111 Violent Deaths Predicted in Texas During Holidays

One hundred and eleven per-
sons will die violently in Texas
traffic accidents during the forth-
coming Christmas - New Years
holiday if predictions released to-
day by the Texas Department of
Public Safety hold true.

The ominous forecast came
from Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr.
Director of the Department of
Public Safety, for a 12 day period
extending from 12:01 a.m. Dec.
23, through 11:59 p.m. Jan. 3.

The 111 predicted motor-
icides are included in an estimate made
by Department Statistician N. K.
Woerner, which indicates that 209
persons will die in violence during
the period. The breakdown is as
follows: Motoricides 111; homicides
and suicides 47; accidental deaths
non-traffic, 42; grand total 200.

Colonel Garrison named several
reasons for the prediction that
this years holiday period will be
one of the most deadly for Texas
motorists in several years.

"This Christmas-New Year's
holiday is expected to be one of
the most dangerous for drivers
that we have experienced for some
time. Not only is the holiday peri-
od in the number of days it cov-
ers, but this has been a prosperous
year for drivers and more cars are
on the road.

"This year's accident rate is
running considerably ahead of that
of last year and we can naturally
expect this trend to carry through-
out the holidays. One other factor
adds to our dim forecast. Both
Christmas Day and New Year's
day fall on Friday, making two
extra long weekends within the
holiday period.

"The best I can say is that I
hope we are wrong. We can be
wrong if Texas motorists will take
common sense precautions in driv-
ing."

ly furnish a large portion of the
winter pasturage are a failure this
winter due to a lack of fall rain.
Small grain of course like our
cool season grass has not yet got
its roots down to subsoil mois-
ture.

As a result overgrazing of
rangeland at this time can be ex-
tremely hazardous to the conser-
vation of both grass and land.
The successful conservation ranch-
er knows that he can never afford
to run out of grass. He also knows
he must keep the good grass litter
he has on the land on through the
winter until next spring to absorb
the heavy rain to be expected each
spring. Even though we have some
subsoil moisture the odds are
against enough rain and warm
weather before next spring for
much grass or small grain growth.
Only the forage now on the land
is all that can be depended upon.

Examination and clipping tests
in this vicinity show that ranges
which were deferred or stocked
relatively light last summer still
have enough forage on the land
to winter some livestock and still
keep the cover needed on the land.

Ranges which were overgrazed
last spring and summer barely
have the cover needed for the pro-
tection of the soil. Many spots do
not have enough cover to allow
moisture penetration when the
next rain comes. Continued over-
grazing of these ranges can only
be at the expense of the land and
next summers grass production.

won the grand championship with
an entry of Wichita pecans, a
hybrid developed by L. D. Rom-
berg at the U. S. Pecan Station,
Brownwood. The reserve cham-
pionship went to J. H. Womack,
De Leon, with another Romberg
hybrid, as yet unnamed.

been throughout the past year.
The little ladies manage to men-
tion that they could, if old Santa
were to bring one down the
chimney, use a new fur coat this
year. The old cloth thing is some-
thing one shouldn't be seen in.

I guess the Christmas season is
actually the best season of the
year. People seem to act a little
more like human beings at Christ-
mas time than in some other sea-
sons of the year.

Of course Christmas has been
over commercialized in America
but that doesn't alter the fact
that this is supposed to be the
occasion for remembrance of the
birth of the King of Kings and
the Savior of mankind.

Christmas is a religious holiday,
but we Americans don't always
act like it. We sometimes act
as if it were a pagan feast day,
which is actually what a lot of
us make of it. But it should be
a time of thanksgiving to God
and in prayer to Him, but a lot
of us have too painful a hangover
to give God thanks, and to praise
His name.

We Americans really observe
two Christmases all in one. We
have one for the kids when we

A lot of things we observe in
Christmas are just as pagan as an

justification of it. The theory of

giving gifts to the Christ child
setting a precedent is, I think, a
falsity. The wise men didn't

That seems to me to make a dif-
ference.

But Christmas time is a good time for preachers to do their best. Many times a lot of the congregation turns out at Christmas who haven't been out since Mother's Day. Most preachers aren't scared by a face in the audience; they like it. But there are times within the year that some of a preacher's flock shows up for church service who haven't been there in six months.

It is now nearing Christmas time and we all are thinking of baking cakes for the Holiday season. Here is a recipe for a dark fruit cake which you might like to add to your recipe collection.

- 1 lb. grapefruit peel or citron
- 1 lb. pecans or black walnuts
- 1/2 lb. almonds, if desired
- 1 lb. candied pineapple
- 1 lb. candied cherries
- 3 lb. seeded raisins or currants
- 1 1/2 lb. figs, dates, or apricots
- 1/2 lb. butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup fruit juice or sweet pickle juice
- 1 cup brown sugar (well-packed)
- 6 eggs
- 4 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon cloves
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon allspice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Wash and dry raisins or currants. Cut grapefruit peel, candied pineapple and other fruit in half inch cubes. Leaves cherries and nuts whole. Sift flour and spices. Cream butter or margarine and sugar in another container. Add beaten egg yolks to fat mixture. Mix a small amount of the flour mixture with raisins and dates to keep them from sticking together. Add flour mixture alternately with fruit juices to the creamed fat mixture. Add fruits and nuts. Mix thoroughly. Add beaten egg whites.

Grease pans. Line with brown paper to fit pan, and extend one inch above pans. Grease paper. Pack batter firmly into pans with hands to 1/2 inch of top of pan. Cover top of cake with waxed paper and place pan of water in oven under cakes. Bake in 250 degree F. oven. Bake a 1 lb. cake 2 to 2 1/2 hours; a 2 lb. cake 3 1/2 hours; a 3 pound cake four hours. Remove waxed paper from top of cake during last 15 minutes of baking.

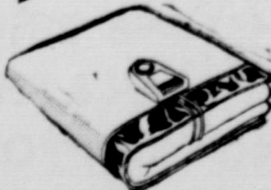

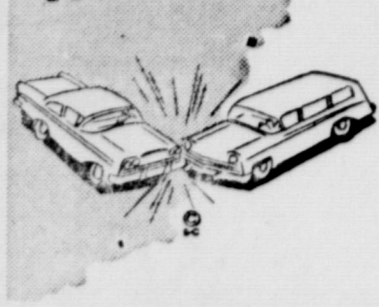
