FROM JETS TO OXCARTS

Mrs. Murrell Finds Many Ways to Travel

(Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of articles written for the Telegram by Mrs. Helen Murrell, who has just returned from an extended visit in Spain.)

By MRS. HELEN MURRELL

From Dallas to New York in the new Jet 707 in less than three hours, when it took four hours from here to Dallas, by train. Unbelievable, but true. This, however, is just a small part of the varieties of transportation experienced before I returned from six weeks in Southern Europe, and North Africa.

Ox-cart and wicker - basket sledge on Madeira; train and horse-carriage in Spain; minute taxis and more horse-carriages in Palma, Mallorca; Mercedes-Benz and Alfa-Romero automobiles in Italy; up-to-date buses in France and not-so-up-to-date buses in North Africa. From Jet to ox-cart. The only thing available which I didn't ride, were the many looking camels and the very small burros from which my feet would have surely touched the ground.

These small beasts with legs and feet so very small, look about the right size for a 4-year-old child and yet they carry and pull incredible loads. It is nothing in both Morocco and in Spain to see one piled so high and wide with produce, sticks, etc., that it is impossible to see any part of him except the tiny feet and perhaps six or eight inches of leg. On top of all this will be sitting a man or, as I saw several times, a woman with child or children. The women ride side-saddle (no saddle) and without any visible means of holding on, nurse their babies with the nonchalance of the old rocking chair routine.

Post Office Has Ideal Gift for Late Shoppers

If you are searching for that ideal last-minute Christmas gift, the Eastland post office has the answer — an attractive gift book containing United States Savings Stamps.

"While everyone looks to us to do his Christmas mailing, few people think of us as suppliers of gifts," Postmaster Marene Johnson told The Telegram today. "Actually, we've been in the business for some years now with Savings Stamps, and they're an ideal gift."

The gift books come in two sizes. The \$2.50 version contains ten 25-cent Savings Stamps; the \$5.00 size has 20 stamps. These are the same Savings Stamps many youngsters have been buying all year on their weekly School Stamp Days.

"We not only sell the gift stamp books," Mrs. Johnson said, "we give without charge a handy album in which to keep the stamps. When you have the album full, you can take it to a bank and exchange it for an interest-bearing United States Savings Bond. It will pay you at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent compounded semi-annually, when held for the full term of seven years and nine months."

In addition to the gift books, the Post Office sells individual Savings Stamps, ranging in size from 10 cents to \$5.00. Savings Bonds can be purchased at most banks and many savings and loan associations.

and its fine, man-made harbor, is not an old city. It was established not too many years ago by the French. The harbor is large and busy even though originally there was no natural harbor at all. A series of rock and concrete breakwater barriers, set at just the right angles, allow the large ocean going liners to dock right at the city's edge.

Up the west coast of Africa and across the narrowest part of the Atlantic to the Spanish seaport of Cadiz. Here is an ancient city, on a small peninsula which was, until quite modern times, an island. This is an old and brooding town. The ancient seawall, built before the occupation of the Romans, is still in use. The old fortifications along the wall are still standing but not in use. Here is the southernmost tip of Spain which has been a target for invasion since man first ventured across the narrow strip of water between there and North Africa. Here one can take a horse-drawn carriage around the city or a taxi to the heart of town. The cathedral stands in drab grandeur, overlooking the sea. However, a sight of real beauty is a parkway along the sea drive. Here are palms, flowers, beautiful wrought-iron fences and cedar-type trees trimmed into fantastic shapes.
