Catholic Schedule Special Services

The festivities for the members of Our Mother of Mercy, Wellington, St. Patrick's, Shamrock and St. Mary's, Wheeler will begin with Holy Thursday services at 7:00 P.M. It will begin music and songs, then readings from Scripture, a homily following by foot-washing in imitation of Jesus washing the feet of his disciples just before the last Supper (see John 13:1-15) and ending with the Liturgy of the Eucharist, the Church's remembrance of the institution of Lord's Supper on this day, which is known as Eucharist for Catholic Christians said Fr. Phil.

"Maundy" Thursday is the term many are familiar in various Christian denominations. It is derived from the Latin *mandatum*, or commandment, which is found as the first word in the Latin translation of scripture passage of John's Gospel 13:34, "A new commandment I give you, that you love one another."

On Good Friday at 6:00 P.M. the members will recall Jesus' suffering and Death on the Cross. According to the Church's ancient tradition, the Lord's Passion consist of three parts: Liturgy of the Word with scripture readings from Isaiah 52:13-53:12; Hebrews 4:14-5:9 and ending with the drama presentation of John's Gospel 18:1-19:42 followed by Veneration of the Cross and concluding with distribution of Holy Communion, said Fr. Phil.

Fr. Phil stated, that Easter Vigil will occur on Saturday, March 30th at 7:00 P.M. As a community, we await the celebration of Christ's resurrection. We also welcome new members into the Church, as well as, complete the initiation into the Church of those individuals who were baptized as infants and are now old enough to be confirmed and receive their First Eucharist. There are several stages to the vigil: the Service of Light—we rejoice in Christ as the light of the world; the Liturgy of the Word—seven Old Testament readings with Sung Psalms, a Pauline letter, and a passage from Mark's Gospel enable us to hear about God's saving acts throughout history and Jesus' Resurrection from the tomb. The Liturgy of Baptism—those adults who have been preparing for baptism are baptized; other members renew baptismal vows; Confirmation—new baptized adult members are anointed with Sacred Chrism Oil and with laying on of hands, as a sign of the mark of the Holy Spirit and concluding the Vigil Service is the Liturgy of Eucharist in which members renew our loving relationship with God.

We are all excited about this Easter Vigil since two Elect-Catechumens, Herman Neal and Dusty Oldham will be baptized, confirmed, and receive their First Eucharist thus completing their full initiation in the church after years of study and preparation. Frank Aquilar, Jessica Aquilar, Mona Cantu, Cecilia Cruz, Everardo Crus, all of Wellington will be confirmed; Casey Oldham, Henry Saigado, Delfina Villarreal all of Shamrock and Delia Ramos of Wheeler will be confirmed; and Elvira Cruz of Wellington together with Ruben Sanchez and Agustin Solis

Property Tax Exemptions Are Available for Disabled Veterans

Veterans with a service-connected disability can receive property tax relief in 1991 by filling out a simple exemption form at the Wheeler County Appraisal District office.

The amount of exemption is based on the veteran's percentage of service-connected disability and can range from \$1,500 to \$3,000. The following taxpayers are eligible: A disabled veteran; a surviving spouse of a deceased disabled veteran, as long as the spouse remains unmarried; a surviving minor child of a deceased disabled veteran, if the veteran's spouse does not survive the veteran and if the child is both under 18 and unmarried; a surviving spouse of a person killed while on active duty, whether the spouse is remarried or not at application time; a surviving minor child of a person who was killed on active duty, if the child is both under 18 and unmarried.

Any eligible person who has not received this exemption before must apply by April 30. Those who received the exemption in 1990 need not reapply in 1991.

An applicant can claim the exemption on only one piece of property, such as a home or any other property the applicant owned on January 1. The applicant must be a Texas resident in order to qualify and must file the exemption application at the appraisal district office by April 30.

An applicant may be required to provide proof of the service-connected disability, such as documentation from the Veterans Administration or the branch of armed services in which the veteran served. Depending on the applicant, proof of marriage, death, or age may also be required.

Tax Deferral Available Is For Elderly Homeowners

Texans aged 65 to older can postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homesteads by taking advantage of tax option called over-65 deferral. The elderly homeowner simply signs a deferral affidavit at the Wheeler County Appraisal District office.

This special form of tax relief can also halt a lawsuit already filed to collect delinquent taxes on an older Texan's homestead. To stop a delinquent tax suit, the over-65 homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

Once a homeowner files an over 65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can initiate or pursue a suit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that homestead.

Tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the homestead; it does not cancel them. During the deferral period, taxes and delinquent interest continue to add up. When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, those accrued amounts become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred tax and interest.

While a penalty may not be imposed on the delinquent taxes during the deferral period, the filing of the deferral affidavit will not forgive penalties which were already due. Also, an additional penalty associated with referring the account to a delinquent tax attorney may be charged if taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends.

Forms for filing a tax deferral affidavit are available at the appraisal district office. "The homeowner must fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a notary public".

Don Rose made the motion, seconded by Barbra Koelzer the meeting adjourn. The meeting was adjourned.

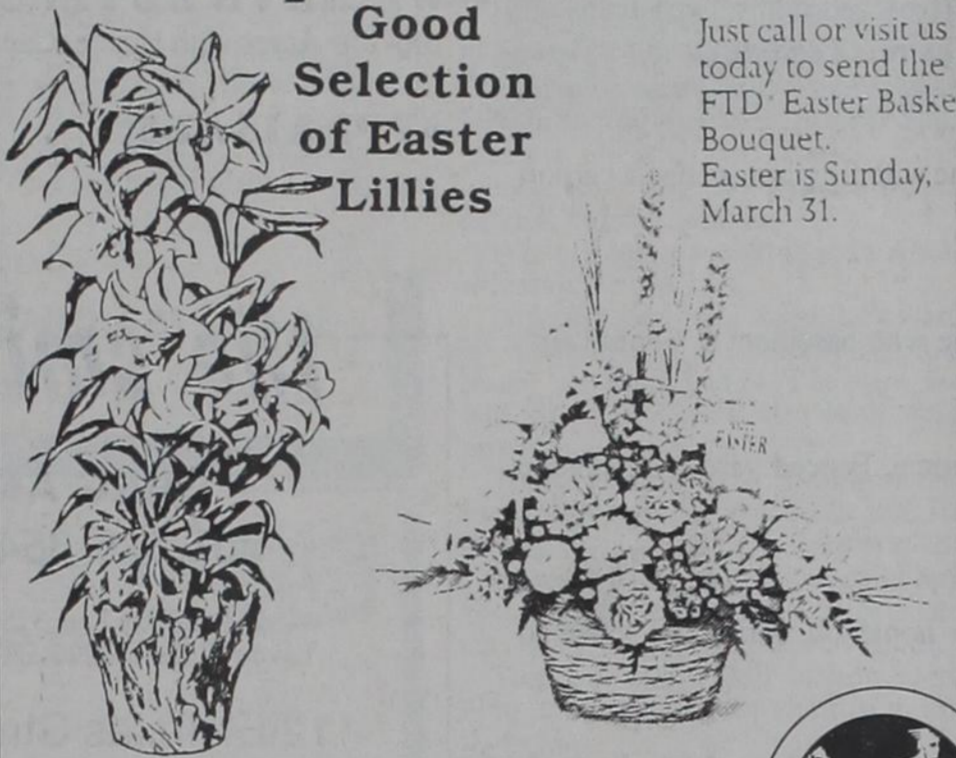

From the Minister's Desk:

John Quincy Adams was the sixth President of the United States, serving from 1825 to 1829. One of the most important accomplishments of his administration was the establishment of the Bureau of Standards.

According to historians, President Adams reported to Congress that there are no standard measurement or standard weight for the nation. In his report to Congress, President Adams exhibited two one pound weights, saying, "The weight in my right hand came from Massachusetts; the one in my left hand came from Maine. Gentlemen, one of these weights is nearly an ounce heavier than the other one." The results of President Adams' report to Congress was the establishment of the Bureau of Standards, which has continued to maintain absolute weights and measures for the nation.

While we recognize the importance of a standard for weights and measures, do we recognize the importance of a standard for life? Consider these two facts;

1. Life demands a standard. Without a standard of good and bad—right and wrong—goodness and wickedness—life would be a catastrophe.

2. The Bible—The word of God—is the only acceptable standard of life. The Bible declares that it is a completely sufficient standard for faith and practice. For example, it says: "All scripture is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness; that the man of God may be adequate, equipped for every good work." (II Timothy 3:16-17)

Life demands a standard and

the only true standard for life is the Word of God. It is the only standard upon which people should determine their faith and practice.

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New Tralee Representative Named

Brenda Wilkinson is the new Tralee Crisis Center representative Outreach & Victim Services Coordinator for Wheeler. Brenda Wilkinson of Pampa is

Wheeler's new Tralee Crisis Center Representative. She will be available for appointments in Wheeler on the third Thursday of each month at the City Hall from 2:00 - 4:00. Emergency assistance is available without appointment.

Tralee Crisis Center of Pampa is a non-profit organization with the basic belief that every woman and child has the right to live violence free.

The center offers temporary shelter, transportation and crisis counseling to Pampa and surrounding communities. If a woman does not wish to stay at the shelter but is subject to an abusive partner, she can be counseled on a non-resident basis.

Tralee also has a sexual assault prevention program to educate the community about the causes and implications of sexual assault, and to provide services and counseling to victims.

Another function of the center is to provide support and assistance for victims of crime. If there is an assault or murder, the victim or family is eligible to receive certain benefits to defray medical bills, funeral expenses or lost wages.

Brenda has been appointed by the district attorney to act as crime victims coordinator, to handle these claims as well as accompany the victim or family member to trial. One evening a week she conducts a homicide support group which has been shown to be beneficial in helping family members cope with their circumstances.

Tralee Crisis has a HEART group, which stands for Helping End Abusive Relationship Tendencies, and is based on a 12-step program. This group meets on Thursday evenings at the Tralee office, and is conducted by Dauna Wilkinson.

Tralee's most recent project has been to initiate a "Teddy Bear" program through the Pampa Police Department. If an officer receives a call on domestic violence or a traffic accident in which a young child is traumatized, the officer gets a teddy bear from the patrol car and gives it to the child. The toy helps comfort the child, and alleviates some of the negative feelings the child might have toward police officers.

Tralee's telephone number is on a heart around the bear's neck so that the mother will have it handy if needed. The teddy bears have been donated by Alco and Wal-Mart, and Wal-Mart has offered to replenish the organization's supply of bears as needed.

The crisis center is always in need of dedicated volunteers. Brenda urges anyone who would like to work in that capacity to call, and she will set up a meeting in Miami.
