## VFW Auxiliary Sponsors High School Contest

The opening of its 26th annual National High School Writing Contest was announced today by the Ladies Auxiliary to the Veterans of Foreign Wars. The topic will be "Law and the Free Citizen."

Students in all public, private and parochial high schools are eligible to enter the contest. National prizes are: First, \$1,000 cash; second \$500; third \$250; fourth \$100, and 20 other cash awards for honorable mention. State and local contest winners receive additional Auxiliary awards which vary with the community.

The writing contest was begun by the VFW Auxiliary in 1935 to encourage young people to think and write on patriotic subjects. During the last school year more than 30,000 students from all 50 states entered the national contest. Leo Hoegh, director of the Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization, served as chairman of the national judges.

Further information on the 1960-61 contest may be obtained from local Auxiliary units, or from the Contest Department, VFW Auxiliary, 406 West 34th Street, Kansas City 11, Mo.

Auxiliary members annually give more than three million dollars, and more than six million hours, to volunteer service for hospitalized veterans and their families, community service, Americanism programs, assistance to youth groups, civil defense and legislation benefiting veterans and their families. Members are the wives, mothers, sisters, daughters and widows of veterans who have served overseas in the U. S. armed forces, or women who have themselves had overseas service.

The solution to the cancer problem is possible through research. Blood transfusions used to safeguard the health of many patients and the crossmatch method will be improved. Hemophilia and the various anemias can be studied more intensively. Funds from this game will benefit children who are doomed unless new discoveries are made.

The Wadley Mobil Unit came to Ranger some years ago and took blood donations for Robby Robinson, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. V. Robinson.

Stacy has a 200 acre farm and planted 10 acres in melons this year.

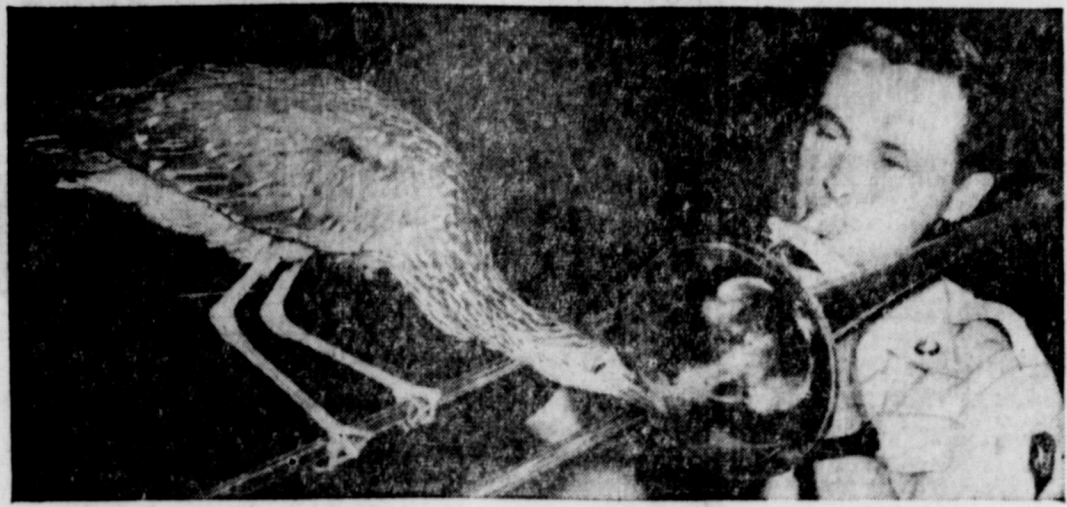

## Busy Schedule Set For SFOA Chapter

The Ranger Chapter of the Southwest Football Officials Association which was organized and accepted by the Texas Interscholastic League in January of this year has at this time scheduled 82 officiating assignments for the coming season.

The schedule is not complete as to date, as most of the games that they have scheduled are on Friday night. The plan to schedule several more games on Thursday a.m. and possibly some more on Saturday nights, are in the making.

The Chapter plans to donate officiating services to Ranger Junior High, in all their home games.

Included in games scheduled are Comanche, class 2A, Clyde and Santa Anna, Class 1A, Bronte, Class B, and Strawn and Moran, 6-man. Also on the schedule is all of Cisco Junior College home games.

Chapter members are scheduled to take examinations August 22.

On August 26, the Chapter is to hold a 5-man rules clinic at the Ranger College cafeteria. All 6-man coaches in the area are invited to attend.

On August 29 they will hold an 11-man rules clinic and an invitation is extended to all 11-man football coaches in the area.

Officers for the new chapter are Lewis Conn, president; Carl Black, vice president, and Roy Barrett, secretary-treasurer.

Establishment of the new chapter in Ranger, is an aid to area schools not only in convenience, but in cutting expenses. Chapter's available to area schools prior to establishment of the Ranger chapter were in Abilene, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth and Brownwood. The Ranger chapter will provide area schools with an opportunity to cut travel expenses formerly paid to officials from other towns.

All officials of the new chapter are members in good standing of the association, well qualified, and include several former coaches. Fees and travel expense will be based on present Texas Interscholastic League schedules.

## Get A License Before Fishing During August

Another warning has been issued by the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission, to buy fishing licenses before starting on your trip in August.

"A number of people will be going on vacation during August," he said. "Some of them are just careless; others think because there is only a month left of the present season they can get by without getting a \$2.15 fishing license. Every month they find this to be pretty expensive because warden have been asked to take careful check on fishermen without licenses."

The director also warned against rushing the hunting season. Dove shooting in the North Zone will be permitted after September 1. New hunting licenses also will be required. They will be available at local sporting goods stores the last week in August.

He also pointed to the change in white-winged dove regulations this year. The season will be Sept. 9, 10 and 11—three consecutive days instead of three alternate days as previously. Whitewings may be taken in several counties in the Rio Grande Valley. The limit will be 10 per day and 10 in possession. During this three day shoot hunters also may take mourning doves. They can kill 10 white-wings and five mourners the first day. But they must not have in possession at the end of the second day's shoot more than 30 doves—10 whitewings and 20 mourners.

## Dr. Stevens to Speak at F. B.'s Annual Barbecue

Plans have been completed for the annual Eastland County Farm Bureau barbecue which will be held Thursday in Eastland City Park.

Dr. John C. Stevens, assistant president of Abilene Christian College, will be the guest speaker, and a special musical program has been arranged.

Dr. Stevens is a native of Navarro County. He holds a B.A. degree from ACC, a M.D. and a Ph. D. from the University and studied at the University of Colorado and attended Harvard University chaplains school.

He was a chaplain during World War II, participating in the European campaigns of Normandy, Northern France, the Rhineland, the Ardennes and Central Europe with an infantry regiment.

He joined the faculty of Abilene Christian College in 1948 as assistant professor of history. He became dean of men of the college in 1950, dean of men of the college in 1952 and assistant president in 1956.

He is a director of the American Studies Program for the college, a member of the American

Historical Association, a member of the committee on Secondary Schools of the American Council of Learned Societies of New York and a member of the Academy of Political Science.

Dr. Stevens is past president of the Key City Kiwanis Club of Abilene, past chairman of the Board of Directors of Abilene Boy's Ranch, and works with many other civic groups, including the Chamber of Commerce, the United Fund and the Boy Scouts.

He is married and the father of two children.

## Traffic Death Rate Reduction Seen In Texas

Texas traffic safety improved in every category during the first six months of 1960 over the same period of 1959, and the State ranked second among the eight states in the National Safety Council's statistical group in reduction in traffic deaths for the same period.

This information was announced Wednesday by Governor Price Daniel following its receipt from the Texas Department of Public Safety's Statistical Services and the National Safety Council.

During the first six months of 1960, the DPS advised the Governor, Texas traffic deaths dropped from 1,112 for the same period of 1959 to 1,010 this year, a saving of 102 lives and a reduction of 9 percent.

In the same period, Texas' total traffic crashes dropped from 164,000 to 142,000, a reduction of 13 percent; injury-causing collisions fell from 37,000 to 32,000 down 13 percent; non-injury crashes dropped 13 percent, from 126,000 to 109,000; estimated number of injuries dropped from 66,600 to 57,800, a decrease of 13 percent; and the actual number of injuries reported to the DPS dropped from nearly 35,000 to 28,000 a reduction of 19 percent.

The death rate per 100 million miles of vehicular travel reached its lowest level in many years, probably the lowest on record, 4.5 persons. For the first half of 1959, the death rate was 5 persons for every 100 million miles traveled. The final death rate for last year, 5.3, was the lowest on record, except for 1958, which was also 5.3.

The injury rate for every 100 million miles traveled was down 19 percent for the first half of 1960 over the same period in 1959, from 156 persons injured last year to 126 this year.

Estimated economic loss in Texas motor crashes for the first half of the year dropped 12.6 percent from \$181,250,000 last year to \$158,400,000 this year.

The National Safety Council advised Governor Daniel that Texas ranked second among the eight states in its automotive group in traffic death reductions for the first half of 1960.

The Texas Department of Public Safety showed the reduction to be 9 percent, but National Safety Council listed the State with an 8 percent improvement. New York reported a 9 percent reduction, Texas 8, Illinois 6, and Pennsylvania 3, while the other states in the same group—California, Indiana, Michigan and Ohio—reported increased traffic deaths varying from 2 percent to 14 percent.

Texas vehicular mileage estimated for the first half of 1960 showed no change from the same months of 1959, but nationally, mileage was up about 3 percent.

National traffic deaths were about same as last year, 17,090 for 1960 and 17,100 for 1959.

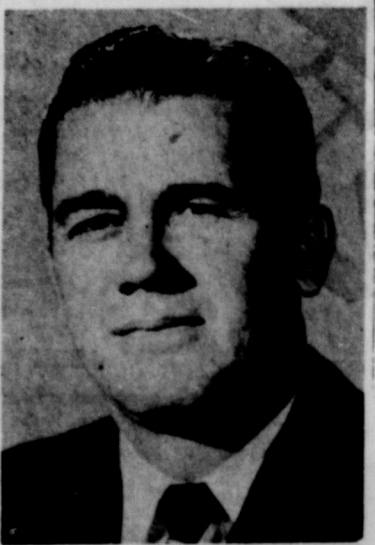

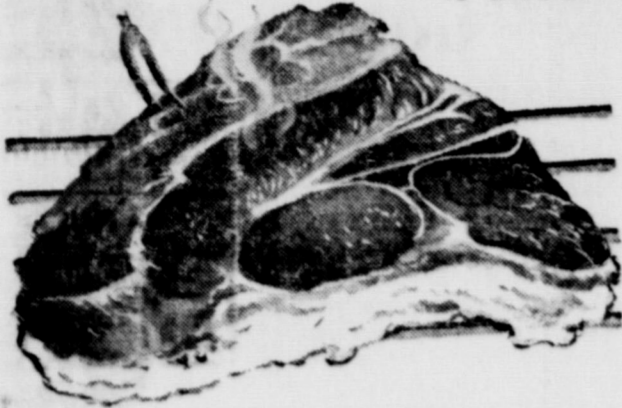
