### National Peanut Acreage Set For 1960 By USDA

The Agricultural Department announced Tuesday a 1960 national peanut acreage allotment of 1,610,000 acres, the minimum allowed under law.

The department also said peanut growers will vote in a referendum no later than Dec. 15 to decide whether they will accept marketing quotas for 1960, 1961 and 1962.

Approval would require a two-thirds vote of those voting. If approved, those peanut farmers who comply with acreage allotments would be eligible for price supports of not less than 75 per cent of parity. If rejected, the price supports would be at 50 per cent of parity for those who comply.

Whether or not marketing quotas are approved in the referendum, the 1960 crop peanut acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for price support.

The law provides that marketing quotas must be equal to the average quality of peanuts harvested for nuts during the previous five years. However, the quota must be sufficient to provide a national acreage allotment of at least 1,610,000 acres.

In determining the marketing quota for the 1960 crop, a normal yield of 1,160 pounds an acre was used. This yield, or about 1,610,000 acres, results in the 1960 marketing quota of 334,000 tons.

If the minimum allotment provision of the law was not in effect, the marketing quota for 1960 would be 720,000 tons and the resulting national acreage allotment would be 1,241,000 acres.

The 1960 acreage allotments by states and the comparable 1959 allotments included:

Texas 356,022 acres for 1959 and 356,032 for 1959; New Mexico 4,296 and 4,222; and Oklahoma 138,058 and 137,964.

### Texas Boys Receive Red Carpet Welcome

Terry Treadwell, a seventh grade student at Eastland Junior High School and 22 more Texas boys of junior-senior high school age landed in the nation's capitol Thursday night and prepared to invade FBI headquarters.

The hallmark of the world-famous crime fighting organization has been the target of the Lone Star state for several weeks, the youngsters competing for the honor of joining the invasion force.

An essay contest on the subject, "Why I Would Like To Be An FBI Agent," was started last month in 23 Texas cities, and the youths who arrived at Washington National Airport are the winners.

Their objectives is to see what makes an FBI agent tick, and there will be no barricades in their path because FBI Chief J. Edgar

Hoover has ordered a "red carpet" welcome at his headquarters post. In fact, the youngsters even will visit the FBI training quarters at the U. S. Marine Corps base in Quantico, Va.

A conducted tour will include the various crime detection departments at headquarters and Hogan's Alley at Quantico, where FBI agents are trained in the physical aspects of taking criminals.

Inspiration for the contest, which made it possible for the boys to participate in the memorable trip, was the new Warner Brothers motion picture, "The FBI Story," which traces the life of a typical young agent through his career as well as home life. The star of the picture, James Stewart, shares with Hoover the conviction that one of the best crime prevention methods is the proper training of youth.

Stewart has devoted much time to the Boy Scouts. He is the first actor to be elected a member of the Executive Board of the Los Angeles Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America. Last year he won the highest scouting honor, the Silver Buffalo.

Stewart was highly in favor of the FBI-movie contest and believes it is a public service to bring so many youngsters to the nation's capitol for a visit to FBI headquarters.

Four executives of the Interstate Theatre Circuit in Texas, who conducted the contest with leading newspapers in 23 Texas cities, have accompanied the lads as chaperones. They will visit other points of interest in Washington, including many that are contained in "The FBI Story," which was written by newspaperman Don Whitehead, two-time Pulitzer Prize-winner. The general sight-seeing tour will include the Capitol, the White House, the Lincoln Memorial, Mount Vernon, Arlington Cemetery, the Marine Museum and the Museums of Natural History and of Science and Industry.

The party will return to Dallas via airplane Sunday.

### Game Violators Now to be Tried In County Courts

AUSTIN — All future game violation cases, involving the forfeiture of hunting or fishing licenses, will be filed in county court, according to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The higher courts have held that a justice of the peace is without jurisdiction to try prosecution wherein money penalty and option or forfeiture of license are both involved. Accordingly, instructions have gone out to all wardens to take these cases to county court.

Cases still may be filed in justice court where no license is involved, such as an arrest for fishing with a rod and reel in a home county without a license.

Several counties in Texas already have been filing cases under county court law, according to the director.


