Mobeetie School Given \$25,000 Cash Award

Commissioner of Education Lionel "Skip" Meno honored Mobeetie I.S.D. at the Texas Successful Schools Awards Ceremony in Austin this past Saturday, July 18, 1992.

Mobeetie I.S.D. received the Performance Gain Award which consists of a certificate and a monetary award of \$25,000., and Outstanding Performance Effort Recognition which consists of a certificate. Only 83 of 6,097 campuses statewide received two

The Texas Successful Schools Awards System (TSSAS) identified schools for performance gain an high performance. The schools chosen for awards had to make at least a 2 percent gain in their students' scores on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills, the state's standardized test. Each of the schools also ranked in the top 10 percent of its demographic group. In Saturday's ceremony, 125 schools received financial awards for their high degree of improvement. Another 9 schools received commendations and special honors for high overall performance. Additionally, 588 campuses were recognized for their efforts in gain or performance.

The Texas Legislature created TSSAS to identify and reward schools that demonstrate progress or success in achieving the educational goals of the state. This year, the awards given out at the ceremony totaled \$10 million. The (Continued Page 8)

Cotton Producers have three alternatives to be in compliance with their Food and Security Act Plans. They must do these to remain eligible for Government Payments.

ALTERNATIVE #1: is to plant 1/3 of a field in cotton or soybean each year and the remainder of the acreage in a high residue crop such as sorghums or small grains such as wheat or rye. Residues from these crops must be maintained so as to control wind ero-

ALTERNATIVE #2: is wind strip crops. This practice is planting strips of sorghum or small grains across a field with cotton between strips. These got it set up. Edith Cross made motion strips should be a minimum of 10' wide with the crops left standing thru the critical erosion period of about April 1st. The widths of cotton will depend on the soil and is specified in their

the critical erosion period. If this practice continues to fail, it will cease to be an alternative practice. If it does not work it could cause you to lose government payments.

At least 5% of the farms in Wheeler County will be spot checked each year. Beginning next year these spot checks will not be done by local SCS staff as they have been in the past. Washington has determined spot checks made by local personnel tend to be too lenient towards the local farmers. Therefore it is very important to follow your FSA Plan.



Home Canning—Does It Pay Off?

Joan Gray, CEA-HE

People home can food for many reasons. Those often cited include to save money, to have healthier food, to know what's in the food, to can for special diets and for personal satisfaction. For those who also enjoy gardening or producing their own, it often becomes a way to relax and gives a sense of pride to enjoy or share with others the bounty of their efforts.

But does home canning really save money? A study done at Pennsylvania State University found that home canners could save half the cost of buying commercially canned foods only if they produce their own garden.vegetables and fruits and discounted the value of their labor. If produce is bought at farmer's markets, roadside stands or pick-yourown operations, the home-canned items would cost about the same as similar canned items in the supermarket, particularly those on sale. And of course, the initial cost of purchasing necessary equipment must be considered by the "new" home canner. Basically, however, of the three major methods of preservation, canning is the least expensive followed by drying, then freezing.

Is home canned food more nutritious than commercially canned food? The answer may depend on how the produce is handled between harvest and canning. In many cases, vegetables begin to lose vitamins immediately after harvest. As many as half of the vitamins may be lost within a few days unless produce is cooled or preserved. Even refrigerated produce loses many vitamins within a week or

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by freeze, and/or excessive rain, which occurred between September 1, 1991, and December 31, 1991 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Pampa, Texas.

Wheeler and Gray Counties are two of several in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the freeze.

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loans needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate if 4.5 per-

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan", the supervisor said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to tigure in proceeds from those programs in determining

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until February 22, 1993, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency lones to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority

The FmHA office is located in the NBC PLAZA, suite 102, located at 1224 N. Hobart in Pampa, TX. The office is open from 8:00 A.M. to noon and 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. Mondays through Friday. Phone No. 806/665-
