HOSPITAL DEDICATION IS HELD SUNDAY

A dedication ceremony Sunday afternoon officially opened the newly expanded and remodeled Parkview Hospital. A \$1 million plus addition and renovation has just been completed. The festivities were held in the new cafeteria, located in the basement. Dean Tipps, chairman of the North Wheeler County Hospital District Board welcomed everyone.

Charles Hix, administrator, was introduced and summarized the realization which led the board to decide upon the project. With the hospital running at 90 percent capacity and 20 years of age on the existing facilities, the board decided it was time to expand. Needed were additional private rooms, larger lab and x-ray facilities and an additional emergency room. With each of the annual Medicare inspections, more and more shortages were being reported.

Dean Tipps gave this summary of the project:

"In 1979, with the hospital constantly running in excess of 90 percent occupancy; it became evident to the Board of Directors and to many citizens of the hospital district that we had outgrown our existing hospital in patient capacity as well as many of the ancillary departments.

"The Hospital Board of Directors and the Administration initiated a study at the time to try to determine the future medical needs for the North Wheeler County Hospital District, and for the next two years continued their study. They were equally determined to do this addition and renovation without a bond issue or increase in taxes.

"In August, 1981, the Board had fairly well determined the needs as pertains to capacity and services, and determined at that time they had

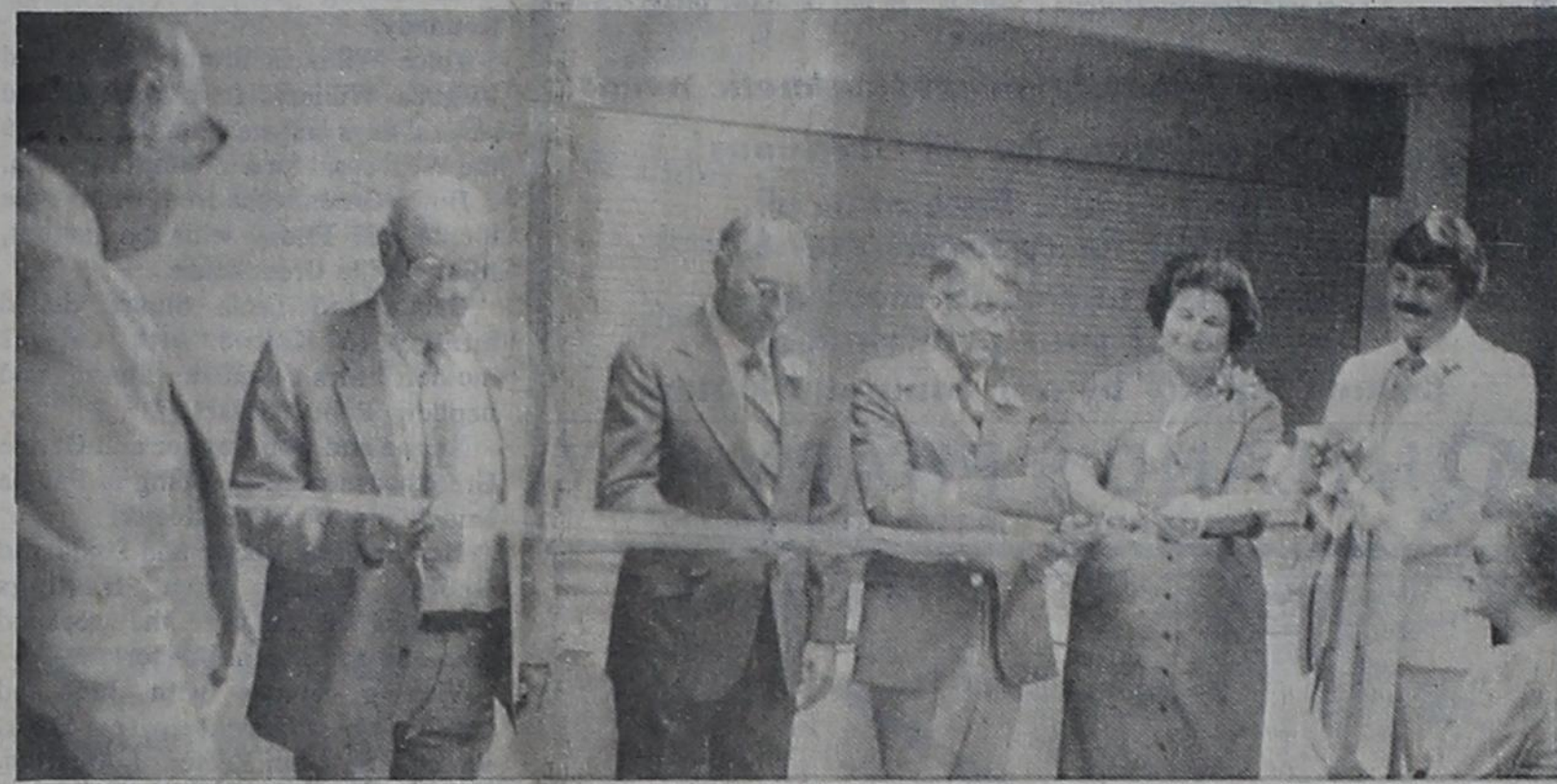
Preceding in death by parents one daughter, Viola Von Dale, 1935. Also 3 brothers and 4 sisters.

Well school is out and we are going to have a lot of kids around the swimming pool and park. There will be some on bicycles and some on foot, so lets all watch for them and make this a safe summer.

It looks like the toronado season is here once again so I just want all of you to know that we will all be out looking when the weather gets to looking bad, so listen to your scanner and we will try to keep you informed. But it never hurts to stand out and look for yourself. So if you have a cellar don't wait for us, you just get down safe, and ask questions later.

In the month of May we have had an average of 6 people in jail every day. We have handled 22 people in and out of jail total. We cleared up the break-in at the Wheeler School and got the weight lifting equipment back.

The new jail is still not finished, we are having a tough time getting the locks, so it shouldn't be to much longer. I know I'll be glad along with everyone else down here.

In the past month we have sprayed 4 patches of marijuana with 24-d and have got a fairly good kill. We will probably have to go back every so often and spray again, there is still some coming up. We also raided a man in the South East part of Wheeler and got 1/2 lb. of marijuana from him. He is now serving 4 years in the pen. We are working on some more and are going to make it hard on anyone and everyone who is caught selling it, or using it. We have had a report of

In the All Around race Drew Thomas is in second place with 115 points.

The Rookie of the Year Award is very close with Larry Trimble leading with 46 points and Lee McCasland close behind with 45 1/2 points.

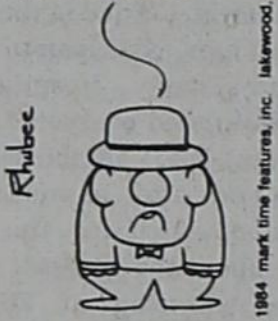

Federal Land Bank of Texas Declares Patronage Refund

Farmers and ranchers who borrow from the Federal Land Bank of Texas recieved \$3.7 million in patronage refunds recently. The refund will help them make their next interest payment.

According to Talmadge Porter, president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Childress, this marks the first time in its 68-year history that the Federal Land Bank of Texas has declared a patronage refund.

Porter said the refund was possible because the bank more than met its goal for funds applied to a mandatory legal reserve account.

The amount of each borrower's refund was based on the amount of interest paid on his loan during 1984. The refund, in most cases, will be applied to the borrower's next loan

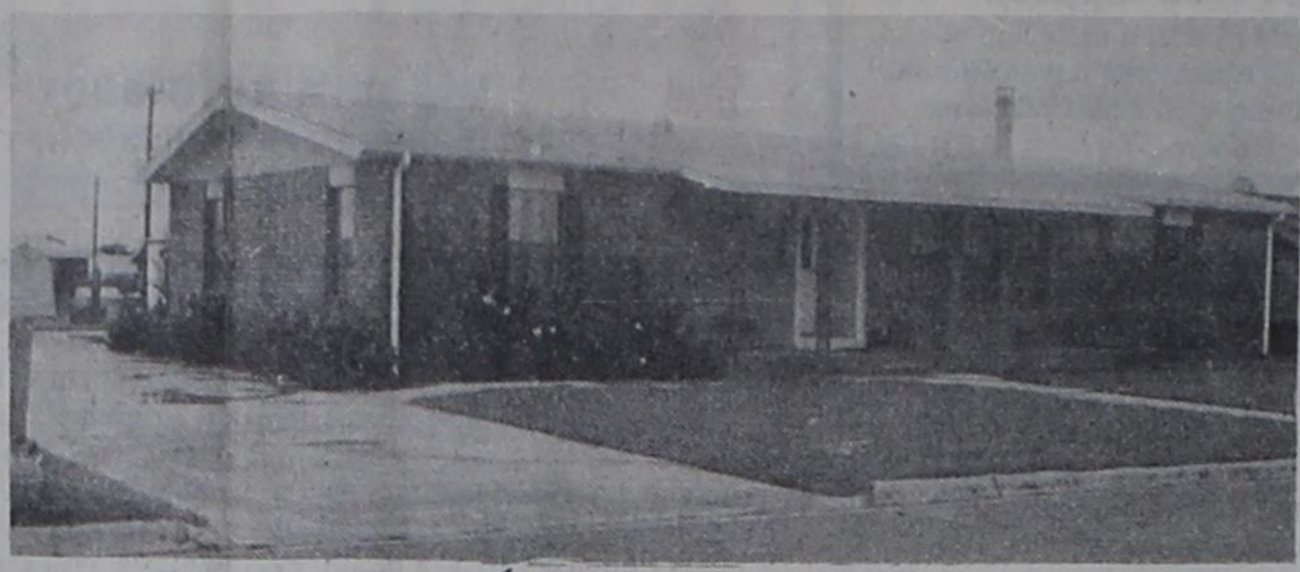

Appraisal Review Board To begin Hearing Appeals on Values

Taxpayers in the Wheeler County Appraisal District will have an opportunity to protest values proposed for their property for local taxes. Protest hearings by the appraisal review board (ARB) begin on June 20, 1985.

When the ARB concludes its hearings and approves a final roll of Mineral & Industrial property appraisals, local governments will levy their taxes against values from that roll.

Marilyn Copeland, R. P. A., chief appraiser for the District, said that a taxpayer who wants to lodge a protest of a proposed value must file a written "notice of protest" with the ARB.

According to Copeland, the ARB is a group of appraisal district residents appointed by the district's directors to see that property values are equal and uniform.

Property owners need appear before only the one review panel, the chief appraiser noted, instead of one for each taxing unit. "They may protest any of the following specific actions of the appraisal office, any time before the ARB approves the Mineral and Industrial appraisal records," she said.

The protest areas are:
*unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property in comparison to the weighted average level of appraisals of other property in the district;
*inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;
*identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located; and
*determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property.

The taxpayer may also protest any other action of the appraisal office that applies to him and adversely affects him on Mineral & Industrial assessments, however, Copeland said that the ARB HAS NO AUTHORITY OVER TAX RATES OR TAXING UNIT SPENDING AND WILL NOT HEAR ANY PROTEST OF THOSE MATTERS.

Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the appraisal office. "But a letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable as a notice," the chief appraiser said, "as long as it identifies the property owner and the property which is the subject of the protest and indicates dissatisfaction with some determination of the appraisal office on Mineral & Industrial property."

The ARB will schedule a hearing after the property owner files the protest notice and will inform him of the time, date and place.

The taxpayer is then entitled to appear in person to offer evidence or argument, but he may also offer the evidence or argument by affidavit without appearing personally.

After the ARB makes its decision on the protest, both the property owner and the chief appraiser will be notified of the result by certified mail.

Copeland said that protest hearings will be held for one day, and the ARB expects to be able to approve the Mineral & Industrial appraisal records on June 20, 1985. This will be a split ARB with Minerals & Industrial on June 20, 1985 and local Real Estate, Business Personal, Vehicle and etc. will be scheduled at a later date and publicized in this paper.

A pamphlet issued by the State Property Tax Board in Austin and available from the appraisal office explains how to prepare and present an appeal.  "The next step was obtaining a Certificate of Need, first from the Panhandle Health Facilities Planning Commission and then from the Texas State Department of Public Health. To assist in this complicated procedure, the Board of Directors retained the services of a law firm in Austin.

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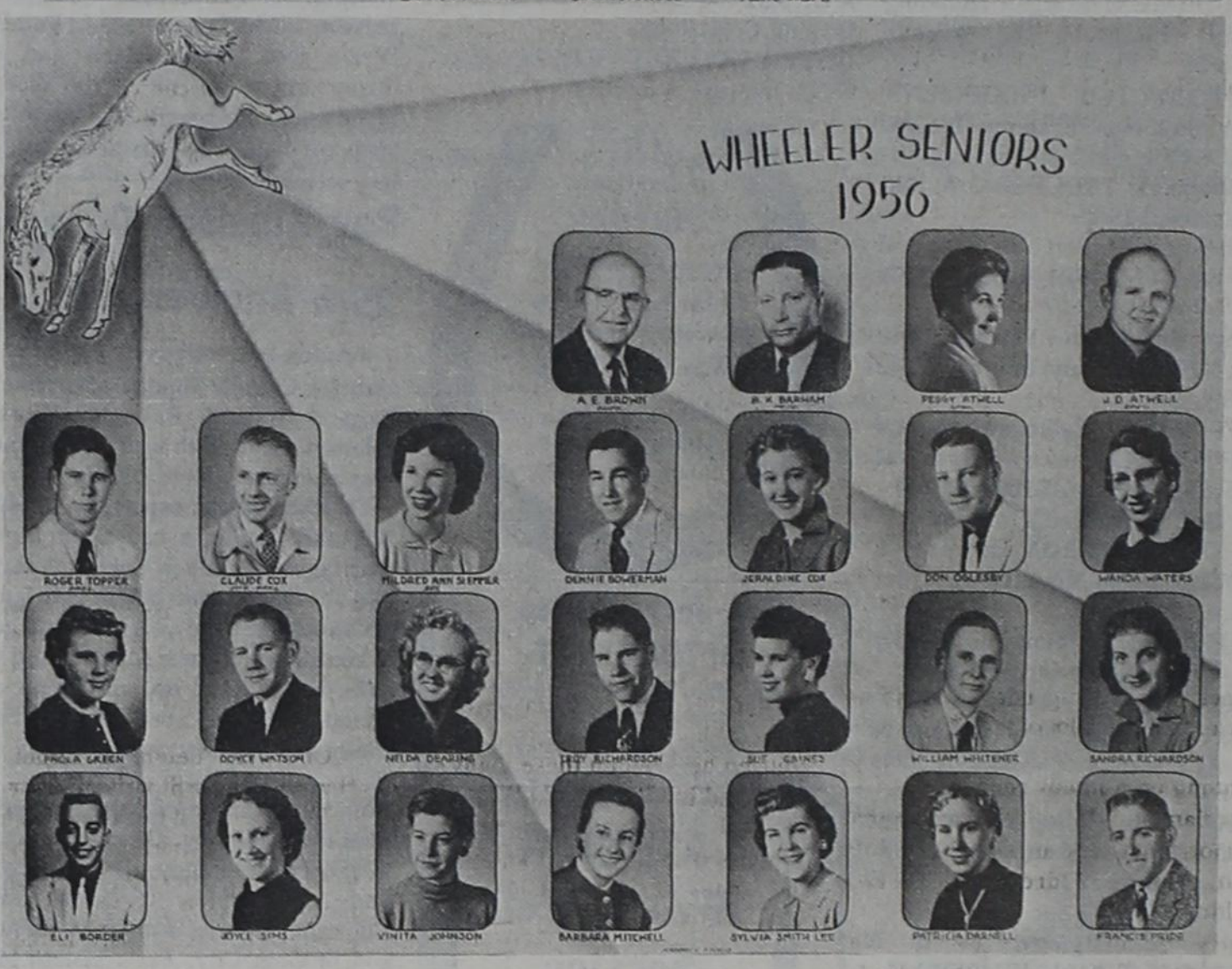
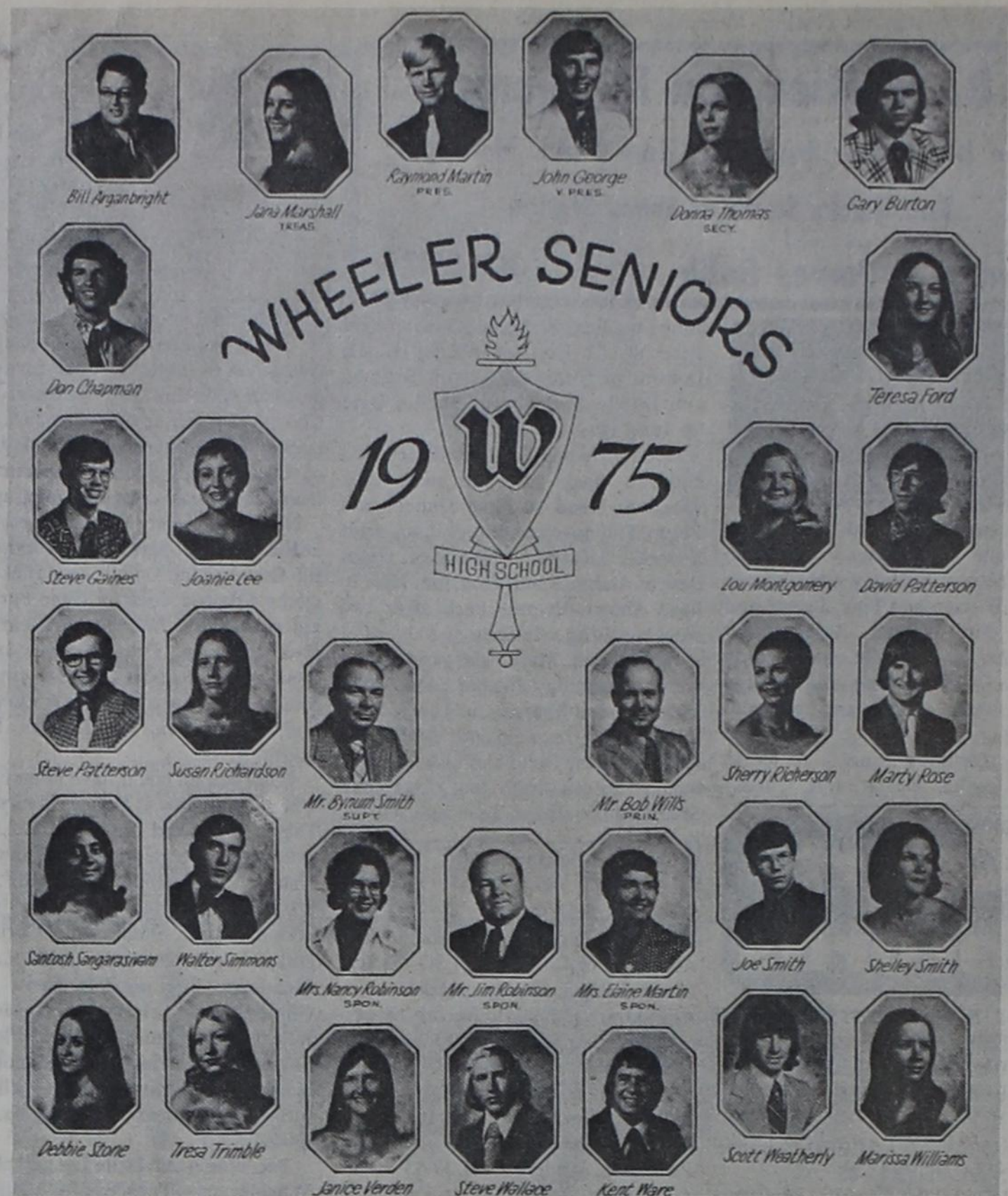

WHEAT PRODUCED IN ALL TEXAS COUNTIES

The assessment up to five mills (1/2¢) per bushel was self imposed by producers of wheat in a 34 county area in a legally advertised and conducted referendum May 11, 1971. Producers of wheat in the remaining 220 counties in Texas, in a similar legally advertised and conducted referendum April 22, 1985, approved the same self-assessment, making the Texas Wheat Producers Board a state-wide authority.

TEXAS WHEAT PRODUCERS BOARD

Assessments of five mills (1/2¢) per bushel have been made on all wheat produced in Texas. Collections are to be made by the "first handler" whether sold, placed in private or government storage, warehouse receipt issued, cleaned for seed, processed or shipped. There are no exemptions from this assessment on the part of producers or for making collection on the part of firms handling wheat whether elevators, gins, pick-up points, shippers, seed companies, mills, feeding facilities, or ASCS offices, etc. Failure to make collection or pay the assessment is a misdemeanor subject to penalty of the law.

TEXAS COMMODITY REFERENDUM LAW, Agricultural Research and promotion. Commodity Producer Board. General Policy provisions.

It is in the interest of the public welfare of the State of Texas that the producers of any agricultural commodity be permitted and encouraged to develop, carry out, and participate in programs of research, disease and insect control, predator control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of the agricultural commodity. The purpose of this chapter is to authorize and prescribe the necessary procedures by which the producers of an agricultural commodity grown in this state may finance those programs. The programs may be devised to alleviate any circumstance or condition that serves to impede the production, marketing, or use of any agricultural commodity. In this instance, wheat.

REFUND. While there is no exemption from paying the 1/2¢ assessment, the law provides that any producer who has paid such assessment may, if he desires to do so, obtain a refund of the amount paid, if application for a refund is made within 60 days after date of payment. Such application shall be in simple letter form, accompanied by proof of payment and filed with the Secretary-Treasurer of the Board. Refund will be made within 30 days after receipt of such request and receipt of such funds from the handlers. The handler has no responsibility or authority to provide any form or other refund assistance to a producer other than proof of payment on his regular settlement sheet of which the producer receives a copy.

THE TEXAS WHEAT PRODUCERS BOARD. The Texas Commodity Referendum Law provides that in an assessment referendum, an election of members to a Producers Board must be held. When certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture, this board has responsibility to formulate and administer programs and to expend and account for funds collected under the program. The Board in its initial meeting authorized the Texas Wheat Producers Association to act as administrator of its programs. Board members elected for 1985-87 are:

The Association maintains membership in the National Association of Wheat Growers for national and international leadership for Texas wheat. These Producer Board collections DO NOT constitute membership in the Association, which operates on voluntary private producer memberships.

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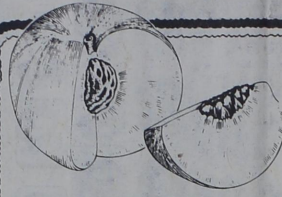
