



## Good Pecan Crop Is Expected In County This Year

Eastland County pecan growers are anticipating a good pecan crop this year, a survey just completed by County Agent J. M. Cooper reveals.

The survey shows that growers overall expect to harvest 50 percent of the potential crop, which would be a big improvement over last year's small harvest.

Some growers, Cooper found, are anticipating a harvest of as high as 75 percent of potential. The lowest estimate was 10 percent.

Last year disease wiped out most of the crop, but Cooper believes that most trees have escaped disease damage this year. "It takes moisture and heat for disease to damage pecans," he said, "and we haven't had the moisture."

The agricultural agent mailed out postcards to county growers and most returned the cards. That way he received a good picture of the county pecan situation. Cooper also predicts a good peach crop.

## Farm Bureau Members To Tour Mexico

One of the outstanding events in Good Neighbor exchanges between Texas and Mexico is the 11-day tour of Mexican agricultural centers being sponsored July 14-24 by the Texas Farm Bureau.

Heading the tour is J. H. West of Bishop, president of the state farm organization, and Mrs. West. The visit to Mexico was planned as a combination goodwill, pleasure and educational trip.

In his official invitation, Sr. Julian Rodriguez Adams, Minister of Agriculture of Mexico, stated that "it is my sincere hope that as many members of the Texas Farm Bureau as possible may be able to come. We are looking forward to showing our good Texas neighbors what we are doing in the field of agriculture to advance the welfare of our farmers."

Included in the itinerary of the tour will be many points of agricultural interest, such as the highly regarded National School of Agriculture at Chapingo. Sight-seeing excursions will be made in and around Mexico City, including visits to the Floating Gardens of Xochimilco, the picturesque mountain-side spa of San Jose Puerua, a day at the fabulous Pacific resort of Acapulco, with stopovers in historic towns and cities such as Taxco, Cuernavaca and Morelia.

Joining Sr. Rodriguez in his invitation for the Farm Bureau tour was Prof. Carlos Paxy Puentes, executive secretary of the National Confederation of Small Landowners of Mexico. Professor Paz was an honored guest at the 1958 Texas Farm Bureau convention in Corpus Christi in 1958.

One of the highlights of the tour will come on July 18, when the visitors will be special guests of Governor Gustavo Baz in Toluca, capital of the State of Mexico. On the way to a special hospitality program in Toluca, the Texans will stop at the Rancho Dona Rosa to inspect the principal crops of po-

tatoes, corn and alfalfa. They will also inspect the Santa Elena Experimental Farm, which specializes in certified seeds for corn and potatoes.

The July 18 trip will be part of a three-day tour out of Mexico City which, in addition to Toluca, will also take in San Jose Purua, Morelia and Patzcuaro. On July 21, the group will leave Mexico City for a four-day schedule of visits which will include Cuernavaca, Taxco and Acapulco, returning to the capital on July 24 in time to depart for home.

It is anticipated that the Good Neighbor policy of Texas and Mexico will gain materially in this exchange of agricultural viewpoints and personal experience.

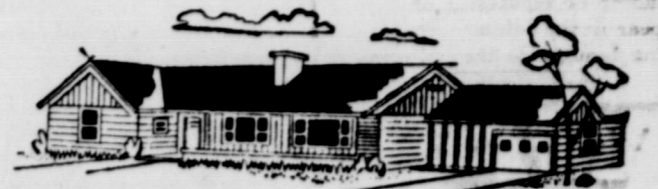

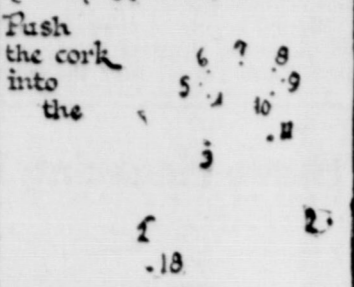

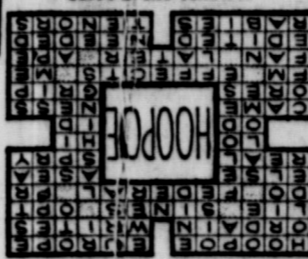
