Cornelius included with each cash bonus at least one two dollar bill. "For luck," he said.



Little known facts about Texas boundaries.

(Editor's Note: This is the ninth in a series of articles outlining the numerous boundary conflicts dating back to 1716, pointing up little known facts which shaped the Texas of today.)

That pink granite giant — the State Capitol Building — stands in Austin as an indirect, unplanned monument to another Texas-New Mexico boundary dispute.

Today Attorney General Will Wilson works in a large room in this same capitol on the current boundary dispute with the federal government in the tidelands case.

The state swapped the capitol building contract for three million acres along the Texas-New Mexico boundary.

The logical starting place for the survey was the northwestern corner of Texas. But where was the northwest corner?

On paper, the Compromise of 1850 said the top of the Panhandle was the parallel line of 36°30'. To the west it was set at the 103rd meridian as it ran north and south. Ostensibly the northwest corner was where these lines met.

However it wasn't easy to locate these things on the good earth.

Texas' Governor E. M. Pease appointed Commissioners William R. Scurry, representing Texas, and John H. Clark, U. S. Representative, to mark the boundary between Texas and the territory of the United States.

They were working east along the 32nd parallel, north latitude

when they got into a political argument, the North v. the South. The Texans got so mad they quit the camp.

Clark and party proceeded with the survey, going north along the 103rd meridian to a point he thought to be the northwest corner. He dug a circle in the ground, placing a large cedar post in the middle.

Then he turned southward to a point above the Canadian river where he had camped the winter before. Before he could finish that survey the Greer County controversy flared anew and he left the 103rd meridian for the troubled 100th meridian.

In the meantime a survey of over 5,000,000 acres of land in Dallam, Hartley, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro, Lamb, Bailey, Cochran and Hockley counties was made so the Capitol builders could pick their three million acres.

The Capitol Company dispatched Col. A. C. Babcock to Texas to make an on-the-ground inspection. The colonel proved to be a real dude, traveling to Buffalo Springs in a four-mule "ambulance," bringing his own canned food delicacies. He refused to eat anything fixed by the camp cook because he used cow chips for fuel.

"The colorful colonel left his mark on the country. Cow chips became known as 'Babcock coal' in the high plains country," Wilson said.

Babcock found two monuments — Clark's and the one made by U. S. surveyors Richard O. Chaney and William W. Smith when they were doing work in territory north of the Panhandle.

In the event the Chaney-Smith location should be established as the correct 103rd meridian, the ownership of the strip of territory two miles wide and 310 miles long would jump from Texas to New Mexico.

However, to the vast relief of Texans, Clark's lines were confirmed by an Act of Congress in 1891.

Then other trouble jumped up. The line drawn by Clark was one-half mile west of the true 103rd meridian. Clark had first started his line on the south stopped, and began anew from the north.

The two lines would never meet if projected from there to eternity. The New Mexico constitutional convention in 1910 raised a howl of protest and tried fast, sly footwork. They said the eastern boundary was not on the true 103rd meridian and laid claim to the land between the two lines.

In the act of admitting New Mexico to statehood there was buried in fine print a leeper clause that set New Mexico's eastern boundary at the true 103rd meridian.

The Capitol Company and the powerful XIT ranch mounted defense that proved disastrous to the claims of New Mexico. John V. Farwell was a college chum of U. S. President William Howard Taft. He briefed Taft on the history of the boundary dispute and Taft decided "it was an outrage for New Mexico to attempt to get this land from Texas."

Congress passed a joint resolution in 1911 making null and void (Continued on Page Two)

'On' Election Year Faces Eastland County Voters

Quite a few office holders and potential office holders will be asking Santa for nothing but a four year term this Christmas.

Eastland County voters will elect a district judge, county attorney, sheriff, tax assessor-collector, two county commissioners and five constables during the coming year. They will also help select a state senator and a state representative.

Feb. 1 is the deadline for candidates to file their names for the first primary, and so far not a single candidate has announced his intention. Voters have until Jan. 31 to pay their poll taxes.

In addition to the usual elections in the county, including the Presidential, state, county, precinct, school and city elections, there has been widespread talk that a beer election will be held during the coming year. This has prompted heavy payments of poll taxes, and the number of eligible voters is expected to be larger than usual in 1960.

Offices to be filled in the coming year include the 91st District Court judgeship now held by Turner Collier; the post now held by County Attorney Earl Conner, the office of sheriff now filled by J. B. Williams and the tax assessor-collector's post now held by J. C. Allison. State Senator Floyd Bradshaw's four year term will also end and State Representative Paul Brashear's two year term expires.

Commissioners of Precinct 1 and Precinct 3 will also face election this year. J. B. (Tip) Arthur is Precinct 1 (Eastland-Ranger) commissioner and Bob Carter is Precinct 3 (Rising Star) commissioner. All constables terms expire, and the usual precinct posts will have to be filled.

The Presidential election is also

expected to create a lot of attention in the county. Eastland County has voted Republican in the past two Presidential elections on the strength of President Dwight Eisenhower's popularity.

The first primary election and precinct conventions will be held May 7 in 1960 and the county convention is May 14. The second primary is June 4 and the general election is Nov. 8.

For the first time in 1960 county voters will be doing their voting in just 13 precincts. In the past there have been 25 precincts in the county, but County Commissioners abolished 12 of them in August of 1958. The 12 abolished precincts were Eastland City Hall, Ranger Young School, Staff, Alameda, Long Branch, Romney, Cook, Sabanno, East Rising Star, Pleasant Hill, Dothan and East Cisco.

The remaining 13 boxes, renumbered by the Court, are Precinct 1, Eastland courthouse; Precinct 2, Ranger city hall; Precinct 3, Olden; Precinct 4, Gorman; Precinct 5, Carbon; Precinct 6, Desdemona; Precinct 7, Kokomo; Precinct 8, Rising Star city hall;

Truck Operators' Highway Tax Is Explained

A considerable number of truck operators have not paid their Federal use tax on highway motor vehicles, according to A. E. Fogie Jr., Administrative Officer of the Abilene office of the Internal Revenue Service. The Internal Revenue Service has surveyed the State Registration Records and has prepared a list of the truck operators subject to the Federal highway use tax who have not filed their tax return on Form 2290 and paid their tax.

Mr. Fogie explained that although the law had been in effect since July 1, 1956, many truck operators still are not familiar with the tax and with the fact that a return must be filed annually and the tax paid. Other returns may be due if additional trucks are put into operation during the year. In general, this tax applies to the use on the public highways of motor vehicles having a taxable gross weight of more than 26,000 pounds. The tax applies to these vehicles even if they are operated solely within a city, town, or other metropolitan area.

The Internal Revenue Service has available Publication 349 which explains the tax in detail. Fogie advises truck operators subject to the tax who have not previously filed, to file Form 2290 paying the tax due at the earliest possible date.

Those who do not file and pay on time are required to pay interest at the rate of 6 per cent per year on the tax from the time it is due. In addition, there is a penalty of 5 per cent a month, but not to exceed 25 per cent, for delinquent filing in the absence of reasonable cause for the delinquency.

this sleeper in the New Mexican constitution.
As writer J. Evetts Haley says: "The old school tie had really helped."
This same resolution authorized the President to act in conjunction with Texas and set up the Scott-Cockrell commission to remark the boundary between the state and the territory on the line run by Clark for the 103rd meridian to the southeast corner of New Mexico, and then west with the 32nd parallel to the Rio Grande.
This was done. Texans figured that finally their border was pegged down with New Mexico. They were wrong.
