The dance was first scheduled for Friday night due a conflict and the lack of a disk jockey. After hearing so much controversy over the change, Bob agreed to re-arrange his plans and do the dance Saturday (The posters are printed and it is intended to mark corrections.)

Saturday morning will open with breakfast at the Masonic Lodge, beginning at 6:30 A.M. You do not have to get up that early, serving will

continue for some time. If you did not include this in your day's activities last year, you should re-schedule. Donations will be taken at the door.

The Fun Run will be under the supervision of Robert and Marla Ford. Starting time will be 8:00 A.M. Individuals are being asked to sign up for the run in advance and the cost will be \$5.00. ## Attention CRP Producers!

### Weeds Must Be Controlled

Attention all CRP producers! It's that time again to control your weeds on CRP. In the last month we have received a lot of rain. The rain has been very appreciative to this area. The drawback from a lot of rain is the number of weeds that occur on CRP. When the producers sign his or her contract they agree to control weeds. Weeds will need to be controlled. If producers don't control weeds on their CRP he or she will be fined or CRP contract terminated or CRP rental payment would be withheld.

Weeds have a tremendous effect on the newly seeded grasses. On newly seeded grasses, weeds have a tendency to sap moisture from the soil and shade the sun from the plant, in which slow down plant growth. Many of the CRP producers don't take the weed problems serious enough until the field is covered in weeds. Producer can control weeds by either spraying or shredding. Spraying weeds is much more effective than shredding.

It would be to all CRP producers advantage to go ahead and control weeds as soon as possible. Soil Conservation Service will be conducting on-site visits to all of the CRP fields in the next few weeks. WEED CONTROL WILL BE ENFORCED! If there are any questions please contact your local Soil Conservation Service.

## SECOND DRIVER RECEIVES MINOR INJURIES

A head-on collision 1.6 miles east of Briscoe Saturday morning claimed the life of 19-year-old Kimberly Michelle Hall. Iona May, 82, was brought to Parkview Hospital and later transferred to Amarillo.

Hall was traveling west on FM 1046 in a 1988 Chevrolet. She was following a bobtail grain truck and decided to pass the truck. Before Hall could overtake the grain truck and get back in the right lane, she met a 1983 Chevrolet driven by Mrs. May.

Both May and Hall swerved to avoid the collision. May pulled to the right and Hall pulled to the left; the cars met head-on just off the roadway. The accident occurred at 8:38 A.M.

The Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance Service and Volunteer Fire Department were called to the scene and Hall was brought to Parkview, where she was pronounced dead at 9:22 A.M.

Mrs. May was treated at Parkview Hospital and transferred to Amarillo

with possible internal bleeding. She is recovering nicely, but remains in the hospital Wednesday and is reported to have a cracked knee, multiple cuts and bruises. She is in St. Anthony's, Room 312.

Both drivers were wearing their seat belts.

Survivors include her husband; and a son, Bobby Roy Dyson of Pampa. The family requests memorials be made to a favorite charity.

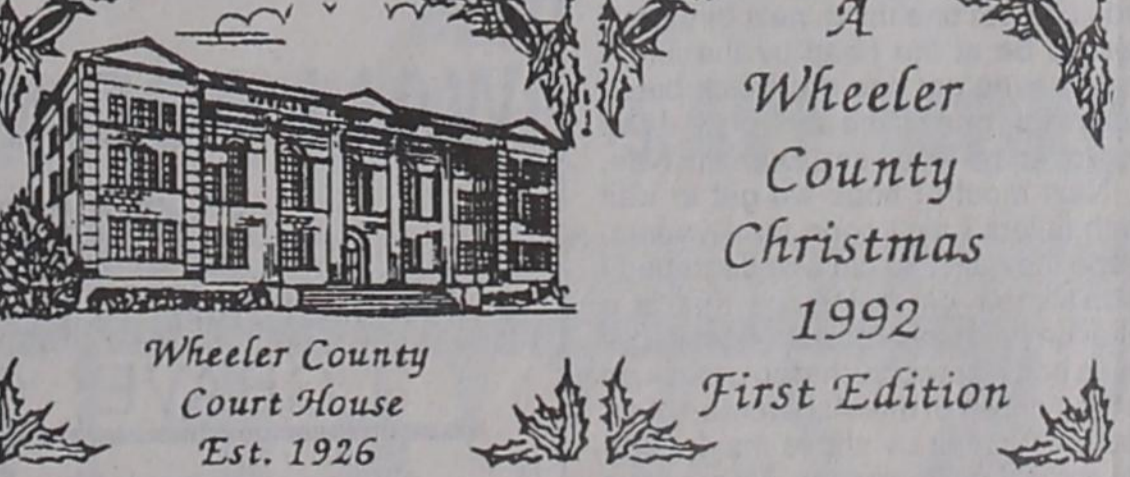
## Texas Tech University Local Honor Students

## Local Fireman Appointed To Advisory Committee

In December, Kenneth J. Daughtry, Wheeler, Texas was appointed to serve on the State Volunteer Fire Fighters Advisory Committee by the Texas Commission on Fire Protection.

This nine member committee is in the process of developing proposed rules and submitting recommendations to the Texas Commission on Fire Protection concerning the Volunteer Fire Fighters and Volunteer Fire Departments Training Program in the State of Texas.

The Texas Commission on Fire Protection, as required by Senate Bill 383 enacted in 1991, must develop a State of Texas Voluntary Certification and

Regulation Program for Volunteer Fire Fighters and Volunteer Fire Departments. This Training Program must make available to Volunteer Fire Fighters the same level of training that is available to Paid Fire Protection Personnel. Participation in this Regulatory Program by Volunteer Fire Fighters and Volunteer Fire Departments is VOLUNTARY.

Since its inception the Texas Commission on Fire Protection Volunteer Fire Fighter Advisory Committee has met in Austin on four occasions and will meet again in Austin July 8-10 at the Texas Commission on Fire Protection offices. All meetings of this Committee are open to the public and all interested parties are urged to attend.

Mr. Daughtry also represented the Texas Commission on Fire Protection Volunteer Fire Fighters and Advisory Committee at the International Fire Service Accreditation Congress held April 24 and 25 in St. Louis, Missouri.

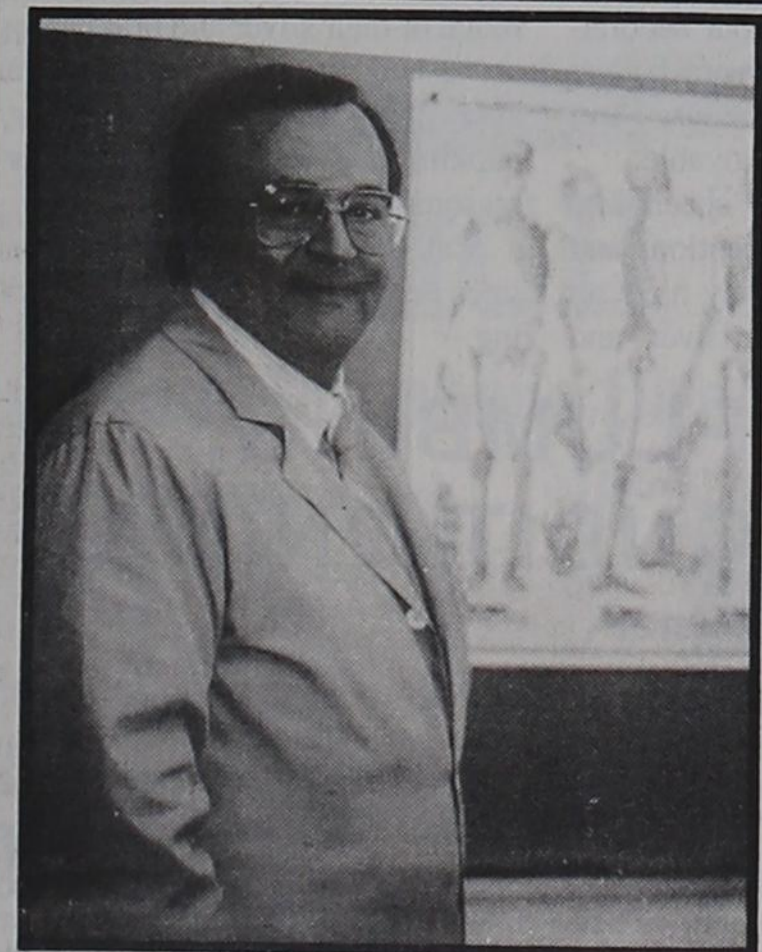

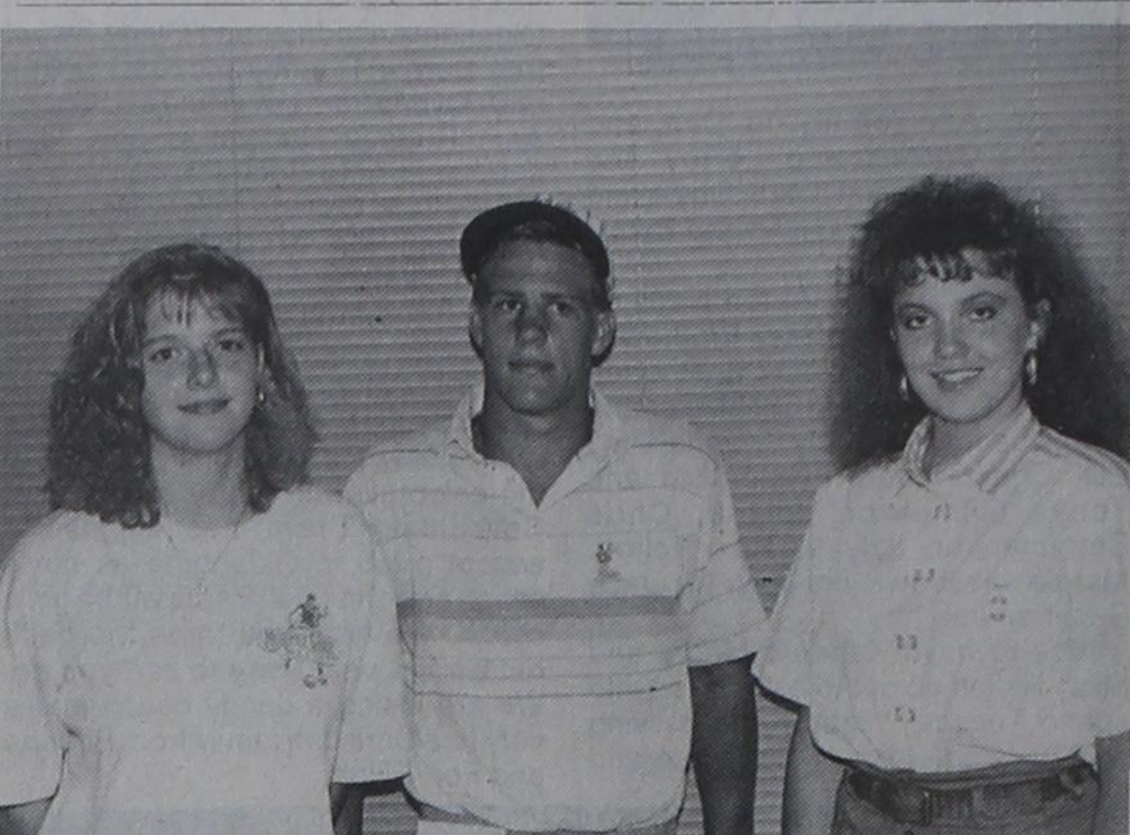

### From The Minister's Desk:

Perhaps you heard about the man who decided to sell his house. He called a real estate agent in his community and listed his house to be sold. The real estate agent placed an ad in the local paper, describing the house. When the ad appeared in the paper, the owner of the house carefully read the ad. He then called the real estate agent and told him to cancel the listing.

The surprised agent asked: "Why did you change your mind?" The owner of the house replied: "After reading the ad in the newspaper, I realized how important my house was to me. And it is not for sale."

More people need to have the attitude of this man. In every community, there are three houses that must not be sold. These three houses are:—

### The Court House

In every Texas county-seat, there is a building that is called the Court House. This building symbolizes constitutional law and order which citizens must respect and obey. The most respectful and obedient citizens should be disciples of Jesus. In the Roman letter, the Apostle Paul stated that disciples of Jesus should "—be in subjection to the governing authorities." (Romans 13:1) The Apostle Peter also emphasized the attitude that disciples of Jesus should have towards the government, saying: "Submit yourselves for the Lord's sake to every human institution, whether to a King as the one in authority, or to governors as sent by him for the punishment of evil doers and the praise of those who do right. For such is the will of God that by doing right you may silence the ignorance of foolish men." (1 Peter 2:13-15)

The law should be obeyed or it should be changed by due process. Civil disrespect and disobedience are wrong. The Court House must not be sold!

### The School House

As the Court House symbolizes law and order, the School House symbolizes education and knowledge. It must always be remembered high-quality educational program is the primary purpose of school. Such program encourages students to achieve their maximum

potential through excellence in academics and vocational-technical training. While extra-curricular activities are important to school, none of them must take precedent over the educational program.

To achieve a high-quality educational program, it is imperative that competent administrators and teachers be hired. It is imperative that these individuals be well paid. It is also imperative that these individuals be supported by parents and respected by students.

The School House must not be sold.

### The Church House

Another house that must not be sold is the Church House. Like the Court House and School House, it is not the brick and wood of the Church House that is valuable. Rather it is the principles that the Church House represents that are valuable.

The New Testament does not teach that the church is a mere institution that people join. It teaches that the church is the body of Christ which are "added to" by an obedient faith in the Lordship of Jesus Christ. (Acts 2:22-47) As a result of this obedient faith, these people—the church—become—"a people for God's own possession—" (1 Peter 2:9)

Yet these people are not sinlessly perfect. These people are a contradiction. They are holy people, but they are also sinful people. Hypocrisy must never be condoned! But critics of God's people—the church—must understand that justification is by faith in Jesus Christ not by sinless perfection. (Romans 5:1)

The Church House must not be sold!

Some extremely important principles are represented by the Court House, the School House and the Church House. It is my sincere hope that these houses in this community will not be sold.
