# **Bond Sales** Goal Topped

op in Savings Bonds sales in 1959, Shackelford Guy Parker, county chairman, Stephens

Parker announced that county achieved 102.4 percent of its goal of \$545,000. Total sales in the county were \$558,006.

Only three counties in the 29 county Fort Worth Area had ounty achieved 102.4 percent of

sales larger than Eastland County's. They were Taylor, Tarrant Is Announced Wichita counties. And Eastand County was one of just seven counties in the Area which made its goal. Parker said the county had
