This project is one of several efforts to raise money for the celebration and lots of volunteer help will be needed for the operation of the "Jackpot Bingo" in addition to lots of people playing.

Voters Told Wild Hog Ordinance Has To Come From The State

Wheeler County commissioners met in regular session on Monday, July 26, 2004, in the Courthouse Annex at 410 S. Main Street in Wheeler.

Nine items were on the agenda. The time hourly payroll time sheets were approved for payment.

The court voted to pay the bills as presented. Items number 3 and 9 had to do with the budget. A budget workshop was held after attention was given the other items on the agenda.

The courthouse restoration was again on the agenda. The court was not happy with the door hardware used on the outside doors at the courthouse; hardware matching the original was requested. The court requested a sample of the proposed floor covering be put on the kitchen area of the extension office in the basement for approval or disapproval by the commissioners. The court was not happy with a sample used in a storage area of the courthouse at

an earlier date.

The Burn Ban was reinstated, beginning Thursday, July 29, 2004, for a three month period.

Permission was given Bravo Natural Resources, Inc., to lay a pipeline across County Roads 22 and E. The commissioners will look into charging an application fee when a request is made for a county road crossing; this will be placed on the agenda for the August 9 meeting.

Bob Covington served as a spokesman for a group from Precinct 4, seeking ordinance to control the wild hog problem in the area. This problem is shared by the entire county and those adjoining Wheeler county.

The group had met with the commissioners on July 12. They were told at that time the commissioners and county attorney would look into the county adopting an ordinance to help with the wild hog problem. The commissioner's court can only enforce laws and ordinances written by the state and cannot write enforceable ordinances.

State officials, including Warren Chissim, have been contacted and informed of the need for legislation for the control of wild hogs in the county and panhandle. The commissioners were requested to draw up and pass a resolution requesting action by the state legislature. Contact will be made with surrounding counties and request them to pass similar resolutions. A joint effort can then be made for legislation for the control of the importation and transportation of wild hogs for hunting.

Those in attendance were informed of a state law making it illegal to transport wild hogs without papers from a veterinarian, unless they are being taken to a slaughterhouse. Violators can be fined \$200 per animal.

Volunteer firemen Kenneth James Daughtry, Duane Lane and Robert Ford, representing Kelton, Allison and Wheeler Fire Departments met with the commissioners requesting more money to be budgeted for the county fire departments. The county presently budgets \$60,000, set in '84. The actual money spent was \$78,000 in '02-03 and \$84,000 in '98-'99.

It was suggested the firemen consider organizing a Fire Protection District encompassing Wheeler County. This would enable them to become a taxing entity with a budget for the amount necessary for fire protection for the county. If such a district were formed, the \$60,000 set aside by the county could be dropped from

ORDER PROHIBITING OUTDOOR BURNING

On this 26th day of July, 2004, the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas met in Regular Session, and found that circumstances present in all the unincorporated area of Wheeler County, Texas, create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning, therefore,

The Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, by this Order, hereby prohibits outdoor burning in all of the unincorporated area in Wheeler County, Texas. This burn ban takes effect **JULY 29, 2004** and will terminate **OCTOBER 29, 2004**, Ninety (90) days from that date.

A person who violates this prohibition will be charged with a Class C misdemeanor pursuant to Section 240.906 of the Texas Local Government Code.

Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

COUNTY WIDE BURN BAN WITH SPECIFIC RESTRICTIONS

The Wheeler County Commissioners Court adopted a County Wide Burn Ban **EFFECTIVE JULY 29, 2004, THROUGH OCTOBER 29, 2004**. Specific restrictions will apply. Those producers wishing to burn crop residue on land designated for Ag use will have to follow

the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission guidelines as set out below AND contact the local Sheriff's Office or Police Department BEFORE ANY burning may be done.

GUIDELINES:
1. Burning shall be commenced and conducted only when wind direction and other meteorological conditions are such that smoke and other pollutants will not cause adverse effects to any public road, landing strip, navigable water, or off-site structure containing sensitive receptor(s).

2. If at any time the burning causes or may tend to cause smoke to blow onto or across a road or highway, it is the responsibility of the person initiating the burn to post flag-persons on affected roads.

a. The initiation of burning shall commence no earlier than one hour after sunrise. Burning shall be completed on the same day not later than one hour before sunset, and shall be attended by a responsible party at all times during the active burn phase when the fire is progressing. In cases where residual fire and/or smoldering objects continue to emit smoke after this time, such areas shall be extinguished if the smoke from these areas has the potential to create a nuisance or traffic hazard conditions. In no case shall the extent of the burn area be allowed to increase after this time.

b. Burning shall not be commenced when surface wind speed be less than six miles per hour (mph) (five knots) or greater than 23 mph (20 knots during the burn period).

c. Burning shall not be conducted during periods of actual or predicted persistent low level atmospheric temperature inversions.

11.221 RESPONSIBILITY FOR CONSEQUENCES OF OUTDOOR BURNING.

THE AUTHORITY TO CONDUCT OUTDOOR BURNING UNDER THIS REGULATION DOES NOT EXEMPT OR EXCUSE ANY PERSON RESPONSIBLE FROM THE CONSEQUENCES, DAMAGES, OR INJURIES RESULTING FROM THE BURNING AND DOES NOT EXEMPT OR EXCUSE ANYONE FROM COMPLYING WITH ALL OTHER APPLICABLE LAWS OR ORDINANCES, REGULATIONS, AND ORDERS OR GOVERNMENTAL ENTITIES HAVING JURISDICTION, EVEN THOUGH THE BURNING IS OTHERWISE CONDUCTED IN COMPLIANCE WITH THIS REGULATION.
