National Peanut Acreage Set For 1960 By USDA

The Agricultural Department announced Tuesday a 1960 national peanut acreage allotment of 1, 610,000 acres, the minimum al lowed under law.

The department also said pea nut growers will vote in a refer endum no later than Dec. 15 to decide whether they will accept marketing quotas for 1960, 1361 and 1962. Approval would require a two-

thirds vote of those voting. If approved, those peanut farmers who comply with acreage allotments would be eligible for price supports of not less than 75 per cent of parity. If rejected, the price supstress in the work this year is to ports would be at 50 per cent of

Whether or not marketing quotas are approved in the referendum, the 1960 crop peanut acreamits. The latest estimate indicated age allotments will remain in efeligibility for price support.

The law provides that marketing quotas must be equal to the werage quality of peanuts harvested for nuts during the prevnational acreage allotment of at states. east 1,610,000 acres. In determining the marketing
