Wheeler ISD Offering Registration Packets

For parents of all kindergarten students and of students new to the district, Wheeler ISD is offering registration packets. These will become available Friday, August 2, and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on business days between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. parents of returning students will only need to fill out the "Registration/Emergency Card"; these will be available in the same location for parents who wish to fill one out prior to Friday, August 16, registration day.

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration/Emergency Card; 2. Student Health Information (A two page questionnaire); 3. Home Language Survey. The parent/guardian must provide all the requested information, including full legal names, before his/her child can be enrolled in school. Students who attended Wheeler ISD's Early Education class already have the home language survey and the student health information in their permanent records, but parents of these students

Jean DeArment, 65, died Monday, July 29, 1991.

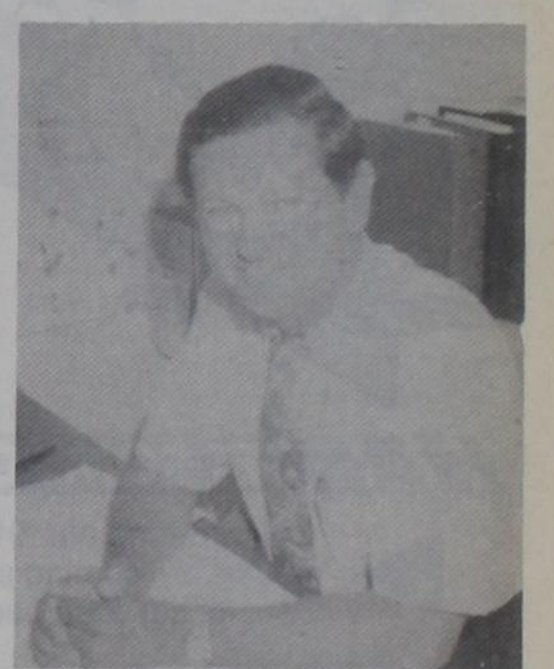

Food Selection Recommendations For Women

A scientific panel of experts serving on an American Dietetic Task Force developed recommendations to help American women integrate nutrition and health issues into their daily living. These recommendations, encompass and build upon the recent Dietary Guidelines for Americans developed by USDA and the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Women have specific nutrient needs during different periods of their lives. Healthy eating for women of all ages is becoming increasingly evident. They need to eat a variety of foods daily, exercise and maintain a healthy body weight.

In many American households, the woman purchases and controls the food supply. Therefore, it is vital that nutritious selections be made for all family members. Promotion of nutritious choices for children is important to women. This enables their children to learn how to make wise nutritious choices and continue this practice on their own.

Knowledge of nutrition is extremely important for women and their families. The following recommendations incorporate a healthy woman's special needs and can also help improve how she eats now and in the future:

- *Eat a daily variety of foods from all major food groups.

- Three to four low-fat servings of dairy food.

- Two low-fat servings of meat/meat alternates

- Four servings of vegetables/fruits

- Four servings of whole grain breads/cereals

- *Maintain healthy body weight.

- To lose weight safely and effectively, adults should not go below 10 calories per pound of present weight and do not skip meals. Increase physical activity or exercise.

- To gain weight, increase caloric intake and exercise in moderation.

- *Exercise regularly.

- At least three days per week.

- *Reduce total fat to no more than one-third of daily calories.

- Select a variety of fat sources: saturated, poly-unsaturated, mono-unsaturated.

- Reduce non-food group or extra foods, such as margarine, butter, cooking oils, salad dressings, cookies, cakes and cream.

- Eat low-fat selections of meat and milk food groups.

- *Include at least one-half of daily calories from carbohydrates.

- Select complex carbohydrates, such as beans, peas, pasta, vegetable, nuts and seeds

- *Include a variety of fiber-rich foods.

- Make daily selections from fresh fruits with skin, vegetables, legumes (navy, pinto, and kidney beans), whole grains (brown rice, oatmeal, oat and wheat bran)

- Add more fiber gradually

- Avoid excess fiber intake, especially from one source

- *Eat three to four daily servings of calcium-rich foods.

- Consume low-fat milk, yogurt, cheese

- Increase milk in cooking

- Eat broccoli, sardines with bones, canned salmon with bones, collard greens

- *Eat plenty of iron-rich foods

- Make daily selections from lean meat, liver, prunes, pinto and kidney beans, spinach, leafy green vegetables, enriched and whole grain breads/cereals.

- *Reduce intake of salt and sodium-containing foods.

- Reduce intake of salt added to food preparation

- Reduce use of saltshaker

- Watch food labels for monosodium glutamate, sodium bicarbonate, sodium citrate and other sodium sources

- *Eat foods for necessary nutrients, using vitamin and mineral supplements only under specific circumstances.

- *If you drink, limit alcohol intake to one or two drinks daily.

- *Avoid smoking.

- *Change diet, exercises, and other health promotional behaviors to correspond with an individual's own identified risk factors.

- Diet is only one risk factor

- Heredity, life-style, environment

- Consult a doctor about risk factors

- *If you have questions about the adequacy of your diet, consult a registered dietitian or contact Joan Gray, County Extension Agent, at 826-5243.

need to get the kindergarten registration packets because it contains other vital information, as well as, the "Registration/Emergency Card."

The estimated length of time needed to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "Traffic Jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day (9:00 a.m. through 10:00 a.m., Friday, August 16,) are welcome to do so.
