I didn't have to make the signs, but they had to be mounted so they could be carried.

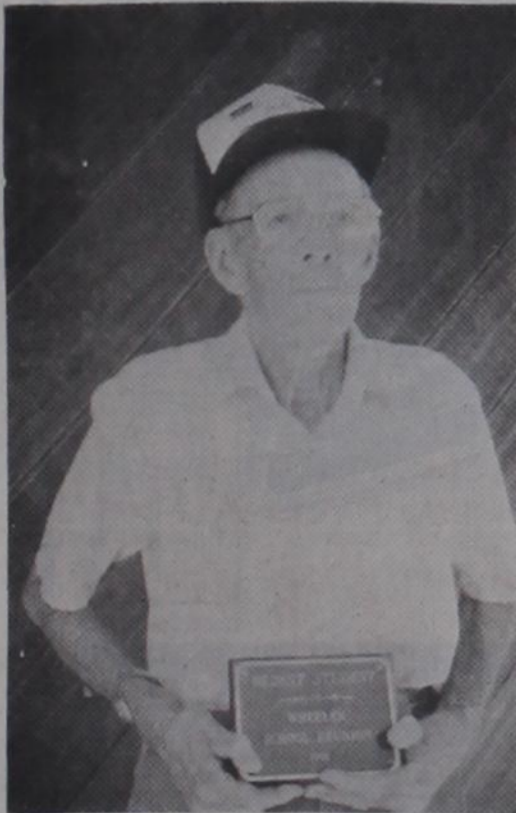
The event was on all three networks. The film I saw showed my sign, but they missed me. Darn, I almost made it on television. We had to wait until we returned from Wichita to see the newscast.

Scheduled for the afternoon will be a tug-o-war. This event is to be organized by Johnny Chapman. Teams of adults will pay \$10 per team for a chance at winning a "percent of the gate." A number of booth spaces have been reserved, but additional spaces remain. An effort will be made to eliminate duplication. 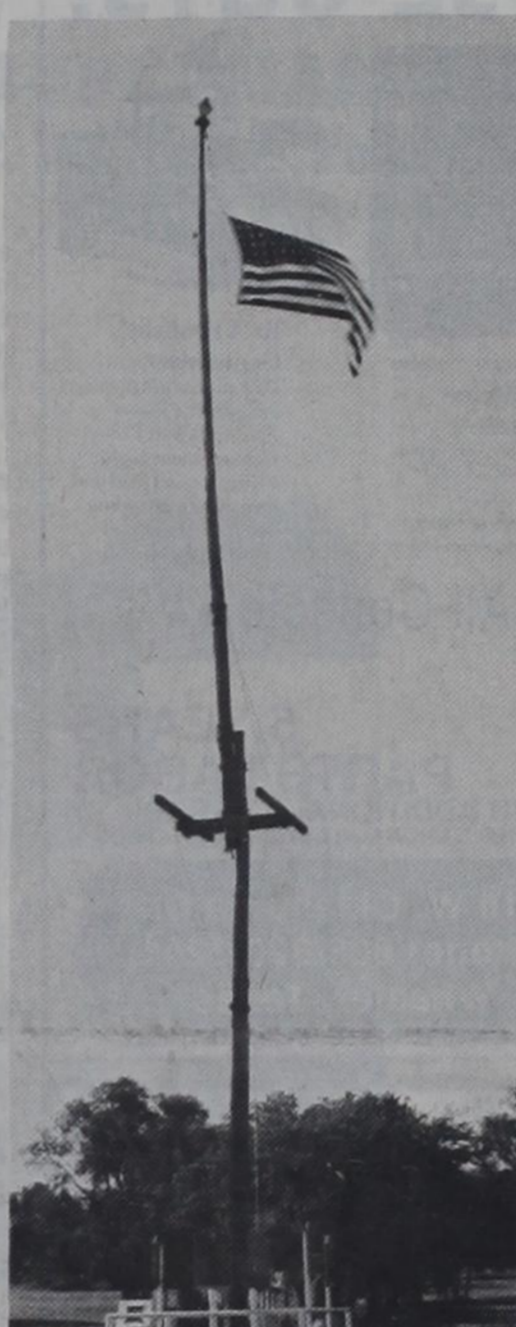
The entertainment will be provided all day. Anyone wishing to perform may contact the Chamber

First time donors over age 66 may be requested to have written permission from their physician if on daily medication. **Weight:** Minimum of 110 pounds. **Donation Frequency:** At least 8 weeks between donations. **Medical History:** You may not donate blood if you have or had: *Hepatitis, *Cancer (other than skin), *Diabetes requiring insulin, * Intra-venous drug use not prescribed by a physician, *Participate in activities at high risk of contracting AIDS, *Sexual contact with an AIDS patient or with individuals who are at increased risk of contracting AIDS, *Unexplained nightsweating, skin eruptions, fevers, weight loss, swollen lymph glands or persistent diarrhea (Heart, lung, kidney, liver or stomach disease may or may not prevent you from donating blood. Contact your Blood Center for more information.)
You may be temporarily deferred if you have or had: *Recent flu, cold, sore throat or fever, *Close contact with hepatitis in past 6 months, *Active infection or disease presently requiring prescribed medication, *Vaccinations in past 24 hours; some vaccinations have longer deferral periods, *Major surgery or blood transfusion in past 6 months, *Dental surgery in past 3 days, *Pregnancy in past 6 weeks; *In the past 3 years lived in, or in the past 6 months visited, a malaria area.

The regular meeting of the City Council of Wheeler, Texas was called to order by Mayor Wanda Herd.
Barbra Koelzer made motion, seconded by Don Rose to approve the minutes as written.
Mark Frankenbery made motion, seconded by Barbra Koelzer to pay bills as presented. The motion carried.
Frank Clymer reported on the activities of the City employees.
Charles Kuntz presented receipts and disbursements and discussed same.
Ken Daughtry representing Wheeler Volunteer Department met with the Council to discuss the utilities for the building which will be used for a training center for the Fire Department. This was given to the Fire Department by Natural Gas Pipeline. Bob McCain made motion, seconded by Don Rose to pay the utilities for one year. At the end of one year the utilities will be discussed again. The motion carried. Don King, representing Wheeler Riding Club, met with the Council to discuss giving the arena and surrounding land to the City of Wheeler. This will be discussed at a later date.
Don Rose made motion to approve the GTE Franchise Agreement in which GTE Southwest agrees to pay the City of Wheeler 2% of annual "Gross Revenues". This will be for a period of five (5) years. Mark Frankenbery seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Local Firemen Give Summer Safety Tips

FIREWORKS: There is no such thing as a safe firework. Hundreds of children and adults get hurt by fireworks every year. So use your good sense and enjoy the 4th of July fireworks at the Wheeler City Park. Don't let yourself or your child get burned.

OUTDOOR COOKING: Flammable liquids near live coals can cause explosions and burns. 1. The safest starters are chemicals in cake form or a charcoal electric igniter (approved by a nationally recognized testing laboratory like U.L.). 2. Never use gasoline near a fire. Never use a liquid fire starter to freshen a fire. Explosions may result. 3. To speed a slow fire or rekindle a dying one, tuck dry kindling under the charcoal. 4. After cooking, soak the coals. Coals that seem "dead" can re-ignite a day later.

CAMPING OUT OR IN THE BACKYARD: Watch out with flammable liquids and open flame near tents. 1. Buy a tent made of flame-retardant fabric. A paraffin-coated cotton tent can burn up in a few minutes with your child trapped inside. 2. Never use candles or matches in or near a tent. Use flashlights. 3. Build your fire downwind, far away from your tent. Make sure it's out before you go to sleep. 4. Never use gasoline. Don't freshen a fire with liquid starter. Explosions can result. Keep liquid fuels away from your tent and children. 5. Children burn up in their own backyards experimenting with campfires, candles, tents, gasoline. Supervise learning and play. Make sure your children are safe.

FUELING POWERMOWERS AND SAWS: Gasoline vapors can travel along the ground and be ignited by a nearby flame. 1. Don't smoke when you use gasoline. 2. Fuel outdoors. 3. Move ten feet from the fueling spot (away from vapors). Then start motor. 4. Cool the motor before refueling. 5. Wipe up gasoline spills. 6. Store gasoline in ventilated area in tightly closed safe cans away from children, sparks, or flame source. 7. Supervise children when they use gasoline and power tools so they won't get burned or injured.

FUELING YOUR BOAT: Gasoline vapors traveling to a flame source cause boat fires. 1. Don't smoke when you use gasoline. 2. Shut down engines, motors, fans, and heating devices before fueling. 3. Leave room in the tank for fuel expansion. 4. Wipe up spills. 5. Check bilges for leakage, fuel odors. 6. Ventilate until fuel odor is gone. 7. Now start your motor. 8. Have fire extinguishers that you know how to work.

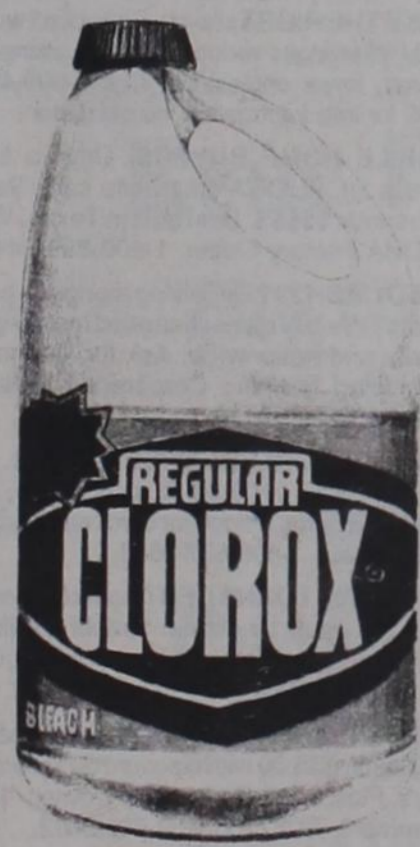

Soil Conservation Wetland Regulation

The Wetland regulations of the 1990 Farm Bill have changed stated Fred Allison District Conservationist of the SCS in Wheeler.

One of the most important changes involves the time frame when a person is in violation of Swampbuster. As of November 28, 1990, when a person converts a wetland for the purpose or to have the effect of making the production of an agricultural commodity possible he or she will be subject to a fine plus loss of eligible for USDA benefits until the wetland has been restored stated Mr. Allison.

Persons who plan to convert a wetland for other than agricultural production, this includes things such as roads or building construction, may be able to get prior approval so they will be exempt from eligibility and benefit losses. Allison stated that this prior approval involves a person completing a AD-1026 Form at the ASCS Office. He or she will need to state their intentions on AD 1026. At this time the SCS will approve or disapprove the proposal depending on whether or not the proposal fits into a non-agricultural use and all needed permits have been obtained.

Allison stated that if a person is planning any new construction in a wetland he or she should contact the local ASCS or SCS Office prior to starting construction.

All programs and services of the SCS are offered on a nondiscriminatory basis without regard for race, color, marital status or handicap status.

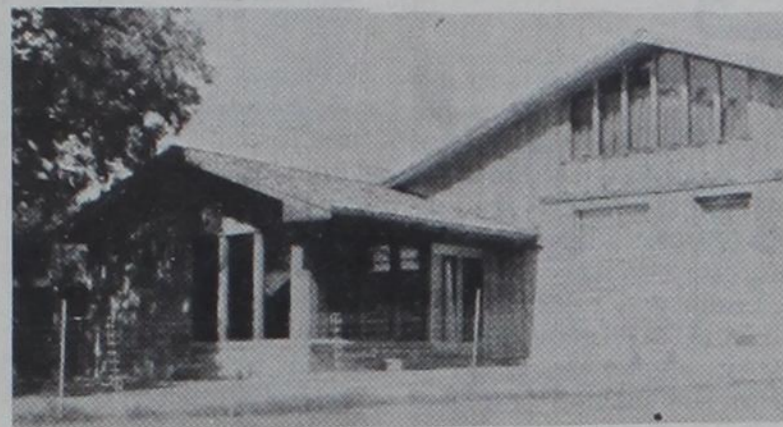

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION
AUGUST 10, 1991

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

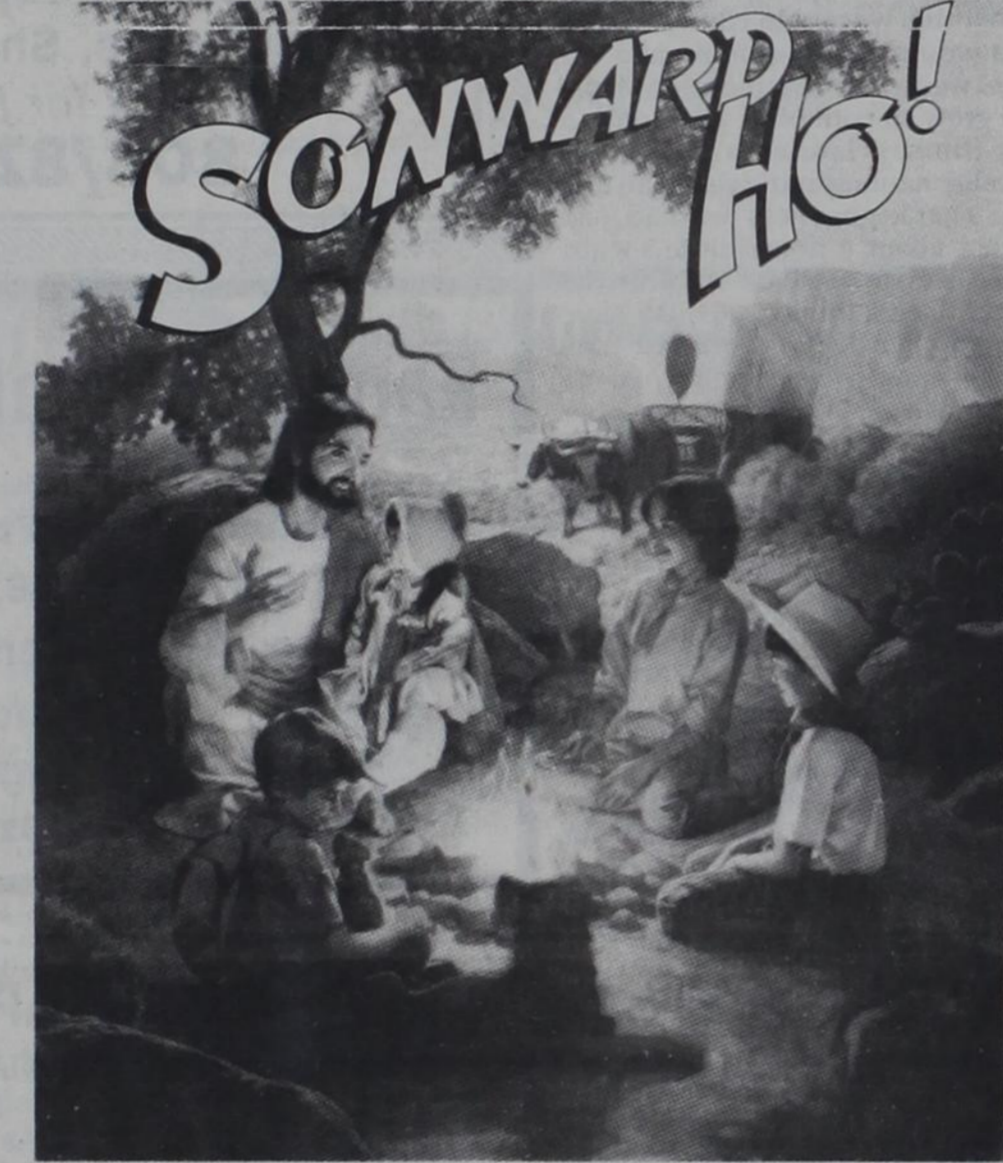

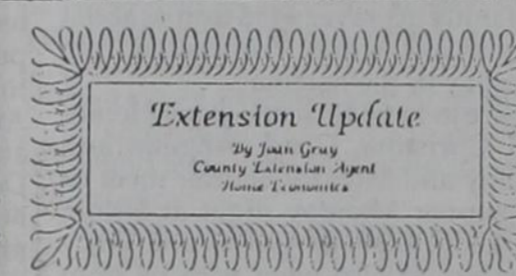

July Fourth Is Not The Only Holiday

It's hard to think of winter holidays during the long, hot days of summer—but thinking, planning, and acting early could make the year-end holiday season more enjoyable and less stressful.

The practice of setting aside a sum of money each month to use for holiday expenses is not new, but the idea is still sound. When the holidays arrive, you will have the money you put away plus a little interest as a bonus. If you begin in July to save for holiday expenses you can earn up to six months of interest on the money you deposit.

To get started, write a list of expected holiday expenses. Include presents, travel expenses, special holiday food, costs of hosting and attending social events, home decorating purchases and party apparel. Estimate the cost of each expense and arrive at a total expected cost for the year-end season. The amount may be more than you expect.

Next, divide the total into six equal amounts. Make a commitment to deposit that amount into savings each month, starting in July.

Finally, make a commitment to stick to your list. Giving in to impulsive buying will defeat your feeling of control and may contribute to holiday stress.

Approaching the holidays this way helps in several ways:

- * You reduce the stress and worry over money which often takes away from enjoyment of the holiday season. A cushion of money is already available to use which will not pull from regular income all at one time.

- * You feel in control of your spending, not at the mercy of retailers, family members, or friends who encourage you to spend during the holidays.

- * You build up interest, adding to the amount of money you are able to save.

- * You avoid overuse of credit cards and the need to pay outstanding balances over time, which adds a finance charge to initial amount of money spent on holiday expenses.

- * You can buy gifts long before the holidays if you have planned what you will give and have money set aside for it. You may be able to find that "special" gift on sale. Selection will usually be better if you buy early in the year rather than during prime seasonal buying time.

So, when July Fourth arrives, remember those other holidays. Acting early will make it even more enjoyable this year.
