Season Low Of 16 Hits County Area

Eastland County began warming up Saturday morning after the years coldest night Thursday pushed the mercury down to 16.

Temperatures Saturday morning hit around 21 after the weatherman predicted colder weather than the previous night's low.

The temperature, in setting the scene for the year's coldest weather, began its plunge between 6:30 and 8:00 Thursday morning when it dropped 20 degrees in an hour and hit a low of about 30 near mid-afternoon then dropped steadily until Friday morning.

As the front passed through Eastland County, the threat of a killing-frost confronted the fruit and vegetable growers in the multi-million dollar Rio Grande Valley.

A hard freeze was expected in most of the state last night with slowly rising temperatures following with clear skies today.

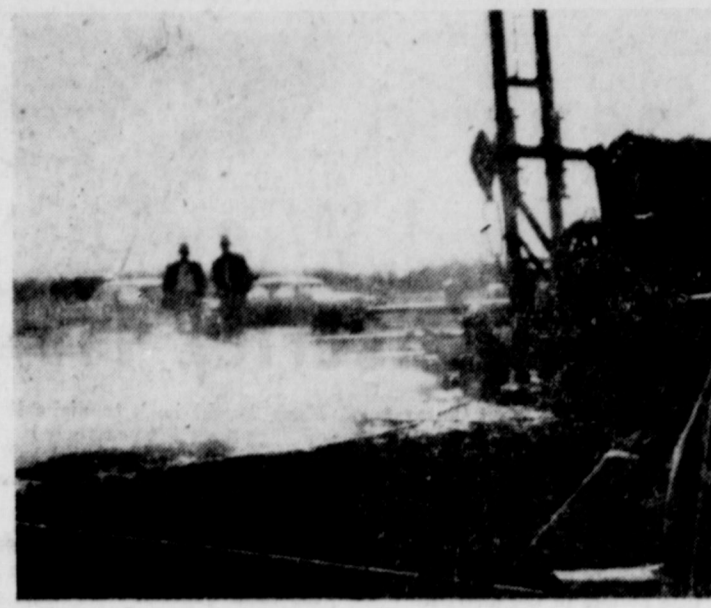

Burleson Says Washington Does Not Think Red China Will Fight

"The official position in Washington is that Red China will not fight," Rep. Omar Burleson of the 17th District of Texas, said Saturday in his weekly report. "Although no one could be certain on this point, this much can be borne

in mind to support that position," he added.

"Russia is not likely to get herself involved in a war on account of China," Rep. Burleson said. "Communist China has no navy to speak of; her air force, except for fighter planes, is not strong enough for a sustained offensive; she has only a few developed resources; little oil and no industry to speak of. Human backs are the main means of transportation in many areas. An army and an air force, with no real industry to support them, lack staying power."

"Be this as it may, the Chinese have the largest army in Asia and can be used to intimidate weaker nations in southeast Asia. In fact, it has paid her big dividends thus far."

"The Communists began the fight in Korea under the impression that the United States would not enter the war against them. President Eisenhower and the Congress have now removed any such doubt regarding Formosa. I offered an amendment to the President's request that Congress back up his policy, stating that this action should not set a precedent which would lead either people in this country or overseas to think that the President had to take such action every time an emergency occurred."

"It is my personal belief that the Chinese Communists have their eye more on southeast Asia than on Formosa, and that they may be throwing up a smoke

Thurber Station Holdup Men Given Six Years

STEPHENVILLE (RNS) — Two men who robbed a Thurber service station Jan. 24 were found guilty by an Erath County jury in Stephenville Friday and sentenced to six years each in the state penitentiary.

A jury of eight women and four men found Donald Lamar Phillips, 22, of Minneapolis, Minn., and Andrew Joseph Lebrash, 29, of Forsyth, Mich., guilty.

Both had entered pleas of not guilty.

A hitchhiker, third man who was in the car with the holdup men at the time of the incident, was nabbed by the grand jury. He had been picked up by the pair near Fort Worth.

Operators of the home believed that the blaze was possibly ignited by someone smoking in bed. The home's fire detection system, which included detecting equipment in every room, gave warning of the blaze, but frozen outside water hydrants prevented immediate action to fight the fire.

Mrs. Morris, almost blind and partially crippled, was dead when taken from her bed shortly after the fire began at 2 a.m.

Mavericks End Season With Upset Victory Over Rising Star

Eastland Win Costs Cats District Title

A jump shot from the arms of Dale Slatten swished through the basket just as the automatic buzzer sounded here Friday night, giving the Eastland Mavericks a 75-73 upset victory over the Rising Star Wildcats, and knocking the visitors out of a cinch tie for title honors in the district.

It was a storybook finish in more than one way, for it not only gave the Mavs an upset they can be proud of — it gave them their only victory of the year. Both teams rounded out their season in the tilt.

The Rising Star defeat handed Cross Plains, victors over Wylie 60-51, the converted 7-A championship.

For Eastland it was a thrilling final quarter comeback that did the trick. Dale Slatten sunk the last field goal and dropped in two free shots, tying the game up at 73-73 with a minute and 17 seconds to play, and then clinching the game with his field goal in the final second of play. He had 32 points for the night, but was edged out for scoring honors by Rising Star's Doyle Edminston, who had 33.

Edminston, who was the backbone of the visitors offense and defense, went dead in the final period at the free throw line to cost his team the game. His six foot, seven inch center missed six of his last seven free throw tries, four of them coming when the game was all tied up with less than a minute to play.
