Toni Horton to Represent City As Cowgirl Sweetheart

Toni Horton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Horace E. Horton, and a freshman at Eastland High School, will represent Eastland as cowgirl sweetheart this year at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show.

Friday, Jan. 29, opening day of the Show, has been designated Eastland Day.

Toni has "ranch" in her soul in spite of parents and family with no interest or knowledge of ranching. On their 30 acre lot back of their home and ceramic factory, Toni is constantly adding farm animals and agitating for crops to be planted suitable for use as cattle and horse feed.

Three years ago, after falling in love with the black Angus cattle shown in the Ft. Worth Fat Stock Show, Toni wheedled her grandfather, Jim Horton, into buying three young Angus. She put them in her small pasture, fed and cared for them enthusiastically, and then—entirely on her own—sold them at the Livestock Auction Barn in Eastland. With her profit she bought a registered hereford cow and calf. She is now in the cattle business on a small scale, gradually building up a fine herd.

Toni has two saddle horses which she loves and care for. Since early childhood, she has had many animal pets—everything from a Mexican burro, white geese, dogs, cats, rabbits, chickens, a lamb to several kinds of horses. On any pleasant afternoon she will be found training her horses or feeding and caring for her cattle. She is often assisted by her younger sister, Donna, and her two-year-old brother.

Miss Horton is grooming a 15-month old hereford bull to show in the Eastland County Livestock show in March. Giving her 1,200 pound bull a bath seems all in the course of a day for Toni. She belongs to the Eastland County Posse Anns, well known women's riding club with many trophies to their credit. She is also an active participant in the local Tri-Hi-Y Club. She attended WaNaKa Girls Camp in Colorado for two years and Camp Mystic in Kerrville, for two years—win-

ning honors in equestrian skills and camp craft. She rides for the third year in the Ft. Worth Fat Stock Show and parade and this year as Eastland's Cowgirl Sweetheart.

Trappers Group Is Promised County Aid

Members of the Eastland County Trappers Association appeared before the County Commissioners Court Monday to request more aid in fighting predatory animals and received a sympathetic hearing. Commissioners, who have been paying \$135 a month on the salary of one trapper for the county, agreed to pay an additional \$100 a month on the salary of a second trapper. They also voted to pay \$500 to help pay off the Association's back debt, which has been incurred since August when the second trapper was hired. Some 20 ranchers appeared before the commission. They stated that there is more wildlife now in the county than there has been in the past 10 years. Ranchers told commissioners that their losses of sheep, goats and cattle during the past few years has been "tremendous." Rancher after rancher stood up to tell of his losses. Homer Boyd, who ranches north of Cisco, told of losing 85 kids this year and 160 last year. He also lost 75 lambs and 50 goats. He estimated that his loss alone would total several thousand dollars. Since August the two trappers at work in the county have killed 38 wolves and a number of bobcats. In addition, several ranchers have killed several bobcats and wolves.

bounty of \$5 a head for wolves and \$3 a head for bobcats. The two county trappers are not eligible to receive the bounty, however.

The \$235 the county will contribute monthly will leave \$115 for the Trappers Association to pay. The Association raises money through voluntary contributions. The rest of the cost is paid for with state and federal money. The county will continue to pay the \$235 until June 1, when another meeting with the Association is scheduled. Ranchers estimated that wool and mohair business in Eastland County brings in from half to three-quarters of a million dollars annually. They estimated that the figure could be doubled if kids could be raised without great losses from wolves and bobcats. How many wolves and bobcats are in the county? Ranchers say that's anyone's guess, but Oscar Schaefer's experience should be some mirror. He said 60 bobcats have been killed on his place in the past five years.

An Associated Press story was released about White as follows: "Oscar White of Rising Star is a near approach to the immortal Bill Henderson in Texas A&M College athletics. Henderson, who wound up his string several years ago, lettered in any sport he attempted and was hailed as the nation's most versatile college athlete. White the other night won the heavyweight boxing title of this 4,600-man school. He already had two letters each in football and basketball and one in track. In the latter sport he is on the way to still another numeral. White is an end in football, forward in basketball and a hurdler in track."

White said he planned to see as many of the voters as possible before the May 7th first primary. "I will appreciate the consideration of every voter," he said. "Everyone is invited to examine my record in all respects. If elected, I will make every effort to handle the duties of sheriff in an efficient manner."

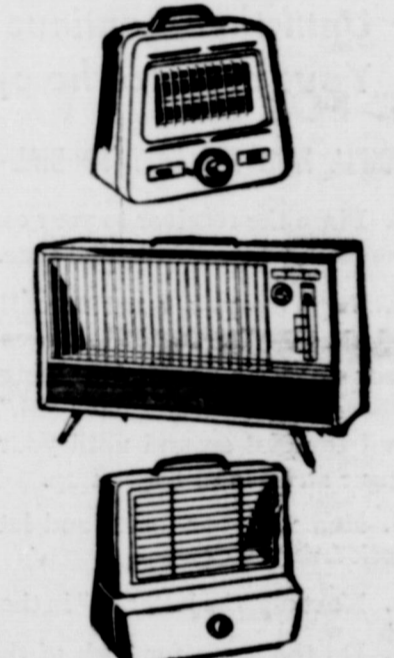

5. Do the same for each of the numerals in order — 9-2-6-9-1.

If you hear the busy signal, or if you hear neither sound, hang up. Wait a few moments, then try the call again.

argument for the high tariffs on foreign-made merchandise.

The American manufacturer says he can't pay the high price demanded of American labor and compete with the foreign product where labor sometimes lives on much less than American labor.

There is some truth in the high-tariff supporters' argument. But before the war I remember one time that congress wanted to put a tariff on automobiles and the automobile industry sent their representatives to Washington asking legislature not to do so as they didn't need a tariff to keep out competition.

This has changed in a few short years. There were so many cars imported in the last few years that the entire American industry has had to take another look at what the American people wanted in the way of a car. The industry had to decide what it was that sold an ugly little 1936-style black bug-looking car with an unfamiliar gear shift arrangement and the engine in the rear. The French looked at it and decided what they saw was good, so they made one for importation into this country that they considered an improvement on the Hitler-inspired car.

Now American manufacturers have come out with "compact" cars. They may have been a little late in getting in production.
