Nighty Cisco Picked to Slaughter Mavs

Locals Say They'll Show Up for Game

Coach Carrol Shelton announced today that the Eastland Mavericks definitely will show up for the Friday night game with the mighty Cisco Lobos. The game, a District 7-AA encounter, matches a team which has yet to win in district warfare, against an untested, state-ranked eleven.

The Lobos, after blasting Ranger, 64-18 last week will be heavily favored to give Eastland a dose of the same medicine. Coach Zac Henderson's squad has rolled up 310 points in winning seven ballgames, and the Lobos have given up just a meager 70 points.

That the Mavs are going to show up will be news in some corners of the district. Sports writers around the state are rating the game as "no contest" and it's obvious that the Lobos aren't

a tackle, and Jimmy McElreath, senior halfback. Neither boy is expected to see much action. McElreath got to play one down in the Winters game.

Cisco will be at full strength in the game. The Lobos have probably the best all-around backfield in Class AA, and have a good line. Charles Lipsey, called the "Galloping Ghost," leads all West Texas scorers with 126 points to his credit. That's more points than the entire Eastland team has scored. And Lipsey has a lot of help. Duane Hale, who has 64 points to his credit, is rated the hardest running back in the conference. Then there are Delbert Schaefer and Jimmy Martin to round out the backfield. Martin played football for Eastland in his sophomore year. He lettered for the Mavs then, and he's a standout for the Lobos this year as a senior.

Coach Henderson is spending more time trying to get his Lobos in the proper mental attitude than he is getting them ready for the Mavs. Cisco is eyeing the Coleman district game and the Stamford regional tilt.

Cisco will have advantage of playing in Cisco. They will also be trying to keep their victory string against the Mavs intact. Eastland hasn't downed Cisco since 1953, when the Mavs won, 7-0. Cisco won last year, 28-6. The Lobos won, 21-18 in 1957; 27-26 in 1956; 33-13 in 1955 and 51-12 in 1954.

Coach Shelton, still faced with huge injury, has announced that his starting team Friday will have Don Wilson and Philip Lewis at ends, Bill Jones and Billy Moylan at tackles, John Wilson and Marvin Agnew at guards, Don Hazard at center, Mickey Garner at quarterback, James Lewis at fullback, and John Stroud and Buddy Moser at the halfback slots.

It was learned Wednesday that Martin Day, starting end who was injured in the Winters game, actually has a bone broken in his foot. His foot has been placed in a cast and he will be out of action for the rest of the year probably.

County Savings Bonds Sales at 70% of Goal

Savings Bonds sales during September totaled \$28,031. In Eastland County, Guy Parker chairman of the Eastland county Savings Bonds Committee, announced today that sales for the first nine months of 1959 were \$381,817 or 70 per cent of the yearly goal.

E and H bond sales in Texas amounted to \$115,170,663 during the first nine months of this year. This figure represents 63 per cent of the yearly sales goal.

"The new improved interest rates on E and H bonds will aid thousands of Americans who are already buying savings bonds and will help induce others to purchase the new 'best ever' savings Bond," Parker pointed out. "All bonds purchased since June 1 of this year now earn an attractive 3-3/4 per cent interest when held to maturity and old bonds earn at least 1/2 per cent more than before. Considering the safety, ease of purchase and the new attractive interest rate savings are truly the 'best buy ever,'" Parker concluded.

Twenty Eastland Boys Will Tour Hardin-Simmons

Four men and 20 boys from the First Baptist Church of Eastland will attend a Texas Baptist Royal Ambassador rally at Hardin-Simmons University Nov. 7.

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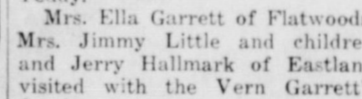

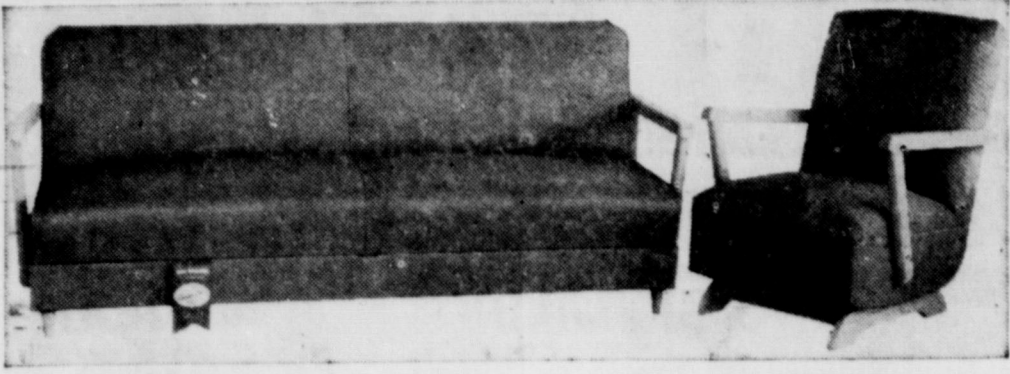

What Do You Know About Bread?

In recent years much has been said and written about bread, particularly by food faddists, and much of it is false. Here are some questions and answers to set the record straight. They present facts obtained from authoritative sources.

Does bread belong in the reducing diet? Definitely. Almost all professional prescribed reducing diets include bread. It is a food for energy and health and supplies vitamins and minerals necessary for proper nutrition.

Is white bread low in nutrition? No. Any elements lost in milling are replaced through the enrichment process. Because of enrichment with essential vitamins, white bread is equal in nutritional value with whole wheat bread, according to leading authorities.

Is bread important in a balanced diet? The United States Department of Agriculture in developing the "seven basic food groups" essential to a balanced diet gives bread a prominent place.

The contribution of enriched white bread to the nutritional health of America was well summed up by Dr. W. W. Bauer, Director of Health Education for the American Medical Association. "Recent years have seen a remarkable improvement in the nutritional health of Americans," Dr. Bauer said. "Much of this improvement has been credited to the enrichment of white bread, that tasty, beautifully textured bread on every table in America at every meal. Before this enrichment, nutritional deficiencies were widespread among our people. Today, physicians do not see them any more."

Is bread a good calcium source? Yes. Bread is second only to milk among common foods as a source of calcium, the mineral so vital for bone strength and so valuable to general well being.

Do growing children need bread? Yes. They need it for its calcium; for its tissue-building protein; for its important vitamins and minerals. Children's frequent requests for bread are a natural expression of this need of their bodies.

Is bread a good food bargain? Yes. At current prices, ten cents worth of bread daily supplies about one-third of the daily needs for protein, one-fourth of an office worker's daily calorie needs, a good percentage of the daily requirements of thiamine, riboflavin, niacin and iron, and traces of other vitamins and minerals.

How does today's bread compare with the bread grandma made? The one big advantage of grandma's bread was that you could smell it baking. But bread baked at home did not provide as much nutrition as modern baker's bread. Today's loaf contains more milk, more vitamins, more shortening and yeast, and more calcium and iron.
