

Commissioners Meet For Last Time In Temporary Facility

Wheeler County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, October 25, 2004, in the Courthouse Annex at 410 S. Main St. in Wheeler. Nine items were on the agenda for the meeting.

Jesse Leonard, 77, died September 9, 2004 in Kerrville,

Mr. Leonard was born to Robert and Tassie Leonard. He grew up in Mobeetie and graduated from Mobeetie High School.

Jesse served in the U.S. Marine Corps as a dog trainer. After graduation from Wayland Baptist University, he began a life of ministry, serving churches in Texas, Washington and Georgia.

Daryl Snelgrooes, Commissioner, Pct. 1, told of his need to purchase a used 2002 3/4-ton Chevrolet pickup from Ware Chevrolet. The estimated cost will be \$15,000. The commissioners approved the purchase.

Melissa Shackleford with the Plains Trails organization was on the agenda, but was not present.

Christie Jones met with the commissioners to get their approval for the Chamber of Commerce to use the gazebo for Santa Claus' visit the latter part of November. Permission was granted. This was the last commissioner's court meeting to be held in the Courthouse Annex. With the completion of the courthouse project, the commissioners will be moved back into their courtroom for the Monday, November 8 meeting.






