EASTLAND COUNTY DELEGATES DISCOVER

Sonic Booms Are Sound Of Security In America

When one of America's modern jet airplanes first started breaking the sound barrier over Eastland County telephones began ringing at police stations, sheriff's office and newspaper offices.

The sonic boom, which at first put real scares in local citizens, has now become more or less an accustomed thing here, however. This city is in the direct path of one of Convair's B-58 flight test corridors and the booms have become common place.

There is still a vast misunderstanding of sonic booms. That's why the Navy and the Strategic Air Command of the United States Air Force recently asked citizens from Ranger, Eastland and Cisco to be their guests on a tour of SAC headquarters in Omaha, Neb., and Convair's plant in Fort Worth.

Attending the orientation conference were O. H. Dick and Tom Wilson, both of Eastland; Wilson Guest, Joe Dennis, Lester Crossley and B. A. Tunnell, all of Ranger; and John H. Webb, Wilson McGlasson, R. L. Ponsler, James McCracken and Jerry Sitten, all of Cisco. Reasoning that once persons realized the importance of the jet to America's defenses, and going under the assumption that people are frightened by sounds they do not understand, these county delegates received complete facts about sonic booms.

Still you might ask, "What are

sonic booms?" These men were told they are man-made thunder caused by shock waves from aircraft flying faster than sound.

More detailed, the delegates learned that shock waves, or sound waves, are the results of surges in energy. An airplane, at speeds in excess of the exact speed of sound, pushes and piles up air particles to a point where there is a considerable change in air pressure. This change in air pressure en-

Many Still Eligible Under War Orphan Bill

One third of the eligible young people are failing to take advantage of the War Orphans Education Act due to a misunderstanding of the law, Edward P. Onstot, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas, estimates.

Onstot says there are three major misconceptions: (a) Many of the eligible young people fail to think of themselves as orphans while one parent is still living. But the law regards the children of a parent who died from a war-time service-connected injury or illness as orphans even with the other parent alive.

(b) Eligible children who have married oftentimes consider themselves no longer eligible for the educational privileges. Yet marriage has no bearing upon eligibility under the War Orphans Education Act.

(c) Some eligible children believe that they may pursue training only at the college level under this law. Onstot pointed out that institutional training may be pursued for various occupations in the vocational and technical field.

Furthermore, an otherwise eligible orphan who serves in the Armed Forces for a period preceding his 23rd birthday may still take advantage of the provisions of the War Orphans Education Act within five years after his first release or discharge and prior to his 31st birthday.

Appeals Court Refuses Advice To Dallas Board

Eastland's 11th Court of Civil Appeals Friday refused any legal advice to the Dallas School Board. The Court dismissed an appeal by the Dallas board, upholding the trial court, which said it had no jurisdiction. The School Board plans to appeal to the Supreme Court.

Two Named As Department Heads By Cornelius For New Printing Firm

Victor Cornelius has announced the appointment of Carl C. Garner and Darwin L. Miller as department heads of his Theatrical Advertising Company and Menu Service.

Since the acquisition of the Oment Menu Service of Waco and its removal to Eastland early this year the demands upon the facilities have been increased. The printing facilities have been "departmentalized" into letterpress and offset. Garner will assume supervision of the letterpress department. All printing and press work of this type will be under his supervision. Miller will be in charge of the offset printing department which includes the photo engraving department and all phases of lithography both in the Theatrical Advertising and Menu Companies.

Garner has had service as a printer on Oil Belt newspapers including the Eastland Telegram and Ranger Times. Throughout his

circles the airplane in the shape of a cone, which the airplane drags along with it. The smallest part of the cone is near the front of the airplane as the airplane flies faster than sound. The cone gets larger as it trails farther behind the airplane.

As long as the airplane is flying supersonically, or faster than sound, it drags along this cone of pressure waves. These waves spread out like a cone in all directions—up, down, and to each side—exerting a pressure pulse as they pass. As the lower edge of the cone is dragged along the ground this pressure pulse is heard as a boom.

Just as the average person would do, the Eastland County delegates were quick to point out they had a better understanding of the booms, but they were also quick to ask why they were necessary.

They were told: "The next war—if there is one—will be supersonic. If our airmen are to fight supersonically, they must train supersonically. When they fly supersonically, they create sonic booms. Thus, sonic booms are part of the sound of security."

It was pointed out that sonic booms are not accidents caused by jet pilots doing something they are not supposed to be doing. Sonic booms are natural products of supersonic flight by airmen intent on preventing a would-be aggressor from doing something he shouldn't be doing. Today a plane doesn't need to go into a dive to break the sound barrier. The Air Force has numerous models of interceptors capable of flying supersonically straight and level and creating sonic booms.

It was pointed out that the higher an airplane flies, the smaller the boom. The Air Force admits possible glass breakage. When a B-58 flies at 40,000 feet booms sound like distant thunder and cause no damage. When the plane drops to 30,000 feet the booms sound like close-range thunder and may possibly break some window panes. And when the plane drops to 20,000 feet it creates pressure of about three pounds per square foot, and these booms sound like an explosion and may possibly break large plate-glass windows.

The Air Force maintains, however, that scientists and engineers have concluded that the booms do not cause structural damage.

Rosemary Jones Is Member of TCU Band

Miss Rosemary Jones of Eastland, a freshman at Texas Christian University this fall, is a new member of the school's famous Horned Frog Band.

Forty-nine new members were added to the band this fall, with the total personnel now at 116, according to director Jim Jacobsen. The marching band, labeled the "Show Window of TCU," is in its 54th year. It is being put through its paces on parade this season by Head Drum Major John Tatum of Wichita Falls and Assistant Drum Major Danny Coulson of Fort Worth. Also featured with the band are two twirlers and six drum majorettes.

President of the organization this year is Arthur Dervaes of Tampa, Fla.

Final Rites for Rev. Collings Held Saturday

Rev. Jesse L. Collings, 81, father of Judge Cecil Collings of Eastland, died Thursday at 9:20 p.m. in Dublin. Funeral services were held Saturday morning at 10 in the Hamner Funeral Home Chapel in Eastland, and burial was in Elwood Memorial Cemetery in Abilene at 3 p.m.

Rev. Collings was born July 3, 1878 in Hood County. He was a retired Primitive Baptist preacher, having pastored churches in Abilene, Chalk Mountain, Stephenville, DeLeon and Fort Worth.

He organized and served as editor and publisher of the Primitive Baptist Sentinel at Glen Rose and also edited the Glen Rose Reporter for 20 years. He founded the Sentinel in 1910.

Miller was born and raised in Eastland and was graduated from Eastland schools. He is a veteran of three years with the Marine Corps. Much of his time is devoted to youth activities and he is active in Little League baseball. He and his wife, the former Dolores Rushing, have one son, Mike. Miller has been with the Cornelius Company 11 years.

Albany will probably be in the same district next season, and both teams have young ball clubs.

The two teams put on a defensive battle in the first quarter, with Albany getting just three first downs and Eastland none. The Mav 36 was the closest point the visitors reached in that period and the Mavericks never did get out of their end of the field.

Albany started a drive from the Mav 49 after a short punt in the last seconds of the first quarter, and in 14 plays marched to a touchdown in the second period of play. Eastland almost held for downs on the two yard line, but big Gene Gray got a yard and a first down in three tries, then blasted over from that point on first down. The extra point try failed.

Minutes later an Eastland back fumbled the pigskin on the Mav 19 and Charles Woodward, who played quarterback on offense and tackle on defense, snared the ball for the Lions. It took just three plays for the visitors, with Harold Durham getting the final six around his own right end. Woodward kicked the extra point this time.

Eastland's nightmare wasn't over yet, however. Buddy Moser went back to punt on fourth down on his own 36. The entire center of the Lion line blocked the punt and Albany came up with the ball on Eastland's 11. It took four plays from there, with Woodward passing to Durham for the final 13 yards, after a five yard penalty set the Lions back for a moment. Woodward again converted.

Finally the hectic quarter ended and the halftime ceremonies came. Then a fired up Eastland team shot out of the dressing room and got back into the ballgame.

Eastland held for downs following the second half kickoff, then took the ball on the Albany 49 and marched to the six before they ran out of downs. After an exchange of punts, the Mavs found themselves on their own 30. James Lewis then got off another of his sensational kicks, this time a 61 yard quick kick which sailed to the Albany nine yard line. At that point two unidentified Mavs snapped the ball out of an Albany lad's hands and the Mavs came up with it. It took four plays, with Mickey Garner passing to Buddy Moser for the touchdown.
