

It seems to us, therefore, that through various media, there should be spotlighted these thoughts:


Concerning the dignity of the individual. Regarding the value of human life.



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
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

Results of the Lay research were publicized as a means of direct aid to Texans personally inrect aid to Texans personally interested in providing cover and food which are the greatest current need for bobwhites.
