



## **Mobeetie I.S.D. Hires New Superintendent**

The Mobeetie school district trustees hired a new superintendent Thursday. They hired David Malone from Chester and Itasca school.

Mobeetie school principal W.F. Howard had been acting superintendent since Bob Mickey left on Nov. 13th. Mr. Mickey had been superintendent many years and will be missed by his many friends. I had worked for Bob 13 years and hated to see him go.

Mr. Malone will begin his duties on Dec. 15th. After screening 21 applicants the trustees hired Mr. Malone 49 yrs. of age with a salary of \$33.420 per year plus \$200.00 per mo. vehicle allotment and \$200.00 utilities. He will live in the residence owned by the school.

Mr. Mickey 58 resigned after contesting the boards decision to cut his salary from \$46,646 to \$33,120. Mr. Mickey appealed the decrease to the Texas Commission on Education but attorney's reached a compromise to pay Mr. Mickey \$2,254 per month for September and October (the difference between his reduced salary and his previous salary).

Mr. Mickey left on Nov. 13th, and is now doing teacher appraisals for a private teachers evaluation firm.







## **Cub Scouts Extend Thank You**



## **Farmers To Begin** Seeding 26,000 Acres

The CRP program has affected Wheeler County in many ways. The greatest effect is the planting of grass. There are approximately 26,000 acres scheduled to be seeded this year. It will be difficult to get all of these acres seeded before the June 1, deadline, unless seeding operations are begun soon. The earliest to begin seeding was December 1. About 10% of the seeding season has passed. CRP producers are encouraged to purchase their grass seed if they have not done so and make reservations with someone to seed the grass. Another CRP sign-up is scheduled for late January or early February. This will make grass seeding more difficult due to additional acres needing to be sowed.

CRP producers who have dirt work scheduled are reminded that diversions must be completed prior to grass seeding. Some diversions have already been completed while others

Davis gained 166 yards on 28 carries to lead all rushers and 127 of those yards came in the second half.

The Mustangs just didn't get the ball that much in the last half to get back in the game. Throckmorton limited the Mustangs to just 7 plays from scrimmage in the fourth quarter as the Greyhounds ate up the clock with the hard running Davis doing most of the dirty work.

Even though the Mustangs didn't get to play for the state championship, they can be proud of their enviable 12-3 record that was fashioned by a group of young men that believed in themselves and their efforts won't soon be forgotten.
