

When asked what the program of dairy development in Texas needs most, R. L. Thornton, Dallas banker and civic leader stated that Texas needs more dairy minded bankers.

Until the banker appreciates the value of the dairy cow to his community little or no progress is going to be made in dairy development. The whole program rests the dairy cow in the hands of a

Mr. Thornton states his bank had farmers who had from two to one ly one loan to go uncollected-and

and during the twelve years had onscarcely a skip in the payments on these loans. He said the farmer must be

granted long time loans-15 to 18 months-with monthly payments. Industrial equipment is bought on this plan and the farmer should have the same privilege. In fact he can't afford to handle it any other Lets take an example: Suppose a

farmer comes to the bank and borrows \$800. He plans to buy 10 cows at \$80 per head. His payment on the loan must be less than his net income from those ten cows. Immgdialely the farmers must buy milk pails, feed, various type of equipment; maybe he will have to build a new barn. He has to live, clothe his family, educate them, pay doctor and other bills.




