Mary Wayne Huston shared opening day honors with two Eastland golfers. Betty Doyle won the long driving contest and Jane Day the putting contest.

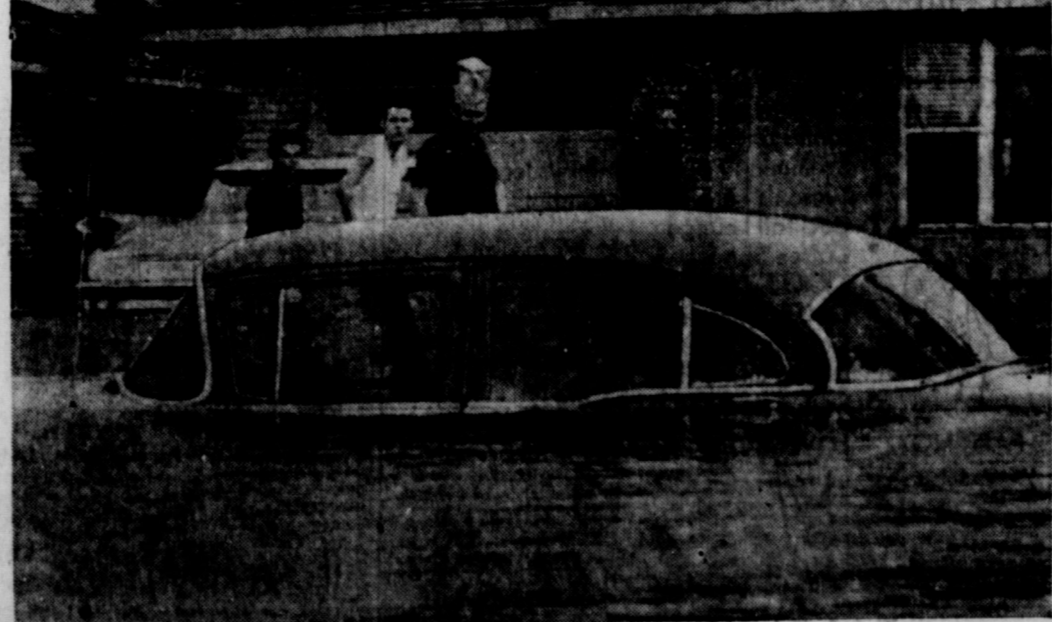

DOES COUNTY NEED WELFARE OFFICER?

County Renews USDA Surplus Food Program

Eastland County Commissioners Friday, in an unannounced called meeting, voted to renew the USDA Surplus Food Program in this county for another year.

The action came as somewhat of a surprise since some members of the court had earlier indicated their plans to oppose renewal of the contract.

In signing up for the government program for another year, the commissioners voted to drop their purchase of surplus food commodities from enough to serve 1900 people monthly to 1400 people monthly.

The court took that action after it was learned that during the past six months an average of less than 1400 people received the commodities, while the county was paying for enough food for 1900 people.

The surplus food program in this county would have ended Aug. 31 if the court had not signed another one year contract with the government. The program has been in effect here since late in 1957 and has been re-newed each year for an additional year since that time.

Since 1957 it is estimated that some \$200,000 in surplus food has been distributed in this county. As many as 1900 persons have

shared the food in one month alone. Lately, since some of the most popular foods—such as butter—has been cut off the list, the number of persons asking for the food has dropped off.

It is estimated that since the program began, 53,000 "surplus" have received commodities.

You can find those who will tell you the program has fed many who would have gone hungry without such a setup. You can also find many who say food has been given to some who would not have received it had there been someone to check up on applicants.

Things have been fairly quiet since the program first drew political fire during the 1958 county judge's race.

When the program first was put in effect in this county the Court said it hoped that there would be a marked savings in money expended by the county to pay for food for charity cases. There has been little, if any, decline in the county's high cost charity program.

Under the charity program that now exists there is little checking of individuals who appear to ask for everything from food, medicine and clothing. The only checking is done by members of the Court. Eastland County has no welfare officer for commissioners and the county judge to hand their cases to. They must judge them themselves, and in each case they are judging one of their own voters.

Many, including this writer, believe the surplus food program would be a good one, if, and only if, the county had a welfare officer to check up on applicants. That same welfare officer could take the county's charity business out of the political path it is now

Dove Studies Make Possible Longer Season

The dove population of the central management area, which includes Texas, has increased 14 percent this year, according to estimates of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Since 1953 there has been a 69 percent increase.

These figures were given to Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission, as one of the reasons this year's dove season was extended to 60 days and the possession limit increased to 30, or the daily bag limit of 15.

Changes Are Announced In RC Curriculum

Changes have been made in the curricular organization of Ranger College. The reorganization plan, submitted to and approved by the faculty in November 1959, was authorized by the Board of Regents in March 1960. As reorganized, the curriculum consists of the Division of Natural Science, the Division of Social Science, the Division of Humanities, and the Division of Applied Science.

The Division of Natural Science includes biology, chemistry, mathematics and physics; the Division of Social Science, economics, government, history, and sociology; the Division of Humanities, art, Bible, English, French, journalism, and Spanish; and the Division of Applied Science, agriculture, business administration, education, physical education, and music.

Through the various courses offered in these divisions, students may have basic preparation for further education and training in teaching, business, scientific research, and other vocational work. Preprofessional courses are provided for students who wish to continue into senior colleges in anticipation of meeting entrance requirements for schools of dentistry, law, medicine, pharmacy, and engineering.

In addition, 64 instead of 60 semester hours of academic work will be required for the Associate Degree of Arts degree. The Associate Degree will be awarded to students who meet the following requirements: 1. Satisfaction of all entrance requirements; 2. Successful completion of 64 semester hours of college work; 3. A minimum of one grade point per semester hour carried exclusive of physical training and orientation; 4. At least 18 semester hours of sophomore work at Ranger College.

Included in the 64 hours of academic work are 12 hours of English, the statutory requirement of six hours of American history and six hours of Federal and State Constitutions, one hour of orientation, four hours of physical training, six to eight hours of a single laboratory science, and three hours of algebra for all majors except physical education, music, business administration, or education majors. These majors may substitute three hours of general mathematics. For students intending pursuit of an A. B. degree in a four-year institution, it is strongly recommended that six hours of foreign language be scheduled.

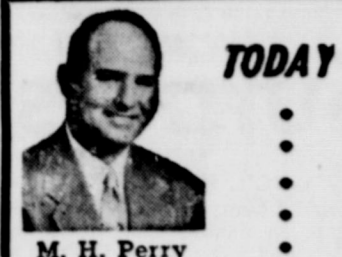

In the national survey—eastern and western. The dove banding program and call counts made by biologists, however, have indicated the central management area, where the heavy population increase has been noted.

According to the department figures, 95 percent of the unit's hunting kill is produced within the area. Thus the major portion of the doves killed in Texas were hatched in the central unit.

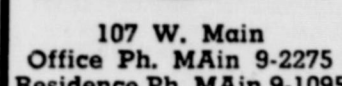
