The Gray County 4-H Youth Rodeo will be held August 16 and 17 at the Top of Texas Rodeo Arena in Pampa at 7:00 p.m. each evening. The rodeo is for all youth ages 9-18.

B-Bar-K belt buckles will be awarded to the top three winners in each event of the 9-11 age group. For the two older age groups (12-14 and 15-18) there will be two go-arounds (one each night). Montana Silversmith buckles will go to the first place average winners in each event in the two older age groups. Contestants must enter both nights to win these average buckles. In addition, pay-backs for the two older age groups will be 50 percent of the entry fees in each event each night.

All-Around buckles will also be awarded in each age group based on points from event placings, not event averages.

Entries are due in the Gray County Extension Office, HCR 2, Box 33, Pampa, Texas 79065, by 5:00 p.m., August 9.

Events for ages 15-18 include: Calf Roping, Pole Bending, Jr. Bull Riding, Barrel Racing, Goat Tying, Breakaway Roping, and Ribbon Roping.

Events for ages 12-14 include: Steer Riding, Pole Bending, Breakaway Roping, Barrel Racing, Goat Tying, Ribbon Roping, Adult/Youth Ribbon Roping.

Events for 9-11 include: Breakaway Roping, Calf Riding, Goat Tying, Barrel Racing, Pole Bending, Flag Racing, Adult/Youth Ribbon Roping. Boy and girls may participate in any event listed for their particular age group. All around buckles will be awarded in each group on points awarded in all events entered with the exception of the Adult/Youth ribbon roping ages 9-11 and 12-14 and the Adult/Youth Team Roping where points will not count.

For ages 9-11, the entry fee is \$10.00 per event. The 12-14 year old age group will have an entry fee of \$15 per event with a \$7.50 pay back. The older age group of 15-18 will have a \$20.00 entry fee per event with \$10.00 jackpotted.

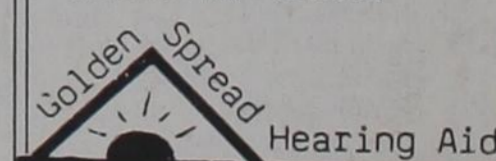

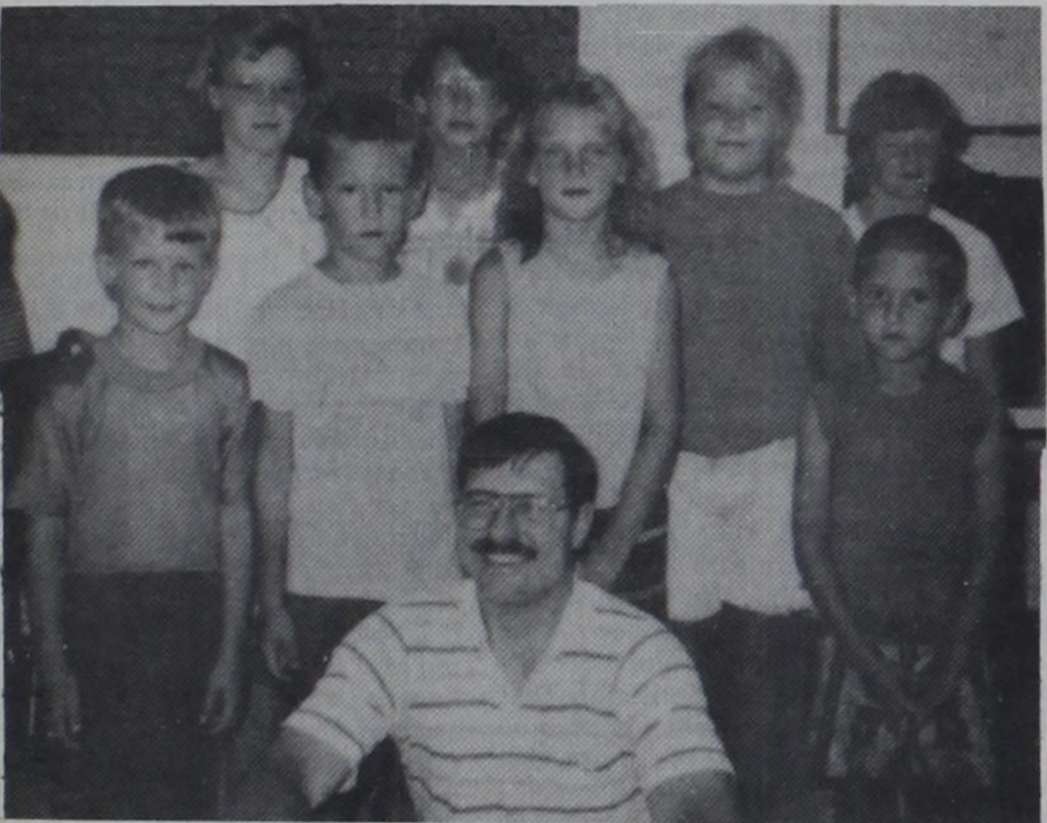

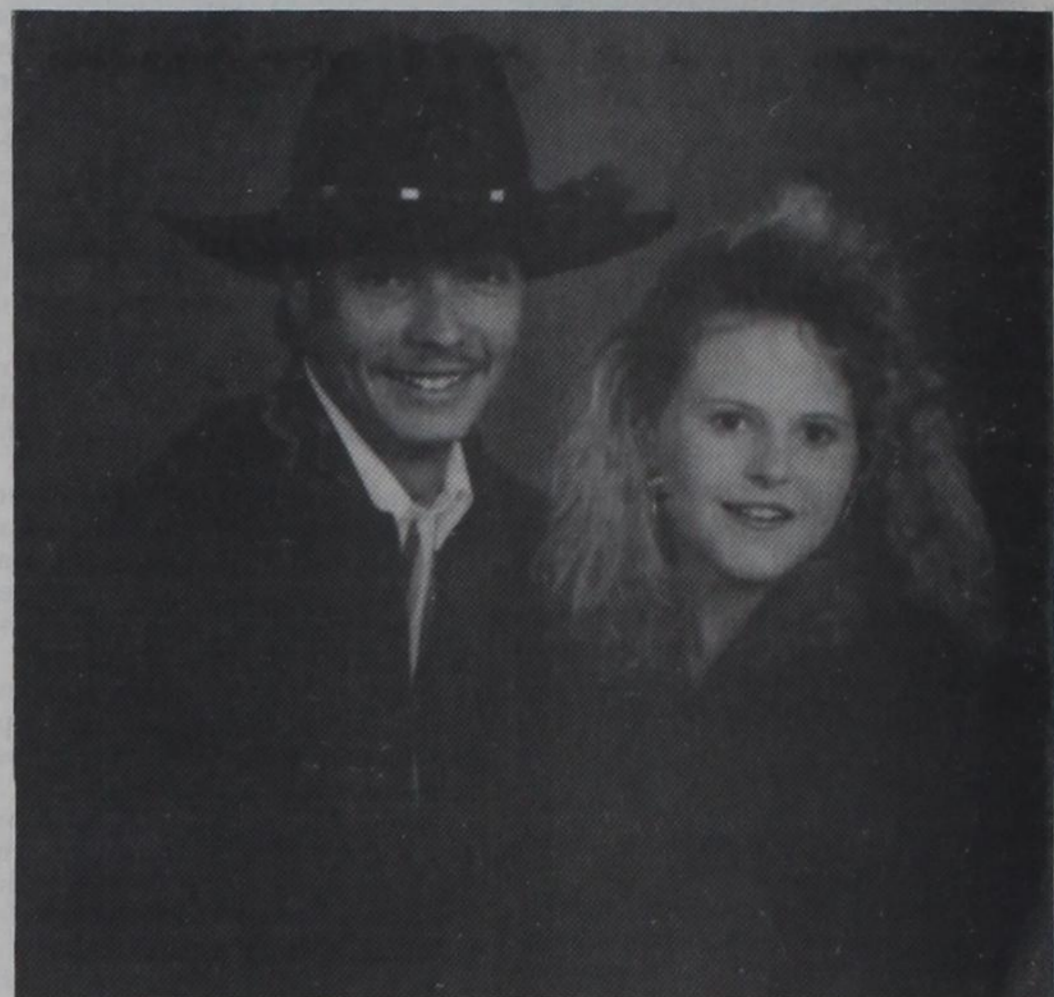

From The Minister's Desk: In the religious section of a recent issue of the Dallas Times Herald, there was an interesting article about church growth. According to this article, churches must possess several characteristics if they are to grow. Some of these characteristics are: supervised child care, social programs, contemporary music, beautiful facilities, youth activities, and stimulating worship services.

After I read this article, I thought about the ministry of Jesus. And I realized that there were two facts that characterized His desire for people to become His disciples. These two facts are: —

1. Jesus emphasized a clear-cut distinction between people who were casual followers and people who were committed disciples. This distinction is clearly seen in Luke 14:25 which says: "Now great multitudes were going along with Him—"

Notice that this text says: "Great multitudes were going along with Him—." These people apparently were not genuinely committed to Jesus. Rather they were merely "going along with Him—." For this reason, Jesus stated some non-negotiable terms of discipleship, saying: "If anyone comes to Me, and does not hate his own father and mother and wife and children and brothers and sisters, yes, and even his own life, he cannot be My disciple." (verses 26-27)

With these terms of discipleship Jesus clearly teaches that the size of a crowd does not determine discipleship. Rather it is determined by the genuine commitment that people have in Him.

2. Jesus emphasized that people who become His disciples should be persuaded by faith not sensationalism. In His ministry, Jesus performed several sensational

miracles, but He constantly "downplayed" these miracles. For example, he once healed a man who was afflicted with leprosy and then told him, "See that you tell no one; but go, show yourself to the priest, and present the offering that Moses commanded, for a testimony to them." (Matthew 8:4)

Notice Jesus told this man that he should "tell no one—." Why would Jesus "downplay" such sensational miracles? In my opinion, Jesus recognized that people who became His disciples strictly as a result of sensationalism would be very fickle. To keep these disciples, Jesus knew that He would have to perform more and more sensational miracles. For this reason, He repeatedly urged people to become His disciples by a simple obedient faith in Him. (John 6: 22-32)

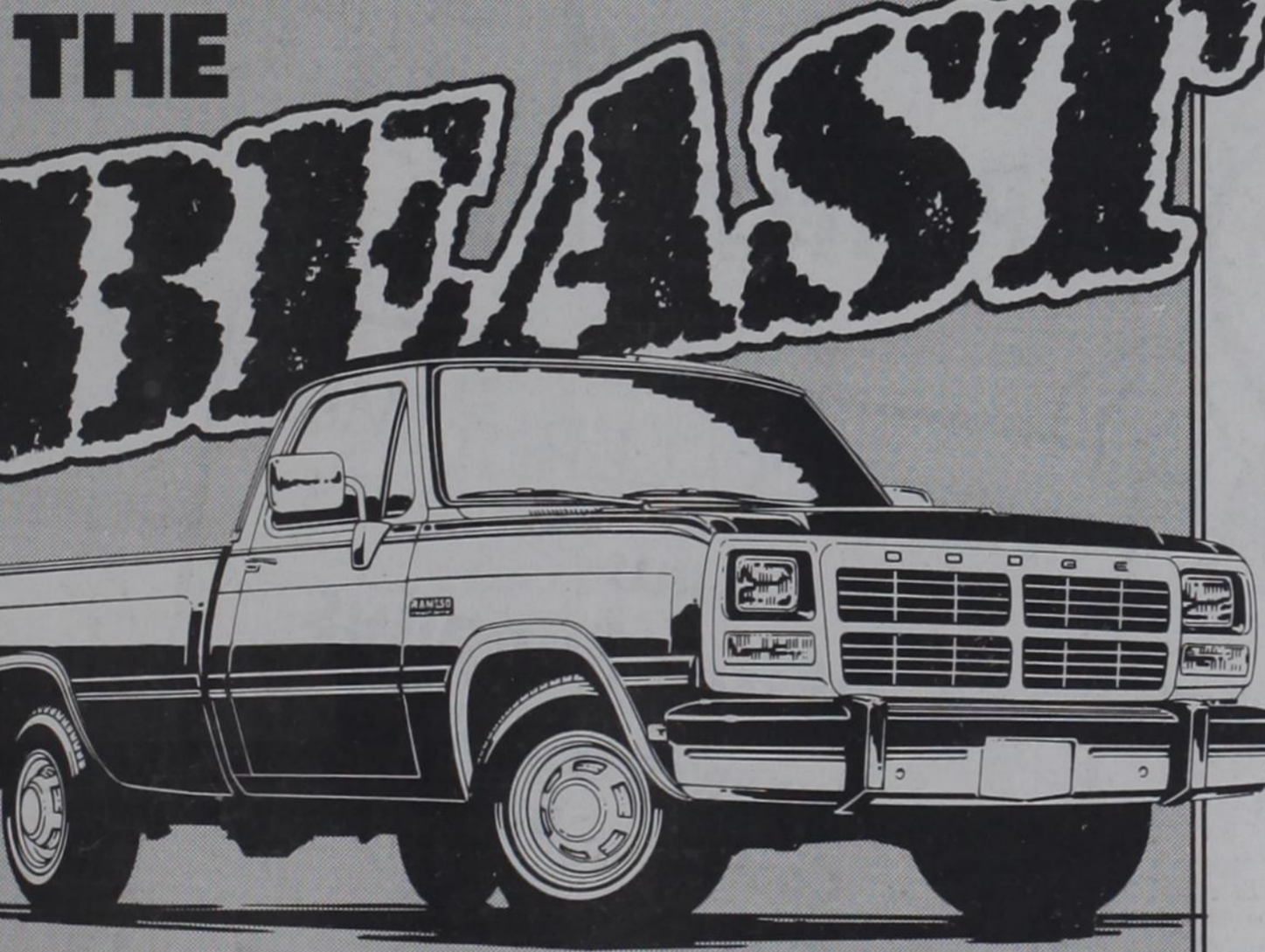
I wish that more churches had this attitude. There are too many churches that depend entirely upon cook-outs, ski trips, youth rallies, picnics, and musical concerts to persuade people to become disciples of Jesus. While such activities are not necessarily wrong, they do set a dangerous precedent, requiring these churches to schedule more and more of these activities if they are going to keep the people that they have persuaded to become disciples of Jesus. These churches need to urge people to become disciples of Jesus by a simple faith in Jesus Christ. (John 3: 14-15; 12: 32)

When churches are characterized by the same two facts that characterized the ministry of Jesus, they will probably never receive the praise of the Dallas Times Herald. But these churches will receive the praise of God.

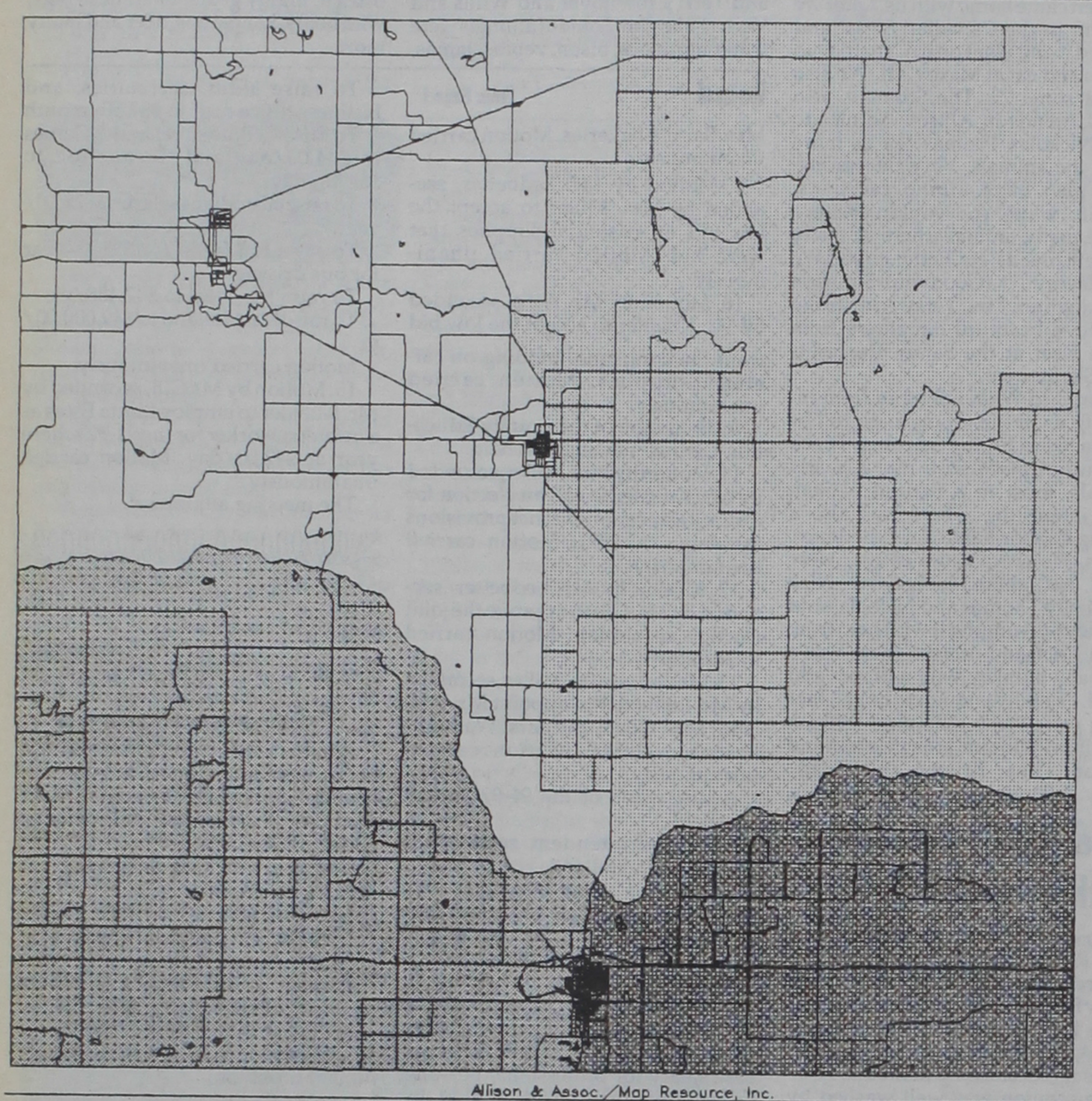

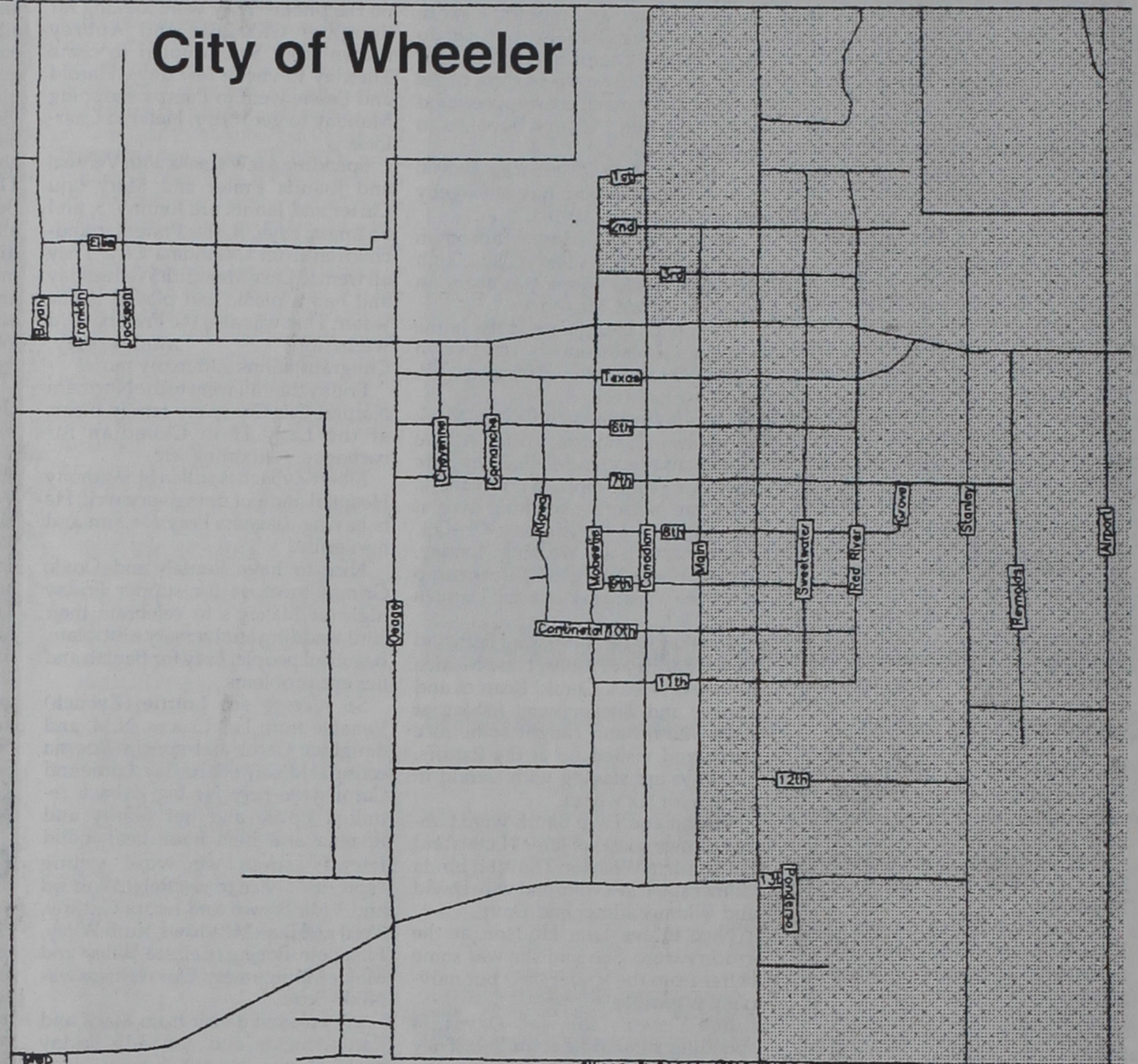

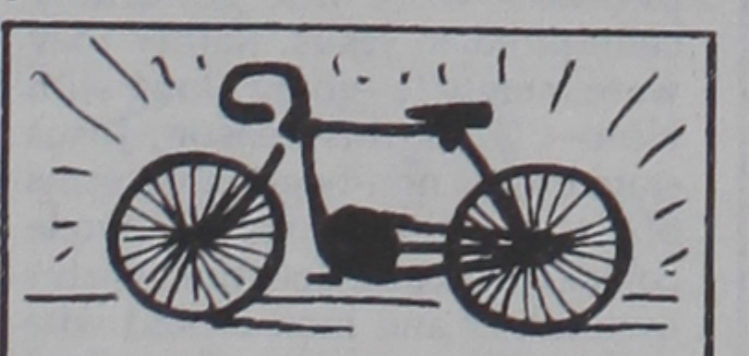
