New Auto Insurance Plan Is Explained

AUSTIN (Special) — Approximately 73 percent of Texas motorists have had spotless driving records for the past three years. When this is related to insured automobiles, 57 percent of the insured automobiles will qualify for at 20 percent reduction on their automobile insurance when the Texas Safe Driving Insurance Plan becomes effective January 1, according to a statement issued today by Penn J. Jackson, Chairman, State Board of Insurance.

An analysis of the records of 40,365 Texas drivers showed that 88.5 percent of the drivers were not convicted of moving traffic violation offenses during the same period. The study also disclosed that 72.92 percent of all drivers had neither motor vehicle offenses nor accidents in their records.

"The vast majority of Texas drivers will be looking forward with great enthusiasm to this new Plan which puts the burden of insurance costs on the careless driver, while giving a just and fair reward to those who have not had accidents or convictions. The Texas Safe Driving Insurance Plan was adopted after repeated requests from State motorists who felt that their safe driving records, and the safe driving records of the other members of their family, entitled them to a reduction in their insurance rates," Jackson said.

The Safe Driving Insurance Plan applies to all automobiles eligible for insurance under the Family Automobile Policy and provides for a 20 percent discount from the regular insurance rates when each member of the household has driven without an accident or a conviction for a moving traffic violation for the past three years.

Insurance Plan four points are assigned for convictions of any of the following moving traffic law violations:

1. Driving while intoxicated;
2. Hit and run;
3. Negligent homicide involving a motor vehicle.

One point is assigned for other moving traffic violations, but no points are assigned for defective lights, defective mufflers, parking violations and other relatively minor offenses.

Basically two points are assigned for each accident involving \$25 damage to property or the injury of a person. No points are assessed for accidents involving:

1. Medical payments coverage only.
2. Damage to your vehicle while you are legally parked.
3. Accidents for which you have been reimbursed by or on behalf of a person responsible for accident.
4. Accident in which only the other party has been convicted of a moving traffic violation.
5. Rear-end collision in which you have been struck in rear by another vehicle and in which you have not been convicted of moving traffic violation.
6. Hit-and-run accident in which your car is damaged by "hit-and-run" operator if you report the accident to proper authorities within 24 hours.

All companies writing automobile insurance at rates prescribed by the Texas State Board of Insurance must use the Texas Safe Driving Plan when insuring automobiles eligible for the Family Automobile Policy.

Highway 80 Improvements Are Due In Coming Year

A total of \$130,000 in special traffic safety improvement funds has been appropriated to improve Highway 80 between Eastland and Cisco during 1960, Robert J. Milligan, District 23 engineer, has announced.

The money will be used to improve the highway from 0.9 miles east of Cisco east to Hillcrest Street in Eastland, a distance of approximately 6.9 miles. The money is in addition to the regular construction and maintenance program.

At the December meeting of the

State Highway Commission \$540,000 was appropriated exclusively for safety improvements designed to give Texans safer traveling on high traffic volume roads. The new program was formed from an engineering study of accident rates.

Those spots that had high accident rates were set up for work under this program. One hundred sixteen and nine-tenths miles of state and U. S. highways in Dis-

trict 23 will be improved under this program of work.

Narrow pavements will be widened and shoulders improved. Dangerous intersections will be channelized and slick and uneven surfaces leveled up and non-skid surfaces applied.

"We expect to get all work underway on this traffic safety program during the calendar year of 1960," Milligan stated.

Shop the Plentiful Foods in 1960

"I resolve to eat better and more economically in 1960." That could well be the No. 1 New Year's resolution for every Texas homemaker. It makes sense.

How? Here's an idea that will help: Follow the U. S. Department of Agriculture's monthly list of plentiful foods, suggests the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of College Station.

Lower prices usually accompany in-season and abundant food supplies. Wider selection for quality also enters the picture. And when crops are large, quality usually runs higher.

USDA's monthly list is determined by the Agricultural Marketing Service on the basis of expected availability. When the supply of any farm-produced food exceeds normal trade needs, that

GI Policyholders Asked to Check Beneficiaries

GI insurance policyholders, some six million strong, were urged today to check their records to be sure that their designated beneficiaries are up to date.

The law gives GI policyholders the right to change their beneficiaries at any time without the consent of the prior beneficiaries, Onstot, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas said.

But unless the change is officially made, no choice is given to the VA but to pay the claim to the beneficiary of record.

Carelessness in designating beneficiaries may result in undesired consequences, Onstot pointed out. An example is the veteran who designated his wife as beneficiary. She divorced him, and he subsequently married again and raised a family.

Should he neglect to change his designated beneficiary before he dies, his insurance may be paid to his former wife, and his widow and children will receive nothing.

Policyholders also have several different options as to how the insurance shall be paid. Explanation of these options can be obtained by contacting any VA office.

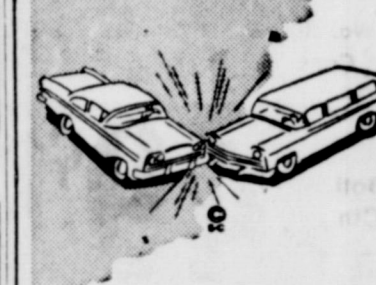

(Continued from Page One) food is eligible for listing. Newspapers, radio stations and the food trade, in general, then cooperate with growers and the USDA in nationwide promotion. Special prices often accompany these efforts.

Start with January: Look for an abundance of eggs. Supplies are increasing, seasonally. Eggs, especially the larger sizes, right now, return a lot of nutrition compared to cost.

Plenty of apples, oranges, raisins and cranberries also are in prospect. Vegetable bins will be loaded with sweetpotatoes, onions and Irish potatoes. Lamb is the only meat on the January list. Then, there'll be an abundance of rice, for economy dishes, and vegetable fats and oils, for salad dressings and all cooking. That's the 11-item list that can help you hold down the cost of feeding your family in January. Keep them in mind all through the month. Serve them often.

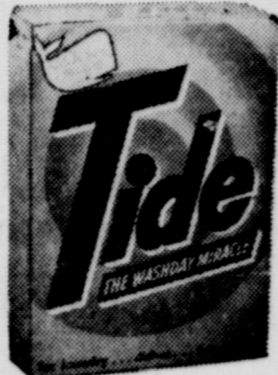

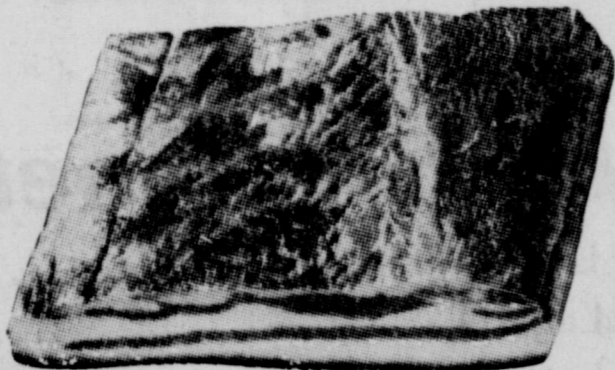

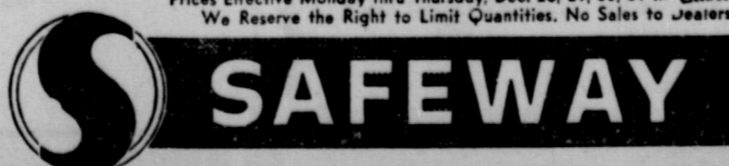

It is then coated with a light coating of slobber and cooked for six and one-half minutes at 380 degrees F. at 35 pounds of pressure.

It is then removed from the broaster, drained and served golden brown and cooked throughout.
