Rep. J.W. "Buck" Buchanan Announces His Candidacy

AREA FARMERS'

Old Concern For Water To Get An Update

Texans' concern for an adequate, safe water supply, shown in overwhelming voter approval this Fall of two constitutional amendments addressing the matter, is nothing new to Wheeler County agricultural producers and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, notes County Extension Agent, Joe Don King.

Demonstrations of good irrigation practices go back many years, and for almost two decades have been a major program in Extension educational efforts, the agent said. These have included cultural practices, well and pump equipment testing, and new irrigation equipment designed to improve efficiency and effectiveness, he said.

Results of such demonstrations and the least scientific and technical findings in the field have been featured annually for many years in the High Plains Irrigation Conference conducted by Extension.

This year's conference will be held January 9, at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West, Amarillo. It will begin at 8:30 a.m.

The conference will provide an update on field tests that help producers (Paul Gross, District Extension Director, Amarillo); benefits from high engine efficiency (Don Hardy, Hardy Race Cars, Floydada); chemigation (Walter Hughes, Tide Products, Friona); and soil moisture sensors (Leon New, Extension Agricultural Engineer and Irrigation Specialist, Amarillo).

A popular feature of the conference is a panel of growers. Participants this year will be Wes Spurlock of Stratford, Lyndon Wagner of Bushland, Dale Coleman of Dumas, and Harold Grall of Dumas.

The conference also will feature exhibits of chemigation injection equipment, surge irrigation valves, low energy precision application (LEPA) irrigation components, drip irrigation equipment, and soil moisture sensing equipment.

Additional information and programs are available at the Wheeler office in Wheeler.

The conference is sponsored each year by the Extension Service, an arm of the Texas A&M University System. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, handicap, religion, or national origin.

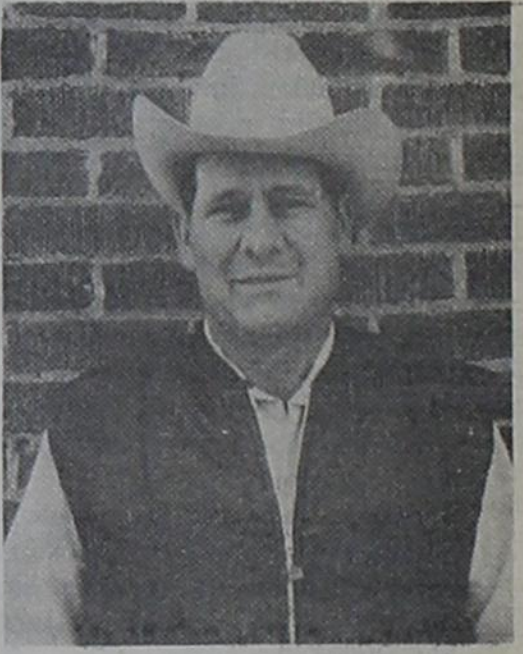



Wind Erosion

November through April are the windiest months for the western half of Texas. There is very little vegetation produced during these months. These two factors interact together to cause severe wind erosion.

Soil types have an effect on erosion caused by wind. A loamy soil has smaller particles than a sandy soil. Smaller particles adhere or cling together better, and as a result, loamy soils are less subject to wind erosion. Soils in Wheeler County are relatively sandy and are easily eroded if not properly managed.

Wind erosion affects agricultural production in several different ways:

1. Most Topsoil is blown away and the less fertile soil remains.
2. Wind blown soil particles act as a knife and "cut down" newly emerging grass or small grain seedlings.
3. Grass stands can be completely destroyed either by soil being removed or the grass being buried.
4. Fences and roads can become covered with sand and require rebuilding or extra maintenance.

Production is lost as a result of wind erosion. Loss of production means less revenue. With low livestock and crop prices, preventing wind erosion is essential. Proper grazing of rangeland and pastureland stabilizes the soil. Leaving residues on cropland will diminish the winds that reach the soil surface and as a result will reduce soil erosion.

Not all soil erosion can be prevented, but most erosion can be prevented. It is easier to prevent soil erosion than to stop it after it becomes a problem. For assistance in controlling erosion, contact your local Soil Conservation Service.

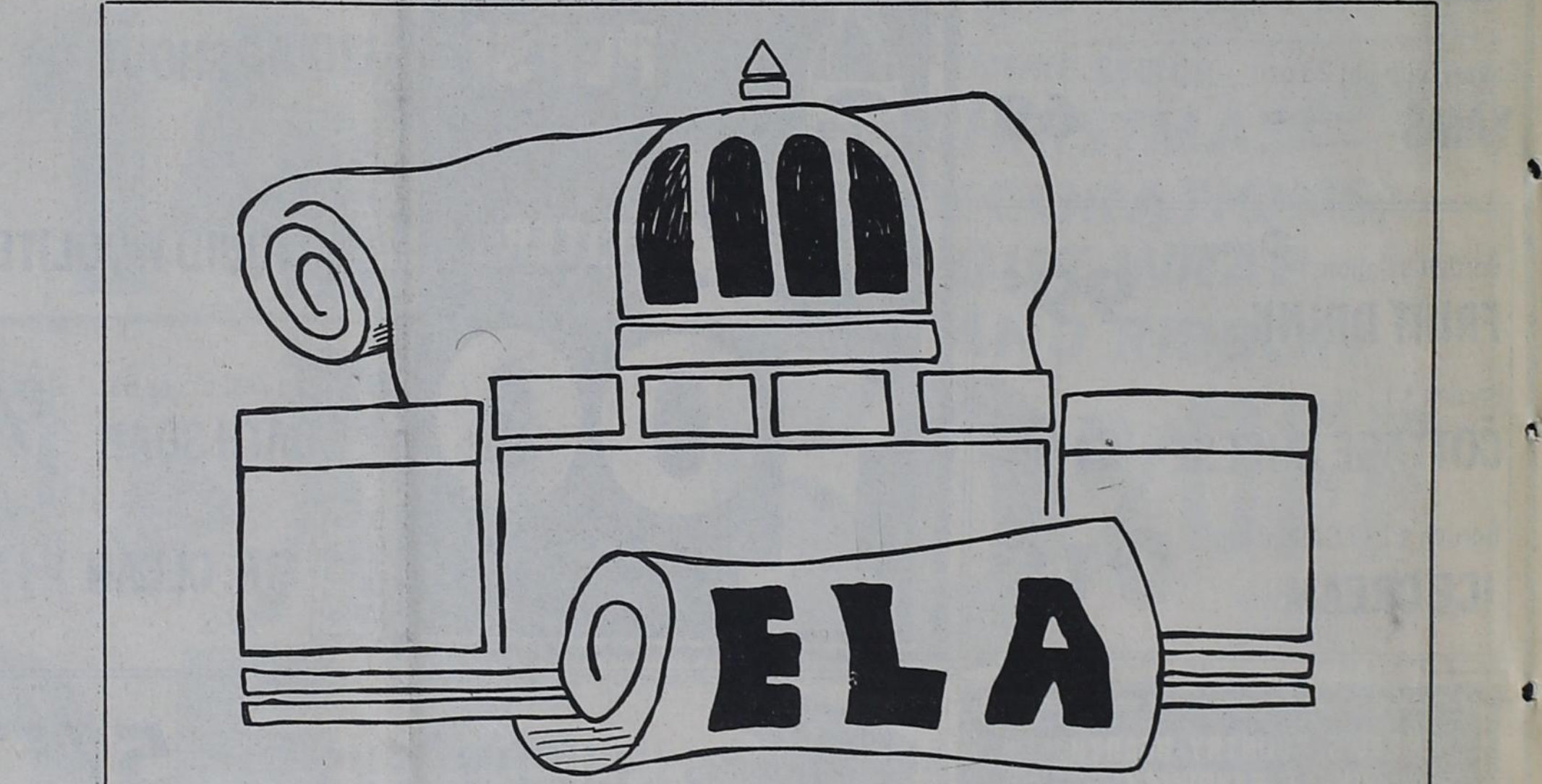

Language amendment suggested

DEAR EDITOR:
The list of proposed constitutional amendments in the Dec. 15 News-Globe is what we citizens have been demanding of our congressmen and president for many years. Unfortunately such leadership has neither the mentality nor backbone to move off dead center.
May I add another proposed amendment?
No language other than English should be recognized as the official language of the United States. English is the common language in which we discuss our common affairs. But today, the position of English as our common tongue is eroding rapidly. Immigrants are rejecting our time-honored custom of assimilating in favor of maintaining their own separate language and culture.

And our federal government is encouraging this trend by providing bilingual education in public schools and bilingual social service, including funding for a national Hispanic university and other services that discourage the learning of English. Proficiency in English is an absolute prerequisite to economic advancement.
Two versions of the English Language Amendment have been introduced in the 99th Congress: Senate Joint Res. 20 and House Joint Res. 96 read respectively:
Sec. 1. The English language shall be the official language of the United States.
Sec. 2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.
And,
Sec. 1. The English language shall be the official language of the United States.

Sec. 2. Neither the United States nor any state shall require by law, ordinance, regulation, order, decree program, or policy, the use in the United States of any language other than English.
Sec. 3. This article shall not prohibit any law, ordinance, regulation, order, decree, program, or policy, requiring educational restriction in a language other than English for the purpose of making students who use a language other than English proficient in English.
Sec. 4. The Congress and the states may enforce this article by appropriate legislation.
Encourage your congressman to co-sponsor and support this legislation.
