Information Needed For 911 Service

In preparing to establish 9-1-1 service in your area, the Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network, in conjunction with local emergency service providers, is asking all residents and business operators to complete and return this form.

The information you provide will aid emergency service personnel in locating your residence or business operation and cut precious seconds or minutes off their response time. The information will be very beneficial in finding rural locations since many homes are generally not numbered and many rural roads are unnamed. The information should be periodically updated by the resident and/or business operator when changes occur. any circumstances or situations that would be helpful in responding to an

emergency, such as health problems, guard dogs, locked gate, flammable material, etc.

4. If you wish, include relative or friend to contact in an emergency situation, including name, address and telephone number in the COMMENTS section.

9-1-1 Service will be available in the Wheeler, Kelton, Allison, Briscoe and Mobeetie exchanges in January 1992.

The information will remain strictly

confidential. It will only be used when responding to a 9-1-1 emergency call.

The following should be considered before completing and returning the form:

1. If you have a telephone located elsewhere than just your business or residence, note this in the COMMENTS section. If it is a different number and within the vicinity of your residence, list that number also.

Include the children's number if different from your own.

2. When giving directions from the nearest city, rural residents should give the highway number and begin routing directions from the city limits marker on that highway. If bad weather frequently causes the normal route to be impassable, include an alternate route.

3. In the COMMENTS section, list

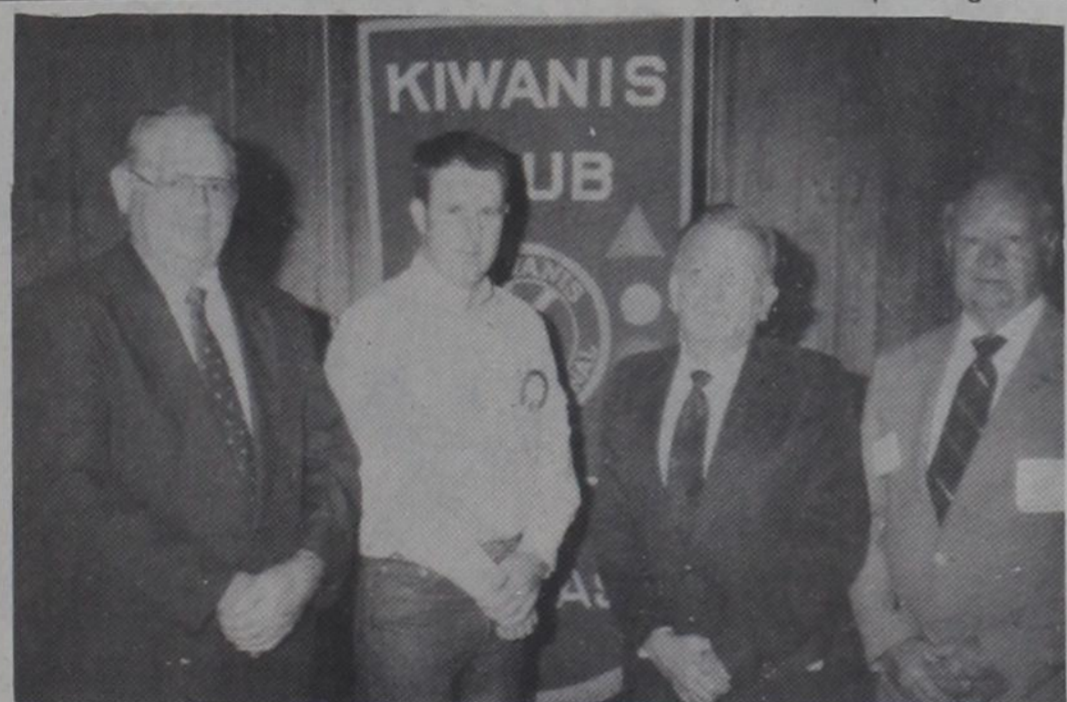

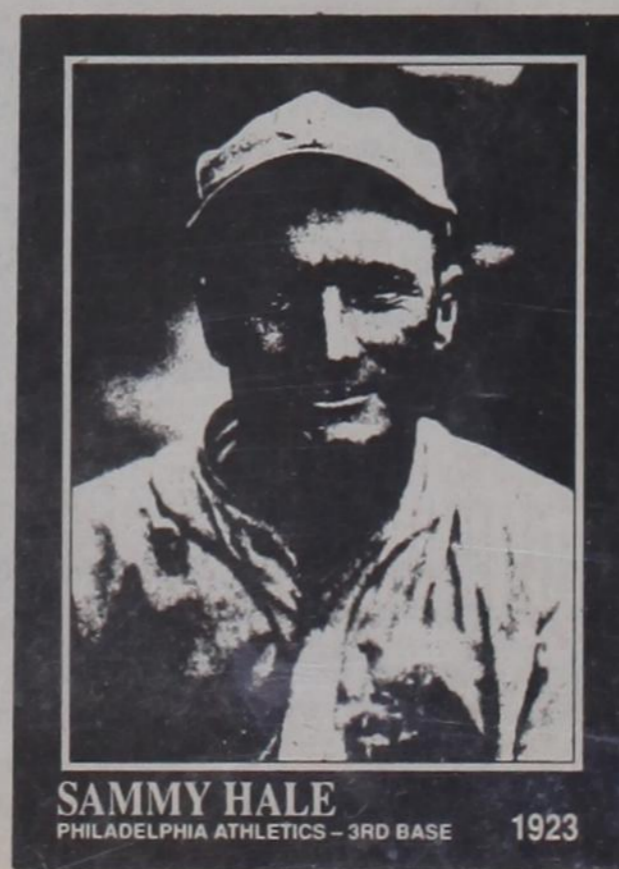

Used mostly as a pinch-hitter, Sammy Hale hit .293 in 76 games his rookie season but was sent back to the minors. He was sold to the Philadelphia Athletics in 1923 and responded with one solid season after another at 3rd base for Connie Mack. His best season was 1925, when he hit .345 in 110 games, collecting 135 hits with 30 doubles and 11 triples. Two years later he hit .313 and drove in 81 runs. He hit .277 in 1929 as the powerful Athletics finished 18 games ahead of the Yankees. Sammy didn't play in the Series because utility man Jimmy Dykes, who hit .327 during the season, got the nod to start at 3rd.

It is recommended that if your going to host a party, that soft drinks be available for your guests so they will have a choice. Introduce people to one another, a good host is not just a bartender. Don't rush refills, don't double up because it's not generous, it's rude. Attempt to have a meal or snacks available throughout the evening and, above all, if someone drinks too much at your house, you are responsible. Provide lodging or get them a safe ride home.
If your plans include traveling this New Year's Eve, then make plans that only allow a totally sober driver to be behind the wheel. It's a good idea to check with your local media outlets to see if any organizations will be providing ride home programs. For those who think that it will never happen to them, the Department of Public Safety, along with other local law enforcement agencies, will have stepped up patrols and DWI enforcement over the New Year's Eve holiday.
Major Cawthon went on to say that one of the best defenses against a drunk driver is to fasten your safety belt, but it's only effective if the driver and all occupants take time to do so.
Let's all work toward making this the safest New Year's Holiday ever.

Ain't It The Truth

Been notice in the paper and over TV that folks want to know what you were doing 50 years ago? Shucks I normally couldn't tell you what I wuz doing yesterday or even the day before, but I can tell you what I and many more of my buddies were doing on Dec. 7, 1941. Was a Sunday morning there at Ft. Richardson, Alaska and for some reason many of us were sort of ansey. I had my field pack laying on my bunk and making sure I had everything packed just rite, plenty of Bull Durham smokin and all. One of the boys was going into Anchorage, probably to see his girl and had left the barracks and most of us were millin around, not really doin much. In a few minutes the friend that was going to town came back in the barracks and said for some reason we were all confined to the post but no explanation given. None of us had a radio and for a few more minutes it hadn't sunk in but all of a sudden all of us started to get on our uniforms and our field coats out and then we heard the bugler blowing Call To Arms. We hadn't heard it before but knew what the call was. All of a sudden we heard one of our First Sgts. yell to fall in and as he opened the barracks door all of us nearly ran over him trying to get in formation. This first soldier couldn't believe we had gotten out so fast and mentioned that he couldn't believe we wuz so anxious to fight. Somehow all of us knew we were at war and somehow we felt it was the Japs.

We had moved to Alaska from Camp Haan, Calif a few months before and didn't even have what you would call Artic clothing nor the cold weather sleeping bags nor mittens but we loaded in the trucks and went to our Field positions that we had been working on for some months. We had a command post quansant building and had started a kitchen but only had the floor down and no other shelters ready. As we unloaded there in the field we cutpoles and got ready to put a tent fly over the kitchen floor and then unloaded our other things for the command post and being so busy we hadn't heard yet where the war had started but finally we heard that Pearl Harbor had been hit and many ships had been sunk and lots of casualties. So many things to do and so few hours till dark we hardly had time to think of anything but to get things in place and get ready for a cold night in the deep snow. We got the command post ready and the crew that would man the radios and unbeknowing to the officers we had snuck an old Atwater Kent battery radio that we had gotten from an Old Sourdough man. The boys worked harder to get that thing operatin than anything else. I failed to mention that the snow wuz deep and under that snow the ground

was frozen solid and I do mean solid. Our command post was up in the hill aways and we had to carry by hand all this stuff up there and some things that had gone to the command post had to be returned to the kitchen such as lard, cleaver and a big mattress cover filled with G.I. bread. We got a lot of spam to eat and even to this day I like it.

After a very tiring cold day we finally got everything about where it belonged, no we didn't get it all set up but we sort of got it near to where it went. We were cold and couldn't build a fire and I believe it was snowing and being in the hills the darkness hit us a bit early so we sort of snuck up to the C.P. and the boys there had got the Atwater Kent operating and also about 50 other military radios working on code and all that noise reminded me of a bunch of chickens laying eggs. I called the C.P. the Chicken house and I think it stuck. The Atwater Kent picked up station KOI, San Antonio, Texas and we heard San Antonio Rose and headed down hill to our beds in the cold cold snow. Yep I can remember Dec. 7, 41.

"I want to cry out, Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do."

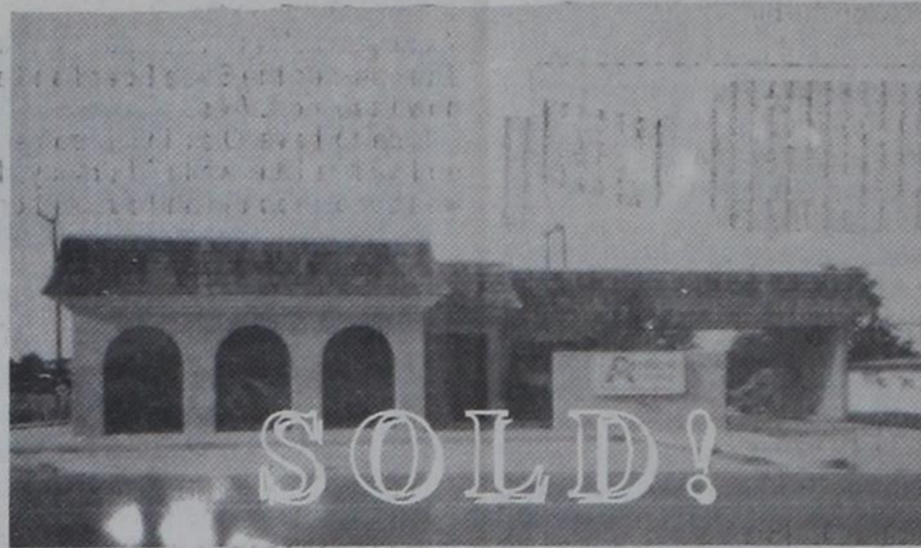

The new facility is budgeted at \$510,000. To date, \$435,000 is committed to the building campaign by individuals, foundations, and Clarendon College. A balance of \$75,000 is needed to complete the necessary funding for the new structure.
Dr. Jerry Stockton, President of Clarendon College, said, "We are pleased with the progress of this fund raising campaign and are grateful to each donor for their support of Clarendon College. It is our hope that the balance of the funds needed can be raised by January 1, 1991."
The new facility will allow expansion of the Ranch and Feedlot Program to accommodate more students.
