





Ginger Nuts 1/2 cup dark molasses

3 cups sifted enriched flour cup melted shortening egg, beaten cup sugar teaspoon soda teaspoon salt teaspoon cinnamon teaspoon ground cloves teaspoon ground ginger

1/2 cup raisins 1/3 cup plain or colored sugar, or decorettes (21/2 ounces)

Sift together flour, sugar, soda, salt and spices. Add motasses and shortening to beaten egg. Add raisins to flour mixture and stir to coat raisins with flour. Add liquid to dry ingredients and stir with a spoon, then knead by hand until well blended. Roll dough into pieces the size of large marbles. To decorate, roll each piece in plain or colored sugar or multi-colored decorettes. Place on ungreased baking sheet and bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 10 to 12 minutes. Makes 6 to 7 dozen cookies. These will keep up to 4 weeks. 4 weeks.

Cookies may also be left plain before baking. Then, while cookies are still oven-warm, shake them in a paper bag with confectioners' sugar until coated. These make attractive cookie "snowballs."




