Five County Bands Accept Bowl Bids

All five Eastland County high school bands accepted invitations to take part in the first annual Peanut Bowl to be held in Eastland Sept. 24.

Phil Hewett, Eastland High band director, who is a member of the sponsoring organization, the Eastland Junior Chamber of Commerce, will serve as coordinator for the special halftime show. The combined bands from Cisco, Ranger, Rising Star, Gorman and Eastland will put on the show under Hewett's direction.

Band directors accepting the invitation were Lloyd Gonzales of Rising Star, Alton Roan of Gorman, Eris Ritchie of Cisco and William Auvenshine of Ranger. Ranger College and Cisco Jun-

ior College will play in the bowl game. Other activities planned include a downtown parade with the five county bands and possibly several others participating and the crowning of the Eastland county Peanut Queen.

Jaycees plan to stress the importance of the county's major crop, peanuts, in promoting the game and Hewett said his halftime show would be based around that theme.

Tickets for the game will go on sale in the near future in Eastland, Ranger and Cisco and possibly in other county towns.

Increase In School Enrollment Is Noted

Junior High Bright Spot In Eastland

School enrollment in Eastland on opening day showed an increase above enrollment the first day of school in 1959, the report issued this morning by Supt. Wendell Siebert reveals.

Enrollment is up in all schools except high school. In all 752 students were in the classroom Monday. Siebert said he expected a small increase in that number by the end of the week, explaining that there are always a few late comers.

Junior High School was the bright spot in the system, showing a gain of 11 students. Enrollment there was up from 179 students in 1959 to 190. J. W. Baley, principal explained.

At high school the enrollment was down slightly, from 188 to 182. Enrollment at the two elementary schools was up nine, from 340 to 349. South Ward has 142 students in five classes and West Ward has 207 in seven classes. Douglas School also increased its enrollment from 36 a year ago to 41 now.

Army Recruiter Lists Reasons For Joining Now

The US Army Recruiting Service offers travel to young men enlisting during the month of September, Sgt Robert Butler local Army Recruiter announced today.

Your travel is guaranteed under a unique new Army program called "Choose it Yourself", which allows you to choose assignment to either of two major geographical areas covering most of the Free World. Under this program you can choose to serve in the Far East where we have units in Japan, Korea, Guam, and the Philippines; or you can choose Europe where personnel are stationed in Germany, France, and Italy. "No matter which area you choose the Travel experience you'll gain there is bound to be exciting," he said.

Also under this program, young men may choose to train in Infantry, Armor, Field Artillery and be assured of schooling or on the job training in any of these three vocational fields will prepare you for a position in the Army's national defense program.

This program is offered in addition to the normal enlistment programs given by the US Army Recruiting Service.

"Young men who enlist during September," the Sgt. said, will be given eight weeks of basic training, then eight weeks of advance training before traveling to the overseas area of their choice.

Men who are interested in travel under the Army's Choose it Yourself program may see Sgt. Butler at the Draft Board in Eastland each Wednesday, or they may call him collect at Breckenridge, HI-9-4006.

School Looks Good To Eastland Parents

School started here at 8 yesterday morning and by this morning the mothers were mixing tears with the breakfast cereal. Let's take a typical mother.

You may wonder why she failed to cry yesterday; the day her children were torn from her arms and devoured by the school house. In the first place, she was too tired.

She rose up at an early hour to be confronted by a boy who hadn't worn shoes on week-days for three months; a girl who knew she'd be the only girl in school wearing fewer than six can-cans and who hinted darkly at the results of thus being made different; and that 8 tardy bell.

Even a casual observer could have distinguished between the mothers and the teachers Monday morning. The mothers had the "relieved" expressions. (Reverse this next May.)

Because, secondly, this typical mother did not begin to cry because her children went off to school. In fact, when classes had actually begun and there was scant chance that the school board would call the whole thing off, relief swept over her as the West Texas winds sweep over the plains. It felt almost strong enough to blow away the exhaustion caused by a summer of continuous child care. Happily she sat down to sip her coffee undisturbed by fights she must stop, cuts she must bandage, and a blaring record player that she'd like to . . . well, never mind THAT IDEA.

Later, however, she started to think and to wonder. Is this pure bliss normal? Shouldn't a mother be saddened by enforced separation from her own flesh and blood? Aren't mothers supposed to cry the first week in September? Our mother decides the sudden change in routine has affected her sense of values and she'll be sad on Tuesday.

This morning she shut off the alarm, prepared herself for a wave of hopeless grief to grip her entire being. Did it? No. Therefore she must be sub-normal in mother love. The world must never know. She pledges silently to support the P-TA all the way, to attend school at any opportunity. Even this does not soften the pangs of guilt she feels. The tears begin and they continue.

And, later, when mothers speak of the way they cried when Susie and Junior went to school, our mother can hold her head high, secure in the knowledge that she, too, wept the first week of school.




