

Where's the internet wiring?

A special meeting of the Wheeler County Commissioner's Court was held Tuesday morning, August 17. One item on the agenda was the "Consideration of Courthouse Restoration Project."

The commissioners recently received a bid from Centra Media of Pampa in the amount of \$45,000 for the installation of the wireless internet system in the courthouse. This came as a surprise to the

commissioners, as they were under the impression a contract was in place for the installation of the internet service along with the electrical wiring and telephone system. Conduit was put into the walls, floors and ceilings for the running of the wiring for various services. Centra Media representatives Tarell Dyer, field services manager and Jim A Sealy, operations manager, both met with the commissioners Tuesday morning. The architects had contacted Centra Media during the designing part of the project. No further contact was made and Centra Media assumed the county had gone with another network.

As the work progressed, County Clerk Margaret Dorman kept asking questions and was assured there was no problem. A month ago, Margaret contacted Centra Media and learned they had not submitted a bid. The bid was then mailed to the county. The commissioners questioned the amount of the bid. They were told it will not be necessary to attempt to thread the wiring through the newly installed conduit. The threading will cause a problem, as 90° corners were used as opposed to slow curves, making threading more difficult or in some cases impossible. Centra Media reported they had made two unsuccessful attempts to 'make contact' with the contractor as the wiring was being done. (Continued Page 4)

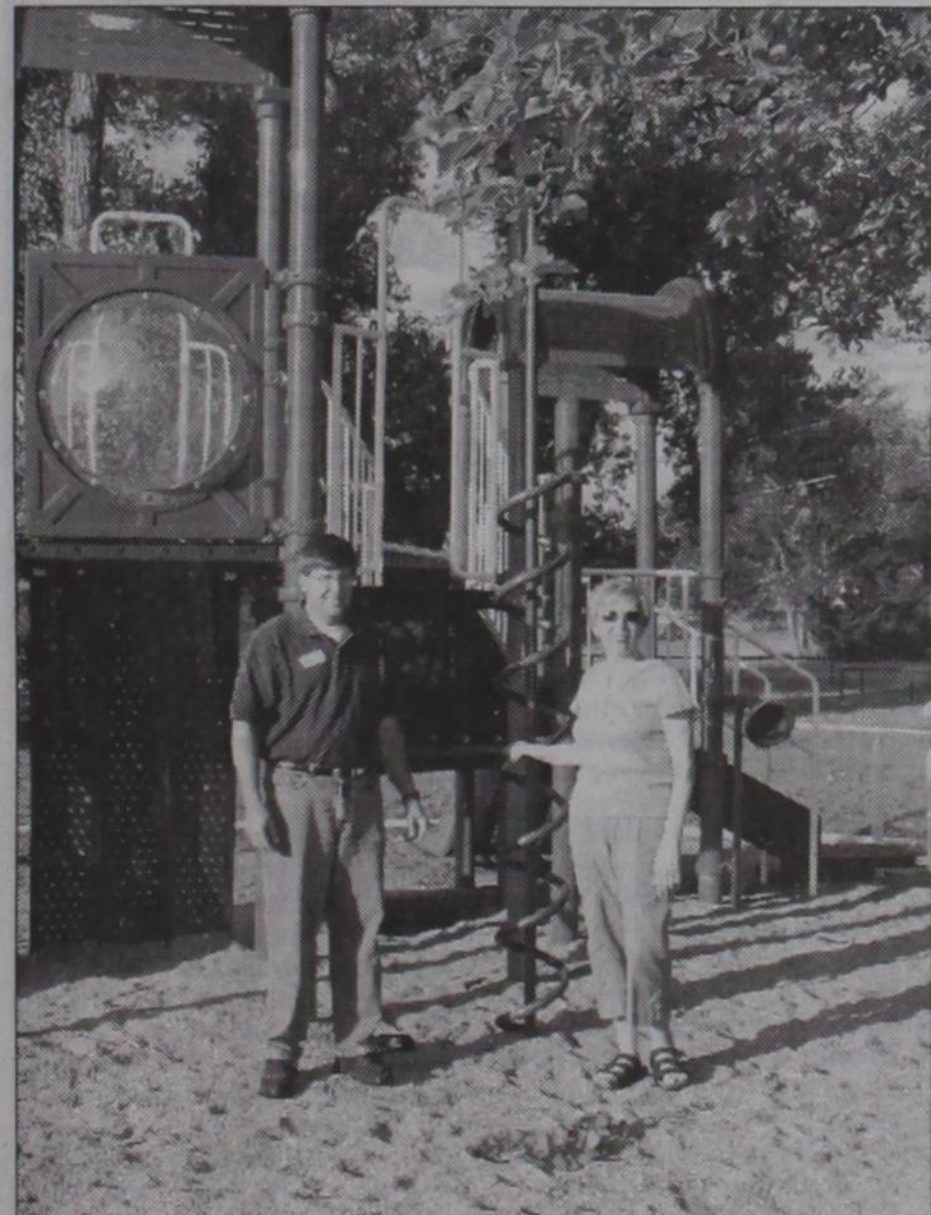

Wheeler I.S.D. Enrollment Shows To Be 343 on Mon.

Registration for students at Wheeler I.S.D. was held on Tuesday, August 10, 2004, and students reported for their first day of the 2004-2005 school year on Monday, August 16, 2004.

Enrollment on the first day of the 2004-05 school year was 343. This is compared to an enrollment of 309 on the last day of the 2003-04 school year.

Thirty-eight youngsters are enrolled in Pre-K and Kindergarten this year. The two classes of the first grade have a total of 27 students; 13 in one and 14 in the

other.

The largest class in school this year is the seventh grade with 33 students. The smallest class is the fifth grade with only 17 students. The second grade is divided into two classes with 15 students in one and 13 students in the other. There are 25 students in the third grade and 24 in the fourth. The sixth grade has 31 students and eighth grade has 22.

High school enrollment stands at 98. The number of students per class is 23 freshmen, 27 sophomores, 24 juniors and 24 seniors.

Wheeler Mustangs Get First Taste of 6-Man Football In Scrimmage

The Wheeler Mustangs got their first taste of the sixman football scene last Saturday here in Wheeler.

The scrimmage was moved from Happy due to the rainfall that was covering the Amarillo area. "I thought our kids did some good things, but we also made mistakes that we expected with our inexperience," said Wheeler Head Coach Toby Tucker. "There were a couple of times that we got out of position, but overall I thought that we did a good job. Happy is a good football team who is very physical. It was a great test for us."

Wheeler outscored Happy with the Varsity teams by a score of 5-3. Wheeler scored three times during its first 15 play session. The scoring began with a 39 yard TD pass from Hector Emiliano to Cameron Burton. Tanner Collins didn't waste anytime scoring on the next play from 80 yards out. Josh Britt also reeled off an 80 yard scamper. "I thought offensively we looked strong on that first 15 play session," added Tucker. Wheeler held Happy to 1 touchdown during their first session. "We made them run about 20 plays before they got into the endzone, said Tucker." "We did a good job and forced a turnover and really got into the groove of understanding sixman." Later in the live portion of the scrimmage Mikel Tucker connected with Cameron Burton on a 24 yard TD pass. The varsity portion of the scrimmage ended with a 69 yard interception return for a touchdown by Jared Haning. Wheeler finished with 419 yard of offense and caused two turnovers from the visiting Cowboys. The Mustangs will travel to Paducah for a scrimmage this Friday.

Paducah is ranked 6th in the state and is expected to have quite a bit of speed. "Paducah is going to be another great test for us," added Tucker. "We have some healing up to do from this weekend, but we are excited about the opportunity to go and play another good football team that will help us prepare for the regular season." Wheeler will open the regular season against Valley who is ranked #2 in the State, on August 28th in Groom.

Rules For Six-Man Football

The football field has been changed to 80 yard length, 40 yard width, in stead of 100x50. Some of the other rules of six-man include: (1) 15 yards for a 1st down, instead of 10; (2) every player is an eligible pass receiver; (3) the offense must have two ball changes before they can run across the line of scrimmage; (4) a kicked PAT (point after touchdown) is worth 2 points, while a run PAT is 1 point, just opposite of 11-man football; (5) no quarterback sneaks are allowed.

The game is said to be a much faster-moving, higher-scoring game.

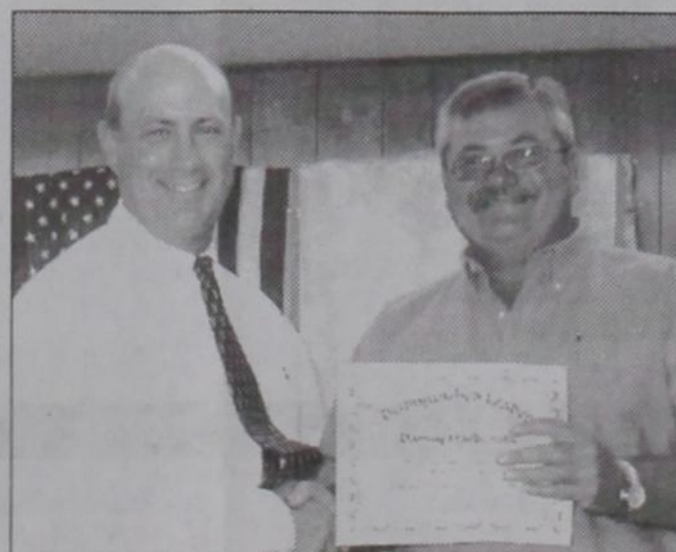
