Dale Troutt Is Guest Speaker At Meeting of Thursday Club

Dale Troutt was guest speaker for the Thursday Afternoon Club when it met Dec. 3 for the regular meeting. Mrs. E. R. Townsend was the leader for the program, "Our Hands In Welfare and Health."

Mrs. Iral Inzer introduced Troutt, the administrator of the Eastland Memorial Hospital. He spoke on "Eastland Hospital Facilities." He said that he hospital has above average facilities. He gave the example of the large x-ray machine and the large operating rooms. He also said that it was served by several good doctors and that it was important that the employees enjoy their work and that they all get along with each other in the hospital. He compared the rising costs in the hospitals today as to that of ten years ago. It is said that the cost per day in staying in the hospital averages \$32 to the \$18 ten years ago.

Mrs. E. R. Townsend, in speaking on "The Critical Shortage of Nurses", said that the need of nurses is as old as pain itself; but as a profession it is only about 100 years old. She said that today many colleges and universities offer nursing courses. It is more attractive all the time. It is a very interesting and satisfying career. It is a career that can be taken any place in the world. There are ever increasing duties dedicated to the nurses, formerly done by doctors. There is a great need for more nurses due to the increase in population. All indications are that more and more nurses will be needed.

"Is American Youth Physically and Mentally Fit?" was the subject of Mrs. Harold Bulgerin. She said that American youths are weak in dexterity. They do not have exercise due to car pools and no wood-chopping. Americans need to step up physical education. They need to stress development of youth's body. She also stated that there is a new type of doctor being developed, the teenage specialist.

Mrs. B. W. Patterson was in charge of the Health Career Posters. Mrs. Inzer, the president,

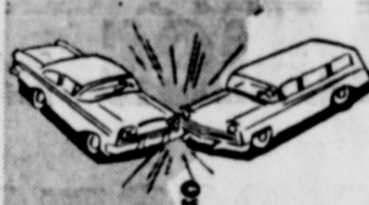
