INEZ WEEMS MONTGOMERY

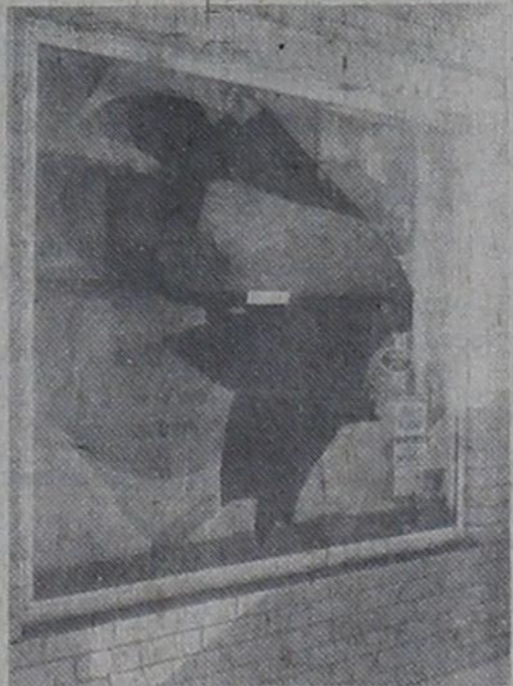
Mr. Wilson discussed finances for the upcoming school year with the Board.

PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS

HELP YOU PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS AS A TAXPAYER
 A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1986. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.
 You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.
 The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.
 You may want to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer:
 • You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. Even if your bill goes to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or else paying extra charges for late payments.
 • You can put your own opinion of your property's value on record. If the appraisal district then places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
 • By filing a special type of rendition called a report of decreased value, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1985. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1986 value to your property.
 File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available at this office.
 The new deadline for 1986 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.
 For more information, get a free copy of the pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, at your appraisal district office or from the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

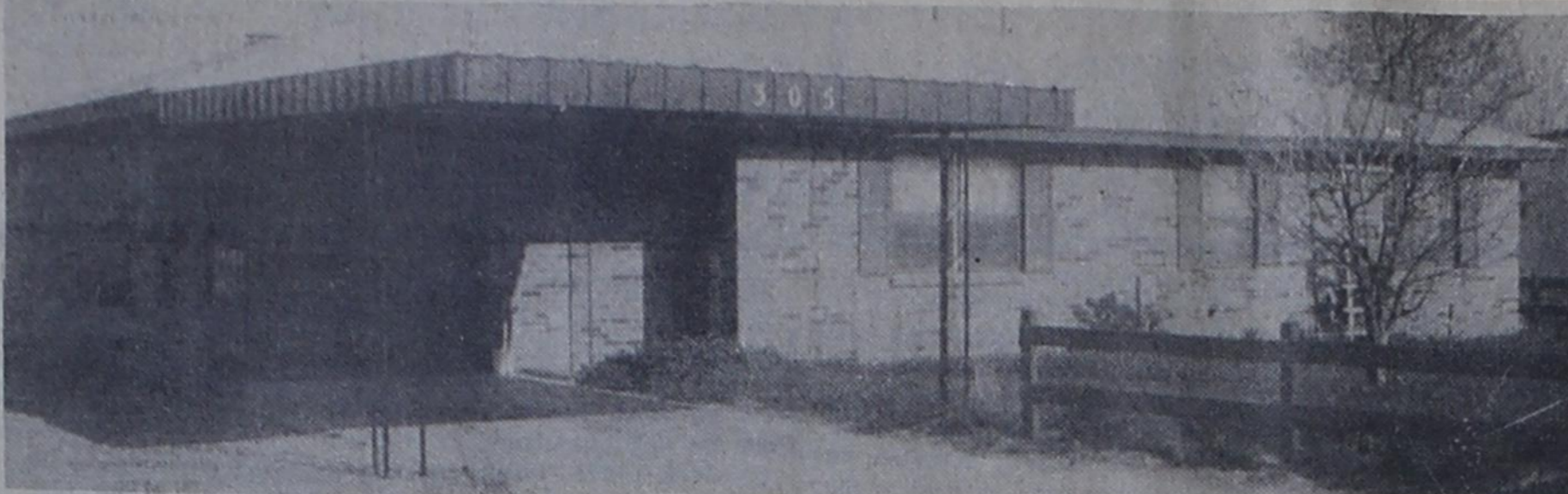

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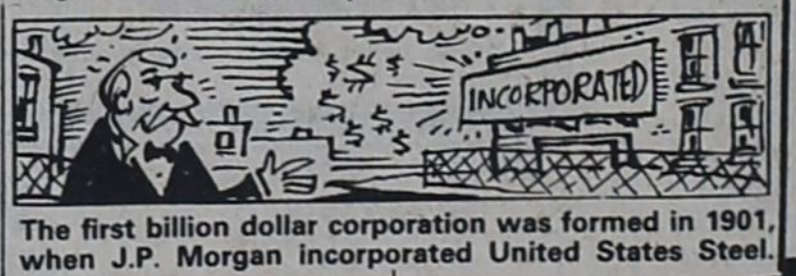

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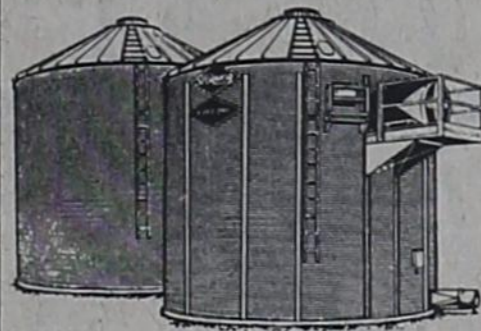

Dear Editor:

We're in grave danger of losing our private non-state funded schools and our home schooling within our state. This can be credited to Commissioner of Education W.N. Kirby, and his proposed ammendment to the compulsory attendance law.

The law now states that the only requirement of private schools is that it include in its course a study of good citizenship. This is how it has been since 1923. Our state truancy laws were meant to be inflicted upon those enrolled in private or home education. This is proven in our Texas Education Code, as it states that our State Board of Education (SBOE) is set up to "exercise general control of the system of PUBLIC education at the state level" (TEC 11.02), and that "this code shall apply to all educational institutions SUPPORTED EITHER WHOLLY OR IN PART BY STATE TAX FUNDS" (TEC 1.04.a). This allows no doubt to the jurisdiction of our SBOE and Commissioner of Education. It does not, and should not govern non-state funded schooling. There are those who would wish to regulate all schools in such a manner as to label students truant if not receiving an education parallel to public schools, despite the evaluation score of the rapid growing private scho., sector.

Mr. Editor, try to picture this: General Motors believes it to be in the best interest of the public to place functioning guidelines over Ford Motor Company, defining its times of production, employee qualifications, materials to be used, etc. If Ford should fail to meet their criteria, they are said to not be an automobile manufacturer. It matters not that Ford's products speak for themselves. It's not hard to see that General Motors would be self-serving, rather than truly protecting the needs of others. This is what is happening in Austin. Private education is our only barrier to a total monopoly of public education.

This issue requires our urgent and immediate response to our State School Board Members, Comm. Kirby, and legislators.

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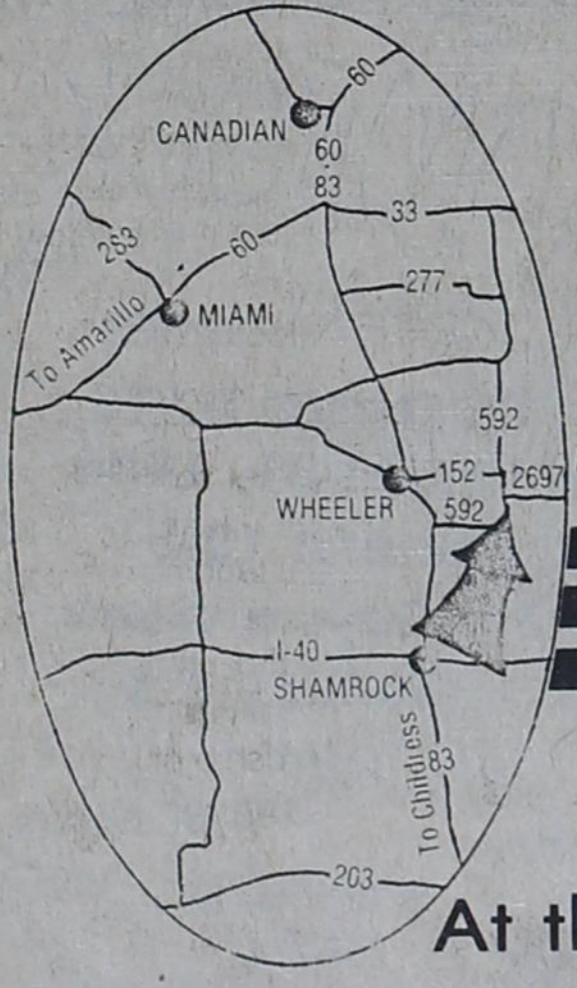

STRESS-EFFECTIVE FAMILIES DEVELOP MONEY MANAGEMENT SKILLS

LINES FROM LINDA

Polls show that most families, regardless of income, worry to some extent about finances. But healthy families seem to be able to deal with it better, mostly because they have some money management skills.

In her book "Stress and the Healthy Family," researcher Delores Curran says that her studies of stress-effective families shows they use four common money management techniques.

First, they learn to control money stresses together. In two-paycheck families they may pay different bills out of each check, and in other families there may be separate accounts for household expenses and discretionary money. But in general, money is not considered to belong to one partner or the other, but is theirs as a family.

Second these families budget, although how tightly they budget varies widely. The families tend to plan for fixed monthly costs like a home, car and medical and insurance payments and then divide the rest into savings, food, clothing, recreation and miscellaneous.

Setting aside some savings for emergencies is an especially important feature of the budget, because it means that the family doesn't fall apart when something out of the ordinary happens.

Curran also found that when money gets tight, healthy families tend to scale down more effectively than others. They do this by revising their expectations. So, for example, the family that has taken an expensive vacation each summer may settle for a nearby weekend camping trip when finances are reduced.

Other families who refuse to lower their expectations often depend more on credit which can add to their financial stress in the long run.

Fourth, stress-effective families develop methods for making major purchases without the need for painful arguments. Couples tend to respect each other's daily decisions on spending unless there's an unusual reason such as high monthly bills or loss of a job.

But for major purchases, such as a new car, furniture or trips, these couples share their own feelings, fears, and attitudes and take into consideration the different attitudes of their partner. This makes it possible for them to strike a compromise.

The skills of sharing, budgeting, revising expectations, and compromising may not seem like much, but evidently they add up to a family that can handle finances without it becoming a major problem in their lives.

Sodbuster Law Takes Effect

The sodbuster and swampbuster provisions of the 1985 farm bill went into effect on December 23, 1985, when the President signed the Food Security Act of 1985.

"That date is very significant for any producer who plows out highly erodible land or drains wetlands after the law was signed," said Lavon Williams, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Wheeler. "It could mean the producer would have to forfeit USDA program benefits in 1986 if the land is used to produce a crop in 1986."

"The Department has not had the time to publish and implement rules and regulations since the legislation was signed," Williams continued. "That is why we do not know the specific criteria that will be used to determine which lands will be covered."

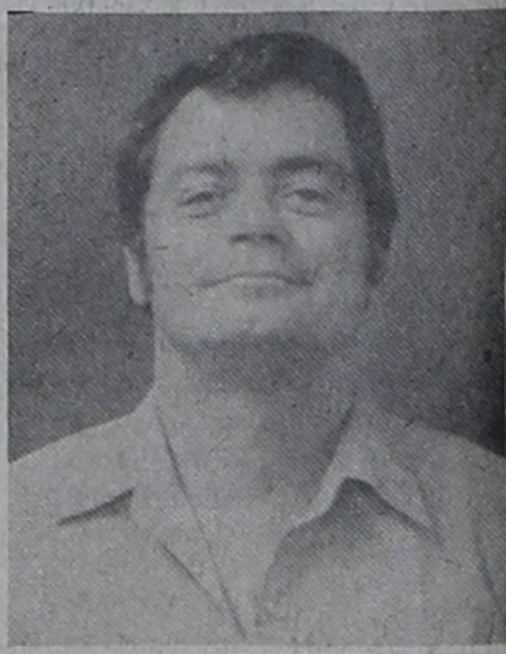

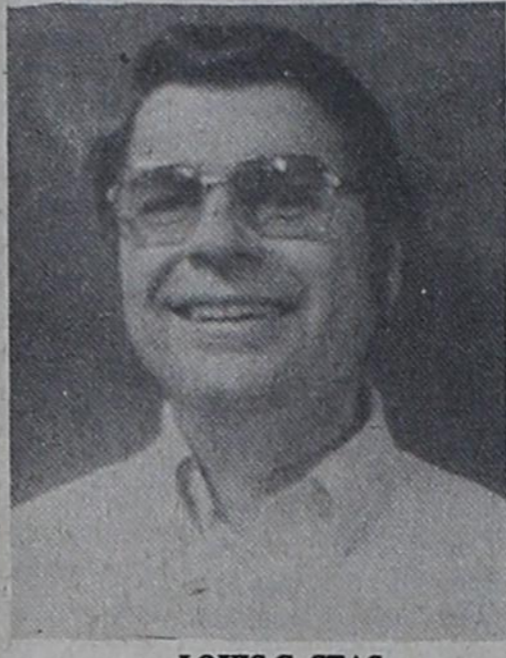

"I would like to continue serving as the Mayor of Wheeler," Stas concluded.



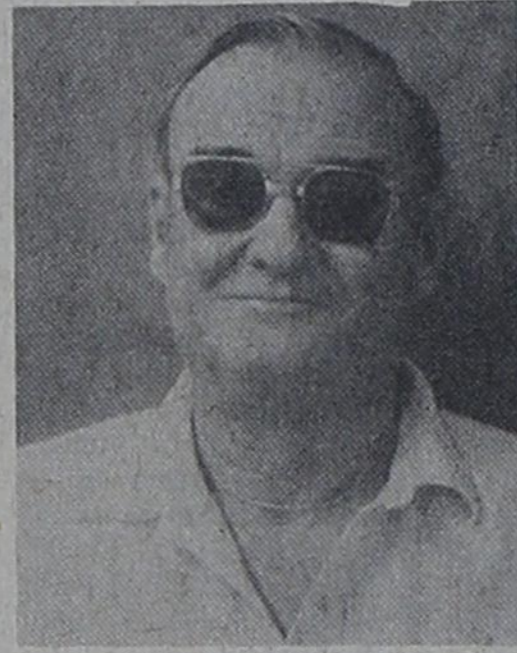

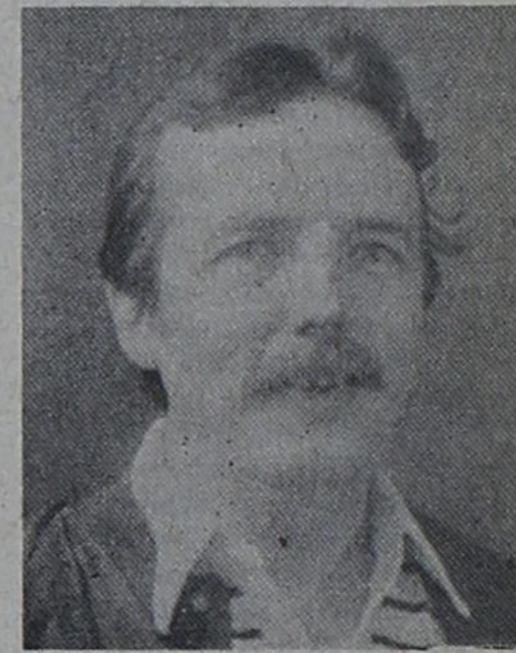

Holy Week Services For Catholics

Holy Week Services, leading up to Easter, for the Catholics of Collingsworth and Wheeler Counties, will be held at St. Patrick's Catholic Church in Shamrock by Fr. Paul Sauerbier, the Pastor of Our Mother of Mercy in Wellington, St. Patrick's in Shamrock and St. Mary's of Wheeler.

The Services for Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday will all be at 8:00 p.m. on March 27, 28, 29. All the Catholics of the two counties are expected to participate in these three days of Holy Week, Called the Tridum, in preparation for their celebration of the Feast of Easter. On Easter Sunday, Fr. Sauerbier will have a Sunrise Mass in Wheeler at 7:30 A.M., a 9:00 Easter Mass in Shamrock, and an 11:00 A.M. Easter Mass in Wellington (after which he says that he'll drop from exhaustion!).

This week is known as Holy Week in the Christian Tradition because Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday focused on the central events so important to every Christian. The Holy Week Services date back to the Beginning of the Church as she painfully remembered the events of these days in the life of their beloved Lord and Savior.

During these days there will be many different symbolic rituals. Rituals are an integral part of every person's life; they may be as mundane as that first cup of coffee in the morning, or the Friday Night Football Game in every town in Texas in the Fall, or the inviolable customs and rituals which go into a wedding. Every Community, especially communities with religious experiences. Some of the rituals will be totally self explanatory during these days, others will be given partial explanation for fuller meaning.

ON HOLY THURSDAY, We will have the celebration of the Lord's Supper within a context similar to the Passover feast which our Lord Himself celebrated in which he said, "Take and Eat, and Take and Drink. This is my Body and This is my Blood." It was also at this Last Supper that He symbolically called His disciples to the Ministry of Service, giving them an example as he washed their feet. Leaders, servant-leaders, of the Catholic Communities of Collingsworth and Wheeler Counties will have their feet washed by the Pastor during the service in response to the Word of God and in imitation of Christ giving us the Call to Serve one another.

The Members of these same communities will be asked to then spend an hour in prayerful watch until 11:00 p.m. in response to Our Lord's request that the Disciples watch one hour with him.

ON GOOD FRIDAY, there will be the Solemn Reading of the Passion and death of Our Lord Jesus Christ, according to the Account of John. This will be done in parts with a narrator doing the major portion, the Pastor taking the part of Christ, and another person doing the parts of the other people involved in the account. The Congregation will be the crowd who followed Jesus on the road to Calvary and cried for his crucifixion. This will be highly symbolic since our Lord continues to be crucified in our brothers and sisters thru out the world and often by well meaning people.

This will be followed by the Veneration of the Cross in which each person in the congregation is invited to come up and kiss the feet of the Crucified Christ on the Cross which is unveiled during the service. Then follows Solemn Prayers for people who continue to suffer thru out the world, for the Leaders of our Country and other nations, for the Jewish people who were very dear to Jesus who shared in their heritage, and got all the people who struggle to be faithful to the Lord today. Then they will share in the Communion of the Lord and ALL WILL DEPART IN SILENCE ON THIS GOOD FRIDAY NIGHT.

ON HOLY SATURDAY, there will be an Easter Vigil in the night, celebrating a Vigil of Watchfulness for the Risen Lord, as we light the new fire and light the three foot high Easter Candle, and spread the light of Christ to every member of the congregation who will be holding a candle in the darkened Church.

The Easter Proclamation will be sung, Announcing the Light of Christ shattering the darkness and leading us to the light which dispels all evil. There will be a recounting of salvation history from Creation, to the passage thru the Red Sea, to the Prophets leading the Chosen People to Christ. After proclaiming the Risen Lord, there will be a Renewal of Baptismal Commitment to entrance into the death and resurrection of the Lord Concluding the Eucharist.

As we gather in prayer during this Sacred Tridum of Holy Week, we, as Catholics, will be praying for all the people of our two counties who continue to give us an example of Christ's Presence in our midst and for who we hope that we can be an inspiration in return, even tho we are small communities.

The headlines for the January 23, 1936, edition of the times read: "Oil Test Well near Wheeler Is Assured"; the subhead continued, "Phillips Petroleum Company Makes Location on Porter Land Short Distance South of City for 6,000-foot Test, Using Standard Rig—Drilling Expected to Start Soon".

"The test, it was learned today, will be 5 1/2 miles south and 1 1/2 miles west of the court house square."

"It will be remembered that The Times reported in its issue of Aug. 1, 1935, a lease deal involving some 1,400 acres of Porter land in that sector."

The Wheeler Market & Grocery offered several specials in their advertisement on January 16, 1936. Four pounds of Tasty Coffee, with milk pail and piepan for 95c.

The Times office was contacted in January of 1936 to print telephone directories for Briscoe and Allison.

The January 23, 1936 edition carried a story on the "Cash Awards and Ribbons" to be awarded in connection with the First Annual Wheeler Exhibit. Premiums to be awarded were: Grand Champion Calf, \$20.00; Reserve Champion, \$15.00; SENIOR CALF (Over 900 lbs.) First, \$9.00; Second, \$7.00; Third, \$5.00; Prizes for the JUNIOR CALF (Under 900 lbs.) were the same.

The show was scheduled for February 8 with Cicero Smith Yard as the location for the show.

The Commissioners Court decided "Against Straight Salary Method of Payment for County Officers". The state passes a law which abolished the "fee system" for the paying of county officials in counties with populations over 20,000; smaller counties had the option to decide which system they preferred. The article did not explain the "fee system".

A classified ad in the January 30, 1936, edition of the "Times" offered a 1932 Chevrolet coupe, good condition for sale or trade. The owner would

consider cattle or work team.

In the same issue if the "Times" the Rawleigh company needed men to cover the 800 family route in north Hemphill County. "Reliable hustler should start earning \$25 weekly and increase rapidly."

"Good Progress Seen In Preparations for Wheeler's Test Well" is the headline in the February 6, 1936, issue. "Crew Starts Building Rig Today on Porter No. 1 Oil Test Just South of town. A crew of 20 men were employed on the lease in various capacities. The location was 5 1/2 miles south of Wheeler, known as the No. 1 Porter."

The Feb. 6, 1936, issue of "The Corral" has the words of a New football Song composed by Robert Mayne. The words of the song were as follows:

Come on, you Mustangs,
Plow through that line.
Rock 'em and reel 'em,
You're going to shine.
And for our colors,
Black and gold,
We'll fight like knights of old.
Fight! Fight! Fight!
Drive for that touchdown
With all your might;
We'll sing a song of victory tonight.
In books of fame
We'll write your name,
Mustangs of Wheeler High.
Fight! Fight!

The song was first sung at the football pep squad banquet, the last Thursday in January.

"Meek Goes to Canyon for Second Semester" was the headline in "The Mobeetie Outlook"—Feb. 13, 1936, issue. The article reads, "The high school students and teachers are happy to know that J. P. Meek who has been taking a post-graduate course has gone to W.T.S.T.C., Canyon, for the second semester."

"Meek graduated with the class of 1934-35. He was football captain of the Hornet football team 1st year, and this community hopes that he will reach his goal by making the college football team next year."

"We hope that J. P. makes a success of his college career and that he is happy in his new environment."

The voter 1936 registration was estimated to be an increase of 400 over the 1933 figures. The 1936 voter registration was the first year voters over 60 were exempt from paying the poll tax.

"Registrations and exemptions,

combined, this year total 3,678. Adding to this an estimated 500 'overs' gives a grand total for 1935 of 4,178. The 500 figure of 'overs' is according to an opinion given by Terrill Gunter, assistant in Templeton's office." John H. Templeton was the tax assessor-collector.

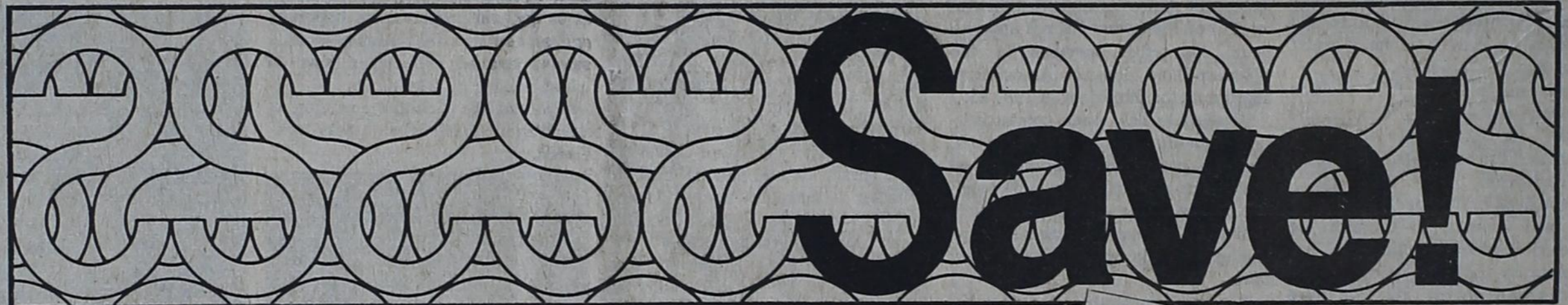


SHARON SPIERS TAYLOR
