Ranger Places 1, 2, 4 and 7 Bobby Thomson Wins Conference Medalist

Bobby Thomson, Ranger Junior College Golfer, after leading the Ranger Golf team to the Conference title Monday in San Angelo went on Tuesday to increase his lead in the individual play and won the tournament medalist honors with a 14 stroke lead and a 72 hole total of 286, to give Ranger a clean sweep of the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference Golf tournament.

The first 36 holes of the tournament was team play with the top eight individuals playing 36 more holes for individual medalist honors.

Ralph Yarborough Report

Dear Fellow Texan: In these days of high concern with the great Communist peril now growing in Cuba—only 90 miles from our shores, we hear and read a great deal about government service and government servants, public decisions and policy debate.

In this report, I want to turn for a few moments from the great turmoil and the great issues of the moment, to salute a band of dedicated Texans, who for 25 years, 50 years or more, gave or are now giving hours of service to their fellow men. I salute that steadfast, dedicated corps of nearly fifty Texans who have received special recognition from our government as unpaid, voluntary weather observers.

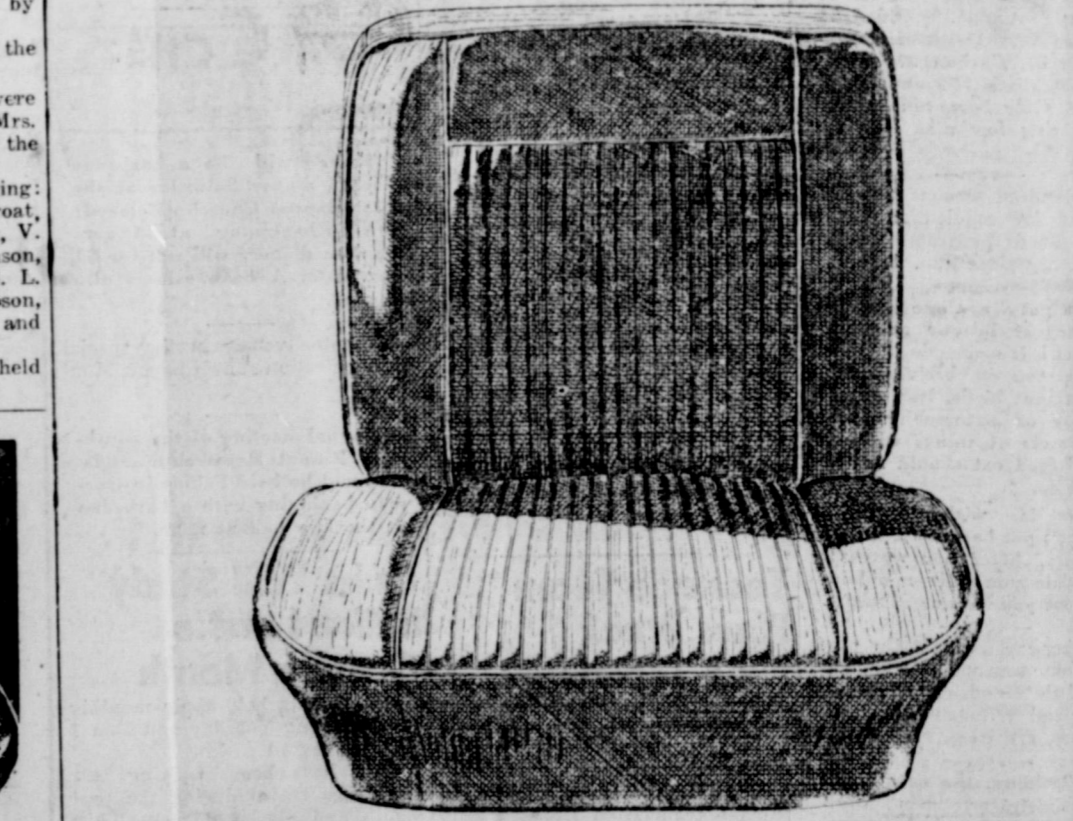

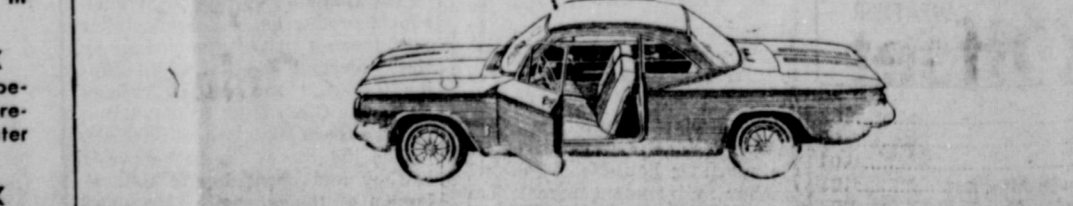

AUSTIN REPORT

On Wednesday of last week the House of Representatives passed Senate Bill No. 1. This was the spending bill for the next two years which provides for the spending of \$2,519,631,894. (Over two and a half billion dollars) and was hotly debated before gaining final approval. The measure had already passed the Senate, but must go back to a free Conference Committee to agree on some changes which the House put in the bill.

After voting the spending measure, the House proceeded to a money-raising bill designed to help pay the cost of State Government for the next two years. House Bill No. 960 is set for vote on Tuesday, May 2nd, 1961. This bill is known as a Corporation Profits Tax. It's sponsors say that it will raise about fifty million dollars. It's sponsors use the same arguments in favor of House Bill 960 that the proponents of the Sales Tax used, namely that Texas is the only industrial state that does not have a Corporation income or profits tax. Representative Charles Wilson of Trinity, who was the Author and main sponsor of the Sales Tax Bill (House Bill 727) is also one of the leading sponsors of House Bill 960. It looks like some kind of combination like this will be essential to pay the debt and provide the needed money for the next two years. The Sales Tax passed last week, falls short of this goal by almost 100 million dollars.

Many of the Representatives who voted for the 250 million dollar tax burden to be placed on the individual house-holder are now confronted with a chance to vote for a tax which will place some of this tax burden on Corporations as well as People. The voters of Texas will have a clear guide on this subject when election time comes around next year.

According to a recent change in the Texas Constitution, the Regular Session of the 57th Legislature will end on May 29th. Time is quickly running out for bills that have not cleared committee. If the Governor sees fit, he may call Special Sessions of the Legislature, not to exceed 30 days each. The 56th Legislature required three Special Sessions to complete it's work and then most of the real burdensome problems were not solved but only postponed. It will be most interesting to see what develops in the next 29 days in the Capitol.

Should the Poll Tax Be Abolished?

There are many opinions pro and con concerning the poll tax. Many people approve payment of the poll tax; others, though the tax is small, object strenuously, pointing out that such a requirement places a price on the voting privilege.

When I think of voting as one of America's freedoms, there is a doubt in my mind as to whether or not a price should be paid for such a freedom. But if one is interested enough in political elections, he should not mind paying the cheap price of a poll tax for the right to vote. Some, if not all, of the tax money is used toward educational purposes, and this is indeed a worthwhile use of tax money.

In talking to a boy from an area where a poll tax is not paid, I learned that in a state where the tax is paid, people seem more aware of an upcoming election. He stated the fact that people like to get their money's worth; therefore, he thinks that they study the candidates and their platforms more closely when they have to pay to vote. This is true to the extent that if people did not pay a poll tax, they might make less effort to find out about the candidate for whom they voted and might care less whether or not he was the best man.

Although there are advantages of having a poll tax, there are also disadvantages, in that many

people think that a restriction should not be placed on one's privilege of voting. On the other hand, that for which we pay is considered of more value to us. —Read The Classifieds—

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

Texas is hip-deep in the business of spot checking air, food, and drink for radioactive content. Public health engineers are manning air sampling stations in Austin and El Paso, milk monitoring stations at Austin and Dallas, and studying the total dietary in take of radio-activity of a school age test subject in Austin.

Every day of every week for the past five years, state and local health department engineers in Austin and El Paso have filtered 85,000 cubic feet of Texas air through vacuum cleaner devices, trapping tiny particles of matter and measuring its radiant energy. Both stations are part of a sprawling coast to coast network set up originally to measure increases in atmospheric radioactivity due to nuclear weapons testing.

Although no nuclear tests have been conducted in the United States since 1958, the network has proved so valuable that it has continued on a year-around basis to study "background" levels of natural radiation, including that which originates from cosmic sources in outer space.

Daily readings from the sampling devices are interpreted for use in Texas and then forwarded to Washington where Public Health Service radiation specialists make more discriminating analyses.

The Austin station clearly detected fallout from the French bomb tests in the Sahara Desert last spring.

Radioactivity in air sampled at most stations within the national network including those at Austin and El Paso—has now reached the point where it is barely measurable.

In the milk monitoring network, specially trained person collect composite samples of milk from at least 90 percent of the dairies supplying the test area. Both Austin and Dallas stations have consistently reported radioactivity levels well below the tolerances set by the National Committee on Radiation Protection.

Austin is also one of eight American cities measuring total radioactivity a test subject consumes in food and drink. Equal portions of everything the subject eats or drinks for seven days each month are quick frozen and sent to government laboratories in Montgomery, Alabama, for analysis.

The dietary study is just beginning. Sponsors say it will be several months before any conclusions can be drawn from it.

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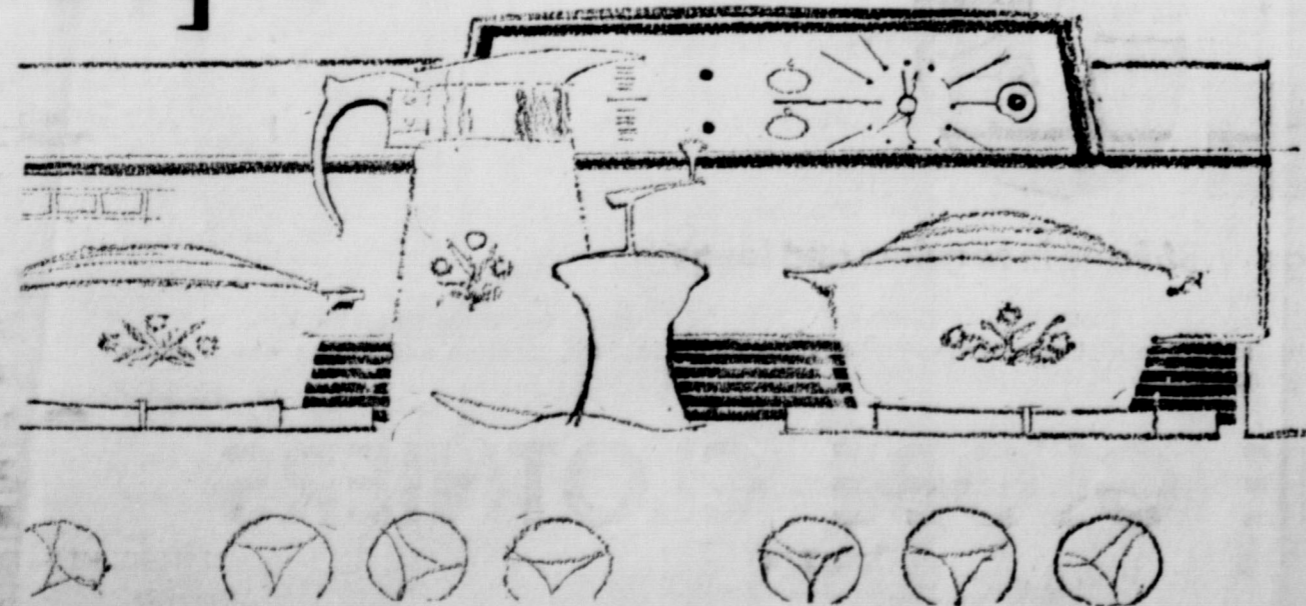

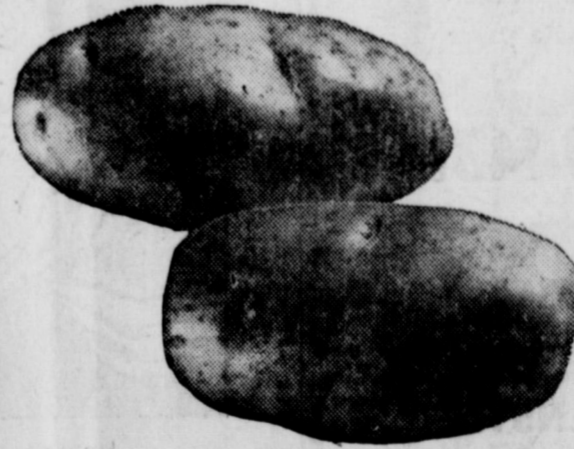

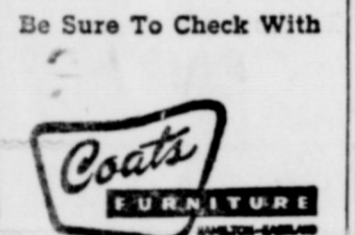

Litterbugs Cost Texans Many Dollars Each Year

The Texas Highway Department today launched a new slogan in its anti-litter campaign: "Be a neatnik, not a litterbug."

This plea comes from Texas Highway Department maintenance crews all over the state as they haul mountains of cans, bottles, paper, decaying food, and other litter from Texas highway right of way.

"Spring houseclean our Texas highways all year long by fighting that urge to toss litter from your car," they recommend.

Throwing litter on highways and roadsides is prohibited by law. Last year 281 cases against litter-throwing were completed in Texas courts. Of this number, 269 were found guilty and were fined or punished by other means.

Highway maintenance men point out that litter is local for the main part, coming from resident litterbugs and not from out-of-staters or from phantom travelers from "up the road." Surveys reveal that the litterbug is a local person, possibly a civic-minded citizen in all other phases of his life, but he fails to see the multiplication factor when he tosses out an empty cigarette package, wad of paper, or soft-drink bottle. He would not toss these objects down in his own yard, or in a friend's; but he will thoughtlessly take over the highway as his own private trashbasket.

Other evidence of the "resident litterbug" is sometimes a can-and-bottle trail. Maintenance foreman report that the biggest dead-soldier tossouts are about a drink away (by car) from the nearest local emporium. Cost of removal has been estimated at one-half cent per can. Maintenance crews join poet Richard Armour in his hurry-up order to science

for an edible beer can.

Maintenance men point out: No machine can pick up litter. It has to be hand-picked. That makes it an expensive operation. Last year the clean-up and mowing bill for 57,500 maintained miles of Texas highways totaled more than \$7,000,000. This included picking up, hauling and unloading rubbish. Another chore for maintenance men is removal of dead animals, removal of rocks and rock piles. Wrecked cars must be hauled off. Advertising signs in the right of way must be taken down. Maintenance crews are also responsible for mowing the grass, removing brush, and keeping vegetation from the highway markers and guard posts.

A maintenance foreman explains, "We could do our mowing job so much quicker and save money if we didn't have to pick up all the cans, bottles, and litter before we start. A heap of litter hidden in the grass can wreck an expensive machine or an automobile. Cutting grass is more than just trying to keep a neat highway yard. Mowing reduces fire hazard and prevents spreading of weed seed to nearby farms. Tall grass and brush can also distort sight distances and result in expensive and tragic automobile smashups.

"Take a count of the litter objects you see the next time you are on the road. Even though we have regular maintenance crews making periodic litter pickups, that busy litterbug is still way ahead of us. Help us out. Be a 'neatnik.' Litter? Don't throw it; stow it—till you get to a proper disposal unit."

Humble Potato Takes on a Smart New Look

Baked Potatoes Creole

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

Baked stuffed potatoes are always popular. Now, for a change, try them stuffed creole style—with tomato, green pepper and a few herbs. You'll enjoy them.

STUFFED POTATOES CREOLE (Serves six)

- 6 baking potatoes
- 1 medium green pepper, sliced
- 1 medium onion, diced
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 medium tomato, diced
- 3 to 2 tablespoons milk
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon white pepper
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon crumbled whole rosemary leaves
- Paprika for garnish.

Wash potatoes. Dry. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) one hour or until done. In meantime, saute green pepper and onion in 3 tablespoons of the butter or margarine until onion is limp but not browned. Add tomato and cook 1 minute more.

Cut slices from tops of potatoes; scoop out centers, leaving shell intact. Add milk and seasonings; mash well. Blend in sauteed vegetables. Fill shells with this mixture. Dot tops with remaining butter or margarine. Bake in preheated hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 20 minutes, or until tops are delicately browned. Sprinkle with paprika.

I Give You Texas

When I was a young reporter in Memphis, Tennessee, Ralph Millett started an afternoon newspaper there—the Penny Bee. That's right, it sold for a cent a copy. His editor was going to resign and so the publisher of the struggling paper was looking for a successor.

He offered the job to me. I said, "I don't know whether I could edit a newspaper." He replied, "You have been highly recommended."

"By whom?"
"Mr. Mooney," (C. P. J. Mooney was the editor of the Commercial Appeal, the paper on which I was working.)

Millet chuckled, "Of course, he didn't know that he was recommending an editor to me. We were just conversing and he called you 'the most promising young newspaperman in the South.'"

That was truly praise, coming from the greatest Southern editor of his day.

That was long ago and I am no longer young—but I am still promising.

Little stories about famous members of the United States Senate of long ago: Senator William B. Bate of Tennessee served in two wars. He was a veteran of the Civil War,

with the rank of major general but the war of his youth—with Mexico—was the one which was most vivid in his memory.

Bate was not an orator and seldom spoke but one day a bill to increase the pensions of those who had served in the Mexican war was being considered and he thrilled the Senate with an address in which he described scaling Chapultepec and other experiences in that conflict. It was remarkable to hear a Senate tell of battles in which he had taken part almost 60 years before.

Senator "Pitchfork" Tillman of South Carolina in a speech in the Senate gave a picturesque description of a colleague, William (Gum Shoe Bill) Stone of Missouri: "He can dance the Highland fling on top of a 10-rail fence and never touch the ground, but

his greatest feat is walking on eggs without breaking the shells."

A new Senator wanted to be named to the judiciary committee. The majority leader, a rock-ribbed conservative, Senator Nelson Aldrich, of Rhode Island, approved saying, "He's all right I had him looked up; he is the attorney for seven different corporations." And so the Senator was appointed.

What Aldrich did not know, however, was that when the Senator had been elected, he retired from all corporation law practice.

He was William E. Borah, Idaho, who became a leader of the progressives in the Senate.
