loss of moisture from the soil caused by evaporation. Moisture moves by capillary action to the soil surface and evaporates if the soil is not covered by a mulch. Sun and wind can rob valuable moisture during the growing season. Mulches keep the soil cool, help to suppress weeds, and provide protection against wind.

Mulches add organic matter and also furnish food for earthworms, which help to aerate the soil. The organic matter helps to keep the soil loose and easy to work. Farmers call this good tilth.

To provide a source for mulch and to do something with those fall leaves, every gardener should have at least one compost bin. Bins can be made by attaching ordinary wire fence or boards to solid posts or open brick-work. Each bin should be 4 to 6 feet high, 3 to 5 feet wide, and any convenient length. One side of each bin should be removable for convenience in building up the compost material and for removing the compost for use.

Many organic materials, such as leaves, are rich in carbohydrates and low in nitrogen. One or two cups of a high nitrogen fertilizer may need to be added to the material before applying it as a mulch. The organic material should be moistened thoroughly when fertilizer is added to the bin. Some garden soil may be added to the bins, about 1 inch for every 6 to 12 inches of organic material. Pack the material tightly around the edges, but only lightly in the center so that less water runs off.

After 3 or 4 months of moderate to warm weather, the material should be stirred and mixed. The material at the edges should be moved to the center. Two years may be needed before the compost is ready.

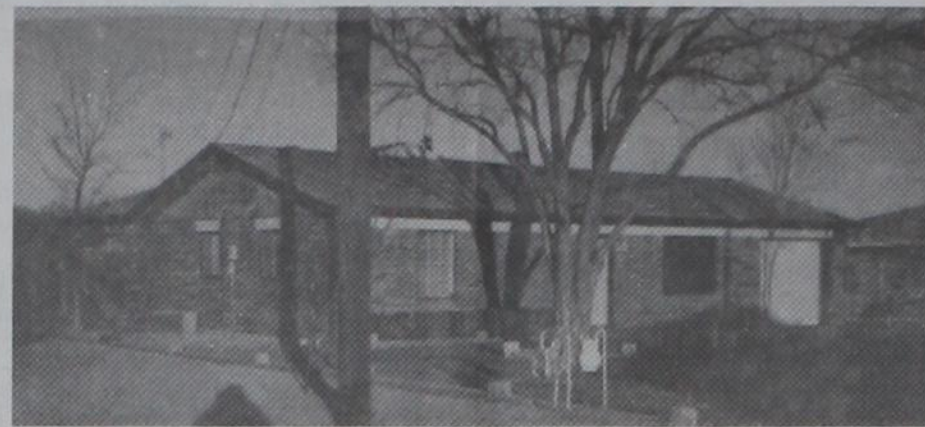

When Whaley, a paramedic with St. John's Ambulance Service in Aurora, Missouri comes to Booker, TX to visit his father, John Whaley, who lives at Twin Oaks Manor in Booker, he usually gives a little concert for the residents and staff.

Whaley was working with the Texas Highway Department in Vega when he first became a volunteer ambulance attendant. This should provide an opportunity to receive staff development training and possibly even student course work through this technology. At the present we plan to provide hook ups in four classrooms. These rooms will become receiving areas for the satellite information. Wheeler Schools will be responsible for providing a telephone line for satellite use, insurance on all award equipment, and space for the installation of the equipment. All other expenses are part of the award. This award should have many possibilities of educational value for Wheeler ISD.

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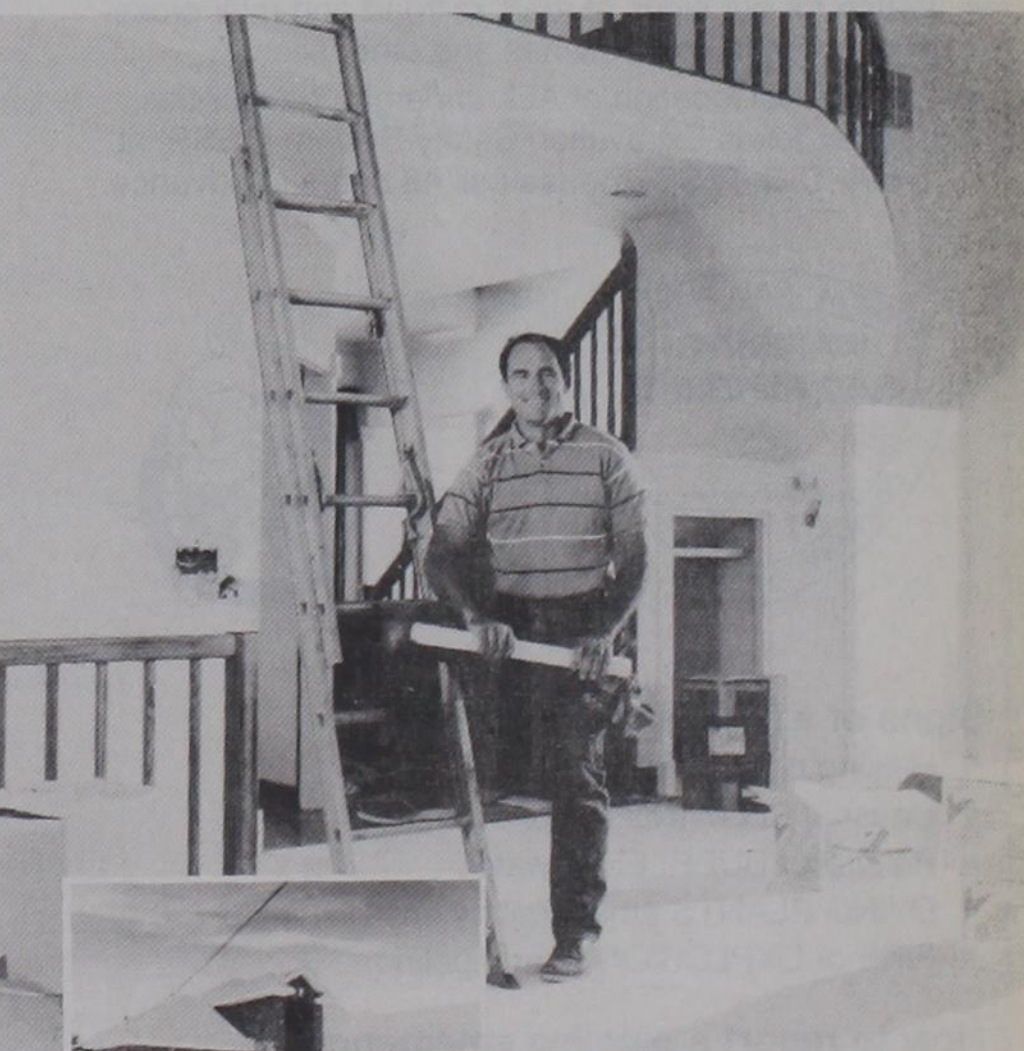

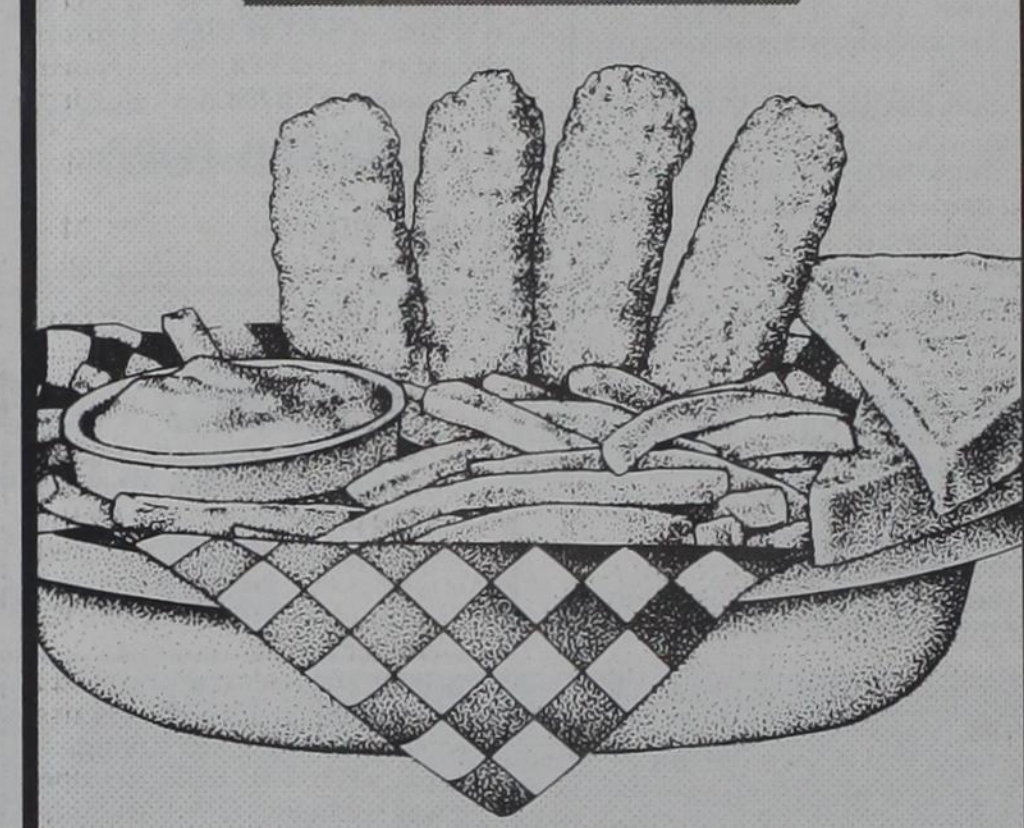

Children Should Get on Low-Cholesterol Track

Research shows kids with high cholesterol — from diet or genetic makeup — seem to maintain that as adults. High cholesterol has been linked to increased risk of heart disease the number one killer in the United States.

The National Education Program of the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute issued its first dietary guidelines in April for children and for screening those who might suffer hypercholesterolemia — high blood cholesterol.

The institute recommends that kids 2 and older follow a heart healthy diet with saturated fat making up less than 10 percent of total calories, and total fat now more than 30 percent. Cholesterol shouldn't exceed 300 milligrams daily. Nutritional adequacy should be achieved by eating a wide variety of foods. Energy (calories) should be adequate to support growth and development and to reach or maintain desirable body weight.

The panel's recommendations are not intended for infants from birth to 2 years of age, whose fast growth requires a higher percentage of calories from fat. Toddlers 2 and 3 years old can safely make the transition to the recommended eating pattern as they begin to eat with the family.

Most children diets exceed 35 percent fat. Fat and cholesterol levels in the United States are higher than most other countries. So there's room for improvement.

"The earlier you start, it seems to be easier to teach them healthy habits, get them to adopt healthy lifestyles and teach responsibility for their health," says Dr. Gerald Berenson, director of the Bogalusa (La.) Heart Study. "It keeps them out of unhealthy habits like smoking, alcohol and drugs. You're inoculating them against unhealthy lifestyles."

With these recommendations to guide them, parents and kids now have little excuse to avoid healthier eating. Even fast food chains are offering more healthful choices; federal agencies are working on uniform nutrition labels for supermarket food products.

It is important to be informed, but being informed hasn't been easy. These are the first official, detailed guidelines for children's diets approved by a consensus of medical and nutrition experts.

From The Minister's Desk:

Duffy Daugherty, the former head football coach at Michigan State University, once described football by saying: "It's often said that football is a contact sport. Not so. Football is a collision sport. Dancing is a contact sport."

I think that Coach Daugherty was correct. Football is a collision sport which can seriously injure the players. For this reason, the rules of football prohibit unnecessary roughness, saying: "No person under the rules shall commit a personal foul during an intermission. Any act prohibited hereunder or any other act of unnecessary roughness is a personal foul."

Football players should not be guilty of unnecessary roughness. Neither should Christians. But I am afraid that some Christians are! This unnecessary roughness is clearly illustrated by the harshness that often characterizes the lives of these Christians. And the New Testament plainly teaches that the lives of Christians should be characterized by gentleness not harshness. (Titus 3:2)

But why? Why should gentleness characterize the lives of Christians? In my opinion, there are at least two reasons that can be given. These two reasons are:—

1. When the lives of Christians are characterized by gentleness, they will be a positive influence upon people who are not Christians. II Timothy 2:25 states that Christians should gently correct people—"who are in opposition, if perhaps God may grant them repentance leading to the knowledge of the truth."

This principal can clearly be seen in the ministry of Jesus. Throughout His ministry, Jesus gently encouraged sinful people to become His disciples. And this gentle encouragement was not understood by the Jewish leaders, the Pharisees. These religious leaders harshly treated sinful people, but Jesus apparently believed that such treatment would only cause these people to reject Him. For this reason, Jesus gently treated them,

saying: "Come to Me, all who are weary and heavy-laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke, and learn from Me, for I am gentle and humble in heart; and you shall find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy, and My load is light." (Matthew 11:28-30) As Christians encourage sinful people to be Christians, they should be like Jesus. They should be gentle not harsh.

2. When the lives of Christians are characterized by gentleness, they will be a positive influence upon Christians who sin. The New Testament plainly teaches that Christians will sin, emphasizing that these Christians should be disciplined by other Christians. (I John 1:9-10, Romans 15: 14, II Thessalonians 3:6) But the New Testament also plainly teaches that the purpose of this discipline should be to restore these Christians not to alienate them. For this reason, Christians who sin should be restored with "— a spirit of gentleness—" (Galatians 6:1)

Such restoration is emphasized by the Apostle Paul in his letters to the church at Corinth. In his first letter, he urged these Christians to discipline a Christian who was guilty of a horrible sin. (I Corinthians 5:1-13) But in his second letter, the Apostle Paul cautioned these Christians about their treatment of this sinful Christian, saying: "Sufficient for such a one is this punishment which was inflicted by the majority, so that on the contrary you should rather forgive and comfort him, lest somehow such a one be overwhelmed by excessive sorrow." (II Corinthians 2:6-7) Harshness will often overwhelm Christians who sin with "— excessive sorrow—". But gentleness will often restore them.

The lives of Christians can be a positive influence upon people who are not Christians and upon Christians who sin. But their lives must be characterized by gentleness not unnecessary roughness.

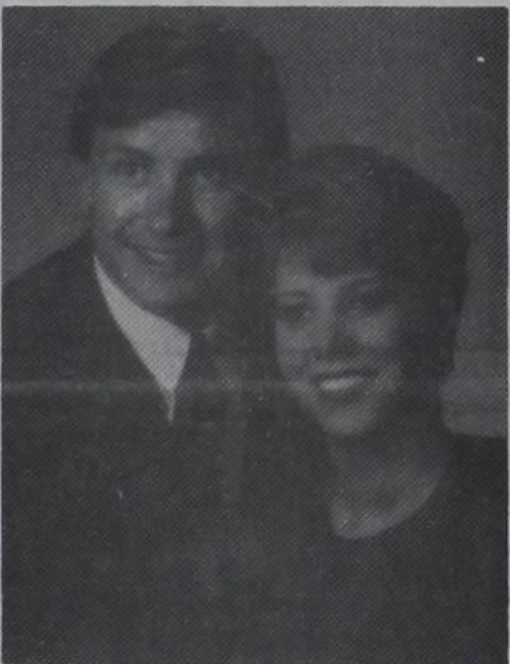

Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.
