Little known facts about Texas boundaries.

A PUBLIC SERVICE OF THE TEXAS ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OFFICE.

(Editor's Note: This is the eleventh in a series of articles outlining the numerous boundary conflicts dating back to 1716, pointing up little known facts which shaped the Texas of today.)

Rivers usually flow along in a series of loops rather than a straight line.

The Rio Grande is no exception. In times of flood the river will cut straight ahead, rejoining the channel further down stream, leaving an exposed loop which becomes a dry bed.

Inside this loop is a plot of dry ground, which has, by action of the river, changed its position from one side of the river to the other. These tracts of land are called "Bancos."

"These 'bancos' created even more complicated legal questions to add to the stockpile of Texas boundary disputes," Attorney General Will Wilson comments.

In 1836 the Republic of Texas fixed the boundaries along the principal stream of the Rio Grande. The Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo in 1848 fixed the boundary as the middle of the Rio Grande following the deepest channel.

The changing of the river channel began to pose real problems and in another treaty in 1854 it was agreed that any bancos cut off since 1852 by the river should remain part of the original nation.

"This meant that parts of the United States were south of the river and parts of Mexico were north of the river."

This naturally did not work so another treaty eliminated all present and future bancos and fixed the line between the two nations along the deepest channel of the streams. The 58 bancos remaining on the north side of the Rio Grande went to the United States.

The International Boundary Commission is directed to set monuments in the abandoned beds of the river where the boundaries of the bancos could be clearly

defined.

Private Mexican landowners continued to own land even when it moved north of the river. In Mexico the government owns all the minerals while in Texas the landowners control the minerals.

By a 1922 statute, the Federal Government ceded jurisdiction over the bancos and provided that they be a part of the State of Texas.

The heart of controversy is this: Because the act did not specifically state what happens to the ownership of the minerals under the bancos it appears, in the light of the Tidelands experience, that another three way battle looms between the Federal government, the State of Texas and the Mexican landowners over the minerals under the bancos.

The General Land Office reports that none of the bancos have been leased by the state for minerals in view of the uncertainty of the title.

The Texas portion of the river bed has been leased, but not the bancos.

Oil drilling along the Rio Grande will eventually force a decision regarding mineral rights.

**Holiday Period Expected to be Deadliest Yet**

With the 12-day Christmas-New Year's holiday opening Dec. 23, Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety has issued a special warning to rural motorists.

Garrison pointed out that this holiday period is expected to become one of the deadliest in several years for Texas motorists. To overcome the threat, he said every driver must accept his responsibility to drive in accordance with traffic laws and other rules of safety.

The Texas Department of Public Safety earlier had announced that it would start counting motor-icides and all other violent deaths in Texas at 12:01 a.m. Dec. 23. The count period will end at 11:59 p.m. Jan. 3.

Throughout this period every available patrolman of the Texas DPC will work overtime to regulate traffic on our highways and make every effort to prevent traffic accidents.

Garrison warned rural drivers of the increased dangers of holiday driving and called their attention to the fact that farm-to-market roads and ranch roads will be used more than normal during the period.

"During this holiday motorists will have two long weekends in which to make trips. We have other indications that there will be more driving than usual during this holiday period.

"We wish to call upon rural motorists to use extra caution in all their driving this yuletide. Be extra careful in entering a highway from a side road or private drive, and observe the signs erected for your protection, especially at areas under construction."

The department expects a death count of 111 motor-icides for the 12 days of Christmas and New Year's and a total of 200 violent deaths including other accidental deaths, homicides and suicides.

Garrison has promised Texas motorists that every available effort will be made to keep our highways safe. He said every available man and law enforcement tool, including radar, will be used through the day and night in this vigil. But he charged drivers themselves with the major responsibility.

He said, "Common sense driving practices can prevent traffic accidents, and it is the moral and legal responsibility of every driver to operate his vehicle in a safe manner. Only with the full cooperation of motorists can we hope to prevent motor-icides during this yuletide season."
