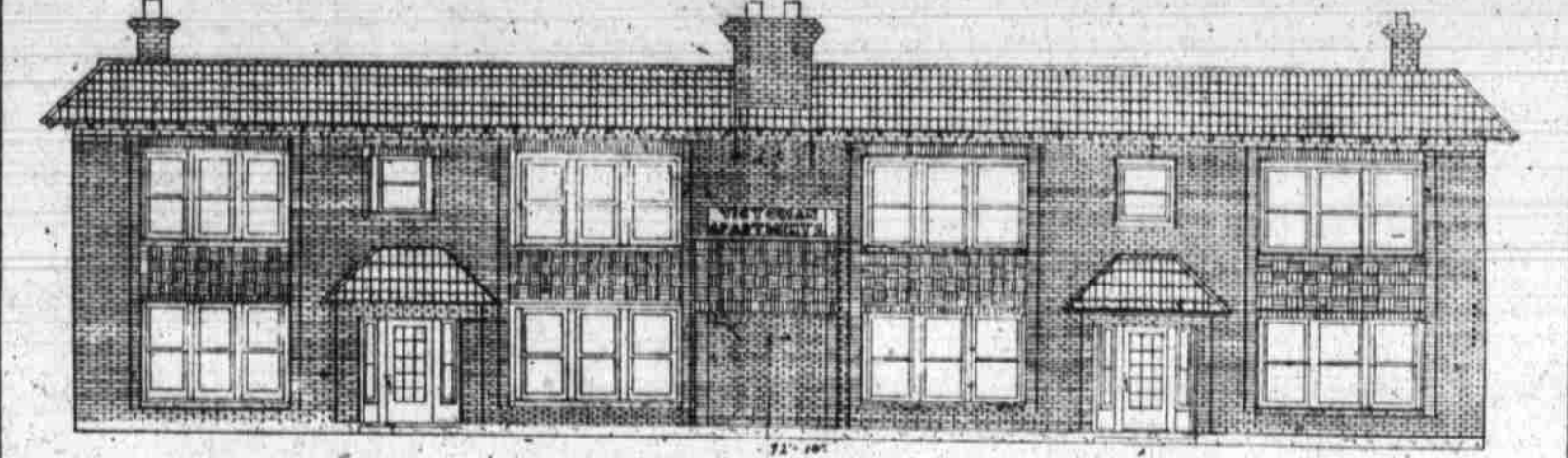
DRY LAW FUND INCREASE

3 HI-JACKERS GAUGHT IN BORDER CITY, SAT; ADMIT ROBBERY HERE

Sheriff Jess Slaughter and deputies were jubilant Saturday afternoon when a message was received from the sheriff at El Paso that he had in custody the three young men who had staged a hi-jacking in Big Spring early Friday morning. The message advised that the three admitted the holdup. They gave their names as Charles Hobbs, aged 17-years, Homer Thazen, aged 16-years, Kenneth Whitham, aged 14-years. They were in a Pontiac coach when arrested.

These are the three who are said to have held up one of the proprietors of the East Side Grocery, about daylight Friday morning and securing \$60.00 in cash and some supplies.

Sheriff Slaughter spared no expense to capture these hi-jackers and had West Sheriffs in every section of West Texas to be on the lookout for the trio. A good part of Friday was put in by Mr. Slaughter and his force in trying to land this bunch. They are believed to have done considerable dodging in the adjacent territory before they headed for El Paso. This capture is going to have a tendency to discourage hi-jackers in the future, as local officers are determined to stop this form of crime or give the hi-jackers a chance to spend a good long term in the penitentiary. A deputy sheriff left last night for El Paso to bring the prisoners to this city.

Two Wells Shot And Will Make Over 1,000 Bbls.

Oil flowed seventy five feet over the derrick of the Louisiana Oil and Refining Co.'s Settles No. 3 well in section 6, block 32, township 2 South, about twelve miles south of Big Spring, Friday, when this well was given a 250 quart to 2300 feet. This well is rated at from 1000 to 1200 barrels.

The American Maracalho Settles A 2 well was given a 200 quart shot from 2248 to 2280 feet, Friday and while it failed to flow because of being choked down by a yard of sand the well was cleaned out and will make more than 1,000 barrels of oil per day on the pump.

CROUP DROPS FOR YOUNGER CHILDREN'S COLDS

AN ORDINANCE

Requiring Pedestrians and personal driving or operating vehicles to stop at certain street intersections on certain light signals.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF BIG SPRING

SECTION 1. Any person, whether a pedestrian, or driving, operating, or propelling any vehicle of any character, upon the streets of the City of Big Spring, approaching the following named street intersections, to wit:

Third Street with Runnels Street
Second Street with Runnels Street
Third Street with Main Street
Second Street with Main Street
Third Street with Scurry Street,

shall stop before entering the intersecting street, if the signal light placed in the center of said intersection shows either a red light (stop) or yellow light (caution) and shall not proceed until the green (go) light comes on.

SECTION 2. No person driving or operating any vehicle shall make a U turn at any of the street intersections mentioned in Section 1 hereof, nor shall any person driving or operating a motor vehicle make a left hand turn at the intersection of Second street and Main Street.

SECTION 3. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be fined not less than one dollar, nor more than one hundred dollars for each violation.

SECTION 4. Due to the urgent haste required in regulating traffic in said city and at said intersections, an emergency is hereby declared, and the rule requiring an ordinance or resolution to be read at three meetings of the City Commission is hereby dispensed with, and the ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage at one meeting of said City Commission and its publication as by law required.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF BIG SPRING:

Section 1. Section 19 of the ordinance regulating the inspection, grading and sale of milk and milk products, passed by the City Commission of the City of Big Spring, Texas, on the 23rd day of October, 1928, is hereby changed and amended so as to permit the sale of ungraded milk, and milk which does not conform with the requirements of GRADE "A" and GRADE "B" milk as in said ordinance defined, provided that is said milk is bottled or labeled, it shall be plainly labeled and marked "UNGRADED MILK," but same shall not be sold or offered for sale unless each bottle thereof is so labeled and marked.

Section 2. Every grocery store, restaurant, cafe, soda fountain, or similar establishment, selling ungraded milk, or milk drinks in which ungraded milk is used, shall display a card furnished by the City Health Officer, stating: "WE SELL UNGRADED MILK HERE" or "WE USE UNGRADED MILK IN OUR DRINKS," as the case may be.

Section 3. Any person, firm, or corporation, violating any provision of this ordinance, shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars, nor more than one thousand dollars for each violation; each sale of ungraded milk in violation of this ordinance shall be deemed a separate violation of this ordinance; each day any grocery store, restaurant, cafe, soda fountain, or similar establishment shall sell ungraded milk, or milk drinks in which ungraded milk is used, failing to play the cards as in said ordinance provided, shall be considered a separate violation.

Section 4. Due to the necessity of remedying the defects in said prior ordinance, an emergency is hereby declared and a rule requiring an ordinance resolution to be read at three meetings of the City Commission is hereby dispensed with, and the ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage at one meeting of the City Commission, and its publication as by law required.

If Big Spring is to have a real airport it is going to be up to the citizenship to assist in providing the necessary equipment. H. F. Taylor, owner of an ideal airport site two miles west of the city, agrees to operate the airport for a period of five years, depending on an income for the planes landing at the field providing the citizenship will provide a hangar, such as is needed for an airport of this class. Married Women With Jobs Tend to Disintegrate Family

FORT WORTH, Jan. 7.—Women in industry are a force that is tending to disintegrate the family very definitely, says Carl D. Wells, professor of sociology at Texas Christian University here, in discussing the effect married women in industry is having on the family. "The industrial revolution is the greatest single blow the old patriarchal family system has ever had," Prof. Wells points out. "However the family is changing rather than breaking up."

Changing conditions and modern conveniences have robbed women of their normal tasks and caused them to go into the business world. Poverty and a desire for a higher standard of living also have caused women to go to work as wage earners, he says. In regard to the number of children, in families where the mother works, Prof. Wells says that until we can rearrange the family system there will be fewer children in families with a higher standard of living. "That cannot be helped. Women become interested in their work and had rather not have children," he explained.

"In our larger cities it is becoming more and more impossible to maintain a decently high standard of living and at the same time have a large family. Among the more educated classes, and those of a high standard of living the birth rate is decreasing. In order to maintain the high standard something must be done. "Most countries are faced today with two problems caused by women in industry," Prof. Wells points out. "First, how to prevent racial extinction and national decline, fear of this being caused by the falling birth rate. Second, how to care for married women in industry. Measures of some kind are being adopted by these countries to meet these new problems. Included in Mexico's new proposed labor plan is this provision: 'That women must be paid their wages three months before and one month after childbirth.' A cross-section view of the attitude taken by T. C. U. girl students on women working is shown by a vote taken in one class study on family problems. Girls in this class were asked to check what career they would choose. A large majority of the girls signified that they preferred to stay in the home to working at any profession. "Married women working does not necessarily mean the breaking up of the home as an institution," Prof. Wells thinks.

A. B. Spencer, a former president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and formerly manager of the old Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, died suddenly, at his home, 2017 Sixth Avenue, Fort Worth, late Saturday afternoon. Spencer was a resident of Crosbyton for a number of years and while there superintended the building of the railroad connecting Lubbock and Crosbyton, which was later sold to the Santa Fe. During the first part of his residence in Crosbyton Spencer was manager of the Bar C Ranch and Land Company. He moved from Chicago to Crosbyton. Coming to Fort Worth the latter part of 1925 to accept the management of the old Chamber of Commerce he was identified with that organization until January, 1928, when the organization merged with the old Manufacturers and Wholesale Association into the present Association of Commerce. Spencer was the only man in the history of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to serve two terms as president. He headed the organization during the presidential terms of 1922-23 and 1923-24.
