



J. V. Calcote, 81, of Childress died Thursday, July 29, 2004 at Childress Regional Medical Center following an extended illness.

Funeral services were conducted at Johnson Funeral Home Chapel in Childress on Monday, August 2, 2004 at 10 A.M. by Rev. Norman Rushing, followed by burial and Military rites in Amarillo at Llano Cemetery at 3:00 P.M. by Johnson Funeral Home of Childress.

Born in Wellington, Collingsworth County, Texas, August 13, 1922. Mr. Calcote was the oldest of eight children born to James Barksdale and Goldie Vee (Trimble) Calcote. His grandparents were William Sigger and Ora Belle (Mayo) Calcote and Plese and Ada (Riggens) Trimble, all pioneer settlers of this area.

As a young child, he moved with his parents to Wheeler County, Texas in a covered wagon, where land was purchased and broke out. This land is still family owned.

Mr. Calcote attended the Kelton schools and at an early age became a member of the Kelton Baptist Church. He served honorably with the U.S. Army in 1942 during World War II.

He married Hilton Irene Lewis on March 3, 1949. The family moved to Amarillo where Mr. Calcote was a painting contractor and later was employed by the Amarillo Independent School District until his retirement. He then moved to Childress to make his home. He enjoyed his friends at Taylor's, was an avid domino player and loved Mexican Music.

He married Ruby Guinn of Chicago, IL February 7, 2004. He was preceded in death by

his grandparents, parents, wife Irene, two infant sons, James and Jackie, and a brother, Bobby Calcote.

on or before Sept. 1, of this year is elgible to attend Kindergarten. Any child who will be 4 years old on or before Sept. 1 of this year may attend Pre Kindergarten at Wheeler ISD.

The State of Texas requires these things for a child to be registered in public school: 1. Copy of Child's official state

birth certificate. 2. Copy of Child's immunization record.

Wheeler ISD requires a copy of the child's social security card for record keeping purposes.

Registration packets for children who will be attending the Wheeler ISD Pre K or Kindergarten during this school year are available and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on business days.

This packet contains information necessary for enrollment and all the required forms. The esti-

Any child who will be 5 years old mated length of time needed to finish the forms is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example...the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "Traffic Jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who perfer to wait until registration day are welcome to get the packet then and fill it out in the cafeteria.

Under this proposal, taxes on the average homestead would increase by \$27.48 or 24.26 percent compared with last year's taxes. Comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would decrease by \$0.11120 per \$100 of taxable value or 20.62 percent compared to last year's tax rate. These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the taxable value of property.

Louise Boydston and Vance and Carol Boydston also from Allison attended Camp Oklahoma. Louise stayed in her travel trailer at camp.





In my nearly 20 years of work in the ministry, I have been involved in a number of different aspects of church-work. Some of it is just plain fun: the Vacation Bible School's, the trips to fun parks or ball games, just getting together with friends and eating good meals. Some of it is tedious work: typing, standing over a copier machine, stapling and folding hundreds of pages at a time, dealing with salespersons on the telephone. Some of it is routine but right up my alley: coming up with sermons, reading theological books, talking with colleagues and members about church subjects - all things that culminate in sermons. Some of it is expected but somewhat impulsive based upon what is going on at that time: visiting hospitals or nursing homes, calling on someone in a time of tragedy, studying with a potential Christian.

In my nearly 20 years of work in the ministry, I have also done a number of funeral services. I don't have an accurate count, but I have done in the neighbor-

vices. That may sound like a very high number to anyone except for Jim Wright or any other funeral director. Sometimes the funerals are done for people whom I knew very well and other times for someone whom I had never met. Admittedly, they are a bit easier when the funeral is performed for someone that I had a relationship with. Here is my little secret, though (and if you misunderstand this it might sound bad): I actually enjoy doing funeral services. That doesn't mean I am glad that the person has died, Rather, I recognize that deaths will happen and I also know that I will take seriously the funeral service. I always try to give my very best to the things said and the actions taken. I always try to make these moments appropriate and respectful to the deceased and the family. Working for this congregation and this community, I owe you my best, and I pray that I deliver my best when those moments arise.


Tamera Hartline and Kimberly Winter were running the Cowboy Oasis Thursday morning. Things




