The "Stangs can forget their 1-4 record because this is where the fun

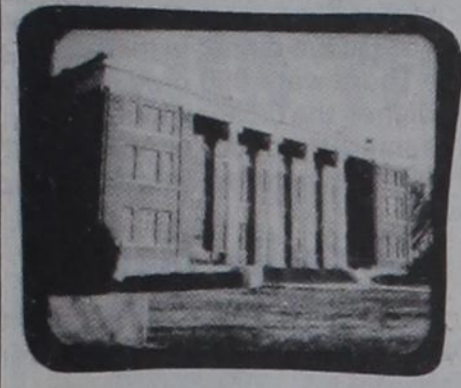
really begins. The Ponies open district 2-2A play Friday night as they travel to Panhandle to take on the always-tough Panthers.

Panhandle has been to the playoffs thirteen years consecutively and has played what is easily the toughest schedule of any team in District 2-2A as they have faced five Class 3A opponents leading into Friday night's duel with Wheeler. The Panthers are 2-3 against those opponents but that record will not be a factor as only the next five games will determine whether or not the Panthers will extend their playoff streak. One thing is certain. Panhandle will have their claws extended and ready to strike Friday night.

The Panthers will rely primarily on their tough 5-3 defense as their offense has struggled up to this point. Sophomore Brady Shadid guides

Coach Steve Land's wing-T offense from his quarter-back post with junior fullback Mark Land and runningback Heath Haseloff, who has been in and out of Panhandle's pre-district games with an arm injury, giving support. The Panthers have good size across the front five with an 193-pound average.

The Mustangs will enter the game with a couple of key players suffering from minor injuries. Quarterback Chad Dunnam is nursing a banged-up hip and split end Heath Sabbe is playing with sore ribs and hurting kidneys. Dunnam missed the last half of the fourth quarter against Quanah. Both should be able to play Friday night.

# QUANAH ROUTS MUSTANGS, 33-13

Using a powerful ground attack and a defense that was almost impenetrable for all but one quarter, the Quanah Indians dropped Wheeler 33-14 last Friday night. Running back Rodney Woodard's 197 yards on 24 carries along with fullback Shawn Hardeman's 164 on 22 paced the Indian victory that was won on the strength of Quanah's 19-point second quarter.

But until the second quarter the game was an exciting back-and-forth exchange of big plays. After the opening kick-off, Quanah moved easily into Wheeler territory on the legs of Woodard and Hardeman. The Mustang defense was rigid however as they stopped Quanah on the Pony 30 and took over on downs.

On the first play from scrimmage for Wheeler, QB Chad Dunnam dropped back and found wide open Joe Dan Ledbetter ranging down the left side of the field. Ledbetter hauled in Dunnam's pass and rumbled down to the Indian 13 before Hardeman could haul him down. Two plays later, runningback Mark Marshall scampered 10 yards to the end zone on a sweep right. Dunnam's kick gave Wheeler a surprising 7-0 lead with 7:18 left in the opening quarter.

Quanah answered right back on its next possession. After Woodard re-

turned the ensuing kickoff to Quanah's 20 and picked up eight yards on first down, Hardeman took the spotlight. The 190-pound fullback took a handoff from Indian QB Chad Smith up the middle, broke two tackles and flew 72 yards to the end zone. George Cox's kick tied the score at 7-7 with 5:35 still left in the first quarter.

#### Colts Remain Undefeated

The Wheeler 7th Grade Colts remained unbeaten by defeating Canadian 22-8 in a game at Nicholson Field. The win makes the Colts 4-0 going into district play. The Colts overcame fumbles, 3 of which were recovered by Canadian, to record their 4 straight win. Despite the win, Coach Steve Scott is concerned about the Colts upcoming game with Panhandle. "We must be more focused," says Scott. "It did not seem as though we were really wanting to play football Thursday. Wheeler opened the game by driving 48 yards in 5 plays, following a Kitten fumble. Marshall Flowers carried the pigskin past the Canadian defense for the touch. Bryan Judd ran for the two point conversion as the Colts took an early 8-0 lead.

In the second period following the third Wheeler fumble, the Colt offense got on track and sustained a drive culminated by a one yard plunge by Jeremy Davis. The extra point run failed leaving the Colts ahead by 14. However, Canadian was able to put points on the board just before the half, following the 6th Wheeler fumble. That score cut the margin to Wheeler 14, Canadian 6.

It looked as though the scoring would end there as both defenses tightened and allowed almost no yardage in the third quarter. Wheeler was able to clinch the victory by scoring after a Kitten turnover in their own end of the field. Judd hit pay dirt and Flowers added the 2 point conversion to make the score final at 22-8.

Offensively, Judd was the leading rusher with 72 yards on 11 carries. Defensively there was individual standout by the entire defense was solid as Canadian was limited to 25 total yards. The next 7th grade game is Thursday against Panhandle in Wheeler. Kickoff is at 4:30.

right back. Ledbetter returned Indian kicker Danny Cisneros' short kick to the Mustang 48 to give Wheeler great field position. The 'Stangs then took the last 52 yards on 5 plays as Dunnam made two key plays to keep the drive rolling. The first was a 12-yard run to the Indian 37 and the second came on a 14-yard pass to fullback Jason Hink for a first down on Quanah's 20. On the next play sophomore fullback Jarrod Ledbetter, who was alternating plays with Hink, rumbled over the last 20 yards to give Wheeler a 13-7 lead with 3:51 still remaining in the first stanza.

But as soon as the opening quarter ended, Quanah took over the game. The Mustangs picked up 123 yards of total offense in the first twelve minutes to Quanah's 144 which was an indication of the closeness of the quarter. After that first period however, Wheeler could only manage 107 yards of offense while the Indians piled up 288 more yards which indicated the closeness of the rest of the game. Woodard, who had 45 yards in the first quarter, loaded up for 152 yards and three touchdown runs of 11, 47, and 9 yards in the second quarter and a fourth on an electrifying 8-yard powerhouse run in the third quarter which gave Quanah its final 33-14 lead.

Wheeler was led primarily by the right arm and legs of Chad Dunnam. The rugged junior quarterback rushed for 43 yards on 13 carries, which was surprising because he was sacked three times (two sacks resulted in fumbles) for 25 yards in losses, and threw for 70 yards. Jarrod Ledbetter rushed for 42 yards on only 5 carries to help boost Wheeler's attack somewhat.

### Canadian Over JV

Last Thursday night, the Canadian Wildcats escaped from Nicholson Field with a 21-6 victory over the Mustang JV. In what is probably the final junior varsity game. The Wheeler eleven played a good 40 minutes against the class of District 2-2A's JVs Canadian which has posted 55-6 victories over both Wellington and Panhandle.

In the week 5 contest, Wheeler and Canadian played to a scoreless first quarter. Both defenses were able to slow down the other's offense. The

She started out life in Chickasha Oklahoma on June 14, 1898. She had one brother and five sisters. She reports her brother was very spoiled having all those girls around. She has one sister that is still alive, Belle Mitchell Abney who is 108 years young.

She moved to Collingsworth when she was nine years old and remained there until she married "Buck" Morris in 1915. Although she and her husband moved around quit a bit, she enjoyed it most when she lived in the same county with her brother and sisters. They were a very close family. They went to church as a family on Sundays, and then stayed together to go to dinner. She says she grew closer to her family during that ten years than any other time of her life.

Willie also told of her first car wreck, luckily it was not serious. It all started on early morning when she was taking her children to school. On the way she decided to treat them to some candy and as soon as she gave them the candy, they began to fight over it. So like any mother she reached back to take it away, but by the time she looked up she was in the ditch. It was muddy, but she finally found some help to get out of the ditch. She didn't want Buck, her husband, to find out, so she gave the children the candy back and asked them not to tell anyone about the accident. Her secret was safe for a couple of hours, until the children couldn't hold it in any longer, but she now looks back on that day and has a nice chuckle.

Willie moved to Wheeler in 1965. She lived by herself for thirty-three years until she recently became ill and was moved into the Nursing Home. She says she feels better and hopes to move into her trailer house behind her granddaughter Yvonne Topper. That wraps up Willie for this week, but I would like to thank Willie for taking the time to talk with me, so THANK YOU VERY MUCH. You are a wonderful lady. I enjoyed it very much.

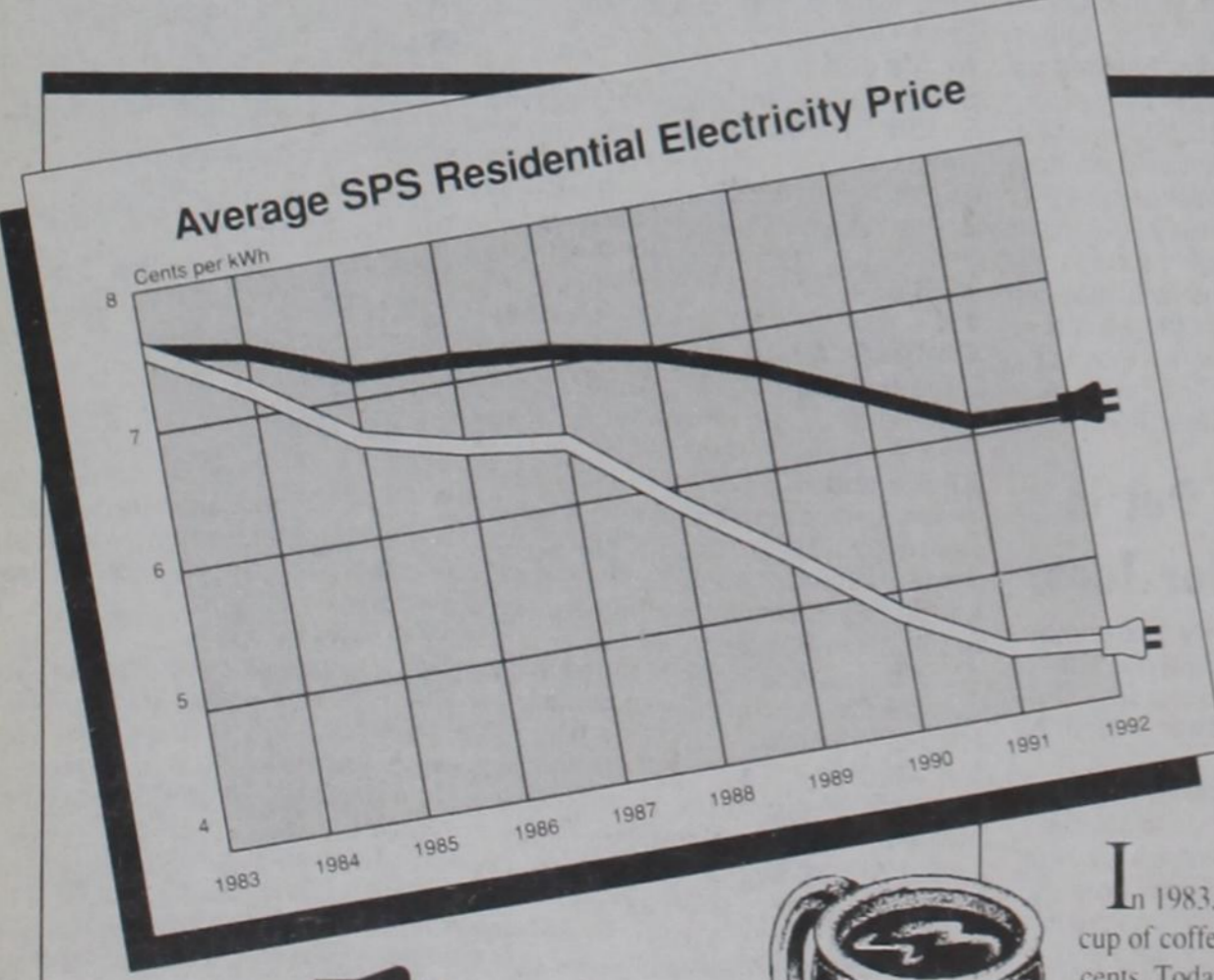

**IS THE DRAFT-DODGING ISSUE AN ISSUE?**

The news media and the Democrats continue to tell us that the draft dodging of the man who wants to be our leader is not an issue. They say it doesn't matter. If it really isn't an issue, why does Bill Clinton refuse to talk straight about it? How many veterans who went and risked their lives in the effort to preserve freedom believe that it is a non-issue?

Mr. Slick Clinton says he was "only a 23-year-old boy" when he dodged the draft. Those are his exact words to Ted Koppel on "Nightline" last February. If he was still a boy at 23, when did he grow up? Nathan Hale graduated as a teacher at the age of 21 and served as a captain on General George Washington's staff. When he was executed, he said, "My only regret is that I have but one life to give for my country". Bill Clinton never earned his Rhodes master degree at Oxford because he never even registered at Oxford his second year.

That was after he cleverly deceived the commandant of the Army ROTC at the University of Arkansas in order to buy time for his fourth evasion of the military draft. It seems that all he did at Oxford in the fall and winter of 1969 was organize demonstrations against his country in a foreign land. Evidently, Clinton merely used Oxford as a shield from the draft. Several of his classmates have confirmed that he rarely attended lectures or performed scholarly work while a Rhodes scholar. He deceitfully worked things around to enter the ROTC program so he could avoid the draft after he had already received a draft notice. That was not allowed, but he didn't tell them that part—that he already had received notice. Later, when he drew a number that was so high he wouldn't be drafted anyway, he dropped the ROTC idea. Col. Eugene Holmes, the director of the ROTC unit that Mr. Slick manipulated to avoid military service, has spoken about it recently.

Rep. Bob Dornan claimed this week that he now has evidence that not only did Bill Clinton lie to avoid the Vietnam draft, but that he also visited the Soviet Union at a time when they were supplying the weapons with which the North Vietnamese were killing our servicemen. Clinton, he says, visited the Soviet Union in 1969 and that he organized anti-war demonstrations in other countries. Those demonstrations in London that he was involved in had the support of organizations such as "British Peace Counsel" an arm of the KGB.

The *New York Times* has recently written about Dan Quayle "pulling strings" to get into the Indiana National Guard in 1969. Most of the people who charged Quayle with that four years ago have since apologized because it became clear long ago that Quayle got into the Guard the way everyone else does. That was not dishonorable. There were no lies, no tricks, no deceit, no slick. Quayle wore the uniform. Mr. Slick didn't. He said he found it "loathsome". Again, that is his word. Does it make any difference? It does to me.

**From The Minister's Desk:**

Did you hear about the young man who graduated from seminary and was hired to be the preacher for a small rural congregation? For twelve consecutive Sunday mornings, his sermon topic was baptism which caused several members of the congregation to complain. These members pointedly told the young preacher that there were other topics that he could use for his sermons.

Since the young preacher was very sensitive to criticism, he ask these unhappy members for their suggestions of sermon topics. One of their suggestions was pills. The young preacher promised that his next sermon topic would be pills.

On the next Sunday morning, the young preacher began his sermon by saying: "My sermon topic is pills—cheap pills, expensive pills, sweet pills, and bitter pills." Then he added: "There is also the gospel which reminds of my favorite sermon topic of baptism."

Baptism is a important Biblical topic, but is a topic that is often misunderstood. In my opinion, this misunderstanding can be corrected by some Biblical truths. These truths are:—

1. Baptism is one specific action. The definition of the Greek word for baptism clearly identifies this one specific action. This Greek word is baptizo and every standard Greek lexicon defines this word as "dip, immerse, submerge, or plunge."

This definition is reflected in the Biblical texts that discuss baptism. For example, Colossians 2:12 says: "—Having been buried with Him in baptism, in which you were also raised up with Him through faith in the working of God, who raised Him from the dead."

The Bible simply does not teach that there are modes of baptism. Rather it teaches that baptism is one specific action.

2. Baptism is an essential command. At the conclusion of earthly ministry, Jesus gave a urgent directive to His disciples. He said: "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation." He then added: "He who has believed and has been baptized shall be saved; but he who has disbelieved shall be condemned." (Mark 16:15-16)

Notice verse 16. This verse emphatically shows that Jesus commanded believers to be baptized if they want to be saved. Yet there are some people who reject this command of Jesus. These people emphasize that Jesus did not say: "He that is baptized not shall be condemned." But why should He? Jesus knew that people who did not believe would not be baptized. Think about the directions that a

doctor gives a patient. A doctor says: "Fill this prescription; take the pills and you will live. If you do not fill this prescription, you will die." Why does a doctor not say: "If you do not fill this prescription and if you do not take the pills, you will die" ? Because a doctor recognizes that taking pills is dependent upon filling the prescription. If a patient does not fill the prescription, a patient cannot take the pills.

When Jesus said: "—He who has disbelieved shall be condemned—", he knew that baptism was dependent upon belief. Jesus simply recognized that when people believed they would be baptized.

Mark 16: 15-16 contains a great truth about baptism. This truth is that baptism is an essential command of God that must be obeyed if people want to be saved.

3. Baptism is an act of faith not a work of merit. This truth is greatly misunderstood by many people. These people honestly believe that baptism is a work of merit that negates salvation by the grace of God. They emphasize that the Bible says: "For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is a gift of God; not as a result of works, that no one should boast." (Ephesians 2:8-9)

Salvation is by the grace of God, but it is—"through faith—." But what is faith? According to the Bible, faith is more than mentally "accepting Christ Jesus as a personal Savior." The Bible teaches that faith is pragmatic, expressing itself through obedience. (James 2:14-26) To be saved by the grace of God, people must obediently express their faith in Jesus Christ.

Strangely enough, people who believe that they were saved by "accepting Christ" will acknowledge that they had to repent before they became disciples of Jesus. Why did their repentance not negate the grace of God? Repentance is an act of faith! Baptism is too! Galatians 3:26-27 says: "For you are all sons of God through faith in Jesus Christ. For all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourself with Christ."

Baptism is not a work of merit which has a ritualistic cleansing power. Rather it is an act of faith which allows penitent believers to obediently express their trust in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. (Romans 6:4-11, I Peter 3: 21-22)

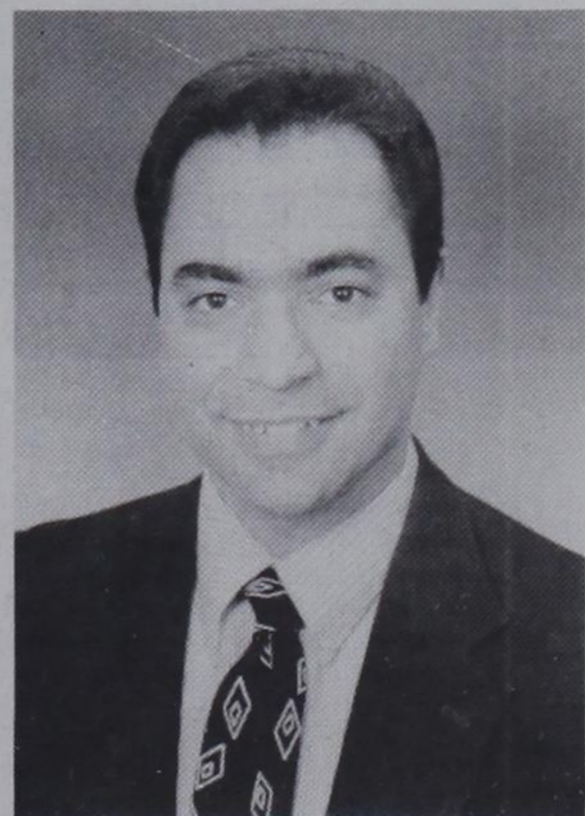
With these three Biblical truths, baptism can be correctly understood. When baptism is correctly understood, it will be recognized that it is at the heart of the gospel.
