Commissioners Sign Contract With Evac Lifeteam For Employees

Wheeler County Commissioners' Court met in regular session on Monday, August 25, 2008, in the Commissioners' Courtroom of the Wheeler County Courthouse.

The 10:00 meeting opened with nine items on the agenda.

The court voted to pay the hourly payroll time sheets as presented.

The bills were approved for payment.

Budget changes were made within individual budgets—Precinct 4, Emergency Management and Sheriff's Dept.

Action on the burn ban was tabled.

No action on item 5—approval of the minutes of the previous meeting.

The county commissioners voted to enter into a contract with Air Evac Lifeteam. The helicopter ambulance service will be available to county employees at a cost of \$40 per individual; this contract will be in effect for one year.

Phone lines to the Emergency Operating Center were disconnected;

this does not affect 9-1-1 service.

Elk City, Oklahoma Pipeline L.P. was given permission to cross County Road M

for installation of an oil and gas pipeline.

Mark West Oklahoma Gas Co., L.L.C., was given permission to cross County Road E

for installation of an oil and gas pipeline.

The court will convene on Monday, September 8, 2008 at 10:00 a.m.

Marriage License Fee Increase 9-1

Texas couples headed for the altar can earn a marriage license fee discount beginning September 1, 2008, by completing an eight-hour relationship education course.

The new law, passed as House Bill 2685 during the 2007 legislative session, increases the state fee for a marriage license from \$30.00 to \$60.00. Through the free class, the state funded

Together in Texas initiative promotes healthy marriages and stable homes. The courses will address communication and conflict resolution skills and provide healthy marriage tools. The program aims to curb the divorce rate and help establish stable homes for children. It will allow a couple that completes the eight-hour premarital education course to get a waiver of the \$60.00 state fee and a waiver of the 72-hour waiting period.

In support of the legislation, Texas Health and Human Services Commission named twelve Regional Intermediaries (RI) across the state for the **Together in Texas** Healthy Marriage initiative. RIs are responsible for providing regional premarital and healthy marriage education services. Wheeler County will be administered by Region I, The Legacy Group, 705 Van Buren, Amarillo, Texas 79101, 806-372-9700. Region I will comprise the following counties: Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Cochran, Collingsworth, Crosby, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Donley, Floyd, Garza, Gray, Hale, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hockley, Hutchinson, King, Lamb, Lipscomb, Lubbock, Lynn, Moore, Motley, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, Terry, Wheeler and Yoakum. A web site will become available September 1 for couples who want to sign up. They can type in their zip code or city and find classes in their area, as well as a list of volunteers who will teach the classes.

If a couple completes the program, the Certificate of Completion will be presented to the County Clerk's office before the state fee will be waived; however, the county fee of \$7.00 will still be due. Without the course, the fee will be \$67.00.

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Kick Start Your Day With Breakfast

The first meal of the day, breakfast, is actually the most important one. However, this meal is often ignored or neglected by many people in the mad rush to make it to the workplace. We often skip breakfast or gobble a hurried one, which is where all the trouble with our diet begins. Breakfast literally means the meal we break our night-long fast with. Since the time gap between the last food we eat (dinner/supper) and the next one (breakfast) is rather long, skipping breakfast or having it haphazardly can seriously affect our health.

Acquire Brain Power:

According to experts, breakfast boosts our brainpower, keeps us slim and lifts our mood. It is not advisable to manage on a cup of tea and a couple of biscuits till lunchtime. Ensure that you and your family members have a proper breakfast, which will supply you the required energy to start your day well. There are different choices for breakfast items. While some swear by toast and egg variety, others go in for; milk and cornflakes, noodles, pasta, bacon etc are other options. Bread is a universal breakfast item and can be served in a variety of ways-as ordinary toast (with butter, cheese, jam, jelly or marmalade) or French Toast, sandwiches, cutlets and so on. Eggs are also a versatile breakfast item and can be served poached, scrambled, boiled or made into a fluffy omelette.

Boost Your Vitamin Intake:

Fresh fruit juice is highly recommended at breakfast, as it boosts the blood's glucose level. Seasonal fresh fruits should also be included on the breakfast table. A bowl of cereal is a must-have for many and a wide variety of cereals are available today to cater to every taste. Though many people cannot do without tea or coffee at breakfast time, other options are milk in any form (including shakes). In addition to the many specific benefits of breakfast, eating the largest meal in the morning and decreasing food intake throughout the day is definitely good for your overall health.

Improve Your Memory:

Children specially should have a healthy breakfast before they leave for school. As parents, we should ensure that the child gets up sufficiently early to get ready and have time for a proper leisurely breakfast. Don't force him to have a glass of milk every day-make an enticing milk shake instead-you will be giving him the double benefits of milk and fruits. Vary breakfast menu and include his favorite dishes once in a while-and he will look forward to the meal. Though it is normally assumed that our brain receives a constant supply of glucose (its fuel) no matter how long ago the last meal was taken, recent research has revealed that the overnight fast leaves our brain starved. If our breakfast does not contain adequate glucose, certain brain functions can be adversely affected, most notably memory.

Strengthen Bonds:

Ideally, our breakfast should contain 500 calories-a quarter of the days nutritional needs. Such a breakfast also enhances physical performance, verbal fluency and the ability to recall. As far as possible, the entire family should have breakfast together, as it gives a good start to the day. The family members can catch up on each other's schedule for the day. Discuss the latest news or just chat. Research has shown that families who regularly sit down to a proper breakfast are more cohesive than those where each member grabs a hurried bite before rushing out of the door.

In today's fast-paced world, breakfast often becomes a casualty. However, we should be aware of its myriad benefits and kick-start our day with a healthy breakfast. You'll see the change.

DPS Out in Force Labor Day Weekend

DPS is stepping up enforcement Labor Day weekend in an effort to make the roads of Texas safer.

All available troopers will be on duty Friday, August 29 through Monday, September 1 looking for drunk drivers, speeders and seat belt violators.

"Alcohol is a big concern this time of year, because this is the last big recreational weekend of the summer," said DPS Director Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr.

"Simply put, drunk drivers are a menace on our roadways."

DPS supports the "Drink. Drive. Go to Jail." campaign and is also a participant in Operation CARE—Combined Accident Reduction Effort—a nationwide

effort by police agencies to reduce fatalities on major interstate highways during holiday weekends.

A DWI conviction stays on an offender's criminal and driving record forever. For the first offense, the law allows a maximum

of six months in jail, a

\$2,000 fine and a one-year driver license suspension. A DWI conviction also carries a \$1,000 surcharge for three years, in addition to any other fines

or costs associated with the arrest.

During Labor Day last year, DPS troopers arrested 912 people for driving while intoxicated and issued nearly 16,000 speeding citations and more than

3,000 seat belt and child restraint tickets. In all, troopers wrote almost 34,000 tickets and 12,000 warnings in an effort to make driving safer during

the Labor Day holiday last year.

"With extra enforcement from DPS and other law enforcement agencies, drivers who disregard traffic laws should expect their chances of getting a

ticket or getting arrested for DWI to increase dramatically this weekend," said Col. Davis.

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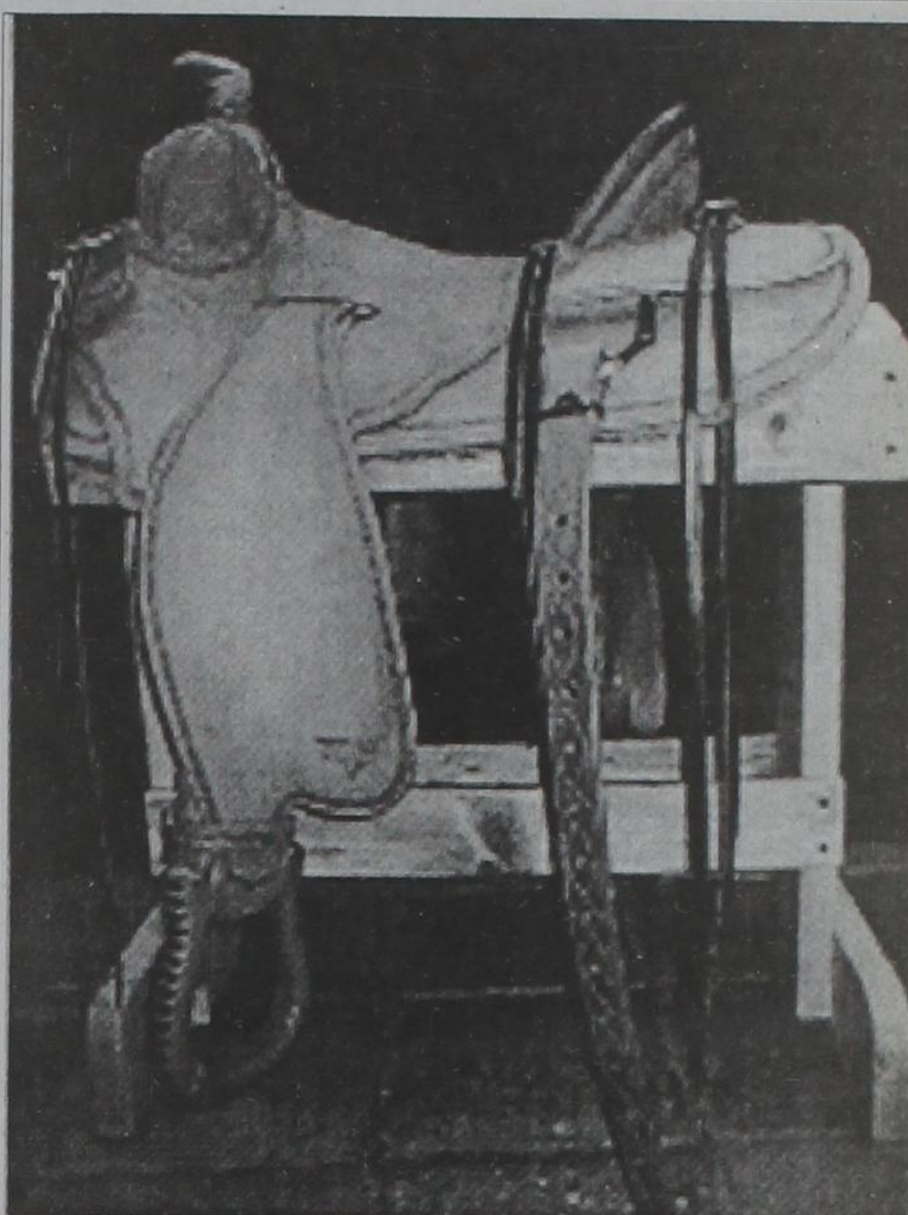
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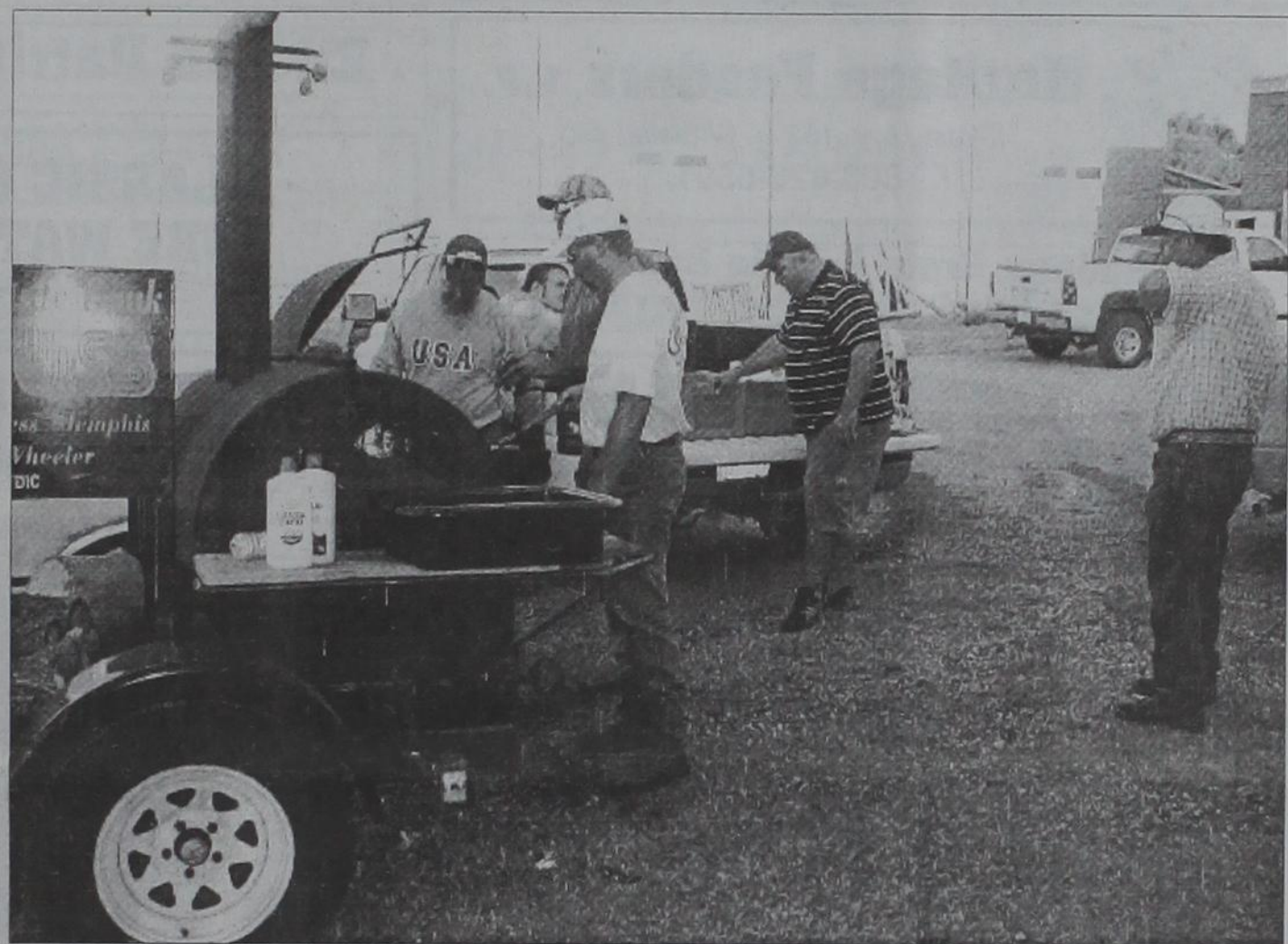

Multiple-Pasture System Is Defined

According to experts, the biggest recent change to the cow/calf business has been rapidly inflating fertilizer and fuel costs.

To survive, livestock producers must change the way they manage pastures, said Dr. Gerald Evers, Texas AgriLife Research forage management scientist.

One change that could help livestock producers reduce inputs and make the most of their resources is to develop a three-pasture grazing system, Evers said.

Many producers use a multiple-pasture system already, but two-pasture systems based on warm-season grasses are probably more common in East Texas, he said. In a two-pasture system, one area is grazed most of the year and another reserved for at least part of the year for growing hay.

The main disadvantage of the two-pasture system is the calves are usually born in spring and are sold in the fall, a time when calf prices are usually at their lowest.

A two-pasture system also requires hay for an extended winter feeding program, an expensive proposition whether the hay is bought or harvested on the farm. And it doesn't take advantage of getting free nitrogen from cool-season legumes, Evers said.

"Things have changed. No one likes change, but high fertilizer prices require that we change," said Evers, who is based at the Texas AgriLife Research and Extension Center at Overton.

Nitrogen fertilizers continue to skyrocket because natural gas is used to produce them. An increasing percentage of nitrogen fertilizer is being imported from other countries. Prices of other nutrients, such as phosphorous, potassium and sulfur also are rising rapidly because of increased transportation costs and higher world demand.

In much of Texas, livestock operations are anchored on improved forage grasses that under most management systems require the yearly application of nitrogen and other nutrients. However, the cost of fertilizer has made such conventional soil fertility programs economically im-

practical, Evers said. But by understanding how different pasture management systems work, producers can stretch their fertilizer dollars and lengthen the grazing period by months to reduce reliance on hay, yet maintain livestock nutrition, he said.

One example of a multiple pasture system would use three pastures, consisting of a hay meadow (about 40 percent of open pasture), a pasture to be over-seeded with ryegrass-clover (also about 40 percent of open pasture), and a third pasture used for feeding hay and calving (about 20 percent of open pasture), Evers said.

"The hay meadow should never be over-seeded with annual ryegrass since ryegrass grows through May and delays spring growth of the warm-season perennial grass," Evers said. "This results in the loss of the early hay cutting when warm-season grass

growth and nutritive value are the highest."

Fertilizer, based on a soil test, should be applied when daily low temperatures stay above 60 degrees. Typically, only one or two hay cuttings will be needed. The hay meadow can be grazed until mid-September. Any growth should be removed in September or a hay harvest in mid-September and fertilized with about 60

pounds per acre of nitrogen to produce a standing hay crop, Evers said.

The pasture to be overseeded with ryegrass and clover can have any type of summer grass on it, he said. It is critical to select a clover that is adapted to the soil type and has the potential to reseed so it does not have to be replanted each fall.

On Labor Day the usual Old Settlers Reunion will be held and the Pit Barbeque dinner served about 12:00 to close the Labor Day weekend festivities.

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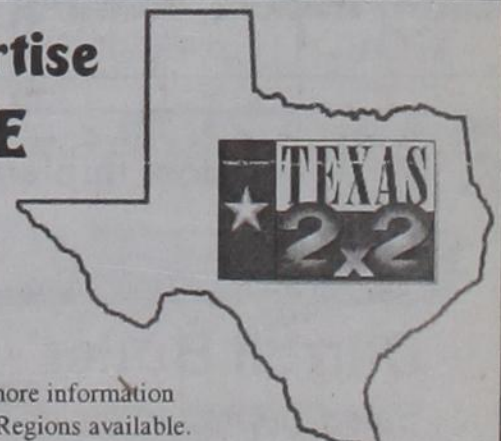

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
