The Wheeler County Commissioner's Court and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will sponsor a meeting Tuesday, March 25, 1986 to determine the degree of interest in such a program. The meeting is scheduled for 7:00 p.m. in the District Courtroom of the County Courthouse in Wheeler.

Mr. Jim Winnat, District Supervisor of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, will be at the meeting to explain the operation of the program and the procedure for initiating the program.

All interested livestock producers are urged to attend the meeting so that they may have input in making the decision.

Nationwide Poll, 4-H Makes A Difference

According to a nationwide poll, 4-H makes a difference in the lives of former members.

A national poll last fall of 1,761 individuals showed that 4-H does, indeed, have a positive effect on the lives of individuals who were involved in the program as youths. The randomly selected sample of individuals that were polled included 710 former 4-H members and 743 members of other youth organizations. The remainder had not been involved in organized groups during their youth.

A key finding of the survey is that former 4-H members today are more active in community activities, particularly in leadership roles, than nonmembers.

When comparing both former 4-H members and those participating in other youth organizations with non-participants in youth groups, the community involvement aspect is particularly significant. Those who did not take part in organizations as youth are currently much less involved in adult community activities.

4-H also tends to have family ties.

Former 4-H members indicated that their children are participating in 4-H to a large degree (by 50 percent more than children of non 4-H parents). They themselves also take part in Extension educational programs and activities to a significantly greater degree than former members of other youth groups as well as former nonparticipants in youth groups.

One reason for the greater involvement by former 4-H'ers relates to the types of experiences they have as youths. Without question, the study showed that former 4-H members gave higher rankings to personal development, knowledge, leadership, and coping skills experiences than did former members of other organizations.

4-H participants also felt that their overall experiences were more valuable to them than did participants of other youth organizations.

The survey also found that characteristics of 4-H members, as youths, are no different from other youths across the nation who are involved in such groups as Scouts, Boys and Girls Clubs, YMCA and YWCA, church organizations, and FFA and FHA. Their backgrounds, educational attainments and incomes are generally similar.

The poll was conducted by Dr. Howard Ladewig, program evaluation specialist with the Extension Service, and Dr. John Thomas, rural sociologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The study was funded by a grant from the Extension Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture.

4-H is an informal education program for all youth between the ages of 9 and 19 regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, handicap, religion, or national origin that is conducted by the Extension Service at the state and national level. Its objective is to provide help in the development of knowledge and leadership as well as in problem-solving and personal skills.

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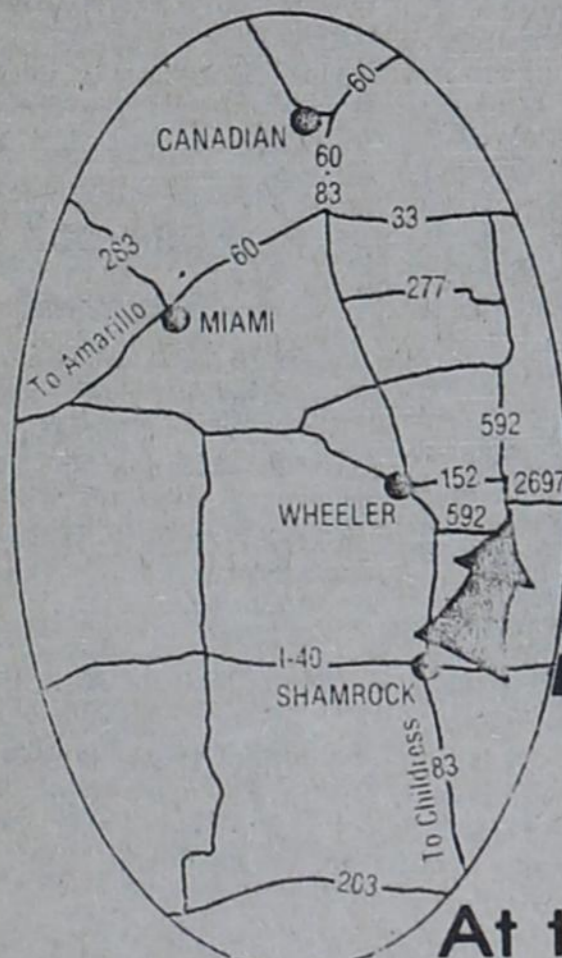

All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans.

Apply to your local appraisal district office at the address shown below for all exemptions you may qualify for. Application forms are available at this office.
If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1985, you won't need to apply again for 1986 unless the chief appraiser requires you to reapply.
However, if you passed your 65th birthday or became disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.
If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1986.

The deadline for applications is April 30, 1986. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.

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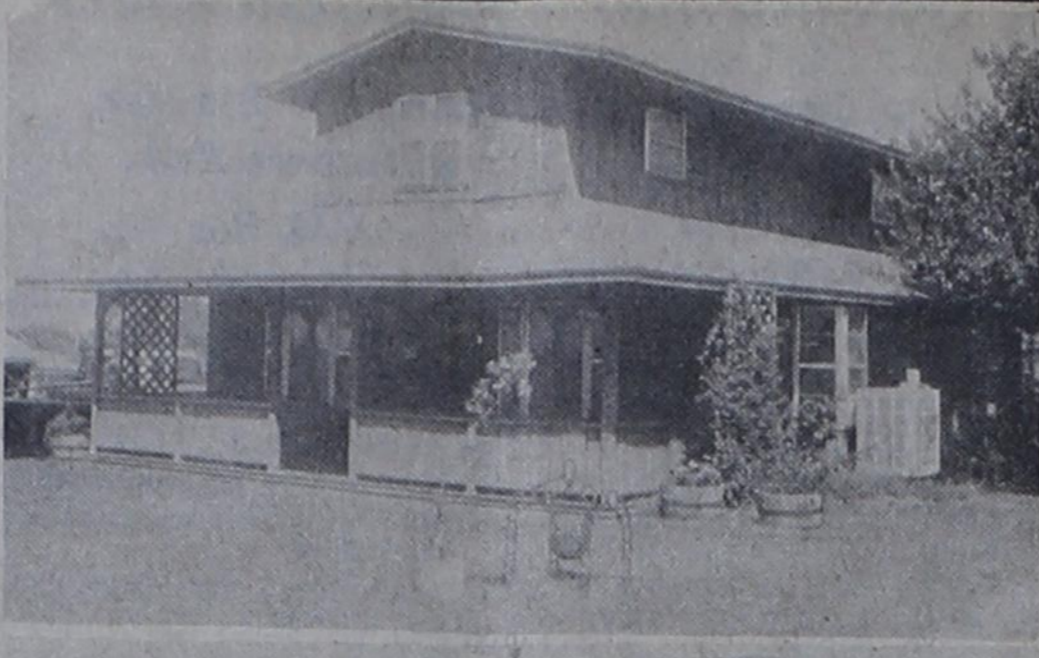
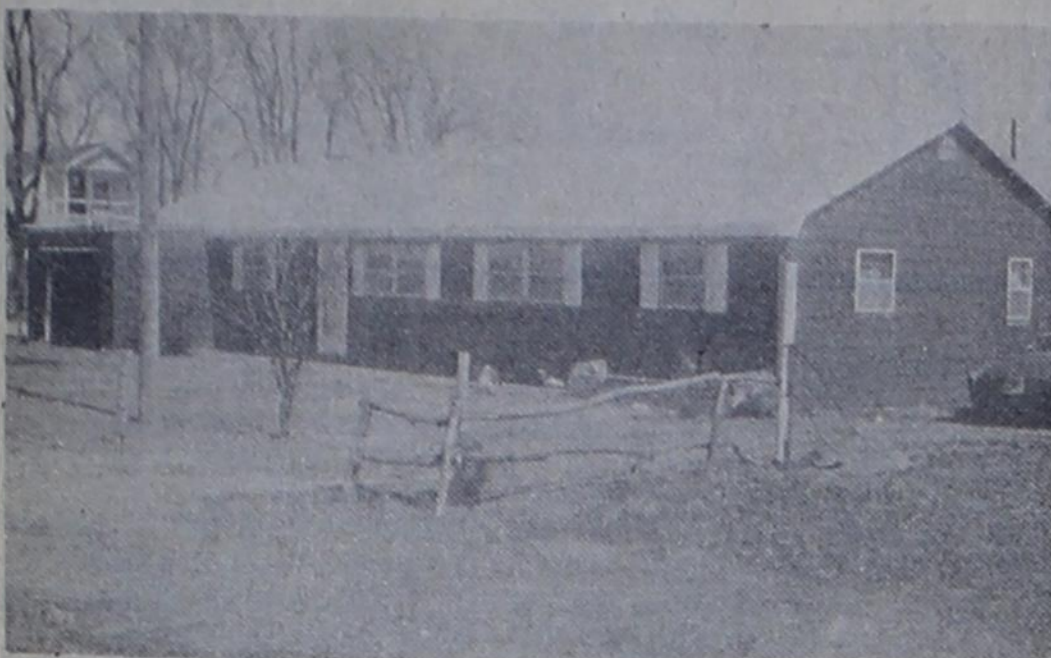

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

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE CITIZENS OF WHEELER
On Sunday, March 16, 1986, I received a survey from Delbert Thomas asking me to choose one of three statements concerning the athletic programs at Wheeler I.S.D. my choice is number one; it was worded: "I approve of the athletic programs of the WISD, the coaches and their coaching philosophy and feel no changes need to be made."

From my point of view, they are all

people to whom the welfare of the total child is the paramount concern. They not only expect each student to give and do his/her best at each practice and in each game, but also in the classroom, with his/her peers, in the community, at home, and in any and all other activities or endeavors in which he/she might be involved.
Our coaches are people who are continually learning, growing, and working toward bettering everything they do. One cannot do any of this without making mistakes along the way. The only time I consider a mistake to be harmful is when the one by whom it is made learns nothing from it. I feel that our coaches are the first to realize when they have made a mistake, and because of what it seems to me to be their ultimate goal — to help each individual achieve his/her own degree of personal excellence—they are very thorough in analysing what went wrong, taking appropriate actions, and getting on with the business at hand. By the same token, they do not hold the mistakes of a student against him/her but rather see it as an opportunity for the individual to better himself/herself and are eager to give help where help is needed.
Life seems to me to be very much like a team sport. I have never accomplished anything that was of any value or merit whatsoever without the aid of many people. I am confident in, comfortable with, and grateful for the fact that our coaches will not allow my son to play in any game unless he has fulfilled his academic and athletic requirements, behaved in a manner befitting an American, and only then, if what he is capable of doing will truly benefit the whole team. I know of no other way that can prepare him as well for the tasks he will have to face and perform if he is to

have a successful adult life than to learn to live within these limitations in a positive way and in a way that will help him appreciate his fellow human beings as worthy helpmates and friends.
Any parent can understand my intense interest in the influence our coaches have on my son; however, every year, through the uniquely marvelous privilege of being the kindergarten teacher, I find many more reasons to be interested in this influence. To you they look like young children, but to me they are dear and cherished friends. I am happy to tell you that all the way from kindergarten through grade twelve they are in the best of hands...perceptive hands that grow better with every passing year.

New Statewide Screening Program

The Legislature passed a new law in 1985 that requires all sixth and ninth-grade students to be screened for spinal deformities. Early detection of abnormal spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems. This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescent years (from 10-14 years of age), with an estimated 1 in 10 adolescents having some degree of abnormal curvature. Curves that are detected early may only require periodic observation by a specialist. Moderate curves may require the wearing of a brace, which is usually supervised by an orthopedic specialist. In most cases, the need for major surgery for this deformity can be eliminated through early detection.
Spinal screening for Wheeler Schools has been scheduled to begin on Monday, March 24, 1986.
Children will be screened for two types of spinal deformities: scoliosis and kyphosis. Scoliosis is a condition in which the spine is twisted, causing misalignment of the upper body or lower back. This condition can worsen and lead to much pain, as well as complications of the heart and lungs. Kyphosis is a type of spinal deformity in which the upper spine shows a pronounced curve. This condition is also referred to as "round back" and can be corrected if detected early.

"Adopt-A-Highway" Statewide Program

A statewide "Adopt-a-Highway" program, aimed at increasing community involvement in Texas' antilitter campaign has been kicked off by the highway department.

Under the new program, civic organizations can adopt a section of highway, and are responsible for picking up the litter along that segment at least twice a year. The program was conceived last year in the Tyler highway district and is apparently the first of its kind in the nation.

In 1984, the highway department was spending \$20 million annually on the litter problem. In response to an appeal by highway commission chairman Bob Lanier, the Tyler district started an intensified campaign against litter. In early 1985, Billy Black, Public Affairs Officer for the district, conceived the idea of organizations adopting highways.

Thus far, some ninety groups have adopted sections of highway throughout the Tyler district. They range from the Tyler Civitan Club to the Tyler-Smith County Juvenile Detention Center. The Tyler district of the highway department includes Anderson, Cherokee, Gregg, Henderson, Rusk, Van Zandt and Wood counties. The program has been a tremendous success in the Tyler area, and now the department wants to try it statewide.

Guidelines for initiating and managing Adopt-a-Highway programs have been sent to the other 23 highway district offices. Once an organization has adopted a stretch of highway, the department will place signs at each end of the two-mile section, giving credit to the adopting group.

The new Adopt-a-highway program complements Texas' other antilitter programs that include a media and education campaign, funding for increased law enforcement, and support of the Governor's Community Achievement Awards for civic beautification.

SIX FLAGS LAUNCHES ANNIVERSARY SEASON

Six Flags Over Texas will begin its 25th anniversary season Saturday, March 1.

The Arlington theme park, which first opened in 1961, has hosted more than 51 million visitors over the years. In a typical season the entertainment center will welcome some 2.5 million guests, making it the state's top, single tourist attraction.

Early-season visitors will see a number of major projects underway. The entry mall fountain area is being rebuilt with a Lone Star motif in honor of the state's Sesquicentennial, and a huge new ride, the Avalanche Bobsled, is taking shape in the park's Spanish section. It is scheduled for opening in mid-April.

Six Flags will be open on Saturdays and Sundays only during the spring months. The exception is the Spring Break period from March 15, through March 23, when the park will be open daily.

Hours for weekend operation in March will be 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Weekdays during Spring Break the park will be open from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m.

Six Flag's one-day ticket is \$14.95. Children under 42 inches tall are admitted for \$7.95. Children age two and under are admitted free.

CALCIUM NEEDS CHANGE AS CHILDREN GROW OLDER LINES FROM LINDA

Most of us know that we need calcium throughout childhood and adolescence to help build strong bones and teeth. The National Dairy Board, however, reminds us that dietary calcium requirements vary at different age levels. Teens require 50 percent more dietary calcium than children who, in turn, need much more calcium than infants.

Infants up to one year need dietary calcium to help the changeover from firm cartilage to hardened bones. Within this first year of life, calcium requirements more than double. Dietary requirements vary from one infant to the next due to individual differences. Therefore, it's a good idea to check with a pediatrician about your baby's dietary needs.

Children ages one through 10 require 800 mg of calcium daily. This means a recommended three servings a day from the dairy group as part of a balanced diet. For example, one and one-half ounces of cheese, a glass of

WHY SPEND MILLIONS TESTING AND INOCULATING CATTLE FOR BRUCELLSIS IN COUNTRY

"For a country to spend millions inoculating and testing cattle for brucellosis while allowing children of the poor to be exposed to diphtheria and polio is a gross distortion of our priorities."

This is the stand taken by the Independent Cattleman's Association in a request to President Ronald Reagan and Texas Congressmen to end the brucellosis eradication program immediately.

"In light of recent announcements about cutbacks in inoculation programs for school children and other cuts in Federal grants for health services to Texas, we believe that the brucellosis program is a prime example of misplacement of public funds and concerns," Roy Wheeler, president of the association, said.

Wheeler pointed out that federal funding for the national program before budget cuts for fiscal 1986 was \$70 million. State matching funds for the biennium are more than \$13.6 million. These state funds could be released to help human services.

With the U.S. Department of Agriculture planning to phase out the program in 1990, "our question is why wait?" Since 1934 more than \$2 billion just in Federal funds has been spent in the futile attempt to eradicate the disease, and progress has been minimal at great cost to all involved, Wheeler said. The annual Federal funds are more than double the annual production loss of \$34 million.

"This disease is a problem cattle-men can handle by themselves," Wheeler said.

Planned Grazing System To Fit Your Needs

One of the best ways to get the most out of forage is to apply a planned grazing system. There are several different systems, but the ultimate objectives of each system are to: (1) graze each plant properly and equally. (2) provide deferment during the growing season.

On every pasture there is a particular site or location preferred by livestock. This could be caused by the water location, different soil or plant types, or any other factor beyond the rancher's control. The rancher can control the concentration of livestock either by increasing the size of the herd or by reducing the size of the pasture. Higher concentrations will

improve utilization, but herds will need to be rotated more often.

Deferment during the growing season is essential to maintain the vigor and productivity of any range site. A grazing system provide for deferment at least one out of every four growing seasons, but may be more frequent depending on the system.

The grazing system should fit the producer. In most instances a system can be designed without having to build additional fences or water locations.
