National Guard Is Sponsoring Essay Contest

The National Guard Association of the United States will conduct an annual essay contest for senior high school males, according to CWO James Hendrick, administrator for the Cisco National Guard unit.

"In announcing the contest the Association wishes to encourage senior high school students to give a special study to an area of American history, an area emphasizing sacrifices made by Americans to win and preserve the freedom we enjoy," Hendricks said.

The awards, called "George Washington Awards for Young Citizens," will carry cash awards to be used for educational purposes. First prize is \$1,000, second and third prizes \$500 and fourth prize \$250.

Writers from high schools all over the country will compete for the awards.

Subject for the essay this year is "George Washington—Colonel of Militia." Preliminary contests in this area will be conducted at the Cisco National Guard Armory sometime between March 1-13.

Contest rules will be sent to high school seniors before Feb. 10.

Ralph Ross Attends Ford Truck Workshop

Six Research Fellowships In Atomic Energy to be Granted by Foundation

Six research fellowships in atomic energy for graduate students in Texas colleges and universities will be awarded this summer by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corporation, it was announced today by J. B. Thomas, president of Texas Electric Service Company.

Texas Electric Service Company is one of 11 investor-owned electric utility companies operating in Texas who comprise the membership of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

The recipients of the six research fellowships will work under the direction of General Atomic scientists on the controlled nuclear fusion research program being jointly sponsored by General Atomic and the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation at the John Jay Hopkins Laboratory for Pure and Applied Science at San Diego, California.

The students will assist in theoretical and experimental research in controlled thermonuclear energy as part of the world's first and largest privately financed program in the use of nuclear fusion for the generation of power and energy. Nuclear fusion is the process responsible for the tremendous power of the hydrogen bomb and the energy in the sun and stars.

This research may eventually lead to the harnessing of the night of the hydrogen bomb for peaceful purposes, including the generation of electric power.

The recipients of the six fellowships will be announced April 1 by a selection committee composed of representatives from Texas educational institutions, General Atomic, and the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. The students will be selected, if possible, from different colleges, but there is no limit on the number of applications which may be filed from any one college. Preference will be given to students with high scholastic standing and with aptitude in experimental, mathematical or theoretical physics.

In order to be considered for a scholarship, a student must in-

tend to continue further graduate studies in a Texas college or university.

Recipients of the fellowships will be paid a regular stipend while working at the General Atomic laboratory.

In announcing the summer research fellowship program, Thomas declared:

"One of the purposes of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation is to aid and foster scientific knowledge in Texas will serve this purpose by bringing into the state some of the knowledge and experience being developed by scientists at General Atomic."

Eddie Munn Rates As Top Freshman Player

Eddie Munn, former cager at Olden High School, is helping lead Howard Payne College freshmen cagers to a top-notch basketball won-lost record this season.

One of the best outside shooters on the team, Munn carries a 3.8 scoring average, and has been a starter throughout the season. He's largely responsible for the Yellow Jacket's good 7-4 season won-lost record, due to his top-flight cage play.

Munn, oddly enough, played his top game of the year at Stephenville, where the Jackets were noed out by Tarleton State College varsity, 52-51, after HPC had led virtually the entire distance.

Pumping in the long, outside shots, the Olden shooter meshed 10 of 16 field goals for an even 20 points, and kept the Payners ahead before erratic play in the final moments led them to their Waterloo.

The Eastland County product actually enrolled at HPC in the fall of 1958. But he was "red-shirted" last season. That is, he didn't see any basketball game play, thus accounting for his freshman eligibility status this season.

While scoring 89 points in nine games this season, Munn has cashed in on 40 of 195 field goals launched for 38.1 per cent accuracy, and has hit nine of 12 free tosses for a good 75 per cent accuracy. He has also pulled down 31 rebounds.

Munn is one of a flock of HPC freshmen who will be shooting for varsity berths come next season. In fact, he saw brief action in two varsity contests this season. "This boy has promise of becoming one of our best shooters,"

Bond Sales Goal Topped

Eastland County went over the top in Savings Bonds sales in 1959, Guy Parker, county chairman, revealed today.

Parker announced that the county achieved 102.4 percent of its goal of \$545,000. Total sales in the county were \$558,006.

Only three counties in the 29 county Fort Worth Area had sales larger than Eastland County's. They were Taylor, Tarrant and Wichita counties. And Eastland County was one of just seven counties in the Area which made its goal.

Parker said the county had sales of \$51,000 during December to put the drive over the top. That placed Eastland County second only to Taylor County in District 13, both percentage-wise and in total sales. There are nine counties in the 13th District.

Statewide, sales totaled \$152,937,812, or 83.8 percent of the state's total bond goal.

During December, Texas Savings Bonds sales were the greatest since March of last year, according to Parker. He attributed that to the recent increase in interest on Series E and H Savings Bonds and to the efforts of "the hundreds of bond volunteers serving on the state and local bond committees."

Last Fall the U.S. Treasury Department raised the interest rates on all E and H Savings Bonds. All Savings Bonds purchased since June 1, 1959 earn 3 3/4 percent and all old bonds earn at least one-half percent more when held to maturity.
