GREENVILLE, Jan. 24 (AP).—Water from the Sabine River was lapping at the doorsteps of the houses in the northeastern portion of Greenville today, as a result of a two-inch rain which covered a large area north and northeast. A regular flood fell in the vicinity of Greenville.

#### Home Demonstration Products Are Large

GREENVILLE, Jan. 24.—The value of products of home demonstration club women in rural communities in Hunt county last year reaches a total of \$220,813.03 according to a report just issued by Miss Myrtle Miller, county home demonstration agent. All of this has been produced by methods approved by the A. & M. College Extension Service and demonstrated by Miss Miller. Chief among the items is food preservation with a total value of \$70,847.96, dairy products are next at \$53,478.32, and poultry third with \$43,686.91. Clothing construction, home and garden both exceeded the total made up by home improvement articles, linens, rugs, baskets and fans.

The Witherspoon test well on section 3, block 32, township 2 south was given a shot yesterday just above the 2300 foot depth. This test is just east of the Taylor-Link producing well.

#### A Few Facts About Viaduct Across Tracks

Here are a few interesting facts concerning the viaduct contract which is to be awarded here March 1st.

The bids will be opened at the office of the county judge at 10:00 a. m., March 1st.

Bids will be for the construction of a reinforced concrete and steel, piers, retaining wall approaches for a highway viaduct across the railway tracks on State Highway No. 9 at Gregg street.

Bids may be submitted for the entire job as a whole, or for any one or more of the following divisions into which the structure is divided for bids.

First Division: Filling for the approaches 5000 cubic yards; excavation 2050 cubic yards; reinforced concrete 2500 cubic yards; concrete handrail 934 lineal feet; reinforcing steel 182,700 pounds; electric light conduit in place 560 lineal feet; brick paving 640 square yards; waterproofing 15,000 square feet.

Second Division: Erection of one 250 foot and one 52 foot steel span, constructing concrete floor, asphalt topping, sidewalks and handrail on spans, and complete electric light installation with quantities approximately as follows: Structural steel, 325 tons, reinforced concrete floor 48 cubic yards, reinforcing steel 7,200 pounds, asphalt topping 144 square yards.

It is understood that the railroad company will furnish the material composing the 250 foot steel trusses but the contractor must furnish the structural steel floors and bracing for the 250 foot span and all other structural steel in the viaduct.

Third Division: Brick paving for the approaches. This will include about 3000 square yards of pavement, and will be constructed after the filled approaches have sufficiently compacted to insure against settlement.

#### Greene Oil Co. Test Progressing

The Greene Oil and Refining Company spudded in their test on the Gunsight ranch in the northern portion of this county on January 21 and drilling is going forward steadily.

#### Humble Oil Co. Makes 2 Locations On Clay Ranch

The Humble Oil and Refining Co. has made locations for two wells in the southeastern portion of this county. These are to be known as No. 1 and No. 2 H. R. Clay. No. 1 is located 330 feet from the west line, and 990 feet from the north line of section 138, block 29, W. & N. W. Railway survey. The location of No. 2 is 330 feet from the south line and 330 feet from the east line of section 138.

Other locations listed are: Group No. 1 Oil Corporation and the Marland Production Company have given notice that they have made a location on section 5, block 32 township 2 south. This location is on the same section as that on which a big producer of the Plymouth Oil Company was recently brought in.

The Moody Oil Corporation has given notice to drill their No. 15 Dora Roberts on section 137, block 29, W. & N. W. survey, in Howard county.

#### 22 Below Zero at Modena, Utah Breaks Record

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 24 (AP).—With the minimum temperature at one degree below zero today, this city experienced the coldest winter recorded here since January, 1924.

At Modena, Utah, recognized as the coldest point in Utah, the mercury dropped to twenty-two degrees below zero this morning. This is the coldest January day ever recorded here.

#### Woman Exerts Domineering Influence

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 24 (AP).—Expanding on testimony that had been given previously before the senate committee, W. B. Graham, former auditor of the State Highway Department today described, Mrs. O. O. Hammonds, confidential secretary of Henry Johnston, suspended Governor of Oklahoma, as exercising domineering influence over the chief executive. Graham testifying before the investigating committee, retold the story that Mrs. Hammonds shook her first in the face of the governor during the conference on the selection of administration choice for Democratic chairmanship of Oklahoma county.

Pat Henry was the governor's choice for this place, Graham testified and Mrs. Hammonds insisted upon the administration supporting George Menshaw, who subsequently was elected.

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 24 (AP).—Dwight Morrow is to return to Mexico City and remain as Ambassador for an indefinite period. This became known today, after he had a conference with President-elect Hoover.

#### Light Snow Reported In Panhandle

PAMPA, Texas, Jan. 24. c.—Falling temperature stopped at 14 degrees here today making the coldest weather of the winter on the north panhandle plains. Light snow fell here last night.

#### Repairs at Depot Will Be Complete Latter Part of Week

According to E. E. Humphries, ticket agent for the Texas and Pacific Railway Company in this city, the repairs on the T. & P. passenger depot will be completed the latter part of this week. The depot has been given a general overhauling, including painting of the exterior and interior woodwork, etc. All of the fixtures were repainted, and when the finishing touches are added, the place will have an entirely new appearance.

#### Prairie Fire In South Part of City at Noon

The Big Spring Volunteer Fire Department was called to the south part of the city today at noon in response to an alarm sent in when the prairie near Our Lumber Company, on the South Highway, caught fire. The blaze was soon extinguished. No damage resulted.

#### Andrews McCamey Test Down To 3850 Foot Depth

The Andrews-McCamey test well on section 17, just south of Big Spring is now drilling around the 3850 foot depth. This test is to be drilled to a depth of 3900 feet and possibly deeper if any favorable formations are encountered.

#### Three Trainmen Injured When Trains Collide

LONGVIEW, Tex., Jan. 24 (AP).—Three trainmen were injured early today when two Texas & Pacific freight trains collided at Quinoy, five miles west of Marshall. The injured are, Engineer Henderson, Fireman Tucker, and Brakeman Coon. All were taken to the T. & P. Hospital at Marshall.

#### G. D. Vallance Found Dead Ross City Jail

G. D. Vallance, said to be about thirty-one years of age, was found dead in the jail at Ross City this morning. Vallance was said to have been arrested at Forsan about 8:30 o'clock Wednesday night on a charge of intoxication.

When the officers visited the jail this morning they found the prisoner had died sometime during the night.

So far as we can learn, Vallance had not been here long, and it is not known whether or not he was employed by any of the oil companies operating in the nearby oil field.

The remains were brought to the Eberly Undertaking Parlor where they will be held pending instructions from relatives.

#### MOODY'S ADVISORY BODY OKES STATE ROADS BOND PLAN

Committee of Seven Decides on Statewide Road Bonds As Most Feasible Scheme for Modernizing State Highways. Bond Issue Would Be for \$175,000,000.

(By the Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Jan. 24.—A statewide bond issue, amounting to one hundred and seventy-five million dollars, was decided upon today by Governor Moody's Committee of Seven, appointed to co-ordinate the several highway financing bills, which have been proposed to give Texas a permanent and adequate system of highways, and also, to provide a program of construction over a period of several years in the future.

If the bond issue is authorized, the plans call for an expenditure of one hundred million dollars for construction and maintenance and seventy-five million dollars for the refunding to counties of money's heretofore spent building State Highways.

The Legislature today considered anew, pleas for 3 cent, 4 cent and 5 cent tax on gasoline, advanced in the hearings last night before four Senate and House committees.

Along with these petitions, the Legislature was weighing the merits of a three hundred million dollar road bond issue, a two per cent gross receipts tax on common carriers, and the return of a larger share of automobile registration fees to the counties for state highway work.

The governor's committee of seven, each member of which has a different opinion on highway legislation, planned to meet again today to formulate a recommendation to the Legislature, after failing to agree yesterday.

AUSTIN, Jan. 24 (AP).—Senators Moore of Greenville, and Hardin of Stephenville, were named by Lieutenant Governor Barry Miller today as members of the committee to investigate the land office.

#### Progress of Test and Locations Are Made

Plymouth Oil Company's No. 1 Kloth, Rumsey and Abrams, was shut down at 2296 feet after deepening two feet last Monday. # To Advertise for Bids On 1036-Foot-Steel and Concrete Traffic Bridge

Citizenship of County Will Rejoice to Know That This Long Needed Convenience and Life Saver, is Soon to Start. Viaduct Will Cost Approximately \$140,000.

That much discussed and needed traffic bridge or viaduct across the Texas & Pacific railway tracks on State Highway No. 9 is now assured unless the world comes to an end of some other dire calamity interposes. Judge H. R. Debenport informs us that he will turn in an advertisement this afternoon which calls for bids to be submitted on the construction of the viaduct.

The advertisement must be published thirty days—so February 23rd has been designated as the date on which all bids must be submitted, as on March 1st these bids will be opened in the office of the county judge with representatives of city, county and railroad present to decide which bidder is to be awarded the contract.

The viaduct proper is to be of steel and concrete, with brick paving on the three approaches. The viaduct will be approximately 1036 feet long, North and South, and including an additional approach from West First street about 164 feet long. There will be a clear span of 251 feet and three inches in the center of the viaduct where it passes above the railway tracks.

There will be a twenty-four-foot driveway on the viaduct and a five foot walk for pedestrians. The "whiteway" lighting system will be carried out.

Even though work on this big project is started early in March it will be next Fall before the viaduct can be opened to traffic.

## New Oil Well Makes This Field Loom Larger

Plymouth No. 1 Kieh, Rumsey & Abrams, in Howard County, has filled up 1,900 feet in 33.5 gravity oil when shut in at 2,294 feet, 20' oil in the lime pay, pending pipe line connections and the arrival of Levi Smith of Texon from Pittsburgh. Smith is vice-president of the Plymouth, in charge of its Texas operations, and also is president of the Big Lake Oil Company, the largest producer in Reagan County, and in which Plymouth owns three-fourth the stock. Texon is holding the other quarter. Plymouth's new Howard County well topped the lime slightly higher but the pay lower in the lime than Henshaw's No. 1A Settles, in section 6, now owned by American Maracaibo Company. The location is in the southwest corner of the northeast quarter of the southwest quarter of section 5, block 32, township 2 south, T. & P. Railway Company survey. It swabbed 200 barrels of oil in six hours at 2,244 feet.

## Livestock Conditions Are Favored Now

AUSTIN, Jan. 21.—Live stock conditions in Texas are generally favorable and the outlook is bright for the first part of the year, at least, according to Bernard Nichols, editor of the Texas Business Review, issued monthly by the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas.

"Shipments to the Fort Worth market in December were the smallest for a long time, all classes of animals except hogs showing large declines," Mr. Nichols said. "Shipments to that market were but 125,916 head, compared to 175,253 head in November and 173,300 head in December, 1927.

"The winter in Texas so far has been very mild and ample moisture has been available in most sections of the state to maintain ranges and pastures in good condition. As a result, animals have been holding up exceptionally well, and feeding has been rather limited except to thin animals and calves."

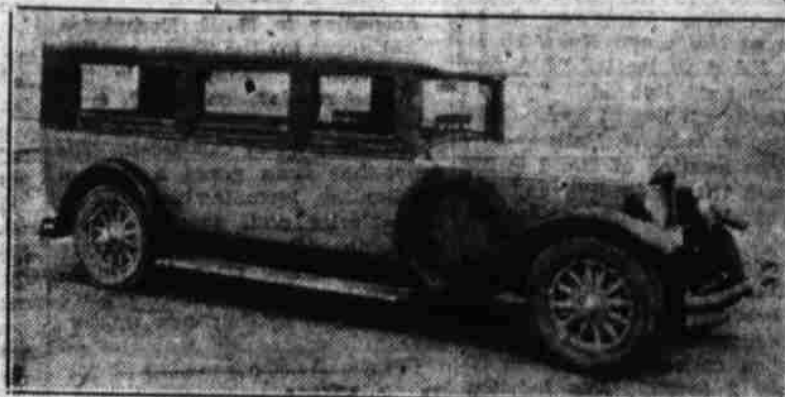

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A GOOD PROJECT TO TACKLE

We may not be able to build a north and south railroad, this year or next year, but it is not going to injure us to make an effort to interest railroad officials in this. And they will be easier to reach just now than at any time in history since several big systems want feeders to West Texas. In our own time we have seen several lines built in West Texas thru the start made by promoters who were working with hot air as their chief stock in trade. A live railroad committee could certainly accomplish some beneficial results.

EXPERT ADVICE TOO LOND DELAYED

No. The day of gravel roads in West Texas is part and gone, but Uncle Sam and the State of Texas ought to reimburse West Texas counties for some costly experiments in building gravel roads and paying for same with bond issues. The experts of the U. S. Federal State Highway Departments were supposed to know more about such matters than the citizens who blindly trusted to the highway experts.

Other experts now try to tell us the highway constructed under government supervision, never was the right kind—but such advice comes about ten or fifteen years too late to be of benefit.

REMODELLING THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

In a recent article by Albert W. Parker, minister of the First Congregational church of Oak Park, Illinois, appearing in Federal Council Bulletin, the reverend set forth ten new commandments of social justice, which he declares must be supplementary to the 10 commandments of personal righteousness as set forth in the Bible.

In view of the changing conditions of today his new commandments should merit the respectful reading by Americans especially of the clergy to whom they should have a special appeal.

The 10 new commandments follow:

I. I am the Lord thy God, but thou shalt remember that I am also the God of all the earth. I have no favorite children. The Negro and the Hindu, the Chinese, Japanese, Russian and Mexican, are all my beloved children.

II. Thou shalt not measure a city's greatness by its population or its bank clearings alone, but also by its low infant mortality, its homes, playgrounds, libraries, schools and hospitals and its low record for bootlegging, prostitution, robbery and murder.

III. Thou shalt remember that no civilization can rise above the level of its respect for and ideals of womanhood.

IV. Thou shalt remember thine own sins and build no prisons for revenge and punishment, but make thy courts clinics for the soul and thy jails hospitals for moral diseases.

V. Thou shalt remember that the end-product of industry is not goods or dividends but the kind of men and women whose lives are molded by that industry.

VI. Thou shalt press on from political democracy toward industrial democracy, remembering that no man is good enough or wise enough to govern another man without his consent, and that, in addition to a living wage, every man craves a reasonable share in determining the conditions under which he labors.

VII. Thou shalt outlaw war and make no threatening gestures, either with great navies or vast military preparations against thy neighbor.

VIII. Thou shalt honor men for character and service alone, and dishonor none because of race, color or previous condition of servitude.

IX. Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor by malicious propaganda or colored news or by calling him contemptuous names such as Dago, Chink, Jap, Wop, Nigger or Sheeny.

X. Thou shalt remember that when thine own ancestors were savages and barbarians other men brought to them the saving and civilizing Christian gospel. Now thou art rich and prosperous, beware lest thou export to Asia and Africa only thy patience and efficiency, thy workshops, goods and moving picture films, and forget to export the Christian message and the Christ-like spirit also.

SPEEDERS MUST BE DEALT WITH SEVERELY

Not only fines, but jail sentences as well, for drivers of speeding autos!

This is the plan to reduce speeding that is being tried out by a New York judge, and one wealthy young candy manufacturer has been compelled to spend a couple of days in jail, scrubbing floors and doing other tasks as the result of his desire to set up new speed records on public highways.

Should more judges follow the example of this Gotham magistrate, and pay no heed to the prominence or influence of the defendant at the bar, the now generally prevalent practice of speeding would be reduced to a minimum.

Fines, it would seem, fail to act as a check on the mania to speed. But the imposition of jail sentences, in addition to the fines, could certainly prove effective in curbing this dangerous tendency. Once an auto driver is made aware of the fact he will spend one or more days behind jail bars if he yields to the temptation to "step on it" there will be

a very noticeable increase in the number of careful drivers.

Speeders have small regard for their own safety, and little or none for that of others. They are a menace to the public, and should be dealt with severely.—El Paso Herald.

A new-comer to Big Spring was asked to aid in working on a committee in the interest of a better town, a better citizenship and a larger membership to the Chamber of Commerce and his reply is the kind that is needed to insure success for the many undertakings which mean so much for the future of our city. Here is the way he accepted his assignment:

"I have come to Big Spring to stay, and not to play. I am ready and more than willing to do anything I can do to make Big Spring a bigger and better city. Depend on me as far as I can go."

Just think what it would mean if we had five or ten thousand citizens who had this same spirit. There would be no limit to our accomplishments with a united and progressive citizenship working heart and soul to promote the growth and prosperity of Big Spring.

A LETTER TO DAD FROM PELON

"Oh, there be players that I have seen play, and heard others praise, and that highly, not to speak it profanely, that, neither having the accent of Christian, pagan, nor man, have so strutted and belloved that I have thought some of nature's journeymen had made men and not made them well, they imitate humanity so abominably."

Say Dad: I do not know who wrote all that load, above quoted, nor do I know just what it is all about but even to a cigarette coated brain like yours, and mine and Charlie's and Bob Piner's, and Fox Stripling's, it is plain enough that the old boy had a pain; and I suggest that he had just finished listening to some after dinner speaker at the Luncheon Club. Fox, at the last meeting, was saying that "the town needed men of vision."

Bob was saying that the town is OK. They are both wrong. Dad, the town has plenty of men of vision. If it needs any other kind of men than it now has, it is men of action. Men who will do something and not just talk and speechify.

Bob is wrong because no town is OK, for any considerable length of time. City builders must ever be up and doing something to increase the pay roll.

The first thing to do is to build a cotton seed oil mill, provided that, after a thorough investigation, you will find enough seed, tributary to the town, to justify the investment. Just how big must an oil mill be to pay the overhead? And can you find an outlet for the oil cake and hulls? These are the questions you will have to answer.

The best feature of a local enterprise is that it gets the fellows to working together. Dividends are only secondary.

There is plenty of wealth in Big Spring to do this little thing, and it can be done in such a way that nobody will be hurt. That is to say nobody need go hungry if they do not get a direct dividend the first year or so. In the meantime the indirect dividend will be great indeed. Just consider the cost and waste of shipping the seed out and shipping the hulls and cake back.

The farmer gets at least \$10.00 a ton less than the farmer in middle Texas gets for his seed. There is not always that difference but sometimes there is more. Then consider that you can catch your seed at the gin, then weigh it at the same gin, and drive around to their seed houses, unload them, and make from \$2 to \$3 per bale over and above what you get by setting, according to the rule that 100 pounds of lint gets you 170 pounds of seed. I am in hopes that the Farmers Gin has corrected that racket to some extent. Just think of it, Dad, 20,000 bales of seed every year for ten years means a half million dollars at least on weights alone. On price, it means a million more ten years and further more there would be more profit for the dairy man. Every farmer ought to take a little stock in this oil mill and if he can't take any stock at all, if he is too poor, like Tom Nabors, and Henry Thomas, let him give a couple of bales of seed. Poor old Tony—the last time I saw him he had just finished counting \$12,335.35 in gold, all but the 35c; and after counting same, three times, he hugged it up to him three times and grunted each time. Then he told Ira Driver to put it back in the vault. He does that on the third of every month, rain or shine. This time, he must take \$300.00 stock.

If you will only build this mill remember that you are building a pay roll and that is what it takes to build a city. After you do this cotton seed oil mill building, you can build an overall and glove factory.

In my next letter to you and Charlie, I will discuss the water question. I could have made this letter funnier by writing about Charlie, but this oil mill is really a serious matter.

## Obstacle In Way Of Oil Mill

The only thing that prevents the establishment of a cottonseed oil mill here, they say, is the fear that "the big fish might eat the little fish." In other words, local capital could be persuaded to invest in such an industry if there was some assurance that the price of cotton seed was not to be boosted out of all reason just to put the local plant out of business. Some corporations which have factories located at many points in the state make a practice of raising the price of raw material at one point and lower it at other points in order to wipe out any competition. If cotton seed is selling at the same basis throughout the state, an oil mill here could be made a paying proposition.

## Yancy Storey Bank Robber Given 5 Years

MARLIN, Jan. 22 (AP).—Yancy Storey, today was convicted of robbing the bank at Krum, Texas, in Denton county. The jury recommended the minimum sentence of five years. The jury began deliberations late yesterday but it was midnight before they reached their verdict. Storey had been charged with robbery with firearms, for looting the bank on June 9th, 1925. He had been tried twice on this charge, being sentenced 99 years, in Dallas, and in a new trial at Sherman the jury was unable to agree.

## Extradition of Loco Weed Is Being Studied

COLLEGE STATION, Jan. 22.—Discovery of some way to eradicate the poisonous loco weed or means to abate its baneful effect on cattle is one of the objectives of the research program of the experiment station at A. & M. College of Texas, for the next two years. Director A. B. Conner of the station has pointed out. The effect of the loco weed on cattle is to make them emaciated and eventually "loco" or crazy with death resulting in many instances. The weed is found throughout the range country and causes heavy losses annually to cattlemen, the loss of twenty-eight ranchers alone from this plant having been announced recently as \$300,000 for one year. Request for aid in this matter was received more than a year ago from cattlemen and citizens of the Trans-Pecos region of Texas and \$30,000 a year for two years has been asked of the Legislature for research work in this field by the experiment station.

## BIG SPRING PUBLIC SCHOOLS FOR A QUARTER OF A CENTURY

In taking up the administration of the last two superintendents of the Big Spring public schools, we will finish the chronological discussion of the administrations of the various superintendents since the organization of this independent school district. Our next article will deal with the individuals that are more directly responsible for the growth and development of the city schools. It will deal with the various school board members and the teachers of the schools for these many years, not in detail but that we may call to mind to the patrons of the school and former teachers and students of the schools some of the memories of those days gone by.

In our last article, we discussed briefly the administration of Mr. Braisher, whose successor, Mr. A. W. Flanakin of Waco was elected in 1920 to succeed him. Mr. Flanakin was elected at a salary of \$2,750. Shortly after his election he was elected secretary of the school board. On July 5, 1920, the Big Spring public schools under the leadership of Mr. Flanakin observed its first "Better English Week." In Feb. 1921, the one dollar rate for public schools was made effective. Mr. Flanakin's record of his work shows that he had a great deal of technical school training. It was revealed that the cost per pupil in the Big Spring public schools was \$24.25 for each elementary student and \$63.12 for each high school student.

On April 13, 1923, the school board elected Mr. P. B. Bittle to succeed Mr. Flanakin. Mr. Bittle's administration being the last of course does not need much publicity because the people remember what was done throughout his administration. On June 4, 1923, the board passed a ruling unanimously that young married women not be employed as teachers in the city schools. At this meeting Dr. E. C. Ellington was elected president of the school board. Miss Rogers was elected as teacher of the seventh grade.

The Big Spring schools at this time had an enrollment of 1,029 students. In 1924 the people voted a \$35,000 school bond to build the present Junior High School. Mr. J. M. Metcalf was elected principal of the High School on June 13, 1924. In 1925 Mr. Norman Spence was elected principal of the High School.

Mr. Bittle, being a tennis fan and president of the Tennis Club, asked permission to erect the present splendid tennis courts that we

have on the high school ground it was also provided that the students be allowed to use the court at times to be scheduled.

Miss Rogers was elected principal of South Ward, April 19, 1925. Mr. Spencer was re-elected principal of the High School at a salary of \$2,250, and Mr. Koenig, who is now superintendent of the Compton schools, was elected principal of Central Ward and later was elected principal of Junior High at a salary of \$1,500.

Mr. Bittle reported at a board meeting that the negro school had an enrollment of 21 pupils.

On June 17, 1923, Mr. T. P. Higgins was elected principal of the High School at a salary of \$2,900. At the same meeting George Gehlert was elected professor of mathematics in the High School at a salary of \$1,350. On August 8 of the same year, Miss Clara Cox was elected as teacher of English in the High School. On June 28, 1927, the school bond was carried for an enlargement of the South Ward School, as we now know it. Mr. A. J. Sparks, who had been principal of Central Ward School was elected to the principalship of Junior High School and Mr. Hollibaugh to succeed him.

On Feb. 9, 1928, the bond election passed for \$150,000 to erect the present new addition of the high school, to repair other buildings, and the remainder of the money to be used in erecting the new Central Ward School to replace the present Central Ward School. It will be interesting to note here that the new high school addition is practically finished and will be accepted within the next week.

Supt. Bittle having been elected superintendent of the Eastland public schools at a considerable raise in salary left a vacancy in the superintendency of the city schools, and the present superintendent, was elected to succeed him.

## Fire Hazards Must Be Corrected Now

Chief of Police E. A. Long is today making the rounds to make sure that the citizens have removed the fire hazards which the inspector from the State Fire Marshal's office pointed out during a recent inspection of this city. The gas stove is the gravest menace where two cut-offs are used and the fire marshal is insisting that only one cut-off and that at the wall be permitted.

## Poultry Show and School To Be Next Week

Courty Agent J. V. Bush has been busy the past few weeks arranging for the first annual poultry show and school, that is to be held in Big Spring, on Tuesday and Wednesday, Jan. 29 and 30. Invitations have been mailed out throughout the country, asking the farmers and poultry raisers to enter their choicest birds in the show. All indications point to a most successful show and school.

E. N. Holmgren, poultry specialist of A. & M. College, will be in Big Spring for this school, and during the two days will make interesting and informative talks on subjects of vital concern to the poultry raisers. It is usually an empty head that swells the easiest.
