### To Order Trees

Now is the time to order your trees for the upcoming 1986 transplanting season. The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District, in cooperation with all Wheeler County FFA Chapters, is again offering a complete line of trees. Pecan trees are again being offered at the bargain price of \$11.00 per tree. These trees are bare rooted and will be approximately four feet tall after being pruned. As in the past, these are excellent trees. In addition to CHEYENNE, WICHITA and SHOSHONI are available this season. There is no minimum order on pecans. Evergreen trees available for windbreak use are AUSTRIAN PINE, PONDEROSA PINE, SCOTCH PINE and EASTERN RED CEDAR. These trees are container grown by the Texas Forest Service and are 12-15 inches tall. The price is \$50.00 for 30 trees with 30 being the minimum order. Deciduous trees available this year are Desert Willow, Russian Olive and Pecans (these pecans are not to be confused with those above as they probably will produce nuts, but the size or quality is unpredictable and they are useful only for shade or wildlife plantings). The price of these trees is \$0.50 per tree with 50 being the minimum order.

Please hurry with your order as several species of trees have already sold out. See any WHEELER COUNTY FFA MEMBER to place your order. Trees will be delivered the second week of March. Payment is required when orders are placed.

**Looking Back**

In 1936, "The Wheeler Times" was in its third year of publication. Wheeler has had publications from as early as 1905, but the "Times" was established in 1934 and has been in continuous publication since. In checking the old files, we find these items of interest.  
 An article headed "Show and Rain Come to County" in the January 2, 1936 edition of the "Times" was sub-headed "First Appreciable Snowfall Seen Here in Two Years Brings Welcome Moisture". The article reads: "Wheeler and Wheeler County received Saturday its first snow of any consequence in two years or more. Succeeding a night of misty, threatening weather, snow began falling Saturday forenoon and continued most of the day. Approximately four inches was recorded.  
 "The snow came quietly, without wind to drift or blow it off the fields. This it yielded the maximum benefit from a moisture standpoint, with an even distribution on fields and pastures where it would do the most good. Sunday's fair and mild weather melted much of the snow before nightfall.  
 "Tuesday and Wednesday brought more moisture as misty, showery conditions prevailed.  
 "Because of the unusually dry weather of the past few years all over

the Panhandle, every particle of rain and snow is especially welcomed by agricultural interests. Storage of sub-soil moisture during the winter season is highly essential to successful crop production in this and surrounding counties.  
 "Today, Thursday, has brought sunny weather with mild temperature."

Each garment entered in the show must be made of a minimum blend of 50% cotton or 50% wool and/or mohair. Contestants must be 18 years or older, and actively involved in farming, ranching or agri-business; or be a member (or member's spouse) of an agriculture-related organization such as Extension Homemakers Clubs, Young Homemakers, Young Farmers, 4-H Leader Association, producer associations or auxiliaries and tractor puller's clubs.

The purpose of this supplement is to teach you how to protect yourself

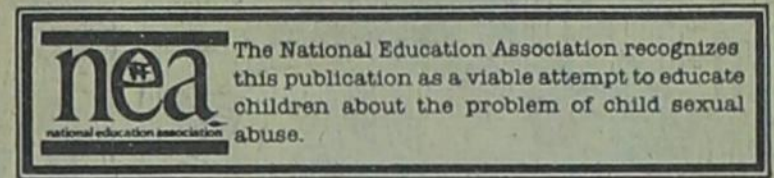

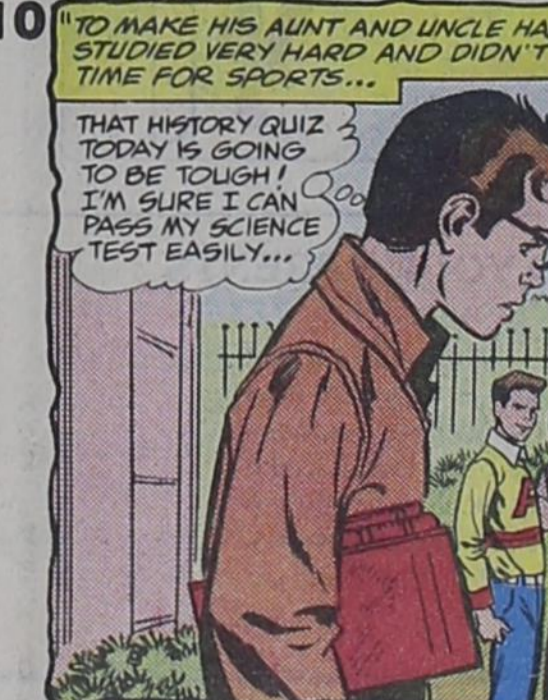

**HOW TO REPORT CHILD ABUSE**

The Texas Department of Human Services is mandated by State law to receive and investigate all reports of suspected child abuse and neglect. Any person having cause to believe that a child's physical or mental health or welfare has been or may be adversely affected by abuse or neglect is required by State law to make a report to the Texas Department of Human Services or any local/state law enforcement agency. Reports can be made to the Department of Human Services twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week by calling this toll free number: 1-800-252-5400.

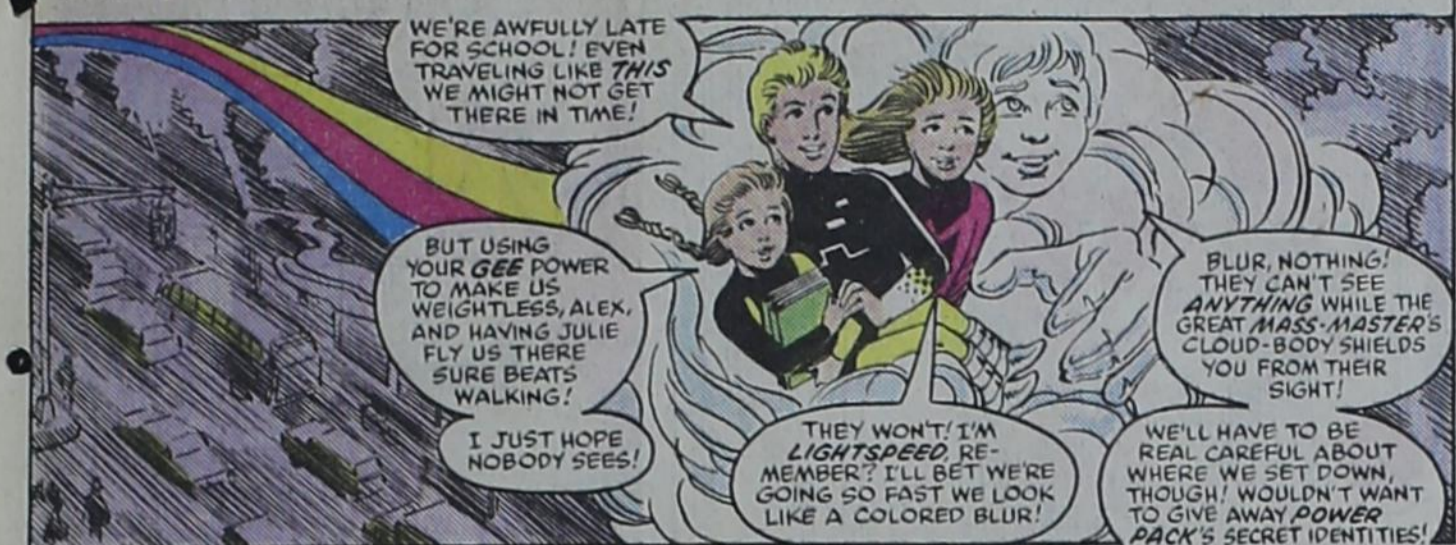

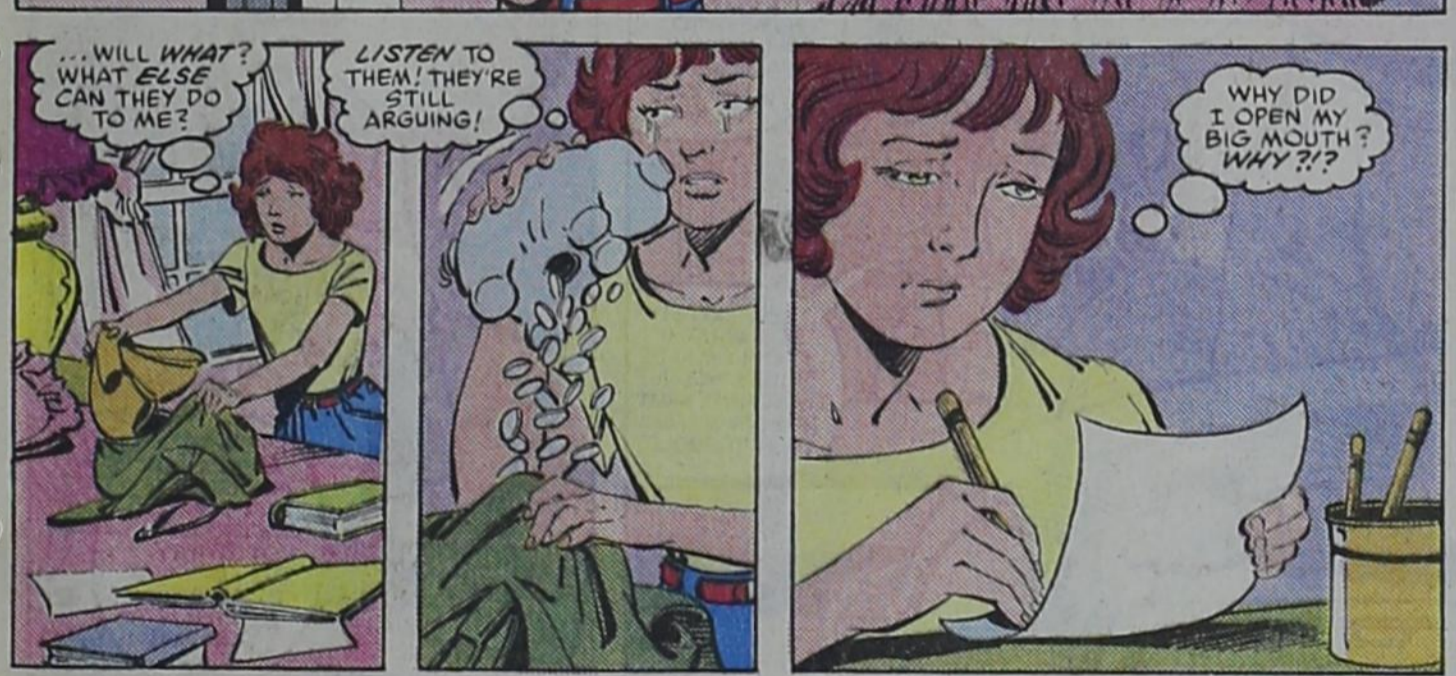

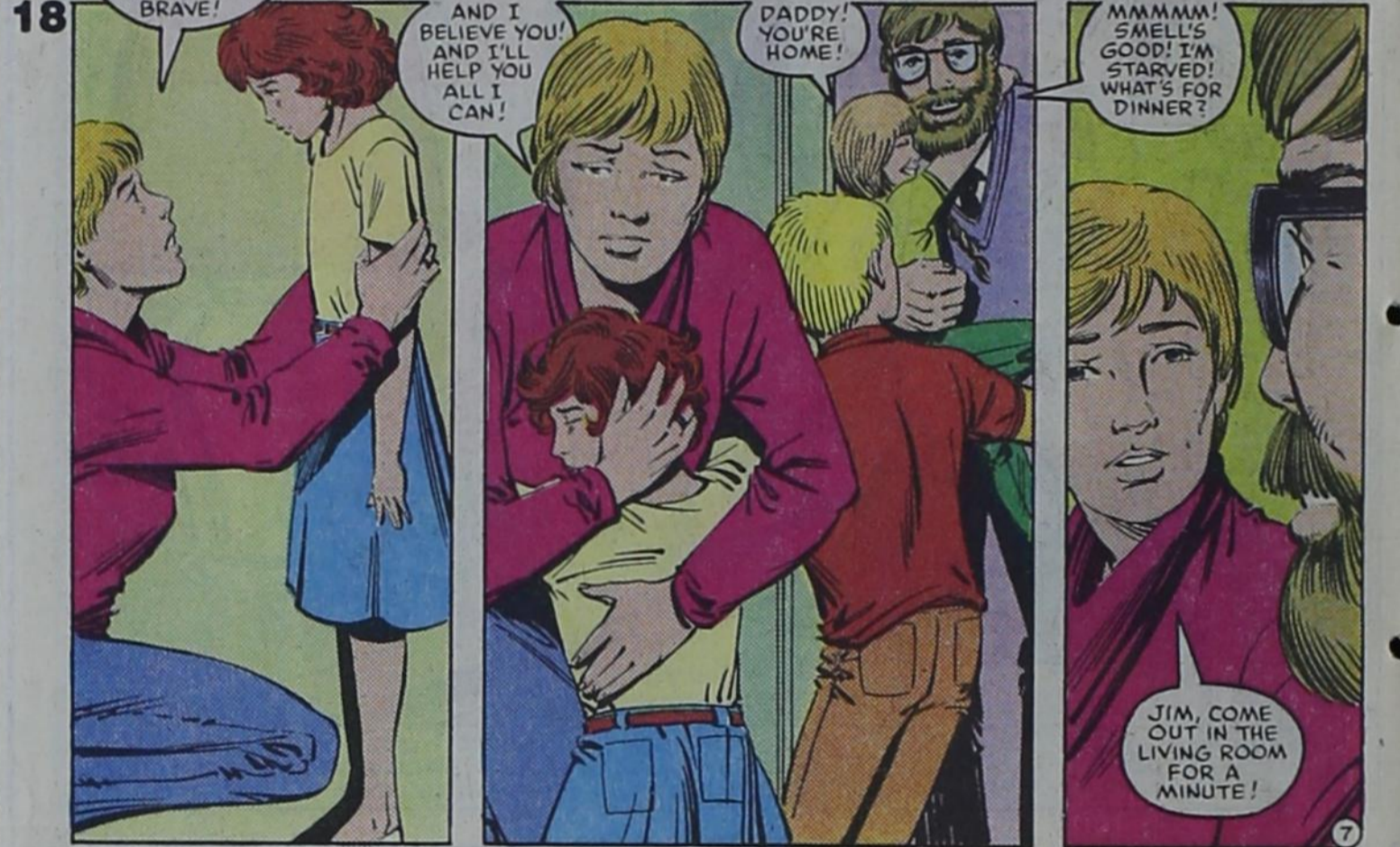

**EPILOGUE**

You may be wondering how these stories end, especially if something like this is happening to you. Well, for each family the ending is different, but it is always important to ask for help. Tony's parents spoke to the baby-sitter's parents, and, with help from the authorities, the baby-sitter got help from someone who works with kids. She no longer bothers other children.

The Power Pack kids' parents know that adults who abuse children should be reported to the agency in that city that handles cases of sexual abuse. And that's what happened in Jane's situation. After a quiet investigation, Jane's father agreed to live with his brother for a while and to go to a place for treatment. Jane and her mother are seeing a family counselor. It isn't going to be easy for the three of them, but they are talking and starting to solve their problems.
