### Mobilgas Sets Economy Run

Twenty-two American stock cars, the pride of the nation's automotive industry, will compete in the 1955 Mobilgas Economy Run from Los Angeles to the base of Pikes Peak at Colorado Springs, Colorado.

A. C. Pillsbury, regional director of the American Automobile Association, said the cars will compete as entries from factories, dealer groups and individual dealers who have complied with AAA entry regulations.

Automobiles entered in the Economy Run will include nearly every size, shape and style of 1955 passenger car on American highways today.

For the first time in the history of the run, all competing cars will

be equipped with automatic transmissions. "This ruling recognizes that at least 60 per cent of the passenger cars produced in the United States this year will have such equipment," Pillsbury said.

All entries, he added, will be of a completely stock status, with no extra gadgets which are not available as standard equipment from dealers being permitted.

Cars to compete in the 1955 Mobilgas Economy Run, sponsored by Socony-Vacuum Oil Company and affiliates, Magnolia Petroleum Company and General Petroleum Corporation are now being selected from factory production lines, showrooms and warehouses throughout the country, Pillsbury said.

### POTATOES ITALIAN STYLE

If yours is a family that demands potatoes nearly every meal, probably you are always looking for different ways to serve this staple dish! Here is a new recipe for preparing the Irish potato Italian style!

(Six Servings)

6 medium potatoes  
2 tablespoons margarine  
2 slices diced Canadian-style bacon OR ham  
2 tablespoons chopped parsley  
2 bouillon cubes  
Boiling water

Scrub potatoes well. Pare off a thin strip of skin all around middle of potato. Melt margarine in skillet or saucepan with close-fitting lid. Add bacon or ham and fry gently 5 minutes, stirring several times. Add parsley, then potatoes. Dissolve bouillon cubes in 1 cup boiling water. Pour over potatoes. Add more water, just enough to cover potatoes. Cover pan tightly and simmer 1 1/2 hours, or until potatoes can be pierced easily with fork. If desired, potatoes may be baked in covered container in moderately hot oven (400° F.) 1 1/2 hours. Serve in vegetable dish with sauce, or serve sauce in separate bowl.

(Note: One No. 2 can small potatoes may be used instead of uncooked potatoes. Drain liquid from potatoes, heat and dissolve bouillon cubes in hot liquid. Reduce cooking time to 20 minutes.)

### Fruit Trees Need Early Fertilization

Peach and plum trees will grow-off faster and offer chances for bigger harvests if treated early in the year with a complete fertilizer.

Three-hundred to 400 pounds of 12-12-12 in February or March followed in April by a 300 pound application of 5-10-10 will do the job in an orchard of 70 bearing trees an acre.

Spread four to six pounds of the 12-12-12 mixture around each tree and a like amount of 5-10-10 in April, advises J. F. Rosborough, extension horticultural marketing specialist, of College Station. Scatter the fertilizer in an area from the outer edges of each tree's shade cover to within three or four feet of the trunk. Rosborough says.

Dick the fertilizer into the soil to a depth of three or four inches immediately after application.

A grove of 70 trees an acre needs at least 60 pounds of nitrogen, 80-100 pounds of phosphoric acid and 80-80 pounds of potash yearly. These requirements are met with the above recommendation, the specialist adds.

Rosborough explains that fruit trees need abundant nitrogen early in the season. Heavy applications later, however, may cause excessive terminal growth and delayed ripening of the fruit.

Late April and early May is a critical time in fruit production, he concludes. That's the time when trees develop a fruit crop and set next year's fruiting buds.

### Interest Shown In Quail Habit Improvement

AUSTIN — The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission said Texans are showing "unprecedented" interest in literature dealing with quail habit improvement.

He said reaction to offers of illustrated data describing bobwhite habitat requirements has provided "the most concentrated response to information dealing with wildlife management" during his tenure of office with the commission.

The demonstration, touched off by new Commission efforts to aid landowners and hunters to restore habitat, concerns material based on the long-time observations of Dan Lay of Buna, wildlife biologist in East Texas, who has been heading up efforts to counter the depleting effects of land clearing and drought on the quail population. Results of the Lay research were publicized as a means of direct aid to Texans personally interested in providing cover and food which are the greatest current need for bobwhites. Lay contends this is particularly true in the case of quail which are such prolific breeders.

A typical recent inquiry came from J. L. Jordan of Beaumont who wrote: "My brother-in-law and I have a 1400 acre ranch in Trinity County and are very much interested in improving quail habitat." Shelby Fox of Temple said, "several of us are interested in this (habitat restoration) field."

W. C. Peyton of Longview wrote: "We have a small group of fellows who have to secure some 2,000 acres of East Texas farm and pasture land on which we want to try to raise some extra quail."

Knox T. Johnson wrote from Albuquerque, New Mexico, that he is heading back to East Texas and intends to improve "some depleted hunting grounds." E. O. Moore messaged from Arlington that he wants the literature to inform himself and to share it with a son stationed with the U.S. Navy in Japan, who is interested in game management there.

E. M. Agrelius of Longview wrote: "We are leasing 2000 acres of land to stock with quail. Several creeks, fed by springs, run through the area. We plan to improve the habitat generally."
